



PROSPECT OF EARLY NOMINATION DIM

Leaders at Baltimore Fail to Agree.

BRYAN HAS INJURED WILSON

Personal Controversy Dwarfs Other Considerations.

ALABAMAN MAY BE TRIED

Genuine Attempts at Compromise Likely to Be Made if Wilson and Underwood Should Fail in Their Turn.

BALTIMORE, June 30.—Hope of nomination on the twenty-seventh ballot for President virtually was abandoned tonight by Democratic leaders. When the National convention adjourned for Sunday it was believed that some solution of the deadlock would result from conferences between the champions of the three leading candidates, but it developed that the time had not arrived for the withdrawal of Speaker Clark, Governor Wilson or Representative Underwood.

Bryan Has Hurt Wilson, Too.

Campaign managers might have reached some agreement if interest in the deadlock had not been dwarfed by the personal controversy between William Jennings Bryan and Woodrow Wilson. The visit of Mr. Clark to Baltimore and his arrival too late to attempt vindication of himself before the convention overshadowed everything else as a subject of Sunday gossip. Party leaders generally took the position, notwithstanding the Missouriian's impassioned denial of Mr. Bryan's imputation that he was beholden to Morgan Belmont and Bryan, that he would be unable to regain the votes he had lost. At the same time many of them thought that sympathy for Clark and the inevitable linking of Bryan and Wilson in the minds of delegates had injured the chance of Wilson's nomination.

Clark Probably Past Crest.

The situation as seen by leaders not associated intimately in the management of any of the campaigns seemed tonight about as follows: Clark having failed of nomination for 17 ballots, after receiving a majority vote, probably had reached the crest of his strength.

Wilson, although climbing steadily, apparently, was bitterly opposed by delegates who resented the general impression that Colonel Bryan had the veto power, although he lacked the votes necessary to control the nomination. These delegates believed that the New Jersey Governor would continue to gain, even to the point where he had a majority, but that he could not break down the Clark strength, which was said to be determined that Bryan should not win through a combination of any kind.

Underwood Next to Be Tried.

Should Clark and Wilson fail on the next two or three ballots, it was predicted there would be a turn to Representative Underwood, who had held his normal vote from first to last. Underwood forces were watching for just such a contingency and said they were prepared to take full advantage of it.

Whether the Alabama candidate could win was the subject of much speculation, but outside of the delegates who had voted for him on the 26 ballots there did not appear to be much enthusiasm.

Genuine attempts at compromise are likely to be made if Wilson and Underwood should follow Clark upon a high wave of votes and still fail to get the necessary two-thirds, but it was not expected tonight that any of the "dark horse" candidates will stand much show until the three leaders have tried and failed.

Many Rumors Are Current.

Many rumors were current in hotel lobbies. One was that the leaders had agreed upon the abrogation of the two-thirds rule after 30 ballots had been cast, while there was another report that an adjournment would be taken after 10 additional ballots and new delegates selected for another convention in August. None of these rumors was based upon anything more than idle gossip.

Another report was that the Wilson men had made a combination with the Clark forces by which the New Jersey candidate would disavow Bryan and in return receive the nomination. Still another was that anti-Bryan forces had entered into a solemn and unbreakable pact not to permit the nomination of Wilson under any circumstances. No foundation could be found for these rumors.

Wilson Men Avoiding Controversy.

On the face of the last ballot, Governor Wilson seemed to have a decided advantage over other candidates, having mounted steadily to 407½ votes from 324 on the first ballot. His campaign managers appeared sincere in their predictions that his vote would grow. Consequently they were doing their utmost to steer clear of the controversy between Clark and Bryan.

VANCOUVER MECCA FOR THE LOVELORN

JUNE HOLDS RECORD FOR DEVOTION TO CUPID'S LURES.

Percentage of Widows to Spinsters Said to Decline as Lovers Court Out of Doors.

VANCOUVER, Wash., June 30.—(Special.)—Dan Cupid succeeded in breaking all records for June in inducing lovers' awnings, lovesick maidens and the more experienced widows in making a pilgrimage to love's shrine in this Gretna Green. No less than 75 couples were married here during June, and this is a dozen more than any previous month. For 59 of these young women it was the maiden trip, but there were 16 who had made the pilgrimage before.

