

## CLUB WOMEN SEE SITE OF EXPOSITION

Delegates Plant Trees Upon "Plat" and Hear Management Explain Plans.

### TALKS MADE ON HYGIENE

Adverse Report Puts Quietness Upon Pennsylvania Scheme for Reorganization—Women Attend Artillery Review.

SAF. FRANCISCO, July 1.—This was Exposition day for the delegates in attendance upon the biennial session of the General Federation of Clubwomen of the United States. Trees were planted in the "club women's plat" on the exposition grounds, and the exposition management explained its plans for the fair to the hundreds who accepted its invitation to visit the site.

Greetings from the National Conservation Congress were read by Captain J. B. White, its president. A review of the Coast Artillery Corps at the Presidio had been arranged for late in the afternoon.

**Health Topics Discussed.**  
At the afternoon session today the department of art was the feature. Health topics and social hygiene and pure food had their innings tonight. Mrs. S. S. Crockett, of Nashville, Tenn., presided at the session.

In the morning the convention adopted the report of President Moore on the amendment to the bylaws. The most important of these are:  
Presidents of the state federations will be entitled hereafter to sit in conventions with all the privileges of delegates, including the right to vote.  
Continuation of the Bureau of Information, under the management of Mrs. Mary I. Wood, of Portsmouth, N. H., for the ensuing two years.

Providing that a fine be levied upon all women's clubs that are delinquent in the payment of dues. The dues for each club are 25 cents for the year in which the biennial sessions are held. In case of delinquency by any club, it must pay a fine of 50 cents additional to the dues.

**Pennsylvania Plan Killed.**  
The plan of reorganization, known as the Pennsylvania plan, received its quietus, as the report had been adverse to its adoption.

Mrs. Moore, the president, was warmly complimented upon her efficiency as a presiding officer by Captain J. B. White, president of the National Conservation Congress, and H. H. Gross, president of the National Soil Fertility League, after they had concluded their respective addresses in the convention this afternoon.

Several hundred delegates enjoyed the review of a regiment of coast artillery at Fort Scott.

When the convention meets tomorrow the report of the council will be submitted. Mrs. Harry L. Keefe, of Waltham, Neb., will discuss the subject of inter-federation.

### SUMMER SCHOOL GROWS

Increased Attendance Gratifying to Principal at Couch.

W. T. Fletcher, principal of Couch School and also in charge of the Summer school, is gratified over the increase of pupils over last year. Attendance this year is 125 over the last Summer term.

Pupils of the Summer high school are not all those who failed to pass their examinations, many are taking one subject or more that they may save time in next year's work and complete their education earlier.

The hours are 8:30 to 1 o'clock and the pupils report only at the hours of their recitations. The following schedule has been prepared by Professor Fletcher:

8:30—Mathematics, first, second and third terms; history, third and seventh terms; Latin, fourth and fifth terms; bookkeeping, second term, and English, fourth term. 9:15—Mathematics, second, third and fourth terms; history, sixth term; Latin, first and sixth terms; chemistry, first term. 9:45—Mathematics, third and seventh terms; Latin, third term; geology, first and third terms; English, second term; history, first term; English, fourth and eighth terms; 1:30—Mathematics, fourth and eighth terms; history, second term; Latin, seventh term; zoology, first term; English, fourth term; history, first and fifth terms; Latin, fourth term; history, eighth term; geology, second term, and English, third and sixth terms.

### WIND TURNS TAIL OF PLANE

Both Are Hurled From Craft as It Plunges Toward Water—Bodies Strike With Fearful Impact and Are Buried in Mud.

Fear of Water Expressed.  
Then with a bright smile she made this significant remark:  
"But I am a cat and don't like cold water."

There were among the last words Miss Quimby said before leaving the starting line on what proved to be her last flight.

The monoplane darted at great speed over the harbor, the motors developing a speed at times of from 75 to 100 miles an hour. An examination of the aneroid barometer after the fall showed that at times the daring pilot had darted to a height of 5000 feet. On the return the great machine was seen to wobble in the gusty breeze.

The setting for the last act of the disaster could not have been more dramatic. It was about sunset. The great white wings swept directly into the west and dipped toward the earth. There was an upward flash of the tail and outlined before the spectators in the red light of the West, the figures were seen to shoot from their seats into the bay, a fall of 1000 feet.

Machine Is Undamaged.  
The powerful Bleriot, after being freed of its two passengers, glided off gracefully into the wind, and struck the water on an even keel, then drove its nose into the mud and turned over on its back. It was recovered undamaged except for a few broken struts and wires.

After a superficial examination some of the officials of the meet said that the rudder control was out of order beneath the chassis.

### DEAD MAN IS IDENTIFIED

Waldo J. Miller Started for Rose Festival—Believed Robbed.

