

MILLER PREDICTS WILSON'S VICTORY

Democratic Party United, Sure
to Win, Declares Oregon
State Senator.

"BRYAN, BALTIMORE HERO"

Retiring National Committeeman
Believes Own State Will Cast
Electoral Vote for New Jer-
sey Governor This Fall.

With an enthusiasm for Wilson and Marshall that is only surpassed by his admiration for William Jennings Bryan, M. A. Miller, State Senator and retiring National Committeeman for Oregon, returned yesterday from attending the Democratic National convention at Baltimore.

Following the convention, Mr. Miller visited New York, Boston and other Eastern cities, including Washington, and called on Woodrow Wilson at his home at Sea View, N. J.

"I am not only firmly convinced that Wilson and Marshall will be elected, but I am just as sure in my own mind that Oregon will cast its electoral vote for the Democratic nominees," said Mr. Miller yesterday.

Party United Sure to Win.
"In my opinion Wilson is the strongest man the Democrats could have nominated. Throughout the East Wilson and Marshall are regarded as an unusually strong combination. As a usual thing a contest in a convention leaves some spots that refuse to heal, but the outcome of the Baltimore convention seems to have had the opposite effect. It resulted in a reunited Democratic party. When the Democratic party is united, it always wins. This was notably true in the campaigns of 1876, 1884 and 1892."

"Wilson has not only a solid party behind him, but a solid Democratic press as well. Call the roll of the Democratic newspapers in the country and they will unanimously answer 'Wilson.' The New York Times, the New York World and the Brooklyn Eagle, papers that have not always supported the Democratic ticket, are enthusiastic for Wilson. The independent press throughout the country is also very generally for Wilson."

"In New York City, where I passed four days, I took part with a great many men, and from what I learned of sentiment among the voters, Wilson will carry that state. Senator O'Grady, of New York, places Wilson's plurality in that state at 100,000. Another thing that makes Wilson's candidacy especially formidable is the fact that he has the earnest and active support of all of his rivals in the convention for the nomination. Every one of the defeated candidates has either called on Wilson personally or has sent assurances of support."

Third Party Aids Wilson.
"The nomination of Wilson and Marshall and the assurance of a third party, or Roosevelt ticket, has made all heretofore Republican states debatable ground in this campaign. For instance, New Jersey is conceded to Wilson by both Republicans and Roosevelt supporters by 80,000. From what I learned in Pennsylvania, Wilson has more than an equal chance of carrying that state. The same is true of Illinois, Dunne, the Democratic nominee for Governor, will be elected and the state will also go for Wilson and Marshall."

"While in the State of Illinois, I met many prominent Republicans who told me Minnesota would cast its electoral vote for the Democratic nominees. Of course, Roosevelt is determined to run, even if the gratification of that desire involves the organization of another party. The fight between the Roosevelt and the Taft forces will be far more bitter than that between either or both with the Democrats. In the various states I visited I found almost as much determined opposition to Roosevelt as there ever was enthusiastic support for him in the past."

Baltimore Meet Greatest Ever.
Although it has been the privilege of Mr. Miller to attend a number of Democratic National conventions, he enthusiastically declares that the recent gathering at Baltimore was the greatest political convention ever held by any party. According to Mr. Miller, it surpassed in interest the Chicago convention in 1896 when Bryan was first nominated after he had stampeded the convention with his "crown of thorns and cross of gold" address. The Baltimore convention, said Mr. Miller, was thoroughly Democratic. Every man had his say and every issue presented was thrashed out on the floor and disposed of on its merits."

"It was the purpose of a clique of politicians and the big interests through their representatives in the convention," explained Mr. Miller, describing the part Bryan played in making Wilson's nomination possible. "I never to destroy Bryan politically and eliminate him permanently as a great factor in the Democratic party. Their selection of Alton B. Parker as temporary chairman was the first step in that direction. Although temporarily successful in the first skirmish, they were thoroughly and completely routed in the outcome."

Bryan's Fight Most Noble.
"Bryan made the most noble, bold and courageous fight that any man ever made in a political convention. He was the hero of the convention. He began a fight which will entirely destroy the unit rule and throw in the waste paper basket prearranged convention programmes. Immediately following adjournment of the convention Bryan received more than 1000 telegrams and nearly 4000 letters from people in all sections of the United States congratulating him on the fight he made. One of the telegrams was from a minister and read: 'I am on my way to church. May the Lord give you strength to keep up your fight for humanity.'"

CIRCUS DRAWS CROWDS

OAKS FEATURE ATTENDED BY
7000 IN AFTERNOON.

Performance Is of the Good Old-
Time Variety With One Ring,
Ringmaster and Chorus.

There is not a single elephant in the Boyd & Ogle One-Ring Circus; nor yet a camel. But fully a dozen youngsters were at the Oaks Amusement Park early yesterday morning for tickets to see the circus "just for carrying water."

"And you don't want no water, nor nuffin," said one little towhead, who had tramped all the way from Alberta. The appeal was too much for Dr. Boyd, and the kiddies were put to work putting the circus ring in final trim for the afternoon performance.

And neither rain nor dull day could keep away the many children, old and young, who had brought their grandparents to see the circus of "80 years ago." Young and old enjoyed it because it was "all circus." And it was attractive enough to keep 7000 people in their seats when one rain shower came.

