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THOUT FRY WILL BE PLANTED—State Game Warden Fink has just completed arrangements for the shipment of 200,000 fingerling trout to Corvallis, for distribution among the streams in that vicinity. The shipment will be made today in 200 cans. Another shipment of 200,000 trout fry will be made to Canby on Saturday, to be planted in the streams near that place. Early next week a similar shipment will go to Klamath Falls. It is the purpose of Mr. Fink to distribute small trout to various streams in the state throughout the summer, in order that the hatchery at Bonneville may receive new supplies of eggs that have been ordered. **PATROLMAN KILLS TWO**—Patrolman Dillon narrowly escaped death Monday night when Emma Giuseppe, standing in Marquam's Gulch, between Front and First streets, shot more than 20 feet from Dillon, fired three pistol shots at him. Dillon and Deputy Sheriff Solomon were pursuing Giuseppe after he had fired some ten shots at a number of youths who were annoying him. Attorney Law Dawley, who appeared for Giuseppe, asked for his release, explaining that he was so excited that he did not realize he was firing at the policeman. The discharge was granted, on condition that he move from that locality.

JACKSON CLUB TO MEET—H. B. Van Duser, chairman of the Democratic County Central Committee, has called a meeting of the committee at the Jackson Club headquarters on the second floor of the Medical building at 8 o'clock tonight. The work of the Democratic National convention will be discussed by Will R. Stevens, Samuel Kerr, delegates from this state and the party's new National committeeman. Resolutions in the county committee will be filed and plans for the campaign will also be discussed at tonight's gathering.

SEWER PROJECT UP—One large sewer to drain all of the central part of the Killingsworth avenue is one of the plans which will be discussed at a meeting of the North Portland Commercial Club and interested citizens of the district, August 12. Another question which will probably be discussed is the changing of the name of North Albina Library to North Portland Library. The boosters will also start work to bring all the tracts now known as Albina, Piedmont and others under the general name, North Portland.

PAVEMENT CUT BY AUTO-TRUCKS—William Donovan, the owner of a number of lots which are fronted with hard-surface pavement, is bringing to the notice of the City Engineer the manner in which heavy gravel auto-trucks, having steel tires, cut up this pavement. The worst damage occurs at the corners where the machines sometimes shave off half an inch of pavement according to Donovan.
