

OSBORN'S STAND PLEASES WILSON

Candidate Reserves Comment on Platform for Speech of Acceptance.

CHARLES W. BRYAN CALLS

Brother Thinks Nebraskan Will Be Found on Stump When Campaign Is Under Way — Texans Present Flag Trophy.

SEA GIRT, N. J., July 4.—Governor Wilson was highly gratified today at the stand taken yesterday by Governor Osborn, of Michigan, with regard to Colonel Roosevelt and himself.

"This is very interesting, indeed," Governor Wilson said after reading Governor Osborn's statement. "I just don't know what to say about it except that it is most significant. Osborn is a man of force; he knows his own mind. What he said gratified me greatly, particularly what he said about me."

Bryan's Brother Calls Representative Burleson of Texas, who has long supported the Governor, was one of the first callers today. He spent half an hour with the nominee. Another visitor was Charles W. Bryan, a brother of William J. Bryan. He was closeted with the Governor for more than an hour. Mr. Bryan declined to make public the topics of discussion and said his call was largely social.

Career as Shortstop Recalled. Pleasant A. Stovall, of Savannah, Ga., who knew Governor Wilson when he was shortstop on the Globe Dixie baseball team at Augusta, also greeted the Governor. Mr. Stovall entertained the Governor and a few friends with stories of the Governor's boyhood days in Georgia.

ATTIRE PUZZLE TO KING

British Ruler in Quandary Over What to Wear at Regatta.

LONDON, July 4.—(Special.)—Just what attire he will wear in the royal barge at the regatta at Henley on Saturday is the problem uppermost in the King's mind today. His Majesty is in a quandary, the occasion being without a precedent, as the state barge has never been used since the Victorian era.

"Nothing on earth," said King George to Lord Desborough, "will make me wear a tall hat in these circumstances." Lord Desborough suggested a naval uniform, but the King replied that a naval uniform on the river would make him look like a ventriloquist.

MULTNOMAH PASSES ON 2

Port of Portland and Single Tax County Questions for Voters.

Aside from the 38 initiative and referendum measures that will appear on the ballot in the November election, the voters of Multnomah County will be called upon to pass on two initiative measures which apply distinctly and alone to Multnomah County.

One of these measures relates to the Port of Portland, proposed by the Central Labor Council. It amends the present law to the extent that, if the measure is adopted, the members of the commission in the future shall be elected by the people and not appointed by the Governor, as under the provisions of the existing law.

LOS ANGELES, July 4.—(Special.)—That three large steamships of the type of the Manchuria will be built at Long Beach and that five large steamships are to be leased from a defunct Hong Kong line within eight months is the statement of Goon Lee, representing the Chinese organizations that are promoting the Los Angeles-Hong Kong steamship project, on his return from a tour of Seattle, Portland and other Pacific Coast cities today.

CHAUTAUQUA TICKETS IN DEMAND. OREGON CITY, Or., July 4.—(Special.)—Secretary Cross, of the Willamette Valley Chautauqua, is receiving more applications for book tickets this year than ever before. He is anxious that the books be closed as soon as possible.

SECRETARY MEYER IMPROVING. WASHINGTON, July 4.—While Secretary of the Navy Meyer still is confined to his bed at Hamilton, Mass., he has so far recovered from typhoid fever that it is expected he can be removed soon to his flagship, the Dolphin, at Beverly, 13 miles distant, for a short run at sea.

ASTORIA BANK WILL BUILD HOME. ASTORIA, Or., July 4.—(Special.)—The directors of the Scandinavian-American Savings Bank of this city, at a meeting held last evening, voted to increase the capital stock of the bank from \$50,000 to \$75,000 and also awarded a contract to Palmberg & Mattson for the erection of a \$40,000 pressed brick building on the property at the corner of Twelfth and Duane streets, opposite the Weimhard-Astoria Hotel.

STOVE EXPLODES, MAN BURNED. PASCO, Wash., July 4.—(Special.)—While preparing a lunch on a gasoline stove after returning home Tuesday evening about 10 o'clock, George Covey had a narrow escape from serious injury, the stove exploding and setting the house on fire. Neighbors saw the flames shooting from the windows and gave the alarm. Home company No. 2 responded and the fire was quickly subdued with little damage from the flames, although the household goods were badly damaged by water.