The ring is raised three feet above the ground and has a diameter of 45 feet. It is the regulation sawdust affair with just enough obstacles to make it impossible for the best clown of them all to walk across without stumbling over the ringmaster's whip. Yes, there is a real ringmaster, and he wears a shiny top hat.

Of course, the clowns were as funny as could be imagined. One of them, old Dan Hart, was a clown in the days of the original one-ring circus that of Dan Rice, in which he played.

There were seven feature acts, which at brisk speed lasted exactly one hour. A big band played all the old-time circus melodies that kept 7000 feet shuffling to unison.

The children were most attracted by the clowns and the trick mule, which absolutely defies anyone as a rider. Then there is a beautiful posing horse. In a series of pretty pictures, a man chews nails, spikes and glass with as much gusto as an ostrich taking an appetizer. There is a dog act that is wonderfully clever, a troupe of Shetland ponies that wait and do other things, more educated horses and heaps of fun.

The Boyd & Ogle Circus is easily the biggest free show that Manager Cordway has ever put on at the Oaks, and it will be given every afternoon and evening this week. In addition, the Oaks Park band will give concerts twice daily. Punch and Judy and other features of the bill remain unchanged. A steady downpour did its best to spoil the evening performance, but it was given to a somewhat smaller audience.

TEMPERANCE MAN HERE

Dr. Guy Wadsworth Speaks at Third
Presbyterian Church.

Dr. Guy Wadsworth, associate secretary of the temperance committee of the Presbyterian Church, spoke last night at the Third Presbyterian Church, East Thirteenth and East Pine streets, on "Our Mutual Foe." The lecture was illustrated by stereoscopic views.

The speaker gave facts to show that the use of liquor is harmful. He said "Great Britain's life insurance companies have a class open only to total abstainers. Their rates are lowest." "Total abstainers," continued Dr. Wadsworth, "have been found by statistics to have an average life expectancy of 44 years, moderate drinkers an expectancy of but 31 years, and heavy drinkers 15 years. The latter cannot secure insurance."

Such a show also that alcohol is not of benefit as a medicine, and that even the purest liquor is poisonous, because alcohol is present. A German scientist has proven this and many other startling facts.

Dr. Wadsworth was for 12 years president of Occidental College in Los Angeles, and for three years filled the same position at Bellevue College, Omaha. He was pastor of the First Presbyterian Church, Pueblo, Colo., for three years before becoming associate secretary of the temperance committee. CONTRACT WILL BE LET FOR ERECTION OF NEW CHRISTIAN CHURCH AT TILLAMOOK.



TILLAMOOK, Or., July 21.—(Special.)—The contract for building the new Christian Church in this city will be let July 25. The new edifice will be 72x95 feet, and will be one of the most imposing structures in the city. It is to be built of concrete blocks, with stone effect, at the corner of Third street and Fourth avenue, East. The main auditorium is to have a seating capacity of 450 people, and it will be possible to seat nearly 900 with everything open.

The property which was formerly occupied by the Christian Church has been sold to the Tillamook Hotel Company, and the buildings have been moved from the grounds. The new building will be finished by October.

PERKINS MAKES ATTACK

Y. M. C. A. SPEAKER RAPS BOY SCOUT MOVEMENT.

Plea Is Made That Youth of Land
May Be Taught What He
Is Interested In.

The Boy Scout movement was attacked yesterday afternoon by R. H. Perkins, religious director of the Y. M. C. A. He was the speaker at the men's meeting in the association lobby. His subject was "Neglected Children and Youth."

"Tommyrot," was the way he characterized the belief that "you can discipline a boy without the military idea."

"Look at our Y. M. C. A. boys' department, with a thousand boys in it," he said. "Do you ever hear militarism preached to the boys around the Y. M. C. A.? Some day we will forget all about militarism and start anew. Some day we will forget the juvenile court and discipline the children in the public schools instead."

Mr. Perkins said there is no excuse for the juvenile court, that it ought not to exist. But he urged the establishment of more playgrounds, and of kindergartens.

The speaker pleaded also for such a reformation in the school system that every boy should be like a soldier. "If the boy makes mathematics, let him learn it in connection with carpentry, machine work, or whatever line of work he is to follow. If he cannot become interested in it, let him become interested in it as he has learned enough to give him a general knowledge of the subject. Then let him specialize in something else, in which he is interested."

"We have made the officer of the juvenile court the sponsor for boyhood life on the streets of our cities. It ought not to be. The home and the school ought to be. Some children need the arm of the law over them, but the arm of the law is just as strong in the school as in the court. We have started wrong."

The speaker said every voter in Portland ought to give the city government a free hand in purchasing playground sites in districts likely to become congested.

METHODISTS WILL MEET

Secretary of Board of Church Extension Coming From Louisville.

Dr. W. F. McMurray, of Louisville, Ky., secretary of the Board of Church Extension of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, will attend the annual Columbia River Conference, to be held at the First Church here September 5 to 10. Bishop R. G. Waterhouse, of Los Angeles, will preside.

Others who will be present will be: Dr. J. J. Lamar, of Nashville, Tenn., in charge of the publishing house of the church, located there; Dr. Gross Alexander, of Nashville, editor of the Methodist Review; Dr. Stonewall Anderson, of Nashville, secretary of the board of education of the church, and Dr. W. E. Vaughn, of San Francisco, editor of the Pacific Methodist Advocate.

Western Oregon and Western Washington are included in the Columbia River Conference. In it are 31 churches and 2000 members. The Western Missionary Society will hold its annual conference in the Sunday school room at the same time as the church conference.