During the first six months of the year, ending tonight, 314 couples secured marriage licenses. This is also a record. The percentage of widows to spinsters to secure marriage licenses from January 1 to June 30 is interesting and illuminating. In January, a cold month, indoor courtship, where widows excel, the percentage was 72.2 per cent. February it dropped to 28.8 per cent. March, very blustery and cold outside, rainy and unpleasant, but cheerful inside, 37.5 per cent; April, slightly warmer, 32.3 per cent; May, the culmination of many courtships initiated during unpleasant weather, the highest mark was reached, 44.1 per cent. June, the month of brides, showed the very lowest record for widows, being but 27.1.

While It is True That There Are a Great Many Divorces Granted, It Is Equally True That Both the Divorced and the Divorced in Many Cases Remarry Within a Short Time.

Those who have been married once seem most anxious to return to that state. Many applicants are refused license to marry because they have been divorced less than six months.

AUSTRIA HAS EYE ON WEST

Officials Prophecy Canal Opening Will Develop Direct Relations.

LOS ANGELES, June 30.—(Special.)—Direct trade relations will be established between Austria-Hungary and the Pacific Coast States by means of the opening of the Panama Canal, according to N. de Szabo and Z. de Kohout, Austrian government officials, who have arrived in Los Angeles and intend to visit San Francisco, Portland and Seattle in the interest of their country's commerce.

De Szabo is commissioner of commerce in the ministry and De Kohout is commissioner of the department of agriculture at Budapest. They came from Philadelphia, where they represented their government at the International Congress of Navigation.

The Opening of the Panama Canal Will Mean That California, Oregon and Washington Will Find a Vast Market for Their Products.

De Szabo declared, "Our tour is for the purpose of estimating the possibilities of an exchange of commerce with these countries in the ministry and De Kohout is commissioner of the department of agriculture at Budapest. Unconditional Surrender Only Proposal Made to Orozco.

MEXICO CITY, June 30.—President Madero has refused again to negotiate with Orozco over terms of surrender. The rebel leader is said to have asked by telegraph what consideration his men might expect at the hands of the authorities if they agreed to lay down their arms.

President Madero is said to have refused to consider terms, maintaining that he would not treat with the revolutionaries and that his terms were unconditional surrender. Such is the substance of the reply said to have been sent to Orozco.

TURKS LEAVE 200 DEAD

Italians Report Victory in Fierce Battle at Tripoli.

ROME, June 30.—Another severe battle at Tripoli on June 28 is described in an official dispatch received here. According to the message, a whole division attacked the heights of Sidi Said and neighboring positions, where masses of Arabs and Turks, who had escaped defeat the previous day, were lying in deep entrenchments, reinforced by a heavy native contingent. The Turks left 200 dead and a large number of wounded on the field. The Italian losses totaled 10 dead and 78 wounded.

BEAN EATERS TO AID T. R.

Progressive Party of Massachusetts Organizes in Boston.

BOSTON, June 30.—Two hundred Republicans who were active for Roosevelt in the recent campaign, bolted the Republican party at a meeting tonight in Ford Hall and formed "the Progressive party of Massachusetts." The new party takes over the organization of the progressive Republicans. Colonel Roosevelt was endorsed as a candidate for President and a telegram was sent informing him of the action taken.

NEW ENGLAND WOMEN FLY

Miss Scott and Miss Quimby Appear at Boston Meet.

BOSTON, June 30.—Miss Blanche Stuart Scott secured distinction of being the first woman to fly an aeroplane in New England at the opening of the aviation meet in Squantum today. She used a biplane.

Later Miss Harriet Quimby made a half hour's flight in a new monoplane.

BRYAN SAYS CLARK IS RIGHT AT HEART

Speaker Censured for Act of Managers.

ATTACK HELD NOT PERSONAL

Nebraskan Says Missourian Has Been Misled.

FAILURE TO ACT, CHARGE

Commoner Criticisms for Accepting Support of 90 Wax Figures Ruled by Murphy Without Making Protest.

BALTIMORE, June 30.—William J. Bryan replied tonight to the statement of Speaker Clark demanding that the Nebraskan prove or retract the general charge made in the convention the Clark forces had allied themselves with the so-called privilege classes. In his statement Mr. Bryan said: "I have received notice by publication only. The only criticism I have made against Mr. Clark is not that he has acted wrongfully, but that he has failed to act. I may overestimate the importance of the Presidential office, but I have felt that an aspirant for that office ought to manage his own campaign and not allow people to do things for him without his direct and specific authority."

Neutrality Is Questioned.

