

CLARK LEADS BUT LACKS 170 VOTES

New York Delegation Goes to Speaker.

CHANGE IS ON TENTH BALLOT

Wilson Forces, 200 Behind, Do Not Give Up Hope.

BRYAN WILDLY CHEERED

Prolonged Demonstration Follows Murphy's Announcement of Switch to Speaker, Who Gains 104 on That Ballot.

BALTIMORE, June 28.—(2 A. M. Saturday).—A sensational break in the New York delegation gave that state's 90 votes to Champ Clark on the tenth ballot in the Democratic National convention this morning, carried the Speaker to a total of 534 out of the 1088 delegates, but still left him 170 votes short of the two-thirds vote necessary to a choice.

The balloting was continuing at an early hour this morning with the Clark forces outwardly confident and the Wilson managers doggedly asserting that the final "break" would come to the New Jersey Governor.

The Clark managers jubilantly asserted that every Democratic candidate who received a majority in the convention always succeeded in eventually getting the required two-thirds.

Early Ballots Uneventful.

The first nine were almost uneventful, Clark leading and Woodrow Wilson not far behind. Then followed Harmon and Underwood in the order named until the tenth ballot, when the New York delegation left Harmon for Clark, putting Harmon in fourth place and Underwood in third. There followed, of the dinner lights, Governor Marshall, of Indiana, and Governor Baldwin, of Connecticut, favorite sons. Baldwin's name, however, disappeared after the fourth ballot and was seen no more.

William Jennings Bryan received a vote on nearly every ballot, and on the second received two. Senator Kern, of Indiana, who was being groomed as Bryan's dark-horse choice, appeared in the balloting after the second, and thereafter had at least one vote and sometimes two. On ballots up to the 11th, Mayor Gaynor, of New York, received a vote.

New York Breaks to Clark.

The long-predicted break in the New York delegation came in the 10th ballot, when Charles F. Murphy announced 81 out of the 90 votes from that state for Clark. He got no further when a great demonstration broke out among the spectators, delegates and friends. While it was in progress there were several firecrackers on the floor.

Those who said they were in the confidence of the New York delegation predicted there would be a switch away from Clark in subsequent ballots.

Murphy later announced that the New York delegation showed 81 for Clark, 8 for Wilson and 1 for Underwood, but under the unit rule gave all its 90 votes to Clark.

The announcement of the 81 votes for Clark from New York started a demonstration among the Clark delegates. They did not wait for Murphy to announce the completion of the New York vote, that state having 90 in all.

A Clark enthusiast grabbed the standard of the Massachusetts delegation, that state not having voted. A scramble in which the Wilson and Clark factions indulged resulted.

Standards Reach Platform.

The standards of several states were carried to the platform, where the sergeant-at-arms endeavored to restrain the delegates. After a scramble the bearers reached the platform.

At 12:38 the demonstration had continued for 20 minutes and unlike those of last night it was carried on almost exclusively by the delegates. The previous outbursts had been largely the work of spectators. Soon afterward the chairman pounded for order and the rollcall continued.

New York was counted as 90 votes for Clark, under the unit rule.

Bryan Wildly Cheered.

W. J. Bryan entered the hall as the Wilson demonstration was at its height and went to the Nebraska delegation. The cheering became deafening. Bryan started a poll of the Nebraska delegation. Two gray-haired delegates from Nebraska grasped his hands and cheered.

At 1:28, when the chairman tried to restore order, the Wilson-Bryan demonstration had lasted 50 minutes. Bryan, after conferring with the Oregon delegation, returned to his seat by the Nebraska standard.

TWO OREGONIANS BREAK

Holman and Godfrey Vote for Clark on Eleventh Ballot.

On the eleventh ballot the Oregon delegation broke with two delegates, Holman and Godfrey, voting for Clark.

RAILWAYS TAXED TO HANDLE CROPS

GRAIN YIELD IN MIDDLE WEST REQUIRES 300,000 CARS.

Kansas, Nebraska and Oklahoma to Have Greatest Output in History of That Section.

CHICAGO, June 28.—(Special).—Roads of the Middle West, particularly those operating through Kansas, Nebraska and Oklahoma, are making preparations for the greatest grain movement they have ever had.

