CHILDREN'S PARADE COSTS \$3000.—C. C. Hall, assistant secretary of the East Side Business Men's Club, made the statement yesterday that the children's parade on Grand avenue, which cost the Rose Festival cost approximately \$3000, which came from contributions made by business men and residents and receipts from the grandstands.

SEWER ASSESSMENTS TO BE REVISITED.—At present property owners in the Riverside sewer district are subscribing to a fund to defray cost of the existing collection of the assessments made in that district. It was decided to ask owners of property to pay at the rate of \$1 a lot and to meet the balance of the assessments.

KENTON WANTS STREET WORK HURRIED.—A committee from the Kenton Improvement Association called on Mayor Rushlight yesterday and asked that Contractor Wiles, who has the improvement of four streets in Kenton, be required to hurry his work. It was reported that he has but a few men at work and at the rate the improvement is proceeding the four streets will not be completed this year.

Bigelow, chairman, held a meeting yesterday afternoon and discussed plans for the proposed clubhouse, to be built on East Sixth and Belmont streets, where the club has an option on a lot 50x100 feet. Tentative plans for a three-story building with basement were submitted. It was reported that considerable stock in the holding company has been subscribed toward creation of the building.

ABBIE HANCE WANTS DIVORCE.—Abbie L. Hance, wife of B. F. Hance, the proprietor of a drugstore at 375 Cleveland street, has filed suit for divorce in Circuit Court. The woman alleges that in 1908, after her husband had demonstrated his inability to hold a position because of drunkenness, she used her money to set him up in business. She says that for a time the receipts ran as high as \$45 a day, but that her husband finally stated his promise to stay on the "water wagon" with the result that receipts have fallen as low as \$10 a day and the business is \$1000 in debt.

HOSE CONTRACTS TO BE RECOMMENDED.—Contracts for 6900 feet of fire hose, to cost \$6984 were decided upon by the fire committee of the Executive Board at yesterday's meeting at the City Hall. Recommendation will be made to the board as follows: To the Pacific Fire Hose Company, 2000 feet 2 1/2-inch hose, at \$1.10 a foot; North-Joslyn Company, 500 feet 2 1/2-inch hose, at 80 cents a foot; Pacific States Rubber Company, 500 feet 2 1/2-inch hose, at 88 cents a foot; Eureka Fire Hose Company, 450 feet 1 1/2-inch hose, at 65 cents a foot; Faber Fire Hose Company, 450 feet 1 1/2-inch hose, at 67 cents a foot.

NEGRESS HELD TO GRAND JURY.—Ada James, a negress, was given a preliminary hearing yesterday before United States Commissioner Cannon on a charge of having contraband opium in her possession. She is the proprietress of a South Portland lodging of such questionable character that it was raided by the police recently and in her room was found five jelly glasses filled with opium. Her testimony was to the effect that she was being "jobbed" by some of her enemies and had no knowledge of how the opium came to be in her possession. She was bound over, with bail, to await the action of the next Federal grand jury.

CLUBHOUSE CORNERSTONE TO BE LAID.—Arrangements are being completed to lay the cornerstone of the clubhouse of the Rose City Club, on grounds at the corner of Sandy boulevard and Alameda avenue some time next week, probably Saturday, July 27. Central Committee Must Do All Under Minnesota Ruling. ST. PAUL, July 18.—Candidates for office, under the Minnesota corrupt practice law, just passed, cannot even dictate political letters to their stenographers unless they first make arrangements for campaign committees, according to a ruling made here by Attorney-General Smith, in response to an inquiry from James A. Hall, County Attorney at Marshall. This construction of the new act seems absurd, the Attorney-General admitted, but is justifiable by its text.