"The papers announced that Mr. Clark was neutral between Mr. Parker and myself in the temporary chairmanship fight and that he informed his supporters to vote as they pleased. If that contest was purely a question between Judge Parker and myself, as individuals, his refusal to take part would not be material, although he never sent out a piece of literature or had a speech made in his behalf that did not represent him as my special champion for 16 years. If he distributed any literature in which he associated his name with Parker's, I shall be glad to withdraw this statement upon inspection of the literature."

Contest Not Personal.

"But the contest between Judge Parker and myself was not a personal contest and everybody but Mr. Clark knew this. It was between progressive democracy on the one side and reactionary democracy on the other, and I contend that in such a contest it was Mr. Clark's duty to take one side or the other, if in his judgment there is any material difference in the two kinds of democracy. If he insists that there is no difference he has no right to complain of criticism at the hands of those who believe that there is a vital difference."

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POLAR CONQUERORS' LIPS ARE SEALED

AMUNDSEN'S MEN REACH LONDON NORWAY BOUND.

Fourteen Members of Fram's Crew Silent Until Leader's Book on Southern Dash Is Done.

LONDON, June 30.—(Special.)—Fourteen members of the crew of the Fram who were with Amundsen in his dash for the South Pole, passed through London last night on their way from Buenos Ayres to Norway. Four of these men—Bjaland, Hassel, Hansen and Wisting—got to the Pole with Amundsen.

All of the men refused to talk, as they were pledged to secrecy because of the forthcoming publication of Captain Amundsen's book. They admitted, however, that Amundsen was very lucky and that he had encountered few obstacles. For the final dash the weather was perfect and everything went according to program.

The success of the expedition, the men declared, was due largely to the efficiency of the dogs. There were 13 to each of the four sledges. The men say the greatest difficulty they encountered was in crossing the 11,000 feet of mountains.

A great reception is being arranged for the men at Bergen. Some of them undoubtedly will sign again with Captain Amundsen, who is still at Buenos Ayres, for his dash to the North Pole.

DRIVER DIES; HORSE WINS

Owner Falls From Sulky as Trotter Speeds Under Wire.

SANTA CRUZ, Cal., July 30.—John M. Ferguson, well known in this state as a breeder and driver of trotting horses, was stricken by heart disease while driving far in the lead in the first trotting event today at Opal Park. He fell from his sulky, while the trotter continued under the wire and again circled the course, halting at her stall.

Ferguson was leaning forward, urging the mare, when he spasmodically sat erect and seemed to draw the reins taut. The mare responded to the apparent urging, and Ferguson's body shot from the sulky to the track, where he died.

The Races were Called Off.

There was a previous accident at the track, when Thomas Hallbrook, a driver, was kicked by a horse and suffered a broken leg and serious injury to the groin.

TORNADO KILLS 200 IN CANADIAN TOWN

Regina Property Loss Is Ten Millions.

FIRES START, ARE CHECKED

MANY BUILDINGS WRECKED

New Parliament House, Just Completed at Cost of \$2,000,000, Is Badly Shaken—Other Towns Also Suffer Damage.

WINNIPEG, Man., June 30.—Two hundred persons were killed and \$10,000,000 damage done by a tornado which struck Regina, Sask., this afternoon. Many business blocks, apartment houses and residences were wrecked.

Relief gangs are now at work taking out the dead.

Two fires started, but the brigade got a stream working and appeared to have the situation under control.

Late reports place the property loss at \$10,000,000. The telephone office was wrecked, and it is feared that 15 girls, employed there, were killed. The telephone exchange building, the Standard bank, the First Baptist Church and the Baird & Bottell building are among the structures destroyed. Many residences were wrecked.

All telephone and telegraph wires, all except one, are down.

Nurses Sent From Winnipeg.

A special train left Winnipeg shortly after 9 o'clock with doctors, nurses and telegraph and telephone repairmen.

The tornado came from the south and first struck the new Parliament building, just completed at a cost of \$2,000,000. The building is of steel and concrete and, while it still stands, it is badly shaken. It then swept northward, mowing a swath six blocks wide through the most fashionable residence district, transforming it into a mass of wreckage.

Along Victoria street, from Sixteenth to Eleventh streets, 300 houses were destroyed and many persons were killed. Automobiles filled with passengers were hurled high in the air and deposited blocks away.

Business District Ruins.