Estimates made by traffic officials of several roads are that the wheat movement alone in the above three states will call for more than 300,000 cars. Facing the prospect of this tremendous traffic movement, they have under active way plans to concentrate every available car by the time the grain begins to move.

It is estimated that the first grain movement in Kansas alone will call into requisition about 45,000 cars. Railroads are working their car repair shops at different points day and night.

LABOR NAMES ELIGIBLE

Central Council Recommends Three for Municipal Job.

The Central Labor Council last night decided to recommend to Mayor Tushnet the names of three representatives of organized labor from which the Mayor is to appoint one as a member of the Free Employment Board which is to be reorganized. The names proposed were: J. J. Miller, W. Lawrence and William A. Marshall.

It was reported at last night's meeting of the Council that sufficient signatures had been obtained for three proposed initiative bills in which the trades unionists are interested. One of these measures was initiated by the Council and provides for the election of labor, provides for a uniform workday of eight hours on all state, county and municipal work, while the third makes the flat salary law, applicable to the State Printer, effective in 1913 instead of 1915, as provided in the original bill enacted by the State Legislature in 1911.

ENOCH ARDEN NO BIGAMIST

Warren Wade Not Man of Same Name Who Wedded Elizabeth.

LOS ANGELES, June 28.—(Special).—Official investigation by the District Attorney's office today absolved Warren Wade from the suspicion of having two wives. Deputy District Attorney Keys has proved to the satisfaction of Mrs. Elizabeth Wade that the Wade who played the Enoch Arden to Mrs. Susie M. Wade-Ormsby is not her husband.

Mrs. Wade said that the names were identical and that the cities visited by Wade during his absence in Alaska were the same. Wade, who lives in Bishop, returned recently to find that his wife had been married to George M. Ormsby. The wife, hearing of her husband's return, secured an annulment of the marriage and will be remarried to Ormsby, it is said.

COAL CARRIERS LOSE CASE

Commission Rules Rates West Are Unduly Discriminatory.

WASHINGTON, June 28.—Sharply criticizing the practices of the Denver & Rio Grande Railroad respecting the distribution of its coal car equipment, the Interstate Commerce Commission today decided the case of the Consolidated Fuel Company against the Atchafalaya, Topeka & Santa Fe Railroad and other carriers in favor of the complainant.

The present relation of rates on coal to destinations in Idaho, Montana, Washington and Oregon were held to be unduly discriminatory as between the Utah and Rock Springs fields, and the differential against Utah Coal was reduced to 25¢ a ton.

The railroads were ordered to establish through routes and joint rates from the Utah mines to all points, taking such rates from the Rock Springs mines.

NORTHWEST STANDS FIRM

Washington and Idaho Wait to Switch to Bryan's Choice.

WASHINGTON, June 28.—(Special).—Throughout today's balloting in convention delegates from Oregon, Washington and Idaho stood by their instructions, Oregon's 10 votes being given always to Wilson, while Washington and Idaho together gave Clark 22 votes each time.

As compromise talk increases, it becomes more and more probable that Washington and Idaho will abandon Clark and swing to any candidate proposed by Bryan. It would accord with the personal views of most all Washington and Idaho delegates to vote for Bryan personally. Oregon's delegates, however, will stand by Wilson to the end, so they announce.

DARROW JUROR TAKEN ILL

Attack, Thought to Be Appendicitis, Postpones Trial.

LOS ANGELES, June 28.—The sudden illness of Juror Leavitt halted the trial of Clarence S. Darrow for alleged jury bribery today. Leavitt was stricken last night with an attack of what appeared to be appendicitis and was under the care of two physicians during the night.

The trial was adjourned until 1:30 o'clock Monday afternoon.

SUFFRAGIST JOAN RIDES IN PARADE

Demonstration Marks Day in Baltimore.

CAUSE IS HERALDED TO CITY

Literature Distributed to Watching Thousands.

MUSIC AIDS ENTHUSIASTS

Miss Ida Neepier, Garbed in White Riding Suit and With Great Cape of White Embroidered With Gold Leads Marchers.

BALTIMORE, June 28.—(Special).—Joan of Arc rode through the streets of Baltimore tonight. Not the real Joan of old, but a real one of the present day, Miss Ida Neepier.

