

THIEF NOT SHAKEN BY \$10,000 OFFER

Riese Refuses to Tell Where Famous De Sabla Jewels May Be Found.

REWARD DIVISION SPURNED

Confessed Crook Says He Does Not Know Who Is Responsible for Big Robbery in San Francisco on Night of Mardi Gras.

SAN DIEGO, Cal., June 30.—(Special.)—C. R. Riese, confessed diamond thief, awaiting arraignment in Superior Court to plead to his part in the theft of \$40,000 worth of diamonds and other jewelry from guests of the U. S. Grant Hotel, refused an offer of \$10,000 made on condition that he tell where the famous jewels stolen from Mrs. Eugene de Sabla the night of the Mardi Gras ball in San Francisco are hidden.

The offer to Riese was made through Chief of Police Wilson and Chief of Detectives Myers. These officers claim the jewels are insured for \$50,000 and that a reward of \$20,000 is offered for their recovery.

They offered to divide with Riese if he would confess. Riese maintains he had no hand in the De Sabla robbery. Officers know that Riese, Paul Sobie and Margaret Ward Manners were in San Francisco at the time of the robbery at the St. Francis Hotel. They claim they have knowledge that Riese knows where the jewels are hidden.

There is nothing to be gained by keeping anything hidden, says Riese, and he has come through clean with everything I know, and if I knew anything about the De Sabla diamonds or of the crime I would tell it. I cannot get it because I don't know about the De Sabla affair.

Riese would make no further statement. Paul Sobie, Chief of Police W. J. Doust, who was a witness for the state in the murder case Saturday until court adjourned in the middle of the afternoon, was put through an extended "course of questions" on interrogations in the "art of Sherlock Holmesing" by the attorney for the defense.

Once the defendant, Mrs. Della Olds, who sits sober-faced, repeats the story of the robbery and hands folded money in her lap, bit her lips and enjoyed the discomfort of the chief of Spokane's police department, Mrs. Olds did not smile herself the pleasure of smiling for many seconds, however, and quickly resumed her melancholy appearance as witness Doust was informed that he would have to turn the attorney for the defense "where he got his necktie."

Chief Doust admitted that he had not made a verbal examination of the condition of the room and many other details and said that he had not because he had men there who were doing that and that in the second place, he believed Mrs. Olds was telling the truth about the struggle.

"Mr. Doust, you don't permit your officers to put on the shoes and stockings of the women prisoners at the police station when you have a matron for that purpose, do you?" Attorney Robertson asked.

"You don't permit your men to tie the corsets of women prisoners?" "No, sir."

"You have no orders not to let women prisoners dress in private and away from the curious eyes of your detectives?" "Yes, sir."

"You have a matron for that purpose?" "Yes, sir."

"Was Mrs. Olds' hair done up when you arrived?" "Yes."

"Did you find any twisted hairpins or comb combs on the floor?" "None were found, to my knowledge."

"Is it not a fact that because Officer Jordan found and combs of this nature that you didn't subpoena Jordan?" "I didn't subpoena anyone."

MAN DROWNS HIMSELF Stranger Leaps From Ferryboat Into Willamette River.

Folding his coat and laying it and his hat on a bench in the men's cabin of the ferry boat Lionel Webster, an unidentified man leaped through a window in the side of the boat into the Willamette River Saturday night and drowned before help could reach him.

A lifeboat from the steamer Harvest Queen was lowered under command of Captain Chester Turner, when passengers on the ferry boat saw the body in the water, but was unable to reach the body.

His hat and coat bore no marks to identify the man. He boarded the ferry at the foot of Ninth street and entered the men's cabin, staying there until he reached the window. His jump through the window was not noticed. The body was not found last night.

WIND SINKS YACHTS Storm Sweeps Long Island Sound During Annual Regatta.

NEW YORK, June 30.—A miniature hurricane today swept over Long Island Sound while the annual regatta of the New Rochelle Yacht Club was in progress and before the wind had spent its force three of the racing yachts had been sunk and nine others capsized.

THIRD PARTY PLANS

Colonel Defers Announcement He Had Expected to Make Day or Two Ago.

M'HARG RUMOR NOT HEARD

Roosevelt Laughs at Statement That Bryan Will Not Support Candidate Supported by Murphy.