At Eleventh street the business district, composed of wholesale warehouses, banking institutions and retail stores, was made a heap of ruins, while the air was filled with flying wreckage. Past Eleventh street, Albert, Smith, Cromwell, Searth, Hamilton and Rose streets, the storm reached the retail section, which received the severest force.

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WOMAN SAVES LIFE WHEN AUTO BUCKS

MRS. REED STOPS RUNAWAY CAR DRAGGING HUSBAND.

Machine Pounces Upon Owner, Who Turns Cranks Without Releasing Clutch—Man's Jaws Broken.

Presence of mind of Mrs. E. C. Reed yesterday saved the life of her husband, who was dragged by a runaway automobile at East Twelfth and Tillamook streets.

Mrs. Reed forgot to release the clutch of his machine and when he cranked the engine the heavy car jumped at him, breaking both jaws and dragging him along the street toward a high curb. Mrs. Reed was sitting in the front seat and although she knew nothing about the machine she pulled faintly at levers until the automobile stopped a few feet from the curb.

Unconscious and bleeding, Mr. Reed was picked up and taken to the Good Samaritan Hospital. Besides broken jaws he suffered no injury.

Mr. Reed is a member of the firm of Reed Bros., tailors.

CROSS, LOOT, WORN IN JAIL

Stolen Crucifix Will Dangle From Neck of Convict.

SPOKANE, Wash., June 30.—(Special.)—A solid silver crucifix, representing part of the loot gained as a high-woman, will be suspended from the neck of A. L. Bennett, alias "Gimp the Rat," when he goes to Walla Walla prison to serve a term of from 10 to 25 years for robbery.

The crucifix was the property of Father Dultiano, who conducts a mission in Hilliard. Bennett held up Ulysses Pichambert, "skinflint" him and stripped the crucifix and a rosary from his neck. Thursday Bennett made a full confession of his most recent crimes.

"Take me out to that priest near Hilliard," he requested of the officers. He was driven to the mission in the police automobile. There he asked the forgiveness of Father Dultiano, which was quickly granted.

"Now you let me take that crucifix to prison with me, that's where I'll go," Bennett asked the priest. Father Dultiano consented. It was held in evidence by the police until today, then returned to the thief. Bennett placed it around his neck with the promise that he would keep it there during the remainder of his life.

"I'll probably die in the penitentiary," he said, "but I'll have this anyway."

JURIST DRUNK SAY TWO

Judge Hanford Is Pathetic Figure During Testimony.

SEATTLE, Wash., June 30.—The House judiciary sub-committee's investigation of the conduct of United States Judge Cornelius H. Hanford, which was expected to occupy only two weeks, will continue much longer unless the committee sets limits to the scope of the inquiry.

It is understood that many witnesses will testify concerning Judge Hanford's personal habits. Two have already sworn to having seen the judge apparently drunk in public places. During their testimony, the judge, who is 63 years old, white-haired and bent by his years, presented a pathetic picture. It is expected that the committee, after disposing of the charges of intoxication, will take up Hanford's decisions.

'HIKERS' JAILED FOR THEFT

San Francisco Boys Headed for Portland Caught Bicycle-Stealing.

GRANTS PASS, Or., June 30.—(Special.)—Clyde and Leonard Dalton, brothers, walking from San Francisco to Portland, were arrested today and lodged in the County Jail upon a charge of stealing two bicycles. The wheels belonged to employees of a department store and were standing by the side of the building. They were quickly on their way and before the wheels were mislaid by the owners had succeeded in eluding them. About 11 o'clock last night they were located in Merlin and Sought here by the Sheriff, where they are lodged in the jail. The boys are 16 and 17 years of age, well dressed and of good appearance. One of them plays a cornet and the other claims to be a linotype.

FOOTBALL COSTS MAN LEG

Hood River Youth Finds Amputation Necessary From Old Injury.

HOOD RIVER, Or., June 30.—(Special.)—Friends of Lynn Young, of this city, who has been in Pittsburg, Pa., for the past few weeks under the care of a specialist, learned that he has just undergone an operation to have one of his legs removed.

The injury causing the amputation was received here several years ago, in a game when the young man was a member of the Hood River High School football team. Water, formed around the knee joint and he has never recovered from its effects.

The message stated that he was recovering nicely from the operation.

HILLSBORO WOMAN IS DEAD

Mrs. Mabel G. Kerr, Born at Cathlamet, Dies at Age of 19.

HILLSBORO, Or., June 30.—(Special.)—Mrs. Mabel G. Kerr, wife of J. T. Kerr, died Friday. She was born at Cathlamet, Wash., June 28, 1892, lacking just one day of being 19 years old.

