

MISS WHITNEY IS SUFFRAGISTS' GUEST

Luncheon at Imperial Hotel At-
tracts Many More Than Can
Be Accommodated.

MISS WOLD IN THE CHAIR

Postmaster Merrick, H. Eilers, Mrs.
W. J. Hawkins and Mrs. Sara
Ehrgott, Aside From Guest of
Honor, Make Address.

Serious consideration of the ways and
means by which the rights of women
to participate in the Government can be
best secured, was the subject of the
luncheon at the Imperial Hotel, which
was given in honor of Miss Anita
Whitney, the woman "through whose
untiring efforts California has won,
and Oregon will win, the struggle for
equal franchise."

When Miss Emma Wold, president of
the College Equal Suffrage League,
arose to introduce the speakers she
struck a happy note by alluding to
the presence of members of both sexes.

"We are here together, symbols of
equality and fellowship, to work shoulder
to shoulder and side by side for the
success of the movement in the
elections in November; inability of
more than 40 people to secure seats;
enthusiasm of business men, men of
science, of letters and of thought,
clever speeches, offering well-grounded
arguments; these were the main fea-
tures of the luncheon at the Imperial
Hotel yesterday in honor of Miss Anita
Whitney, the woman "through whose
untiring efforts California has won,
and Oregon will win, the struggle for
equal franchise."

Business is Potent Factor.
Postmaster Merrick said: "No one
save those whose reasons are sinister
and unfair can oppose this movement.
Possibly a certain class of business men
will object, but only because that class
fears its business may be affected. This
is, in itself, one of the strongest argu-
ments because an investigation of those
opponents will reveal the fact that their
business is connected with the very
conditions that women hope to im-
prove."

By Eilers said in part:
"As a result of general apathy public
business is not in the best hands, but
is being run for the benefit of the in-
dividual. We must awaken a deeper
sense of the obligations of citizenship.
You women are not asking for a privi-
lege, but a duty and an obligation."

Miss Whitney's rising was the signal
for an outburst of cheering and for
the presentation to her of a magnifi-
cent bouquet of the pink roses of
Portland by La Reine Helen Baker,
one of the committee in charge of
affairs.

After alluding to the enjoyment the
women of California had experienced in
waging their fight in the cause of
freedom and the betterment of social
conditions, Miss Whitney went on to
tell of the way the right for the im-
provement of their object in Oregon.

Persistence is Necessary.
"Our work was carried on steadily
month by month, not only by women,
but also by men, who saw the vision
as we saw it," said Miss Whitney, "and
not the wealthy man of the large cities,
but the man who knew what the
women of his family meant to him,
and who had learned in times of stress
to rely on their judgment and advice."

"Don't neglect your outlying
districts. Organized voters are the
city of Portland, fears the vote of
woman, and it is only by the votes
from all the counties that we can hope
to overcome the hostile forces of the
evil interests in the large cities."

"In four of your counties there is
good organization. In seven more
work has been done, but it is not
efficient. Every county must have an
efficient organization."

"In all these counties secure the help
of the local newspaper. The power
of the press cannot be overestimated.
I have rarely seen articles so con-
vincing and so able as the editorials in
The Morning News. The editorials
more than any other papers and
our labors will be lightened."

Mrs. W. J. Hawkins and Sara
Ehrgott also spoke. The former
referred to the predominance of the
male viewpoint at the present day,
and to the fact that even a model
husband, who was a model husband,
sent his wife, could not imbue himself
with her personality.

Mrs. Ehrgott said she was glad to see
that those present understood the vital
elements of the campaign, and that they
were not like the husbands who gave
way in this, as they did in other things,
with an indulgent and patronizing
attitude.

FARE TO ALBANY IS FIXED

One-Way Rate for Round Trip An-
nounced for Celebration July 4.

A single "one way" fare of \$2.50 has
been fixed for the round trip to Al-
bany July 4 for the celebration of the
opening of the new line of the Oregon
Electric into that city. Albany has
raised \$2000 for the combined celebra-
tion of Independence day and the com-
ing of the railway, and elaborate prepa-
rations are being made for the enter-
tainment of the Portland crowd, which
will arrive in the first special train to
be run over the new line. The ex-
cursion is under the auspices of the
railway officials and of the Portland
Commercial Club.

Portland will not be alone in assist-
ing Albany to celebrate. Three hun-
dred automobiles will bring visitors
from Eugene, and all other important
towns in the Willamette Valley have
dispensed with celebrations of the
Fourth of July, and will send large de-
legations to Albany.

