

GRACE SHOT SELF WIFE TELLS JURY

Woman Says Pistol Was Discharged in Scuffle for Legal Document.

SPOUSE GLARES FROM COT

During Testimony Wounded Man Is Smiling Cynically at Defendant—Case Expected to Go to Jury Today.

ATLANTA, Ga., Aug. 1.—With her husband glaring at her from the pillow of his cot, Mrs. Daisy Opie Grace told her story today to the jury that is to decide if she is guilty of the charge of attempting to kill her husband.

"I did not shoot Mr. Grace, and he knows it," she exclaimed dramatically, and Grace's lips parted in a cynical smile. Mrs. Grace declared almost an hour in telling her story, and at its conclusion the defense rested.

As she did not make the statement under oath, the prosecution was denied the privilege of cross-examination. The state then put on one or two witnesses in rebuttal and rested. The case is expected to go to the jury tomorrow.

Mrs. Grace declared in her statement that she shot herself during a scuffle with her husband over a legal document which he was trying to shoot her. It was not the first time he had attempted to kill her, she said.

Alleged Actions Related.

Last summer, after she had made her will in his favor at his insistence, she said, he tried to throw her overboard from a steamer on which they were traveling from New York to St. Johns, N. F. Some time after that, in Atlantic City, she testified, he had held a pistol at her head, declaring he would kill her if she did not stop talking to him about going to work.

Soon after they came to Atlanta last November, Mrs. Grace testified, she began to realize that her husband was neglecting her. Another woman began calling him up over the telephone, and when she would say anything to him about it he would get angry.

Then Grace went into the building business, but with such poor success that he was draining constantly on her money. Finally he prevailed upon her to give him power of attorney to go to Philadelphia and sell her home. He was to leave on the morning of the shooting, she going to his mother. Grace awoke that morning feeling bad and she suggested that they defer their departure until the next day.

Mrs. Grace Suspicious.

"His manner was very suspicious," she said, "and I made up my mind that he was trying to get me out of Atlanta so he could take a woman with him, or worse still, into my own home."

She said that when Grace's partner called up and asked her to tell Grace he had just received money, she told Grace he could wait before selling her home.

"At this suggestion he raised his voice and began cursing and abusing me," she said. She said she was convinced there was a woman connected with the trip and told Grace as much. "I said I would take care of it," she said. "Grace was lying on the bed. His coat was hanging just behind where he was lying." She took out of his pocket the power of attorney papers she had given him. When Grace saw what was done, he jumped out of bed and grabbed her. In the ensuing scuffle the shooting occurred.

INFANTILE MALADY FATAL

33 Deaths Result From 173 Cases of Paralysis in Los Angeles.

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 1.—Infantile paralysis in Los Angeles has so alarmed the city health officials that they have distributed 45,000 circulars to the public giving the history and symptoms of the disease and have prepared other pamphlets for distribution among physicians so that all may recognize the malady and take immediate steps for saving children's lives.

Dr. L. M. Powers, City Health Commissioner, has asked the Council for \$5000 with which to prepare a quarantine station for children attacked by the scourge. According to Dr. Powers, 173 cases of the disease, 33 of which resulted in death, have been reported to the authorities.

"The Council has issued an edict excluding all children under 10 years of age from all public playgrounds," said Dr. Powers tonight. "It also has ordered that no children under 15 be permitted to enter places of entertainment or Sunday schools."

"There are only two or three public schools open at this time of year and they will be closed, as nurseries are conducted in conjunction with them."

pas, have disappeared in the Sierra Madre, southwest of Madera, on what is known as the Dolores trail.

It is not known whether they have permanently separated themselves from Orozco's command, just at a time when General Salazar, his chief lieutenant, must bear the brunt of the attack of the whole government army, or whether they are engaged in an important strategic movement with the purpose of cutting the lines of communication of Federal troops, who are 1800 strong, under General Blanco, with two guns, near Ojitos, 50 miles from Casas Grandes. The skirmishers of the forces are in touch.

Orozco's Forces Scattering.

General Orozco, the rebel leader, is in Juarez Caraveo, on the Mexican Central Railroad. The rebel forces in Northern Mexico appear to be scattering and many disturbances are reported in various quarters.

County Would Act.

Scores of messages have been sent to Washington from El Paso and other border towns, appealing to the United States to take some steps which will secure protection for Americans in Mexico.

In many instances messages are being sent in the names of entire communities, as in the case of one from Marfa yesterday, addressed to Representative W. R. Smith. The message said:

"If the United States cannot handle the Mexican situation, let Presidio County handle it."

The appeals, in most cases, are being sent to Congressmen and Senators, but some have been directed to the White House.

The arrival last night of two trainloads of refugees from the Mormon

colonies of Pachuca, Chuchupa and Garcia has brought the number here to a full 2500.

