

NEW YORK PROBE MAY GET COURTS

Police Commissioner Waldo
Intimates Judges Give
Gamblers Protection.

CONVICTION HARD, HE SAYS

Revolver Duel Expected in Capturing
"Lefty Louie" and "Gyp the
Blood," Thought to Be in Cat-
skills and Heavily Armed.

NEW YORK, Aug. 4.—Police Commissioner Waldo in a statement tonight relative to the Rosenthal case recommended thorough investigation of the charges regarding the alleged connection between the police and the gamblers.

At the same time he said that gamblers can exist only because the gamblers can obtain what amounts to protection from the courts and asserts that gamblers do much to corrupt the work of the political parties that place the judges on the bench.

It was reported at police headquarters that detectives were most in the trail of "Lefty" Louie, and "Gyp the Blood," the two remaining gangsters sought in connection with the murder. Inspector Hughes spent his third day in personal charge of a force of detectives near Tannersville in the Catskills.

Revolver Duel Expected. "Gyp the Blood" and "Lefty Louie" were in Tannersville last week.

Both "Lefty" and "Gyp the Blood" are known as desperate men, reputed to be shot. They are believed to be armed. A fight is looked for by the police when the detectives finally attempt to arrest the alleged murderers. District Attorney Whitman, who has been spending the weekend at Manchester, Vt., will return to this city tomorrow and resume his work in the case.

Commissioner Waldo said in his statement that at no time in his history has the Police Department been so well prepared to stand an investigation as at present.

Probe Is Welcomed

"The best interests of the public and Police Department itself demand that a thorough and impartial investigation be made without delay in order that the guilty, if any, be brought to justice, and that the confidence of the people be restored in the police. My desire is that everyone who is guilty of wrongdoing shall be dealt with by the Police Department and that they may be sent to prison as a warning. Gambling would not be a police problem if the courts would convict a man of gambling on the same evidence as they would convict him of murder or burglary."

"It is impossible to say that under the system of checks now employed there can be no grafting in the Police Department, but it can be safely said that there has been no protection sold by anyone who has been in any official position to deliver."

RECKLESS DRIVER SOUGHT

Asa Dwindle Looking for Man Who
Ran Into His Team at Eddyville.

NEWPORT, Or., Aug. 4.—(Special.)—Asa Dwindle, a resident of Eddyville, is here in quest of an auto party with whom he and his family had a rough experience Tuesday.

It appears from Mr. Dwindle's statement that, with his family, he was driving out to the valley and when near the Wakefield farm, a short distance above Eddyville, an auto, running at a high rate of speed, came suddenly upon them without warning and collided with their vehicle, knocking them off the road grade. Their 3-year-old son sustained a broken collar bone and other members of the family were cut and bruised. The carriage, horses and harness were more or less damaged.

The automobile party made no effort to ascertain the extent of the accident, but hurried away from the scene. Mr. Dwindle has thus far been unable to learn the names of the motorists, though the number of the machine is 3494. He says the accident was due entirely to reckless driving of the motorists, who did not even slow down, while he was in the midst of the accident, he did his best to back his team out of the way and would have succeeded had the car slackened its speed.

MOVING DOESN'T SEPARATE

Men With Adjoining Places for
Years Will Remain Neighbors.

ALBANY, Or., Aug. 4.—(Special.)—After conducting adjoining places of business for 23 years, Walter M. Parker and Fred W. Schultz will both move tomorrow to new locations. Their establishments, however, will continue to be side by side in the new locations.

Barker has conducted a grocery store at 316 West First street for exactly a quarter of a century. But the first two years of that period Schultz has had a meat market in the building just west of Parker's store. The two buildings in which these two places of business have been conducted are to be torn down this week to make way for a new two-story brick block. Parker and Schultz will move into the two-story brick block at the northwest corner of Second and Lyon streets.

This building formerly stood at the southwest corner of First and Broad streets. It was erected by S. E. Young and stood as his store for 25 years. When S. E. Young & Son erected a new store last year and sold this site to the First National Bank for its new five-story structure Charles Pfeiffer bought the two-story brick block and had it moved to Second and Lyon streets and placed on a new foundation.

"SHARK" WAR EXTENDS

All Over Country Officials Are Tak-
ing Up Fight.

War upon loan sharks, which has been a matter of keen local interest for some months past, is being waged all over the country, with varying methods and varying results.

A vigilant district attorney in Indianapolis has adopted an expedient somewhat similar to one practiced here, but incomplete, in calling upon the victims to bring forward their accounts of how they were swindled.

"Loan shark war! If you have a loan with one of the shark companies, call on the prosecutor, Frank P. Baker. He will protect you against exorbitant interest and charges. Advice free. Legal services free. Everything free. Help us win the battle!"

The tidings to the struggling victims in the net of the extortioner, that somewhere in the world there is service to

be had without "brokerage," "interest" and "insurance charges," must have been thrice welcome to the recipients. Education of the borrowers to the full extent of their rights is the line of attack indicated in this message, and it is also the one contemplated by the campaigners here, whose efforts have been intermittent of late, pending the outcome of indictments now before the courts in the cases of Adolphus Lane and M. E. Schouwer, accused under the "nuisance" statute.