Deceased is survived by an infant daughter, Mabel Viola; husband, her parents, Mr. and Mrs. E. Cheney, of Hillsboro; two sisters, Mrs. Elizabeth T. Long, of Forest Grove, and Mrs. Agnes J. Westmoreland, of Banks, Or.; and one brother, Henry E. Cheney, of Hillsboro.

GIRL IN AUTO SHOT BY ROADSIDE THUG

Youths, Trying to Copy Roberts, Caught.

QUICK JUSTICE IS PROMISED

Sheriff Stevens and Deputies Join in Short Chase.

THREE MAKE CONFESSIONS

Officers Smash Door to Take Two of Base Line Road Boy Highwaymen—Seven Persons in Car Have Narrow Escapes.

In confessed emulation of the exploit of Jack Roberts, now on trial for killing two men while attempting an automobile hold-up, Dan Brundridge, Guy A. Vaughn and Gail B. Merritt, all youths, attempted to stop two automobiles on the Powell Valley road early yesterday morning, and Brundridge fired one shot, wounding Miss Leora Stanley, 354 East Taylor street, a stenographer. She suffered a slight flesh wound above the elbow of the right arm. The car contained seven persons, including the driver.

Within less than an hour from the time that the driver of the car telephoned the news to the police station, from the Twelve-Mile House, every avenue into the city from Vancouver ferry to Sellwood was under police guard, while five automobiles, manned by officers under Sheriff Stevens and Captain Keller, scoured every highway and by-road leading from the scene of the crime.

Officers Smash Door.

As a result, Patrolman Post, at East Eighty-first street and Base Line road, just after daylight, intercepted Brundridge, still carrying a powder-fouled revolver, and through information gleaned from him, Sheriff Stevens, Captain Keller, Sergeant Kienlen and Patrolman Shaffer broke in the door of room 7 in the Hart rooming house, Front and Main streets, and caught Vaughn and Merritt in bed. Their weapons were under their bed.

All three confessed, telling how they plotted the act, how they attempted to carry it out and of their movements afterward. An effort will be made to take the three before the Grand Jury today and if it succeeds a record for quick justice may be established.

First Holdup Fails.

The automobile was driven by "Barney" Royce, a public chauffeur, who stands at First street and Base Line road. He had picked up the party of six at a restaurant about midnight. The names they gave to the police were fictitious, but later they admitted their identity. The members of the party besides Miss Stanley were W. E. Porter, a traveling man of Lincoln, Neb.; T. E. Young and J. F. Slater, traveling men of San Francisco; Miss Emma Johnson, of 223 Twentieth street North, and a third young woman whose name was not learned. Royce dropped all of them at the Corbett building, where the wounded woman was taken to the office of a physician.

No trace has been found of the first automobile the youths tried to hold up. According to the confession, the car whizzed past the robbers when they signalled it to stop. Royce thinks that it was a car that was about five minutes ahead of him.

Yesterday's adventure is not the first of the kind for Miss Stanley. Less than a year ago Miss Stanley was one of an auto party that was held up on a road between Tacoma and Seattle. "That time the chauffeur had sense enough to stop, and the man went through the car and took all that we had," said Miss Stanley. "The adventure did not scare me much. I did not cry out when I was hit, although I felt a little burn on my arm. What made me angry was that the rest of the party would not believe that I was injured, until we reached the Twelve-mile House."

Chauffeur Tells Story.

"My spot-lights picked up three men in the road, about 100 feet away," said Royce yesterday. "As the light hit them they scattered, one holding the center of the road and flagging me. I realized what was coming and threw on speed, going up from 30 miles an hour to about 50. I tried my best to get the fellow in the middle, but he dodged. "Then I yelled to the crowd to duck, and I guess they all did so. Miss Stanley had her head below the seat, but threw up her arm, and that is how she was wounded. If we had not dodged I am sure someone would have been killed, as the hold-up shot from only a few feet away and quartering the car, so nearly all of us were in range."

"I drove as fast as I could to the Twelve-Mile House, where we bandaged up the girl's arm, and then started for the city. I left my party at the Corbett building and know nothing more about them."

Escape Narrow, Says One.

"I do not understand how our party escaped with no more serious injury," said W. E. Porter, a traveling salesman. "Miss Stanley was sitting in one of the revolving seats in the center of the car and I was in the back seat. The

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