Special entertainment and sports will
be the programme of the day, which
will begin with a parade at 11 o'clock,
led by the delegation of Portland vis-
itors, who leave Portland at 7:45 on
that day and reach Albany at 10:45.
The programme will close with a
luncheon in the park, served by the
women of Albany. Trains will be re-
turning to Portland throughout the
evening after 2:30 P. M., and the ex-
cursion ticket will be good for any of
them.

NEW YORK, June 28.—(Special).—
Edward B. Nally, vice-president and
general manager of the Postal Tele-
graph Cable Company, being shown the
statement from Arkansas that the
company was defendant in a suit for
violating the anti-trust law, said:

"The regular Postal Telegraph Cable
company is not the one that has been
sued by the State of Arkansas. The
company is a subsidiary of the Western
Union, which is a Bell telephone concern
that has been sued, the Postal Telegraph
Cable Company of Texas."

"The words 'of Texas' are a part of
its corporate name. The name of our
company in Kansas is the Mackay Tele-
graph Cable Company. The Bell people
got our regular Postal name in Arkan-
sas, Texas and Oklahoma many years
ago, and are holding to it. They en-
joined us from using our name in Okla-
homa."

ELKS IS ALLEED

Auto Club Races Sanctioned
for July 9 and 10.

ELKS TO BE ENTERTAINED

H. L. Keats Receives Permission of
American Association Official for
Contests—Special Race Is
Almost Assured.

Sanction for the Portland Auto-
mobile Club races July 9 and 10 was re-
ceived yesterday by the American
Automobile Association's contest board
by H. L. Keats, district representative
of the board. Under plea of stress of
time and the fact that he has been ab-
sent from the city for several weeks,
Mr. Keats received a blanket permit
from William Schimpf, chairman of the
board, yesterday. The only condition
is that Mr. Keats assume personal
responsibility for the meet and see
that it is run in full accord with
the rules of the three As.

This action was more than Mr.
Keats looked for. It was thought
that Chairman Schimpf would protest
against giving the National organiza-
tion receiving blanks, sanction fees and
all details concerning the meet.

Keats Accepts Responsibility.
Mr. Keats, who is a director of the
Auto Club and a member of the race
committee, has assumed the personal
obligation and assured the committee
yesterday that everything would be all
right.

July 9 and 10 will be known as au-
tomobile days of the Elks convention.
The club plans to put 500 machines at
the disposal of the Elks for both days
to show the visiting delegates the
sights of the city. The cars will take
the visitors around from 10 to 12 each
morning. A band will be sent out
the route to be designated. The Elks
and their wives who take advantage
of this hospitality will be driven to the
Country Club track for the races if
they desire.

A special match race has been virtu-
ally assured to add to the race attrac-
tions. The plan is to have the "White Spider,"
a Ford creation, go against a Flinders
Ford. The "White Spider" is the ma-
chine with which Art Edwards has
raced so much here.

A. G. Batchelder, chairman of the ex-
ecutive committee of the American Au-
tomobile Association, arrived here yester-
day and was met at the train by
W. J. Clemens, president of the Port-
land Automobile Club, and H. L. Keats.

Withdrawal Is Considered.
Mr. Batchelder, one of the most wide-
ly known officials of the three As, is
on a tour of the West in the interest
of the good road movement. In Port-
land, however, he has a more serious
problem to consider. The local club
is thinking seriously of severing con-
nection with the National organization
and it will be up to Mr. Batchelder
to show the directors some logical
reasons why they should not take this
action.

Antagonistic feeling has been created
because the Portland club has received
scant recognition from the officials of
the three As.

Mr. Batchelder will meet with the
directors this noon.

"I find interest in the good roads
movement spreading rapidly," said Mr.
Batchelder yesterday. "A meeting of
the State Development League of Cali-
fornia at San Jose, which I attended,
was virtually turned into a good roads
gathering."

"The most enthusiastic and beneficial
good roads meeting I have attended in
this trip was at the Portland Club. The in-
termountain Good Roads Association held
its annual convention there. This
work that this body has accomplished
recently is surprising and they have
laid big plans for the future."

Road Improvement Pays.
"Good roads are the logical way to
develop the country. The Northwest
should be active in this work. Good
roads in bettering highway condi-
tions is well spent; it will bring rich
returns."

The American Automobile Association
is endeavoring to promote this
cause through a National Union. We are
trying to have a Federal bill passed
by Congress. This measure provides
for National Government participation
in the building and maintenance of
highways.

Good trip thus far has been very
gratifying. I find the Federal aid
idea growing in popularity and if the
clubs will stick together and co-oper-
ate in a National body we will be
able to get some tangible results
quickly."
