

MOVE AGAINST T. R. ELECTORS IS MADE

Kansas Regulars Seek by Order of Court to Exclude Names From Ballot.

COUNTY CLERKS ENJOINED

Eight Men Nominated Before Chicago Convention Was Held and Say They Will Vote for Colonel Are Affected.

NEWTON, Kan., July 18.—A temporary restraining order was issued by Judge Brannin in the District Court here Wednesday, enjoining every County Clerk in Kansas from printing on the official primary ballot, under the head of Republican party, those candidates for Presidential electors who have asserted openly they will support Theodore Roosevelt if elected.

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COMPROMISE IS REFUSED

Colonel Unwilling Taft Shall Get Electors if He Gets Most Votes.

OYSTER BAY, N. Y., July 18.—After reading statements made by William Flinn, of Pittsburg, and E. A. Van Valkenberg, of Philadelphia, two of his leaders in Pennsylvania, in support of the plan for placing the same candidates for Presidential electors on both the Taft and Roosevelt tickets, Colonel Roosevelt said today that he would not concede from the position he has taken in regard to a compromise giving recognition to Taft claims in the primary states.

SUSPECT FREED ON BAIL

Police Alleged Murder of Gambler Will Be Solved.

NEW YORK, July 18.—While the police continue to declare their confidence that there will be a speedy solution of the problem of who shot and killed Herman Rosenthal, a gambler, early Tuesday and what were the motives behind the murder, the apparent result of yesterday's action on their part was the apprehension of "Bridge" Webber, an East Side sporting man and his release on small bail after he had been questioned. Webber admitted that he was the man who had heard a suspicious conversation the day preceding the crime between members of a poker party on a steamer excursion, during which threats were made to "get" Rosenthal if he persisted in continuing his revelations of alleged partnership between the police and the gambling fraternity.

WRECK LAID TO WOMAN

Railroad Tender Is Now Reported to Be Inmate.

CHICAGO, July 18.—Discovery today that Mrs. D. A. Wilcox, the tower operator at Western Springs, near where a wreck occurred on the Chi-

cago, Burlington & Quincy Railroad last Sunday, costing the lives of 13 persons, once was confined in the Dunning asylum, caused Coroner Hoffman to summon her for investigation tomorrow.

P. S. Egusta, passenger traffic manager of the road, issued today a statement regarding the case, in which he said in part:

"May 29, 1911, a letter was addressed to the chief dispatcher at Aurora informing him that Mrs. Wilcox had been in an insane hospital and that it was thought she was not right at that time. One of the company physicians examined her and reported he found her in normal condition, both physically and mentally; that he had interviewed several parties in La Grande in regard to her and was informed that while she was in the hospital she was in the company of a man in a few days, as there seemed to be no occasion whatever for holding her there.

"It was informed that ill-feeling existed between the party who made the complaint and Mrs. Wilcox, and we concluded that the charge that she was unbalanced was prompted by malice, not an unusual thing in our experience.

"After these reports had been received Mrs. Wilcox was put to work June 17, 1911. Her work has been reported satisfactory and the facts regarding the accident do not indicate any ground for censure on the handling of the tower signals of which she was in charge.

REPUBLICANS MUST STAND FOR TAFT OR T. R.

Regulars Now Out Will Be Supported by Third Party if They Climb on the Bandwagon.

For Republican candidates for the various state, county and city positions, the Roosevelt third-party supporters in Oregon, through their support, provided the candidates will climb into the third-party handwagon.

This was the announcement Wednesday of Dr. Henry Walden, one of the Roosevelt supporters who has called a meeting of Roosevelt supporters for next week to perfect a working organization to begin an active political campaign.

Dr. Coe says it is his desire to have the candidates express their opinions as to which side they want to be on, and he offers to award the much interest the answer to the question of affiliation which has been put up to the candidates by the county central committee. Candidates who line up with the Taft people will be snubbed by the third-party supporters.

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The ex-President explained that he had no objection to having the same electors on both the Roosevelt and Taft tickets, as contemplated in the Flinn-Valkenberg plan, but he objected to any agreement under which President Taft should receive the entire electoral vote of the state in case a greater number of votes should be cast on election day for the Taft ticket than for the Roosevelt ticket.

So far as possible it will be left to each state to work out its own arrangements, subject only to such general restrictions imposed by a National committee. For example, the entire restrictions, if the Colonel has his way, will be the provision that there must be no agreement with the Taft forces which will give official recognition to the President as the legitimately chosen Republican candidate in the states which the ex-President won in the primaries.

He will insist, also that any plan adopted must be nonpartisan and applicable to Democratic as well as Republican organizations in furtherance of his plan to run upon a genuinely independent ticket.

