

GIRL DRUGGED AND HIDDEN IS THEORY

Passengers Tell of Couple Leaving Train at Wilbur Wednesday Night.

FOUL PLAY IS FEARED

Man and Young Woman Attract Attention by Reason of Latter's Apparently Helpless and Ill Condition.

ROSEBURG, Or., June 30.—(Special.)—Satisfied that Ethel Metcalf and the man with whom she fled from her home at Oakland, Or., alighted from a south-bound train at Wilbur, Douglas County, and did not continue their journey to California, as first suspected, Roseburg officers now are inclined to believe that the girl may have met with foul play.

This theory, the officers assert, is partly substantiated in information furnished by Mrs. Ringrose, of 2618 Sacramento street, San Francisco; Richard Stagg, a Roseburg millman; Wiley McDonald, a brakeman, and a traveling salesman whose name cannot be learned.

Drugs Used, Is Belief. Mrs. Ringrose says she was en route from Portland to Roseburg, Wednesday night, and occupied a seat directly behind a man and girl. She says the couple entered the train at Oakland, and that her attention almost immediately was attracted to the girl, who appeared to be suffering from the effect of drugs. When the train reached Wilbur, Mrs. Ringrose said the man left the train, and upon returning informed the girl that there was a wreck and they had better get a horse. With this remark, Mrs. Ringrose says, the man half carried the girl from the train to the platform, where they disappeared from sight.

Pursuit Dodged by Move. Richard Stagg corroborates the statement of Mrs. Ringrose in detail, and is positive that the couple left the train at Wilbur. In fact, he says he was so interested in the girl's condition that he searched the train following its departure from Wilbur and was unable to find the couple. Stagg's statements are substantiated by Wiley McDonald, a brakeman, each of whom say they noticed the girl's condition on account of which she was half carried from the train.

M'GAW SPEAKS AT Y. M. C. A.

Field Secretary of Reform Association Takes Whack at Politics.

Intemperance, divorce and Sunday legislation were the subjects of James S. McGaw, field secretary of the National Reform Association, in an address before the men's meeting at the Y. M. C. A. yesterday afternoon, and in his sermon at the White Temple yesterday

morning. Last night he preached at the White Temple on "The Conversion of Uncle Sam."

"I can see Christ pleading with this Nation to accept him as its king, and to accept his word as the basis of its law. There is a mighty movement on foot, represented in the World's Christian Citizenship Conference, which is to come to Portland next year, and every man who is in sympathy with Christ will stand in sympathy with this movement."

The speaker took for his text the story of the rich young man, who "went away sorrowful" because "Christ instructed him to give his great possessions to the poor, and to follow Christ."

"That keeps many young men out of Y. M. C. A. work and out of the ministry because the salary is low, out of great moral issues because it interferes with their business."

"They may cut you off the social list. What do you care? You may be placed outside the ecclesiastical camp. In this

day when churches are numerous, a man can hardly hold a position in a university without exploiting some new religion.

WORK ON LINE STARTS

NORTH BEND WILL IMPROVE STREETS AT SAME TIME.

In Addition to Obtaining Railroad, City Is Counting on Having \$100,000 Hotel.

NORTH BEND, Or., June 30.—(Special.)—Progress of this city, due to the railroad activities, assumed definite form today when the first shipment of equipment for a railroad camp was made from North Bend and it was decided to launch a plan for improving the entire business section of the city and to secure a \$100,000 hotel.

The McArthur & Perkins Company, which is to build the line from Eugene to Coos Bay, today sent a shipment of tents and other camp equipment to North Bend, where the first construction camp will be established. The camp will be on the Rezin ranch, which was recently bought by the Southern Pacific Company. It will be a small camp and will be used for headquarters for the men, who will arrange the larger construction camp.

When the big score loaded with material started from North Bend a large crowd gathered and the occasion was one of much interest, as it was the first actual work done on the new road.

MORRISON IS AIDED

Widow of Assassinated Governor Makes Statement.

CANDIDATE CLOSE FRIEND

Mrs. Steunenberg Declares That Neither She Nor Her Family Ever Had Slightest Feeling Against ex-Governor.

BOISE, Idaho, June 30.—(Special.)—If the Republican gubernatorial fight in Idaho is to be waged over the connection ex-Governor John T. Morrison, again a candidate for office, had with the Western Federation trial when he acted as attorney for Steve Adams, supposed to have been an accomplice of Harry Orchard, murderer of ex-Governor Frank Steunenberg, it will be done over the protest of Mrs. Steunenberg. She has made her wish in this matter known to Mr. Morrison, who for many years has been a close friend of the Steunbergs. This is her desire in spite of the fact that ex-Governor Steunenberg's brother, familiarly known as "Pete" Steunenberg, a prominent Democrat of this state, publicly protested against the nomination of Mr. Morrison.

