FRUIT VENDOR ARRESTED.—Gus Car-
ayla, who conducts a fruit stand at
Second and Morrison streets, was ar-
rested yesterday by Patrolman Powell,
charged with neglecting to keep his
fruit covered with a screen, as re-
quired by the recent health and food
ordinance. Several days ago Chief
Slover issued a general order to all
patrolmen instructing them to take
pains to enforce the ordinance and par-
ticularly calling to their attention the
ordinance required that all fruit, as
well as meat and other forms of food-
stuffs, be covered with a screen or net-
ting to keep away the flies. The fact
that the ordinance applied to fruit did
not seem to be generally understood.
Patrolman Powell said that the arrest
of Carayla was made after repeated
warnings which he did not heed.

ACCIDENTS WILL BE INDEXED.—To
provide for a more systematic manner
of dealing with the accident problem,
Chief of Police Slover has issued an
order requiring that a record of all ac-
cidents occurring in the city be kept
and properly indexed. In the order
issued he also instructs the police to
be more thorough in their reports.
They are required to report all details,
giving the time and the place of the
accident, the circumstances and the
names of witnesses. The reports are
to be made to the chief of police.
In the past many in-
quiries have been made of the police
regarding accidents, but satisfactory
results could not always be given, for
want of any systematic record. This
has been especially noticeable in the
past few weeks, when the number of
accidents has been larger than usual.

RECOVERS SLOWLY.—Logan Roe,
the small boy who was injured on July
19 by being run over by an automobile,
has not yet completely recovered con-
sciousness. A day or two ago he
seemed to be improving, but has since
been so weak that Dr. George F. Wilson,
who is attending him, believes, how-
ever, the boy will ultimately recover.
The boy also suffered a fractured thigh
bone. He is a patient at Good Samaritan
hospital.

DR. PARKER TO VISIT SWITZERLAND.—
Word has been received from Dr. E. H.
Parker, of Prescott, Ariz., formerly of
this city, that he is planning to visit
Switzerland in the near future. Dr.
Parker was the partner of Dr. E. D.
Johnson, of this city, and went to
Switzerland in the last of his health.
Whether or not he will return to Por-
tland before going to Switzerland is not
known.

FUNERAL OF MRS. SIGLER TODAY.—The
funeral service for Mrs. B. D. Sigler, County
Assessor, who died Friday, July 26, at
Dayton, Or., will be held this morning
at 10:30 o'clock at Finley's chapel. At
the conclusion of the services the body
will be taken to the Portland Cremato-
rium. Services were held at Dayton
yesterday afternoon, the remains being
transported to Portland in the day.

MEMBERS OF PRESS TO SPEAK.—At the
popular affairs luncheon to be held
at the Imperial Hotel today at noon,

PASTOR IS IN ASYLUM.—While John
Marshall, pastor of the Portsmouth
Protestant Episcopal Church, was in
the insane asylum at Salem, where he
had been sent by the county authorities,
the police and his family were scour-
ing the city in search of him. Mar-
shall had been missing from his home
since 2 o'clock Friday morning, July
23. Last Thursday he was examined
by Dr. W. T. Williamson and declared
mentally deranged. His family was not
notified of the disposition of Mr. Mar-
shall, however, and they appealed to
the police. Mr. Marshall is well edu-
cated. He has a wife and four children
at 1554 Portsmouth avenue. He worked
hard and was well liked, and it is be-
lieved that he became temporarily deranged
from overwork.

CHINESE TO RAISE FUND.—Members of
the Young China Association of Por-
tland, of which Louis King is presi-
dent, are planning to make a campaign
to raise \$20,000 toward the loan fund for
the new Chinese republic. The members
of the association in San Francisco have
already raised \$20,000 for this purpose.
Chinese associations in Seattle and
other cities of the Northwest are pre-
paring also to inaugurate similar cam-
paigns, and the contributions from the
Pacific Coast will be a comparatively
large proportion of the total sum
sought by the Chinese government for
its loan.

PULLMAN COCKLEMAN HERE.—F. E.
Sanger, W. G. Lankin, D. M. Haynes
and W. Edwards, members of the City
Council of Pullman, Wash., arrived in
Portland yesterday and will be in this
city for a few days, making extensive
investigations of the paving projects
that have been carried out and are in
process here at this time. Costs, qual-
ity and other features of the Portland
paving will be looked into, and the in-
formation gathered will be reported to
the authorities in Pullman for use
in preparing for similar enterprises in
that city. The authority from Pullman
is registered at the Oregon.