The city enjoyed the suffragist demonstration, of which Miss Neepier was the central figure. For days the women have been taking the delegates to the convention by the lapels of their coats and whispering into their ears the wonderful things which will follow if a suffrage plank is inserted in the Democratic platform.

Regardless of the results of the women's campaign, the delegates have found them exceedingly charming to converse with, and, despite pressing convention duties, turned out in large numbers to watch the marchers pass. And the women were in earnest about the parade. In speeches from automobiles and carriages, by the distribution of literature and carrying motto-bearing banners, they proclaimed to all who passed the suffragist requirement of the hour.

Parade Accompanied by Speeches.

To bring their cause more forcefully to the attention of the convention city, they organized the parade, and, led by the reincarnated Joan, marched through the business section of the city. The parade started in Mount Vernon place and there at the base of the monument of the Father of their Country some mothers of the country and some daughters made speeches to the men who gathered and looked at them in awe. But the women were not satisfied with merely being gazed at. They wanted to be listened to and taken seriously. If the men on the sidewalk had any objections to the cause of suffrage they were invited to state them. Those who had not were commanded to pledge themselves to talk woman suffrage to all their men friends.

Enthusiasm Leads in Jail. There were no objectors and many pledges. In fact, one man kept insisting upon pledging himself to a woman in a gaily decorated automobile. He reiterated his pledge so often that finally he got a ride in a less pretentious motor vehicle, and in the morning the judge doubtless will make him take another kind of a pledge.

Clark makes substantial gains on tenth ballot.

First nine ballots fail to shake the strength of any candidate materially, although Wilson makes small gains.

LIFESAVERS RESCUE TWO

Cape Disappointment Crew Goes to Men of Overturned Sailboat.

ASTORIA, Or., June 28.—(Special).—Two men were saved from drowning today by Captain Stuart and the Cape Disappointment Life Saving crew. The men were Elmer Mikola and Sander Leimola, who fish for the Co-Operative Cannery. Their sailboat was carried across the spit by the strong tide and ran into the breakers near McKean Head, where they dropped anchor about 5:30 this morning. Soon afterwards the boat was struck by a heavy sea and rolled over three times. The life saving crew hastened to render assistance and succeeded in rescuing the men and also in picking up their boat and net.

JAP'S WHITE WIFE INSANE

Fifth Case of Same Kind Occurs in Los Angeles in Year.

LOS ANGELES, June 28.—(Special).—Mrs. Hachisaku Tuguo, the American wife of a Japanese living at 255 Boyd street, was brought to the Receiving Hospital today and she was so violent that she was sent directly to the insane ward at the County Hospital.

According to Tuguo, they were married in Vancouver, B. C., February 15, making the trip to the Canadian territory because the laws of the United States would not allow an Asiatic to intermarry with an American. He said his wife was Miss Jennie Dugan.

A certificate was issued by Assistant Police Surgeon Kidder and the woman will be taken before the lunacy commission. This is the fifth case with exactly the same conditions this year.

GERMAN DIRIGIBLE BURNED

Several Workmen and Soldiers Injured at Dusseldorf.

DUSSELDORF, Germany, June 28.—The Zeppelin dirigible balloon Schwaben I, stationed here, was completely destroyed by fire today following an explosion of escaping hydrogen gas caused when a strong gust of wind broke it from its moorings and made it collapse in the middle.

Several workmen and soldiers were burned or otherwise injured, some of them seriously, but not fatally. The airship arrived from Frankfurt last night. Owing to the high wind, it could not be directed into the balloon shed and was anchored outside. The balloon was insured for \$162,500 against explosion.

RARE OPERATION MAY WIN

Girl, Cripple Since Babe, Will Try First Step at 16 Years.

SPOKANE, Wash., June 28.—(Special).—One week from today Lavina Randall, 16 years old, will take her first lesson in walking. Plaster casts, which have held her crippled limbs in place since a delicate operation on June 5, will be removed next Friday and the two limbs, which she has never straightened here, will support her frail body for the first time in her life.

At the age of six weeks the child was taken ill. The muscles on the front of her legs sloughed away and the muscles at the back of the legs forced her to double her limbs.

FEDERAL TIE-UP UNLIKELY

Officials Say Lack of Appropriations Will Not Hinder.

