

TAFT IS ASSAILED BY SENATOR WORKS

California Says President Was Renominated Unjustly and Illegally.

CHARGES MADE IN SENATE

Members of Body Accused of Giving Time to Campaigns Instead of Public—Reformer Would Purify Nation's Politics.

WASHINGTON, July 1.—Senator Works, of California, progressive Republican, presenting in the Senate today a resolution to investigate recent campaign contributions and expenditures, declared that President Taft's renomination had been procured unjustly and illegally.

California needed no new party, he said, and the Republican party might better go down to defeat for the sins of its leaders and come up four years hence than to form a new party.

Common Knowledge Cited. Senator Works said his resolution was based on charges publicly made by President Taft and ex-President Roosevelt. The resolution declares it is common knowledge that public officials from the President, Cabinet officers and Senators down, have engaged in the pre-convention campaign.

It directs investigation of the financial transactions of Democratic and Republican candidates for the Presidential nomination, calls for names of officials engaged in the campaign and their salaries, the percentage of voters in the primaries and payments to newspapers and newspaper writers and the amount of expenses of delegates paid by others.

Resolution Strips Senate. The resolution stirred the Senate, but was not acted upon. Mr. Works charged that men sent to Washington to discharge public duties had been giving their time to carrying on political campaigns.

"Doesn't that apply to certain members of this body," asked Senator Nelson, of Minnesota.

"I think it does," replied Senator Works.

Mr. Works asserted that a new party in California would mean turning the "purified Republican party," there back to special interests.

SALEM SALOONS WATCHED

Council Will Revoke Licenses Where Drink Is Sold to "Blacklisted."

SALEM, Or., July 1.—(Special.)—Allegations in the City Council tonight that one man who is on the "blacklist" has been furnished with liquor here, called for a general declaration that hereafter saloons that are guilty of any such offense will see their application for license rejected. One member of the Council called attention to the attitude of Governor West and favored co-operating with him on his policy, but other members were inclined to be more conservative.

A tangle has arisen following a recent decision of Mayor Lachmund not to sign a contract for improvement in certain sewer districts. He favored a vitrified improvement, while others favored concrete. As a result the Council delegated Councilman Pennypacker the power to sign the contract.

Mayor Lachmund declared he would not sign the warrants for payment if the contract was undertaken and banking houses here have informed the contractor they will not honor warrants unless signed by the Mayor. He has asked to be released from his contract.

MINISTER IS VINDICATED

Marshfield Presbyterians Hear of Exoneration of Rev. J. T. M. Knox.

MARSHFIELD, Or., July 1.—(Special.)—Members of the Marshfield Presbyterian Church have received word regarding the vindication of the former pastor, Rev. J. T. M. Knox. For some time Mr. Knox was pastor of the church in this city, but he resigned his position when his family troubles started. He sued for a divorce from his wife, Della V. Knox, and the wife filed a cross bill, making many charges against the minister. A special session of the Southern Oregon Presbytery was held at Medford.

The clerk of the session has sent word to the Marshfield congregation that all of the evidence in the divorce case was thoroughly investigated and after deliberation Mr. Knox has been exonerated of all blame. Mr. Knox has not yet made known to his former congregation just what plans for the future he has made.

KALANANIA'OLE WILL RUN

Hawaiian Delegates Will Oppose "Un-American" Rule.

HONOLULU, July 1.—Kuhio Kalaniana'ole, Congressional delegate from Hawaii, issued a formal statement today in which he said he would run for re-election regardless of what the party organization does. His platform will be based on the propositions made in his contest against Governor Frear. In view of the manner the planters controlled the convention, he expects the support of those opposing the "un-American" rule which he says has been brought about by a combination of the planters with Governor Frear.

The rumor is current here that ex-Governor Carter will head the Hawaiian Roosevelt party.

H. N. Ely Lowest Bidder. SALEM, Or., July 1.—(Special.)—With only Salem contractors bidding, H. N. Ely made the lowest bid on the proposed new girls' dormitory to be constructed at the State School for the Feeble Minded, his bid being \$20,500. Other bidders were as follows: Voigt & Allen, \$28,738; Denison & MacLaren, \$22,525; Southwick & Hedrick, \$21,498; George Anderson, \$20,873; W. D. Pugh, \$21,000; Fred Erickson, \$23,331.

BULLITT IS CHOSEN

President Names Kentuckian Solicitor-General.

APPOINTEE PRINCETON MAN

Successor to Frederick W. Lehman, of St. Louis, Is Prominent Attorney Who Makes His Home in Louisville.

WASHINGTON, July 1.—President Taft today sent to the Senate the nomination of William Marshall Bullitt, of Louisville, Ky., to be Solicitor-General of the United States. The nomination was made to fill the position left vacant by the resignation of Frederick W. Lehman, of St. Louis.

Mr. Bullitt is a native of Louisville, Ky., 35 years old and a lawyer by profession. He is prominent throughout Kentucky and in 1908 was a delegate-at-large to the Republican National convention. At that time he was appointed a member of the committee on resolutions.

Mr. Bullitt is a graduate of Princeton of the class of 1910 and also of the University of Louisville. Following his graduation from Princeton Mr. Bullitt returned to his home in Louisville and began the practice of law.