EUGENE, Or., July 1.—(Special.)—A body discovered in the Willamette Sunday evening two miles north of Eugene was identified today as that of Waldo J. Miller, who left his home at Waltham, early in June to attend the Rose Festival in Portland. The body was identified by his son, who, alarmed at his father's continued absence, had begun search. Miller was seen in Springfield for several days about June 10 and it is supposed he was robbed and thrown into the river there. He usually carried considerable money, but when the body was recovered there were but a few dollars in the pockets. His watch and all identifying papers were gone. An inquest will be held tomorrow.

### PRINTING BIDS ARE OPENED

Book Work for County Court May Be Done in Portland.

Bids for the furnishing of printed supplies to the county for the year

were opened yesterday morning. Last year the lowest tender for blank books was \$14.40. This year it is \$11, and it is probable that the printing contract will remain in Portland. Last year the contract went to Crocker & Co., of San Francisco, at \$9.50 a book. The bids were turned over to County Auditor Martin for tabulation. He will figure five out and report to the County Court which is the most advantageous from the aggregate standpoint.

The bids on blank books as received yesterday were: Portland Printing Company, \$11; Yoran Printing Company, Eugene, \$11.15; Glass & Prudhomme, \$11.50; Lincoln-McCord Company, \$11.75.

Last year Portland printers sent several delegations to the County Court to urge that Crocker & Co. be not given the contract, their contention being that the San Francisco firm had cut prices below the cost of manufacture to "get back" at Oregon firms for invading territory in California.

### DISPUTANTS ARE FINED

BURNS AND ROGERS CLASH IN DARTMOUTH HEARING.

Detective Protests That Counsel for Defense Called Him Suborner of Perjury.

LOS ANGELES, July 1.—William J. Burns, the detective who brought about the arrest of the McNamaras, took the stand today in the trial of Clarence S. Darrow, for jury bribery.

Five minutes after his direct examination was begun by District Attorney Fredericks, Mr. Burns asked the protection of the court, and a short time later was fined \$25 for contempt. A similar fine was imposed upon Earl Rogers, chief counsel of the defense, at the same time.

Judge Hicken announced when imposing the fines that he would not allow the personal difficulties between Rogers and Burns to interfere with the orderly conduct of the trial.

The outbreak was precipitated by Mr. Darrow's reference in the course of an objection to Burns as a "wonderful man." He immediately retorted with the remark, saying it was "untrue," and Rogers audibly asked him not to withdraw it. Burns, turning to the court, resented the remark, saying that he was not withdrawing his statement by declaring that Rogers had denounced him in open court as a suborner of perjury.

"Yes, and I repeat it again," shouted Rogers.

The detective appealed for the protection of the court.

Burns' brief direct examination was confined chiefly to corroboration of the evidence of Detective Biddinger, who preceded him on the stand. Burns' cross-examination will be begun when the trial is resumed tomorrow.

Detective Biddinger said on cross-examination that he had lied to Darrow while pretending to betray Burns to him. The story about E. A. Clancy, the San Francisco labor leader, being Burns' spy, he said, was a fabrication conceived for the purpose of "worrying" Darrow and protecting from suspicion the actual Burns spies in the camp of the McNamara defense.

### Women to Drive Nails.

HUSUM, Wash., July 1.—(Special.)—Among the features of the Fourth of July celebration here will be a women's nail driving contest and a pole-climbing contest. Pole climbing, Indian races and foot races for boys and girls also will be attractions. The program for the day includes horse racing, baseball, moving pictures and old-time sports.

### Burned Mill Rebuilt.

LYLE, Wash., July 1.—(Special.)—Work of rebuilding the Clemens lumber mill has started at Timber Valley. The mill was destroyed by fire a few weeks ago. A large and more up to date mill will replace the old one.

## 40 DEAD, 400 INJURED IN RUINS OF REGINA

Fully 400 Persons Are Injured and Property Loss May Be \$11,000,000.

### MANY NARROWLY ESCAPE

Families Separated, Business Ruined in City—Runners of Other Disasters From Storm All Heard but Unconfirmed.

REGINA, Sask., July 1.—Forty are known to be dead and a number of bodies remain in the debris left by last night's tornado, which wrought havoc in this city. There are fully 400 injured and several will die.

The property loss is estimated at \$10,000,000 to \$11,000,000. The debris is being removed slowly for the workers seem afraid of their task. Many streets are blocked and wide detours have to be made to get to certain portions of the city.

The death list probably will reach 80, for many persons were boating in the lake when the storm hit Regina, and only two or three have been accounted for. Some of them were noticed struggling in the water. Their bodies will not be recovered until the lake dies up in the late summer.

Wild rumors are being received from outside points of farmhouses hovering about and their inmates killed, but all rural telephone lines are down.

Many escapes marvelous.