O. P. Brown, one of the Mormon bishops, in a note to a local paper, declares that the time has come for the American people to act, if the Mexican government is unable and the United States is unwilling to protect its people in a foreign land.

BOTH HANGED MEN GERMANS

Investigation Into Execution Starts. Mexican Rebels Suspected.

DOUGLAS, Ariz., Aug. 1.—John Hertling and Guido Shubert, the men hanged at Montevista, east of Cananea, Sonora, about a week ago, were natives of Germany and subjects of that country, though Hertling had taken out his original papers for American citizenship. Hertling was the watchman at the Montevista mine and Shubert was his guest.

Both men were well known in Douglas and their German friends here have sent a man to Montevista to investigate their deaths and to make a report to the German ambassador at Washington.

The mine is situated 45 miles south of here and both men formerly lived in Douglas. When the bodies were found, that of Shubert was still swinging from a tree, while Hertling's body had broken the rope and fallen to the ground with the noose still about his neck.

A report from the mine today said that Mexican rurales had encountered a band of rebels near Nacoziari who are said to have been in the vicinity of the mine about ten days ago.

The report was that this band was suspected of having been responsible for the death of the two men. One of the band was captured by the rurales, but the others escaped.

No definite news as to the identity of the perpetrators of the hangings has been received here, but the incident has been taken as a warning of danger to all foreigners in isolated and unprotected localities in Mexico.

Many Mexicans formerly in the rebel army have reached this city. About 40 of them were said to have held a meeting last night for the discussion of an alleged plot to destroy bridges and tracks of the railroad between Douglas and Nacoziari, Sonora.

BYRCE RUMOR IS DENIED

SIR EDWARD GREY SAYS AMBASSADOR WILL RETURN.

Report That Great Britain's Representative at Washington Will Give Up Post Held Untrue.

LONDON, Aug. 1.—While it is practically certain that the British Prime Minister will not visit Canada, Winston Spencer Churchill, First Lord of the Admiralty, according to the Daily Telegraph, is considering an invitation and is likely to go to Canada in the autumn.

The Telegraph repeats the report that James Bryce, British Ambassador to the United States, will not return to Washington.

Asked today in the House of Commons by Clement K. Kinloch, whether the resignation of James Bryce was impending, and whether his successor had been appointed, Sir Edward Grey, Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, replied:

"Mr. Bryce is returning to Washington early in September to resume his work there as ambassador."

AGE AND YOUTH AT ALTAR

Man 68 and Two Girls 17 Figure in Vancouver Weddings.

VANCOUVER, Wash., Aug. 1.—(Special.)—One man 68 years old and two girls but 17 years of age entered into matrimony here today. Lyman H. Swain, a manufacturer of Los Angeles, 68, and Marion Gemmill, 55, of New York City, came here today for no other purpose than being married and slipping East to Chicago to make their home. The ceremony was performed by Rev. J. M. Canase of the First Methodist Church.

Bert Beaton and Miss Grace Weaver, 17 years old, daughter of S. R. Weaver, of La Center, Wash., Clyde M. Churchill and Miss Lucie L. Todd, 17 years old, daughter of W. W. Todd, of Oswego, Or.; Henry Keeney and Emily Moore, of Holly, Or., were all granted marriage licenses today. Dr. F. P. Hunter, of Portland, and Gertrude Trueman, last night obtained a marriage license. Dr. C. C. Wilcox of this city acting as witness. They returned to the auditor's office after 5 o'clock, with a witness they did not have on their first trip earlier in the afternoon.

REAL HEADS DISCLOSED

Pacific Improvement Company Offered by "Big Four."

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 1.—Testimony additively brought out by the Government today in its gigantic suit to regain \$75,000,000 worth of land from the Oregon & California Railroad, a subsidiary of the Southern Pacific, put into the record the fact that Collis P. Huntington, Mark Hopkins, Charles Crocker and Leland Stanford, known as the "Big Four," were the real heads of the Pacific Improvement Company, which had charge of all construction work for the Southern Pacific, of which they were also directors and officers.

Chief Engineer William Hood of the Southern Pacific and Joseph Cumming, formerly assistant engineer, admitted that "such was the historical fact," and that it had long been part of the popular belief.

He was here yesterday for that purpose. Crossley is president of the firm of D. Crossley & Sons, wholesale dealers in New York, London, Liverpool and Glasgow.

JURORS MAY READ DARROW'S WRITINGS

Stipulation That All Works of Defendant Be Furnished Is Taken Under Advisement.

BELIEFS ON CRIME ISSUE

Defense Objects to Reading Part of Lawyer's Lecture—Attorney Says He Had Right to Fear Effect of Bribery Charge.