But intimidation, practiced through attorneys and petty court officers, prevents such action, and the judgment usually is taken by default, after which the victims of constabulary law are only to go into court and tell the story of the loan, no court would dare enter judgment against one of them, except as in favor of the state school fund.

Enlightenment of the needy borrower, and a little daylight of this sort is all that is needed to break up the practice of extortion. Default judgments, blackmailing collection agencies, harassing visits of constabulary law, a too legal view of the law by the petty courts, are the buttresses of the loan shark business. One vigilant public official to tell the borrowers what their rights are, is all that is needed to force the extortionate claims to an equitable settlement.

ALBANY RESIDENT DIES

S. A. DAWSON, AGED 70, STRICKEN WITH APOPLEXY.

Successful Farmer, Active in Politics
and Civic Life, Lived 50
Years in Oregon.

ALBANY, Or., Aug. 4.—(Special.)—Attacked by apoplexy at 6 o'clock last evening, Sylvester A. Dawson, ex-State Senator from Linn County and one of Albany's most prominent men, died at his home in this city at 4:30 o'clock this morning, at the age of 70 years.

Mr. Dawson was about the streets yesterday apparently in perfect health and felt no illness until the sudden attack which came while he was sitting in a chair at his home last evening.

Mr. Dawson was born in Marion County, Indiana, December 4, 1841, and was reared on a farm seven miles north of Indianapolis. He was educated in the public schools of his home county in Indiana and attended school one year at Danville, Ill.

In 1861 he crossed the plains to Oregon, the party arriving in Albany exactly six months from the day they left Danville. In 1864 he was elected to the farm near Albany and Mr. Dawson remained there with his parents for two years, and then spent two years packing and mining in Montana and Idaho. He returned to Linn County and bought a farm near his father's place about five miles southeast of Albany. There he lived continuously until 1897, when he moved to Albany.

Senator Dawson was prominent for many years in the political affairs of Linn County and the entire state and was an active Republican all his life. In 1880 he was elected a Representative to the State Legislature from this county, and in 1884 was elected State Senator from Linn County. He was again elected to the State Senate in 1894, serving through four sessions in that body. For several years he was a member of the Linn County Republican Central Committee and was also this county's representative on the State Central Committee.

Since moving to Albany, Senator Dawson was active in city affairs and served three terms in the City Council. He was a member of St. Johns Lodge, No. 17, Ancient, Free and Accepted Masons, of this city, and was also a member of Safety Lodge, No. 13, Ancient Order of United Workmen, of Albany. He had been a leading member of Harmony Grange, No. 23, near this city, for many years, and was prominent for some time in the State Grange.

Senator Dawson is survived by his widow, Sarah L. Dawson, to whom he was married in 1873, and one daughter, Mrs. Georgia C. Wilson, both of this city. He also was survived by a brother, M. F. Dawson, of Albany.

Portland was represented at the exercises by 100 Knights, who arrived in a special train about noon. Eugene, Salem, Oregon City, Corvallis, Astoria, and other cities were represented.

The work of initiating the candidates consumed the greater part of the afternoon. In the evening the Albany council entertained the visiting members of the order with an elaborate banquet in the Elks' temple. W. A. Barrett, grand knight of the Albany council, was toastmaster.

Governor Warns Mayor and
Councilman That Town
Must "Clean Up" at Once.

OFFICIALS ARE "SHOWN"

West Takes Municipal Heads
Through Slums, Pointing Out
Law Violations Which
They Disclaimed.

HUNTINGTON, Or., Aug. 4.—(Special.)—Governor West quietly slipped into Huntington last night on his return from the Boise conference of Governors, called a hurried and per-

empory meeting of the Mayor, City Councilmen and Police Magistrate, later took them on a tour of the slums.

When this was done, Governor West took a walk through the slums of Huntington, and also cashier of the Bank of Huntington, aside, and warned him that a waiver in the procedure of cleaning up the town would be his. Wood, who attended the conference on request of the Governor, was unofficially advised that the Governor would ask for his resignation as soon as formal request can be brought about. When the conference was opened, and Governor West delivered his ultimatum, Mayor Norther and his aides denied knowledge of any gross franchise of the law. Governor West immediately, as chairman, adjourned the executive session and said: "Come with me and I'll show you."

Then Mayor Norther and Police Judge then trudged with Governor West through the town and Governor West gained admission to the house where a woman and three children live. The house has the reputation of being a notorious bawdy resort and the children are maintained there at the same time.

Governor West then cited other instances of violations of the state moral code and handed the officials without gloves.

Governor Is Positive

"I want you men to understand that this town has got to be cleaned up. If you can't do it or don't do it, I shall order the state militia here with in the next week and I will clean it up," the Governor is reported as saying.