Many freaks of the wind are shown. The roof of a factory building was carried three blocks and crashed through a handsome new residence. Four lively stables were demolished and every horse in each of them killed.

The escape of 75 girls working in the telephone exchange was probably the most marvelous of any. The building was completely demolished and the girls were killed and mangled and injured. This, however, proved to be untrue. Just how many were injured is not known, but none was killed nor fatally hurt.

On Lorne street, one of the principal residence thoroughfares, scarcely a building is left standing.

The Canadian Pacific yards is a flat expanse of ruins, shops and trains. Not a whole car remains in the yards. Some of them were picked up by the wind and carried for several blocks. One was carried clear through the freight sheds.

Death List Unknown.

The whole North Side of the city is practically wiped out. No one knows how many are dead on that side. A canoe was carried from Wascana Lake to Victoria Park, a distance of three-quarters of a mile. Sailing vessels were strewn over the southern portion of the city. The cupola of the Baptist Church was dropped in the middle of the street, three blocks away.

Later in the evening clerks were working in the ruins of the local branch of the Royal Bank, where some men, seeing the door unlocked, walked in and demanded the money there to their credit.

One of the largest grain elevators facing the railway yards was picked up bodily and carried a distance of 50 feet from its foundation.

Among the pathetic incidents of the night were the finding by searchers of members of their own families among the victims.

Families Are Separated.

Husbands were searching for wives and mothers for children; men would stop in their work of rescue from time to time to inquire from a passing acquaintance for news of friends or relatives. Many families were separated at the time of the storm.

The day had been extremely hot and many had sought comfort in the parks. A large number of people were out on the waters of Wascana Lake when the storm broke, and five are known to have been drowned.

Girls Escaped Death.

There were 60 girls in the Y.W.C.A. building, which faced on Central Park. One side of the building was torn out, the roof was blown away, the windows were blown in and most of the furniture wrecked, but most of the girls escaped uninjured. The telephone exchange is nothing but a pile of brick and mortar and tangled wires. This was one of the first buildings to be attacked. Moans and cries coming from the debris made them think that the girls were being crushed by one, the girls were reached and it was found that only one was injured, probably fatally.

### GEO. WINGFIELD DECLINES

Justice Massey Appointed Senator From Nevada Accepts Place.

RENO, Nev., July 1.—In a letter addressed to Governor Odde, of Nevada, George Wingfield, United States Senator, declined to accept the nomination to succeed the late Senator Nixon.

Wingfield says that after giving the matter due consideration he has concluded that he can best serve the state by continuing as the active head of the business interests with which he is identified.

W. A. Massey, ex-Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of Nevada, and at present a practicing attorney of Reno, has been tendered and has accepted the appointment of United States Senator from Nevada to succeed the late George S. Nixon. This was announced by Mr. Massey today.

Senator Massey is one of the staunchest Republicans in the state. He was defeated by Governor Odde two years ago for the Republican gubernatorial nomination at the primaries.

### Unidentified Man Found Dying.

EUGENE, Or., July 1.—(Special.)—An unidentified man, aged about 25, was found dying today three miles south of Junction City. He expired a few minutes after being picked up. A small blood clot was on the top of the brain, but otherwise there was no means of identification. He was dressed like a logger.

### Seaside Poolroom Raided.

SEASIDE, Or., July 1.—(Special.)—The safe in Lew Harbort's poolroom, on Main street, was broken into early this morning and a sum approximately amounting to \$255 was taken. The money was evidently taken by some one who knew the place well, for the combination on the outer door was not broken, although the inner one was.

## BOND HOLDERS LOSE

Omaha Independent Plant Is Sold to Bell Company.

Creditors Will Be Out Approximately Half Million as Result of Subscribing for Telephone Securities.

PORTLAND RESIDENTS HIT

HUNDREDS AFFECTED HERE

Bond Holders in Portland to Receive 25 Per Cent on Dollar.

OMAHA, Neb., July 1.—The Independent Telephone Company's plant (automatic) in Omaha was sold at a receiver's sale today for \$285,000, the Nebraska Telephone Company (Bell) being the purchaser.

The plant has been in operation six years, and was bonded for \$2,400,000. The Portland and Portland capitalists being the bondholders. They will receive about 25 per cent on their holdings.

Saskatchewan Receives First News of Storm Through Papers.

J. D. Hansen, a business man of Regina, Saskatchewan, arrived in Portland yesterday morning with his family, and the first knowledge of the disaster that had befallen his home city was learned through the columns of The Oregonian.

When seen last night Mr. Hansen said: "The reports of the storm are indefinite, but indicate that the chief damage was in the business section of the city, and particularly in the district of the last census the population of Regina was 35,000 and there was a no pauper among the business class."

"Until I learn more details my personal plans are uncertain."
