REBELS AT JUAREZ

Hundreds of Refugees Camp in Streets, Sleep in Open.

OROZCO DIRECTS HIS MEN

Force of 3500 Cavalry Diverted Toward Casas Grandes and Sonora, Where Guerilla War Will Be Carried On.

JUAREZ, Mex., July 5.—The transitory stage of the Mexican revolution—its passage from an organized military campaign into a guerrilla warfare—brought nearly 2000 rebel troops here today en route to Casas Grandes and the region along the Mexican Northwestern Railroad, about 100 miles southwest of the border.

Hundreds of women and children, mostly refugees from Chihuahua City, now in the hands of the federal government, came with the troops. Homeless, they camped in the streets tonight, cooking their meals on curbs and sleeping in the open.

General Pascual Orozco, the rebel chief, spent the day at Sauz, 30 miles north of Chihuahua, giving final orders to 3500 cavalry which he directed westward across country toward Casas Grandes and the State of Sonora, now the rebel objective.

Three of five troop trains which left Chihuahua, where the rebels defeated the rebel army two days ago, had reached here at 5 o'clock. Two more were on their way and General Orozco was said to be on one of them.

Governor Felipe Gutierrez and members of the rebel legislature arrived today. Those who witnessed the battle of Bachimba said the rebels had every advantage, driving the rebels away long before they intended to retreat. When the last troop train was pulling out of Bachimba a scattered fire from federal cavalry was directed at it, the passengers calling frantically on the engineer for speed.

BORDER SITUATION PEACEFUL

Report of Intent to Fire Across International Line Denied.

EL PASO, Tex., July 5.—Colonel Pascual Orozco, Sr., father of the rebel chief, denied today the report from Washington that the rebels would direct artillery fire across the international line to destroy the plant of an El Paso electric lighting company. The story has been in circulation here for nearly a month, but officials here representing the State and War Departments, after having investigated, reported that they did not believe any such contingency probable.

Governor Felipe Gutierrez, rebel executive of the State of Chihuahua, said the story was absurd.

Notwithstanding Governor Colquhoun's report to Washington that he would send the Texas militia to El Paso Army officers here regard the situation as peaceful, and believe no more troops are needed. It is generally accepted among those close to rebel headquarters that no fighting is likely at Juarez at any time.

Scores of rebel soldiers deserted to American soil during the day. They declare a dissension between General Orozco and his staff and lack of money

or food were rapidly decimating the rebel army.

STREET CONTRACTS LET

Improvement Work Totalling \$122,017 Awarded.

At a meeting yesterday of the street committee of the City Council recommendations were made for the letting of contracts for street improvements amounting to \$122,017. The larger contracts for paving were as follows: On Umatale avenue, from Grand avenue to East Nineteenth street, concrete pavement, to Kibbe-Welton Company for \$25,482.88; Schuyler street, from East Twenty-eighth to East Thirty-sixth, gravel bitulithic pavement, to the Pacific Bridge Company for \$15,418.82; East Couch street and other streets to Cochran, Nutting & Co., for \$18,103.30.

Other contracts were awarded for improvements on the following streets: East Seventeenth, from Almsworth avenue to Holman street; East Thirtieth, from Division to Clinton streets; Malden avenue, from East Thirtieth to Milwaukee avenue; Crampton street, from Milwaukee avenue to Lavern street; East Fourteenth street, from Killingsworth avenue to Holman street; East Seventy-first street, from East Stark to East Taylor; East Forty-third, from Division to East Lincoln streets; East Oak street, from Ninth to Tenth streets; East Thirtieth street, from Broadway to Hancock street; Harney avenue, from East Ninth to East Fifteenth streets; East Thirtieth street, in Laurelhurst, and Woodward avenue, from Simon's Addition to East Twenty-sixth street.

A number of delegations were at the meeting to object to various proposed assessments of benefits and damages. Several others were on hand to ask the committee to ask for particular kinds of pavement to be used in the various districts.

On East Tenth street there has been a fight between the larger property owners and those with small holdings. The former wanted bitulithic paving, while the others held out for asphalt. The Haasam paving won out by the unanimous vote of the committee members.

