LABORER AWARDED \$6000 FOR INJURED HAND.—A verdict for \$6000 in favor of Jesse Tann, a laborer, and against K. Sauter and the McDermott & Carmody Contracting Company has been found by a jury in Judge McLain's court. The plaintiff, Tann, was injured while assisting in the construction of a sewer at Corvallis. His hand was drawn around a pipe by a piece of twisted rope, resulting in the loss of two fingers and a badly fractured arm. The bones of the arm failed to knit and physicians testified that the injury is permanent. He sued for \$20,000. Rauch & Senn were attorneys for the plaintiff. Malarky, Seabrook & Stott defended.

WRIGHT TO MAX.—SECOND PAYMENT.—Graham & Belknap, attorneys for State Bank Examiner Wright, yesterday secured in Circuit Court an order authorizing Mr. Wright to pay a dividend of 15 per cent on the claims presented by creditors of the American Bank & Trust Company, between June 22 and July 30. Mr. Wright last week paid a dividend of 15 per cent to the main body of creditors and has still enough money on hand to pay the same to the supplemental list of claimants. This second disbursement will be small as compared with the first. Date of payment is set for August 15. The claimants are to be notified by letter.

OREGON LITERATURE GOES TO EUROPE.—Several weeks ago the Portland Chamber of Commerce sent a supply of Oregon literature to Alexander Jackson, general European agent of the Chicago, Rock Island & Pacific at London. In a letter received yesterday, Mr. Jackson said the publicity pamphlets had been distributed among the numerous inquirers of Oregon who had called at his office. At the request of Mr. Jackson, the Chamber of Commerce yesterday forwarded a second and larger shipment of the same kind of literature.

OREGON'S MAXIMUM DRAUGHT 27 1/2 FEET.—For the purpose of establishing officially the draught of the battleship Oregon when it visited Portland in the Elks' convention week, the Portland Chamber of Commerce in a letter to the commander asked for the figures. In an answer which came yesterday, Lieutenant E. W. Smith stated that the maximum draught of the Oregon in the Columbia and Willamette rivers was 27 1/2 feet when the battleship drew 36 feet 8 inches in crossing the bar.

WOLVERINES TO WALK.—Members of the Michigan Society who like to walk will assemble at East Fifty-seventh street and Sandy road at 8:15 this evening to indulge in their favorite form of exercise. They can reach that point best by taking a Rose City Park car. A walking party of 250 will lead out for them along Columbia boulevard to Kenton. EAGLE VALLEY RANCHER DIES HERE.—James A. Wallace, a rancher of Eagle Valley, died at Good Samaritan Hospital yesterday morning after suffering several days from an attack of heart trouble. He was 59 years of age and leaves a family of several children in Richland, Or. He has many relatives in Salem.

PATRONS TALK PICNIC.—Members of the printing trade are considering a plan of declaring a holiday and giving a picnic similar to the grocers. In addition to the printers, the paperhangers, supply departments of the paper houses and kindred trades, such as linotypers and engravers, would be asked to shut down and join the picnic.

NEW PENINSULAR CARLINE PROPOSED.

The franchise asked for the new Kenton carline by George F. Heuser, "father of Kenton," contemplates extension over the interstate bridge across the Columbia River, when built, and a connection with the Broadway bridge. The company asking for the franchise operates the line from Kenton to the Union Meat Company's plant. It is planned to build this line on Patton avenue, a wide street extending from Willamette boulevard to Columbia boulevard, with the expectation that the interstate bridge across the Columbia River will be located on Patton avenue. This wide street is to be paved next year across the Peninsula, and if the franchise is granted the tracks will be laid at the time the street is improved.

KENTON WANTS BRANCH LIBRARY.—Initial movement has been started at Kenton to get a branch library. The Kenton Improvement Club will probably take the matter in hand. The plan is to get a branch started in rented quarters at present and later secure a quarter block for the erection of a permanent building. The nearest library is on Killingsworth avenue, a mile and a half away, which is too far for children of Kenton to go. It is estimated that 2000 people now live in Kenton and the suburbs of Glenwood Park, Fairport and Swinton, besides the great manufacturing district, all of which a branch library will serve. It is desired to get the library opened this fall.