OYSTER BAY, N. Y., June 30.—"It's just a game of puss in the corner," said Colonel Roosevelt last night when he heard of the day's happenings in Baltimore. The Colonel had been picketing all day and did not know what had been going on until he returned. When he was told that William J. Bryan had declared he would not be a party to the nomination of a candidate supported by Charles F. Murphy, he laughed heartily.

"It is very funny," he said, "but, of course," he continued, "it is preposterous to think of a convention in which Bryan and Ryan are in good standing. Has anybody got any idea what the convention is going to do?"

Plans for the formation of a new party await developments at Baltimore. "I expected to be able to say something definite a day or two ago," said the Colonel, "but the Baltimore convention is hanging, so that we have been delayed."

The report that Ormsby M'Harg, who managed Colonel Roosevelt's recent campaign in some of the Southern states, had declined to join the new party was neither affirmed nor denied. Colonel Roosevelt said he had heard nothing of it. William L. Ward, of Westchester, he said, had written him a "nice letter" explaining why he did not wish to leave the Republican party.

"There are a good many men who will take the same view," he said, "but for every man who says that we will get ten others who were not with us before."

MORO SHOWS BIG FARM

EXPERIMENT STATION HOST TO VISITING BOOSTERS. Hundreds of Growing Crops Seen by Crowds—Excursion Rates Help to Swell Throng.

MORO, Or., June 30.—(Special.)—Moro State and Federal Experiment Station hosts to visitors from all parts of Sherman County, from Portland and from neighboring counties. The O. W. R. & N. reduced fares for farmers day, and this helped swell the attendance.

The day's programme opened with the arrival of a passenger train from the southern part of the county. Visitors were conducted over the experiment farm by Superintendent Stephens and his corps of assistants. Visitors were divided into groups, each in charge of an assistant.

Another big element in the figures was the corporation tax, which, it is calculated, brought in \$27,000,000 against \$33,000,000 last year.

LEWISTON IS SHOW HOME Livestock Men Ask D. O. Lively to Alter Plans and Dates.

LEWISTON, Idaho, June 30.—(Special.)—At the meeting of the membership of the Northwest Livestock Association at Lewiston Saturday, at which there were about 100 federal and breeders of the Inland Empire present, the matter of the permanency of the Northwest Livestock Show at Lewiston will be the permanent location of the show, which will be held annually in the first week in December.

As to the matter of the proposed show under the direction of D. O. Lively, at Portland, to be known as the Pacific International Feeders and Breeders' Show, to be held December 8-12, 1912, the association went on record adopting resolutions asking Mr. Lively to withdraw his dates for 1913 in order to prevent any conflict and to urge the Commercial Club of Portland to co-operate with Lewiston in making the Lewiston Livestock Fair a big success.

The resolutions adopted will be sent to all the clubs in the Inland Empire and when endorsed will be directed to Portland asking their co-operation. Mr. Lively proposed to hold his show in the Spring this year, but shifted it to the mid-Winter season in 1913, which would mean the failure of both the Lewiston and Portland shows.

A permanent site will be purchased at once and buildings erected for the forthcoming Livestock show.

If The Price of Coffee Would Double Again All The Better!

The price of coffee has doubled in three or four years. And this, despite production has doubled in that time. The reason for the present high price of coffee was sought and it has been found that the market supply has been artificially restricted.

The Brazilian government is in operation and participates in the profits to the extent of an export duty of three cents a pound. And American bankers are financing the scheme.

Diabolical plot? Outrageous conspiracy? Perhaps! But we did not take our pen in hand to condemn anyone concerned except COFFEE DRINKERS—to condemn them and also, to congratulate late them, both upon the present increased price and the probability that it will go higher.

It isn't exactly inspiring to see American capital finding its way to a foreign country to be used there to the end of exploiting American family pocketbooks.

However, this is not the saddest fact involved, to our way of thinking. It is most regrettable that the consumption of coffee in this country has increased to a point to warrant manipulation of the supply.

We don't like to look upon coffee as becoming a NECESSITY to the American people, and view with alarm the activities of capital suggesting that it is becoming a necessity.

Coffee isn't good for you. Too much of it is positively harmful. If the present price, doubled in four years, would double again, it would be the best thing that ever happened to the excessive coffee drinker.

He wouldn't drink as much of it. Better yet, maybe he wouldn't drink it at all. Just possibly you have us put down as being a bit nervy in this coming in and sitting down beside you before the coffee pot and telling you to keep hands off.