The committee will take a trip to the proposed extension of East Gilliam street to investigate the reports from that section of discriminatory reports of assessments of benefits and damages made by viewers. At the request of property owners of the Roseland district proceedings were discontinued on the proposed improvement of East Seventh street from Sumner to Emerson streets.

GAS MINIMUM MAY DROP

Ordinance Reducing Price From \$1 to 50 Cents Proposed by Clyde.

At the request of Councilman Clyde a proposed ordinance reducing the minimum charge for gas and electricity in Portland from \$1 a month to 50 cents will be prepared by City Attorney Grant and filed with the City Auditor the first of next week. The measure is aimed not only at the practice of the companies requiring a payment of \$1 a month whether that amount of gas or electricity is used or not, but also at the practice of demanding \$1 a month when none is used.

The proposed measure if passed by the City Council will require the companies to place the maximum charge at 50 cents and to exact no greater charge during the summer months, when patrons close their homes during vacation periods.

FREE LUNCH UPHOLD

Saloonman Says Women Are Wrong in Opposing.

HUNGER CAUSE OF CRIME

Los Angeles Council, After Hearing Declaration That Food Promotes Cause of Temperance, Takes Time to Consider.

LOS ANGELES, July 5.—Members of the Women's Christian Temperance Union and a delegation of saloonkeepers appeared before the City Council today to argue for and against the passage of the proposed ordinance to prohibit free lunches in saloons.

The women took the ground that the elimination of the free lunch would advance the cause of temperance. The saloon men, on the other hand, asserted that the presence of the free lunch was a valuable aid to temperance.

"Many men go to the saloons at noon to get lunch and of course they have to drink," said the leader of the Temperance Union.

"Yes, and after he eats he drinks less than he did before," replied the spokesman for the saloon men. "A man always gets drunk quicker and wants drink more when his stomach is empty."

"Another fact you seem to have overlooked," continued the saloon man, "is that free lunches prevent many crimes. A man in the 'down-and-out club,' hungry and desperate, will go into a saloon, eat a free lunch and satisfy his hunger and with this satisfaction disappears all incentive for going out and holding up someone, which in many cases results in murder."

The physiological assertions caused the council to delay action for a week to investigate further.

CLUB DANCES STARTLE

COMPLAINTS AGAINST CARNATION MEMBERS PILE UP.

"Guests" Accused of Giving Liquor to Young Boys and Girls, Also of Being General Nuisances.

VANCOUVER, Wash., July 5.—(Special.)—Protesting that persons attending dances given by the Carnation Club, of Orchards, gave intoxicating liquors to boys and girls of 15 or 16 years old, and that the "guests" were uproarious as late as 3 o'clock in the morning, disturbing the peace and

quiet of their slumbers, C. H. Delaney and 61 others have filed suit in the Superior Court, demanding that a restraining order be issued to put a stop to the rowdiness.

The defendants to the suit are William G. Carlisle, Charles R. Turner, Mattie Turner, Mrs. Nellie Streeter and Grant Dean, all members or officers of the Carnation Club. It is alleged in the complaint that these persons, forming a voluntary association, have leased the Parkway Opera House, and have rented it for the purpose of holding dances; which are said to be immoral and disgraceful. It is further alleged that some of those attending the dances trespass on the neighboring porches, tear up gardens, break fences, and keep peaceful residents from enjoying their sleep by boisterousness, loud and coarse conversation and drinking.

This is said to be the largest number of plaintiffs who ever brought suit at one time in the history of the county.

Orchards is six miles from Vancouver on the trolley line and is in a dry unit.

Boy Who Shot Camper Has Hearing.

Eddie White, who early Thursday morning shot William Malloy, a member of a camping party, in the thigh with a bullet from a 22-caliber rifle, seriously though not fatally injuring him, was taken before the grand jury yesterday. Others connected with the affair were also before the jury, which considered, too, the charge of selling liquor to a minor lodged against John Grimm, proprietor, and E. Munson, bartender, of a Linnton saloon. The boy declares that he secured from Grimm's saloon the liquor which "went to his head" and caused the recklessness which inspired the shooting after a quarrel with members of the camping party during which he was deprived of his revolver. The jury has not reported on the matter yet.