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After Police Commissioner Waldo had forwarded to District Attorney Whitman a written request that the latter begin a "re-education" investigation of charges of partnership between the gamblers and the police and that members of the force were guilty of investigating down the line until most of the old guard stalwarts had paid their respects, the young manager of the President's cause authorized the opening of offices in the Times building tomorrow and said that permanent offices of the committees of the National committee would be chosen Friday. Mr. Hillis said that the suggestion of Representative Rees, of Kansas, looking to the withdrawal of President Taft and Colonel Roosevelt from the race had not got far.

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Dr. Coe returned from the East Monday after spending some time visiting Eastern relatives, following the public convention in Chicago. When he arrived in the city he issued a call for the third-party supporters to hold a meeting to arrange for a complete organization.

"The third party is working on the supposition that the Republican party now stands without a nominee for the Presidency. This is because Roosevelt Taft got the so-called nomination by a majority of 21, and he had a total of 75 stolen votes. Morally he was not nominated and that is the basis we are working on.

"It is our desire to get every one of the candidates on the Republican ticket, from United States Senator on down, to show the voters. We want them to come out in public and say whether they are for Taft or for Roosevelt. We want to know whether they want to take a chance with Roosevelt and his 21,000 votes or Taft with his 7999 votes. Whether we will put candidates out in the field or not we have not decided as yet, and we probably won't know until we hear from the present candidates.

"In the East some of the politicians I have talked with have figured out the situation in detail and they declare that Taft will carry but one state in the Union—Rhode Island. He has a bare fighting chance in Delaware and New Hampshire, but that is as far as it goes. The idea of Roosevelt regarding the third party does not coincide with a great body of his supporters. It is necessary to have the third party get candidates properly placed on the ticket in many of the states. Out of it may come a great new party, but the time is too short to absolutely create this party for the present emergency.

"In the matter of electors for Oregon the Roosevelt people will take no chances in voting for a set of men, no matter what they say, and they will be known as genuine progressives, who will support the nominee of our convention. The plan probably will be to put up men, along with such candidates already nominated, as can be relied upon. This will not be done until after the convention in August."

KLICK INDORSES WILSON

KENTUCKY ORDER TO WORK FOR DEMOCRATIC SUCCESS.

Active Campaign Starts at Armory Tonight—Clark is Praised for His Unselfish Spirit.

A special meeting of the Kentucky Klick was held Wednesday night at headquarters, in the Worcester block, for the purpose of ratifying the nomination of Woodrow Wilson for President and devising ways and means for an active campaign. An urgent appeal was made by the president for all to attend the meeting in the Armory tonight.

The following ticket was unanimously indorsed: For President, Woodrow Wilson; for Vice-President, Thomas R. Marshall; for electors, Hugh McLean, of Cos. County; William M. Peterson, of Unadilla County; John M. Wall, of Washington County; D. M. Watson, of Multnomah County; F. C. Wilfong, of Multnomah County.

The following resolutions were adopted: We applaud and admire Champ Clark for his unflinching and unselfish patriotism in obeying the stern mandate of a two-thirds rule, and in common with our Democratic brethren, the Klick returns in the nomination of Woodrow Wilson for President of the United States.

Oregon has heretofore indorsed the plea of our worthy Governor, George E. Chamberlain, "that true progressive Democracy consists in respect for the rights of Congress," therefore the Democrats have united States Senator and the Klick contends that the Democrats are now entitled to a Representative in Congress.

The Klick has a strong and patriotic majority for its platform in Baltimore in yielding to a stubborn minority.

NEW BRIDGE TO BE USED

O. W. R. & N. ENGINEERS THINK SPAN DOESN'T NEED TEST.

Regular Train Service Will Be inaugurated Not Later Than Next Monday Morning.

Regular traffic over the new O. W. R. & N. bridge across the Willamette will be inaugurated not later than next Monday morning. It may be started as early as tomorrow afternoon.

As soon as practicable thereafter demolition of the old bridge will be started regardless of pending negotiations between the city and county and city and county officials for use of the upper deck of the new bridge.

Operation of the lift span in the new bridge was started successfully yesterday morning. Tracks now are being laid across it. As soon as this work is completed, train tracks will be run over it. The first train will consist of a heavy engine and a string of steel cars loaded with ballast to be used in filling the tracks between the west approach and the yards adjoining the Union depot.

Engineers say there is no necessity of testing the new bridge, as they are confident it will operate successfully.

As soon as the bridge is done it will be ready for train service, said George W. Boshack, chief engineer of the O. W. R. & N. Company, yesterday. "We don't have to test it, as it can't be wrong. It would be a waste of time and money to require testing, and we would be poor bridge builders to demand a test after completing it. Probably the first train to cross the bridge