WASHINGTON, June 28.—The threatened tie-up of the Government departments on July 1, because of the failure of Congress to pass the big appropriation bill, is not likely to occur, according to high officials and members of the Cabinet, who talked with President Taft today. Many Cabinet officers were of the opinion that in most instances employees of the departments who hold their positions under statute can be kept at work after July 1, whether Congress passes the appropriation bills or not.

EDDY WILL AGAIN UPHELD

Court Denies Rehearing in Scientist Church Founder's Case.

CONCORD, N. H., June 28.—The Supreme Court today denied a rehearing in the case involving the legality of the residuary bequest of Mrs. Mary Baker Eddy to the First Church of Christ, Scientist, of Boston.

The Supreme Court recently ruled that the residuary bequest was legal and did not conflict with statutes quoted by the plaintiffs limiting the size of bequests to churches.

OLD WELL FOUND WHERE JAIL STOOD

FORGOTTEN HOLE UNCOVERED BY WRECKING CONTRACTOR.

Excavation Eight Feet in Diameter by 100 Deep Not Recalled by Pioneers of Portland.

An old well of huge dimensions was discovered yesterday at Third and Oak streets, under the site where the old city jail was recently dismantled. How the well came to be there and for what purpose it was used, is a mystery to old residents who have been informed of the discovery.

A wrecking contractor, removing material from the old jail site, came upon an arch of brickwork where the jail stable formerly stood. He set his men to tearing the brick away, and soon uncovered the well, which was found to be eight feet in diameter and 100 feet deep, fully 70 lower than the river. It was walled with three tiers of fine brick and the contractor started removing these.

The salvaging of the brick had proceeded for some distance under ground when the architect in charge appeared and ordered immediate cessation, as the caving in of the well, he feared, would cause the collapse of the Worcester building, which is all masonry.

Soundings were then taken, and the depth of the well was determined. Old-time members of the force, including Captain Moore and Ben Branch, say they never heard of the well. Both recall when the rule in the city was to house the patrol wagon, but did not know at that time what was underneath. Inquiry among old residents failed to throw any light on the subject. For at least 20 years it has been forgotten that the well existed.

LEADERS ARE MUM ON VICE-PRESIDENT

Premature Talk May Injure, Is Fear.

BALANCED TICKET PROBABLE

If Clark Wins, Second Place Will Be From East.

DIVERSION IS EXPECTED

Amateur Manager May Attempt to Aid Own Candidate Before Party Choice for President Is Selected.

BALTIMORE, June 28.—(Special).—Thus far no candidates' managers are discussing the Vice-Presidency. The situation is exactly similar to that in the Taft campaign in Chicago, where premature discussion of the Vice-Presidency might have proved fatal.

That amateur managers of some candidate might attempt a diversion of this kind before the convention meets again was expected, but the veteran leaders are keeping still.

Little Being Said Now.

The most that can be got out of them is: "If Clark is nominated the Vice-Presidential candidate will come from the East and if Wilson is nominated he will come from the West."

There is some talk of a ticket composed of Clark and Wilson or Wilson and Clark, but it is doubtful whether either man would consent to run second to the other. Speaker Clark is said to be opposed to giving up his present post, which ranks in power second only to that of the Presidency, while Governor Wilson is said to prefer to be the chief executive of a state rather than the "moderator of the Senate."

Seven Are Prospects.

Eastern men most talked of for Vice-President include Governor Foss of Massachusetts; Governor Baldwin, of Connecticut, and Mayor Gaynor, of New York, while the Westerners most talked of are Governor Harmon, of Ohio, and Governor Marshall and Senator John W. Kern, of Indiana.

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INDIANS MADE HONOR MEN

Convicted, Court Lets Them Go Home Before Serving Sentence.

During the territorial times in Oklahoma it was the rule in the United States Court of that district, after an Indian was convicted, to permit him to return to his home and settle his business affairs before the sentence was executed, even if it was the death penalty. Similar action was taken in the United States District Court yesterday by Judge Bean when Ab Captain and George Gray, Klamath Indians, pleaded guilty to having introduced liquor into the reservation and each was sentenced to 60 days in the County Jail and to pay a fine of \$100.

In view of the fact that both are farmers and their crops are ripening Judge Bean permitted them to go home, on their own recognizance, and attend to the harvest. They are to return on August 15 and begin serving out their 60 days' sentence.

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