DEER TAGS ARE HERE.—State Game
Warden Finley has just received a con-
signment of license tags to be used by
hunters when presenting deer skins for
sale. According to the game laws, no
hunter may kill more than five deer in
one season and must not present them
for sale without having one of these
tags attached to each skin. The tags
are issued to applicants upon making
proper affidavit. Mr. Finley has
received 1500 tags and expects that an
additional 500 will be necessary to
care for all skins to be offered dur-
ing the coming season.

MISS EUNICE HOFFMAN SPEAKS.—At the

FOUR BREAK JAIL

Ohio Man Wanted for Forgery
Most Important Prisoner.

TRUSTIES SIGN WARNING

Doors and Window Forced, Allowing
Exit to Roof of Adjoining
Building—Wife of One Not
Found at Her Lodgings.

Four prisoners forced a bolted and
barred window, jumped 15 feet to the
roof of a barn from the third story of
the City Jail and made their escape
early last evening, while "trusties" in
the corridors of the jail were awak-
ened by the burglar alarm. The escape
took place in the vicinity of the police station
garage with dishes in a vain effort to
attract the attention of officers below.
Claude Lee Curran, aged 25 years, ar-
rested in the Portland Police Agency
for alleged forgery in Norwood, O., is
supposed to have been the ringleader
in the jailbreak and is by far the most
important prisoner who escaped. J. B.

Robbins, aged 26 years, and E. T.
Lewis, both arrested in a leading hotel
in connection with the disappearance
of a Eugene, Or., business man, and
John Nelson, a youth held as a witness
against two Japanese who assaulted
him Friday night, were the others who
made good their escape.

Curran, who is known in the Middle
West as a baseball player and foot-
racer and who was a superintendent
of construction for a contracting firm
in Norwood, was visited by his wife
Saturday, and it is thought that the
means of escape were smuggled in to
him at that time. Mrs. Curran, who
is believed to be in the eastern part
of the state, is said to have been in
a hotel at Third and Pine streets,
which she has kept since her husband
was arrested there Friday night. Her
clothing and effects were still there,
but a search failed to discover her
whereabouts.

Men Occupied Adjoining Cells.
The four men were in two adjoining
cells in the third floor portion of the
jail, which is reserved for important
prisoners and those held as witnesses.
Lewis and Robbins were in one cell,
Nelson and Curran in the next. The
trusties in the corridor said that they
did not know that the prisoners were
attempting to break away until they
saw them in the hallway, when they
tried to give the alarm.

The four jailbreakers attacked the
heavy iron grating of a window of the
jail which opens out above the barn
to the south of the jail. It was se-
cured by a bolted hasp and this they
forced. They threw a blanket from
their bunk on the far roof of the
Northwestern Transfer Company
stables at 301 Davis street, and jumped
out on it. From the stable roof they
reached the roof of the Elkhorn Lodg-
ing House, at Sixth and Davis street,
and through a window which opens on
a court in that place, went down to
the street.

Several descriptions were followed
by the police in searching for the quar-
ter, but none led to results. Curran
is described as having been north-
east to the Olson & Mahony dock on
Front street, but search failed to re-
veal him. The officers in the station
were only aware of the escape when
they went to the third floor of the
building to investigate the throwing
of the window of dishes, tin cups and
other articles by the escapees. "But
do not know that the prisoners were
attempting to break away until they

Curran Admitted Identity.
Curran is charged with having
forged a check for \$450, which he de-
posited in the First National Bank of
Norwood, Ohio, drawing checks against
it for the total amount. Bank officials,
when they came to realize on the check
which he had deposited, found it is al-
leged, that it was spurious. He ad-
mitted his identity to the Burns offi-
cials when they confronted him with
his pictures and description, and an
officer was to start from Cincinnati
last night to take him back to Ohio.
Detective Captain Day wired to inter-
cept the coming detective.

Lewis and Robbins were arrested
when a business man of Eugene, Or.,
having been in the Portland Police
Agency, was charged with forgery
and vagrancy, and were being held until
the affair was cleared up.

Nelson was beaten about the head
and face Friday night by the Panama,
Japanese-owned lodging house at 52
Fourth street North, when he was set
upon by T. Tanaka, a "bouncer," and
H. Yoneda, the proprietor of the place.

The funeral probably will be held
Tuesday. The time will be announced
today.

IMMENSE COUGAR KILLED

Body of Animal in Coos County Is
Over Eight Feet Long.

CAMAS VALLEY, Or., July 28.—(Spe-
cial.)—The largest cougar ever seen in
this neighborhood was killed Friday
by W. H. Lehnberg, in the eastern part
of Coos County. The body measured 8
feet 2 inches from tip to tip, the feet
measuring 6 inches across, the hide
alone weighing 17 pounds.

He had grown quite bold and trailed
two prospectors from Philomath who

evening.