He is a director in the Henderson & St. Louis Railway and chief counsel for the First National, the Union National and the Kentucky Title Savings banks in Louisville. Mr. Bullitt is a member of the Metropolitan and Princeton clubs in New York. He resides in Louisville during the winter months, but in summer makes his home on his estate, "Oxmoor," in Jefferson County, Kentucky. He is now in Washington.

ALIENIST GIVES OPINION

DR. FLINT SAYS WILL SHOWS THAW IS INSANE.

Physician Says That at First He Believed White's Slayer to Be "Plain Murderer."

WHITE PLAINS, N. Y., July 1.—Dr. Justin S. Flint, the alienist retained by the state to oppose the release of Harry K. Thaw from Matteawan, explained today at the hearing before Judge Keogh how he had at first regarded Thaw as a "murderer," but later arrived at the conclusion that he was insane.

"Did you see any evidence of insanity on Thaw's part when you first interviewed him?" Dr. Flint was asked by Thaw's counsel.

"No, I thought he was a plain murderer," was the reply.

Dr. Flint said his first intimation that Thaw was irrational came when he read Thaw's will and codicils. After studying these papers carefully, he went to the then District Attorney, William T. Jerome, told him he was trying an insane man and said he himself would withdraw from the case if he desired.

The witness said that Thaw's delusion must crop out in time, although it might be concealed for years.

BOISE MEN ADMIT GUILT

Two Arrested at Eau Claire for "Short Changing" Merchants.

EAU CLAIRE, Wis., July 1.—(Special.)—William McGee and Ralph Kemp, giving Boise, Idaho, as their home, were arrested here and pleaded guilty today to "short-changing" merchants here. They are suspected by the police of being implicated in other crimes in the West.

The men say they once lived in Portland, Or., and Chicago.

WARSHIPS LEAVING CUBA

ARMIES FACE FOR BATTLE AGAIN

Federal Force of 5000 Brings Rebel Troops to Bay Before Bachimba.

VANGUARDS IN ENCOUNTER

After Exchanging Few Shots Both Retire to Main Bodies—Insurgents Make Preparations for Night Attack.

AT REBEL FRONT, Bachimba, Mex., July 1.—The federal army of 5000 troops moved into position within two miles of Bachimba, the rebel stronghold, at 1 o'clock tonight. The opposing vanguards exchanged a few shots and withdrew to their respective main bodies. The rebel forces are about equal to the federals.

Preparations were made by the rebels to repel a night attack from the federal artillery, though heavy fighting is not looked for until morning, when the government forces will be in closer battle range.

The federal artillery, with a regiment of cavalry, advanced on the east side of the railroad late today, while further east about 1200 cavalry and infantry were marching. To the west 1000 federal cavalry and light mountain artillery were being moved.

HUERTA'S FORCE AT CONSUELO

Prisoners of War Used in Making Repairs to Bridges.

AT FEDERAL HEADQUARTERS, Consuelo, Mex., July 1.—General Huerta arrived here yesterday. His column is in excellent condition. Three wagons and 20 railroad cars were found here abandoned by the rebels. The division is camped on the plains near here, with the mountains rising on the west and the entrance to the Bachimba Canyon only five miles to the north. The Conchos River lies to the south and southeast. It is believed there are two rebel cannon seven miles north of here. Scouts have been out all day and have been in contact with the rebel vanguard.

Generals Teller and Rabago hold the vanguard with Manzana on the right. The other brigades are guarding the trains and artillery in the center. The work of repairing the bridges progresses rapidly, prisoners of war being used in the heavy work.

OLD SOLDIER IS ROBBED

Veteran Awarded Medal for Bravery Starts to Walk to Roseburg.

Robbed of the money he had been saving from his scant pension for months that he might visit old comrades in Portland, John F. Fuller, a Civil War veteran 75 years old, who has a silver medal from Congress for bravery, was found last night walking along the Southern Pacific track on the East Side. He explained that he was walking to Roseburg, where the soldiers' home is located.

Butler received his silver medal for planting the stars and stripes on Lookout Mountain in the face of a terrific onslaught from the enemy.

He has for the last 12 years been an inmate of the soldiers' home at Mount Carmel, Cal. Five days ago he reached Portland and lodged at the Grand Central Hotel, at Third and Planders streets. Yesterday he discovered that his money, \$45, was missing.

The police communicated with T. B. McDevitt, commander-in-chief of the Grand Army for the state, and Fuller was taken in charge.

LENDS BUYS FIRE ENGINE

Chemical Apparatus Purchased for Volunteer Company.

Lents now has fire protection. The Lents Volunteer Fire Company has purchased the chemical fire engine owned by the Kern Park Fire Company for \$150. It was delivered to the Lents company Saturday evening, and is now in commission.

It consists of a two-cylinder chemical of a total 70-gallon capacity. The engine also may carry hose. It cost the Kern Park company \$345. The city soon will install a paid company at Kern Park in the new fire station. Lents has an active volunteer company of young men. F. B. Rayburn is the chief in charge.

Petitions have been filed with the Board of Education asking that fire hydrants be installed at the Lents School, which has an attendance of 900 pupils. The money for the engine was raised by entertainments and subscriptions.

ROSE CITY PARK TO PICNIC