Governor West warned the Mayor of Huntington which he would place in the town if the violations were not curbed immediately.

Huntington has been running more or less wide open at intervals. Many of the citizens have protested against the laxity of the morals of the municipal family. Saloons have been brazenly defiant in their all-day Sunday sales and immoral houses have been the lair of many crooks who came in for week stays. Gambling is credited with flourishing and the safety of men or women on the street at late hours has been feared.

Governor Confirms Report

"Town Must Clean Up or Militia Will Do It," Says Executive.

BAKER, Or., Aug. 4.—(Special.)—Governor West passed through Baker today en route to Portland on one of the delayed O-W-R. N. trains which have been held up by the recent water-spout near Huntington. Governor West admitted his seance with the Huntington officials and said:

"I have warned Mayor Norther of my proposed action. I intend to keep close watch on the town for the next few days and if cleaning up is not efficient and speedy will send the State Militia to take complete control. Furthermore I shall ask Police Judge Wood to resign."

"I have warned Mayor Norther, who, as cashier of the Bank of Huntington is accepting the people's funds, that I believed I had good cause to authorize the bank examiner to take a hand in the affairs of the town. Mayor Norther is at the head of a corrupt corporation, the City of Huntington. He also cashier of the bank. The two capacities cannot be filled with trust to the people."

"The officials disclaimed any knowledge of law fractures in their city. But I showed them on a personal tour some of the places that I knew about and I haven't spent much time in Huntington either. I'll venture the Militia sentries can be stationed at a few places more. The town is rotten and has got to be cleaned up, that's all."

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TOWED CAR TURNS TURTLE

Four Passengers Under Auto and J.
E. Glenn, of Montana, Is Hurt.

CHEHALIS, Wash., Aug. 4.—(Special.)—J. E. Glenn, of Flathead, Mont., was badly bruised about the head and body this afternoon by the overturning of an automobile. Jim Smith, driver of the car, and two other men who were passengers, were unhurt. J. B. Justice had been driving the machine, which went out of commission near Jackson Prairie, 12 miles from here, and Justice left for a nearby telephone. Roy Stearns, of Adna, came along with his car and two or three passengers. He volunteered to tow Smith's car to Chehalis and a rope about ten feet long was attached.

Smith claims that Stearns agreed to drive slowly, but that in going around a sharp turn in the plank road down a grade, he failed to slow up. The Smith car was hurled around the curve at terrific speed, jumped off the plank road eight inches and when the rope was suddenly checked flipped completely over.

There seemed to be no end of jewelry, silverware, bric-a-brac, trinkets of small value, furs, silks and satins, ostrich plumes, cut glass, ivory images, ivory umbrella handles, rubies, diamonds, emeralds, pearls and sapphires.

Guthrie today regained his composure and seemed to be rather proud of his feat. He told again how he had worked as assistant city chemist during the day and played housebreaker at night. He laughed as he told how he had never been suspected all the time he was teaching in the Englewood and Lane Technical schools, and finally he wondered who would get the reward offered by Mrs. Sarah Kellogg for the return of her oil paintings he had stolen.

Further investigation of the young man's history revealed that after graduating in electrical engineering from a technical institute, he obtained employment with an electrical company. Later he was connected with the municipal laboratory. Subsequently he was appointed instructor in electrical engineering at a public high school.

Guthrie is 26 years old, six feet in height and weighs 150 pounds. He is a native of Chicago, Ill., and when arrested he had more than \$16,000 on deposit in Chicago banks.

to Leave Within Hour.

HOME WRECKING CHARGED

London Music Hall Singer Now Wife
of Harry Rheinstrom, Heir to
Millions, Stirs San Rafael,
Cal., by "High Life" Capers.

SAN RAFAEL, Aug. 4.—(Special.)—The climax to the escapades of Mrs. Edna Loftus Rheinstrom came last night when she was given one hour in which to leave town. Numerous complaints of alleged disorderly conduct were made to City Marshal Daly by residents in the neighborhood of Luke Hotel, where the actress has been staying, and that official served notice on her at 6 o'clock. She left at 7:30 o'clock on a train for San Francisco.

Mrs. Rheinstrom, better known as Edna Loftus, has been living here for the last three or four months. Her stay here has been marked by a series of joy rides and other incidents, involving a number of young men here.

Last March she took an automobile ride with Dr. W. J. Stone, of San Rafael, and Mrs. Stone later obtained a divorce from the physician.

Mrs. Loftus, a sister of Classic Loftus, and formerly a London music hall favorite, first was married to Winnie O'Connor, the jockey. Divorcing him, she returned to the stage. As one of the "Raindeer" on a vaudeville circuit in the East she was seen by Harry Rheinstrom, son of a millionaire brewer of Cincinnati. The two eloped and were married in Kentucky. January 6, 1910, Rheinstrom previously had been judged incompetent by an Ohio court.

The Rheinstroms came to this state to live and the young heir to the Rheinstrom millions again was adjudged insane. He is confined in a private asylum in Stockton.

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