Mrs. Steunenberg's statement is as follows: "I want you to know that neither myself nor my family has now nor ever had any feeling against you in any way whatever or have thought you in any way did wrong by reason of your employment. On the contrary, I have now and have always had the most kindly feeling towards you and I do not want you to think that the attacks recently made upon you have the sanction of either me or my family. We regret very much that they were made and cannot understand why they are not willing to let us—to let me and mine alone."

This statement was made by Mrs. Steunenberg to Mr. Morrison in the office of the latter in this city of her own free will. Mr. Morrison was solicited during the trial of Moyer, Haywood and Pettibone in this city and after the arrest of Steve Adams and Orchard, to secure the release of Adams from the state penitentiary. Habeas corpus proceedings were followed, Adams being released and promptly re-arrested on a charge preferred by the state. The political enemies of Mr. Morrison have been attacking him, since he made known his intention to become a candidate for Governor for a second time, on the grounds that he was connected with the Western Federation cases and was against the state.

Pete Steunenberg's letter created a sensation, but the statement of defense of Morrison made by Mrs. Steunenberg has created even more of a thrill in Idaho political circles.

TOWN MARSHAL IS FINED

Attempt to Arrest Teamster Costs Officer \$5 and Costs.

SEASIDE, Or., June 30.—(Special.)—Town Marshal Tibbels' effort to arrest Expressman Newton last Friday cost the officer a fine of \$5 and costs. Newton drove up at the depot and found the other teamsters had beaten him there and had already taken possession of the choice places to solicit work. Newton promptly halted his team in the middle of the street. Marshal Tibbels ordered him to move. He refused.

The officer climbed into the wagon and tried to take the lines from the driver. He couldn't. He climbed back off again and picked up stones, which he threw at the horses. The expressman put on the brake and sat resolved not to move one inch. Meanwhile the train arrived. Baggage was put into the wagon and delivered, after which Newton went to the City Hall and obtained a warrant for the arrest of Tibbels, charging cruelty to animals. Tibbels was arrested and fined \$5 and costs.

POWER AT CASCADE LOCKS

President Young Says New Flume Will Provide 1500 Horsepower.

HOOD RIVER, Or., June 30.—(Special.)—"Our company will develop 1500 horsepower by the completion of the big new flume that has been begun from the rapids of Hermann Creek," says G. A. Young, president of the Columbia River Power & Light Company, who was here yesterday on business. "We have been serving the citizens of Cascade Locks for years, and we are now located, with electric lights since last Thanksgiving by means of a temporary system we constructed."

"It is probable within a short time some business enterprise will come to Cascade Locks and make use of the surplus power we are developing. Several companies are now considering our offer."

The other officers of the newly incorporated company are: M. Collins, manager, and R. W. Lang, secretary.

SCHOOL CASE NOT SERIOUS

Milwaukie Complaint Will Be Withdrawn After Taxpayers' Meeting.

MILWAUKIE, Or., June 30.—(Special.)—The order restraining the Milwaukie school directors from purchasing the five-acre site at \$5000, selected for the proposed central school building, will not be pressed if the voters decide Monday night to endorse the action of the Board. C. B. Hanson, who signed the complaint, said he did so in order to delay the purchase of the site until the taxpayers should have an opportunity to express their opinion. "If there is a majority in favor of the purchase of the site at the meeting Monday night," said Mr. Hanson, "then, of course, that will settle the matter as far as I am concerned. If the taxpayers want the site that is their business. In any event the restraining order will be withdrawn."

The taxpayers will decide the site question and the matter of issuing bonds at the meeting Monday night.

Chehalis Boy Accidentally Shot.

CHEHALIS, Wash., June 30.—(Special.)—Robert Pickins, the 15-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. R. M. Pickens, who live west of Chehalis, accidentally shot himself through the abdomen today while cleaning a revolver. The boy was upstairs at the time and for some minutes did not give the alarm, as he feared it would excite his mother. The family heard the noise and thought it a firecracker. When hurried to a hospital surgeons recovered the bullet from the boy's hip.

VANDAL-LIKE ROMPINGS TERRORIZE COUNTRYSIDE.

Naughty Army Beasts Chase Children, Cows and Colts and Break Down Farm Fences.

VANCOUVER BARRACKS, Wash., June 30.—(Special.)—The mules of the Second Field Artillery, when on "duty" and exercising trips, chase frightened school children, cows, calves and colts, break down farm fences, interfere with cows grazing in the county roads and cause runaways. Is the complaint of some of the residents of the county. Major Edward F. McGlachlin, in command of the Second Field Artillery stationed here has received several letters protesting against the action of the Government in allowing its mules to destroy the property of its subjects.

Major McGlachlin has given orders that mules when on trips through the country be tied so that they cannot get away, if they are being led, but the mules when bearing packs must be free.

A Mothers' Club at Ellsworth has protested that the mules have almost destroyed a footpath along the roadside, which was built for the children to go to school during wet and inclement weather.

The mules must be exercised or their usefulness will be lost, and as there is no place for them to "hike" in the past it is probable that the trips through the country will be continued, but with closer guard over the play.