DOUBLE TRACKS BEING LAID.—The Portland Railway, Light & Power Company is completing double tracks on Milwaukie street, between Holgate street and Bybee avenue, and will have both completed this month. One track has been finished and paved between the rails with stone blocks and the paving of the second track on the east side has been started. The Independent Paving Company will pave the west side of the street, and the grading has been done on the street between Bybee and Nehalem avenues, and the property owners have been making connections with the water and sewer pipes in advance of the pavement.

JUDGE VREELAND HAS CAUSE FOR HAPPINESS.—Because Richard III, rumored regent of Great Britain at one time, died on the 21st of July, and did some rather startling things which caused the greatest of excitement to prevail, Thad Vreeland is quite enthusiastic over the birth of a girl in Portland, who weighed nine pounds and which like Dick number 3, has two teeth. The baby came to Portland July 23, and although Judge Vreeland's friends were anxious to see the baby, they were disappointed on his part, few are acquainted with the cause. Mrs. Vreeland hopes to see the day when the girl will be a suffragette.

Hall, on Irvington, will be held this afternoon at 2:30 o'clock, at the Crematorium. The Eastern Star burial service will be held at the residence of Mrs. W. Robinson, of Oregon City, will officiate. A special car will leave Oregon City at 1:35 P. M. The remains are at the East Side Undertaking Parlor, at East Fifth and Alder streets.

REV. J. H. FOWLER COMING.—Rev. J. H. Fowler, of St. Louis, Mo., evangelist, will arrive to take part in the annual camping of the Free Methodist churches of Oregon, which opens on St. Johns Heights, on the Peninsula, August 14. Rev. Mr. Fowler has a National reputation as an evangelist. The meetings will continue through August. Rev. W. N. Coffey will be in charge. The grounds are on the St. Johns carline.

DOW INQUEST DROPPED

RELATIVES OF AUTO VICTIM ASK THAT PROBE END.

Accounts Given by K. V. Lively and Simmons Satisfactory, Says Brother of Dead Girl.

The inquest that was to have been held yesterday afternoon to inquire into the death of Miss Grace C. Dow, who was killed early Wednesday when thrown out of an automobile driven by Karl V. Lively, was cancelled, and no official record of what happened at the time of and just before the accident will be made. The action was taken by Deputy Coroner Dunning upon the request of John P. Dow, brother to the dead woman, and of Dr. Lively, Mrs. H. C. Johnson, brother-in-law and sister respectively to Miss Dow.

"We are perfectly satisfied with the statements of Messrs. Lively and Simmons, and feel that there are no new facts that can be added by an inquest," said Mr. Dow, who returned from Ilwaco Wednesday night. "We believe that all the circumstances under which Miss Dow was riding in the automobile party were perfectly proper, as Miss Dow was a long-time friend of Mr. Simmons, and we are satisfied that it was an accident, pure, simple and unavoidable."

Deputy Coroner Dunning stated that under the circumstances he felt it would be only a waste of money to institute an inquest, particularly in view of the statement from the District Attorney's office that action on criminal charges would not be likely to be undertaken unless negligence of a gross kind were shown.

The funeral of Miss Dow will be held at 2 o'clock this afternoon from Pinley's undertaking parlors and interment will be in Lone Fir Cemetery.

BAKER ASSAILANTS KNOWN

Detectives Have Guilty Men Under Surveillance.

A diligent investigation that has been engaging Detectives Hellyer and Howell constantly, since the capture of the gang that beat Adam Baker early Sunday morning. Several important witnesses to the fray have been located, and also persons to whom members of the gang are alleged to have boasted of their part in the affair.

The detectives say they have most of the gang members under surveillance, while they are weaving a network of evidence around them. When this is complete they will make arrests, most likely several at once, unless some of those who are guilty attempt to get away.

The funeral of Mr. Baker was held yesterday at the Selwyn Crematorium. The arrangements were in the hands of N. A. and Dr. F. N. Boody, relatives of the dead man.