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 1.—A unique stipulation was made today by opposing counsel in the Darrow bribery trial. It was that all the published works of Clarence S. Darrow be admitted into evidence and copies of his novels, essays and lectures be furnished to the jurors to be read during their hours of leisure.

District Attorney Fredericks later withdrew for the present his consent to the stipulation.

Except for this incident and a heated verbal encounter between Assistant District Attorney Ford and Chief Counsel Rogers of the defense, the day was featureless.

The defendant again gave a few direct responses. His most common reply was, "I don't recall; but perhaps I did," or something of like nature.

Mrs. Franklin to Be Called.

Nearly every phase of the case was gone into by Ford and it was indicated that Mrs. Bert H. Franklin, wife of the principal witness for the prosecution, would be called by the state in rebuttal.

"Did you not say to Mrs. Franklin on the day of her arrest, 'Now, Mrs. Franklin, don't be too hard on me'?" asked Ford.

"I did not," declared Darrow emphatically, "either by language, gesture, writing, cipher, or any other way in substance or effect."

Darrow's writings were injected into the proceedings when Ford produced a copy of an address on "Crimes and Criminals," given by the defendant before the prisoners in the Cook County jail in Chicago and read from it the following paragraph:

"There is no such thing as crime as the word is generally understood. I don't believe there is any sort of distinction between the moral condition of the people in and out of jail. One is just as good as another. The people here can no more help being here than the people outside can avoid being outside. I don't believe that people are in jail because they deserve to be. They are in jail simply because they cannot avert it on account of their control and for which they are in no way responsible."

State of Mind Questioned.

Ford asked if the foregoing was Darrow's state of mind last November.

Attorney Rogers protested that it was unfair to select an isolated paragraph from the pamphlet and Judge Hutton agreed that Darrow's state of mind at the time could not be determined by lectures and addresses upon different subjects.

The defense said it would not object to the reading of excerpts from Darrow's works if all of them were admitted into evidence and the jurors provided with copies, to which the prosecution assented, but a short time later District Attorney Fredericks recalled his agreement.

Questioned concerning the effect of Franklin's arrest upon the negotiations for the compromise pleas in the McNamara cases, Darrow insisted that he had a right to fear the effect on the settlement.

"I know that it affected the settlement," said Darrow. "It cost J. J. five more years." He explained that the marriage of Darrow, prior to the arrest of Franklin, had consented to a term of ten years for the elder McNamara brother, and later insisted upon 15 years.

Darrow appeared more at ease today.

ARCHBALD SEEKS DELAY

House Committee Agrees to Wait Until Saturday for Decision.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 1.—Judge Archbald's counsel protested that his defense could not be prepared before October 15. Chairman Clayton, of the House committee of managers, declared against any delay, but agreed to wait until Saturday before forcing a decision.

The House committee's reply to Judge Archbald's answer to the charges against him, filed today, is a complete denial of all the judge's contentions.

SUGAR INQUIRY END NIGH

HAVEMEYERS NET \$12,950,000 IN 21 YEARS.

Dividends Enormous From Comparatively Small Investment by Those in Combine.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 1.—Ownership of one-half of the common stock of the Western Sugar Refining Company—the John D. and A. B. Spreckels concern of San Francisco—has netted the Havemeyers interests in the American Sugar Refining Company \$12,950,000 in dividends in the past 21 years.

For all but two years of that time these payments were made on an investment that represented only \$500,000. More than \$12,000,000 of the amount has been paid since 1893. The first payment of \$50,000 was made on October 21, 1891, when the Havemeyers had \$1,000,000 sunk in the concern.

These facts were developed today during the hearing of the Government's suit to dissolve the American Sugar Company, under the Sherman law, as a combination in restraint of trade. An official statement of the Western Sugar Refining Company was produced and identified by W. H. Hannam, secretary of the concern. For every dollar that

the Havemeyers and their associates got, the Spreckels and their associates got a dollar.

The inquiry here will close tomorrow and the Government attorneys will move to Salt Lake to continue the hearing, beginning Monday.

SALMON RUN IMPROVING

Lower Columbia Fishermen Doing Well With Fine Prospects.

ASTORIA, Or., Aug. 1.—(Special.)—The run of fish last night and today, while not quite so good as yesterday, was satisfactory in the lower harbor and all classes of gear in that section did well. Individual gillnetters made catches ranging from 1000 pounds up to nearly a ton. The traps this morning lifted from one to four tons each and the seining grounds on the island made big hauls.

About Point Ellis, however, the catch was small, but the fish are coming in, and by tomorrow excellent hauls should be made opposite the city and above Tongue Point. One encouraging feature is that the salmon taken average large and their quality is of the best.

Those in a position to know say the cannery pack at the present time is from 25 to 30 per cent short of that on the corresponding date last season, while the cold storage pack is fully as large and, in some instances, exceeds that of a year ago.
