It has been decided that Waddell & Harrington, engineers for the O.-W. R. & N., and Modjeski & Angier, engineers for the city, shall check up and determine the cost of the upper deck. The railway officials have given orders that all vouchers and papers showing expense items be turned over to the en gineers for their examination. It will probably be six weeks before a report can be obtained.

Another phase of the bridge ques-tion which will come up Friday morn-ing before the Council will be the question of giving the Mayor power to em-ploy gatemen. The railway company employed the three bridge operators Portland Man Says Enough Tonnage on the old Steel Bridge, and will con-tinue to do so on the new one. Thus the railroad company will have its own men handling its machinery.

But six gate-tenders will be needed, one at each end of the bridge, to work in three shifts of eight hours each. These gatemen it is proposed that the city shall employ.



A new standard in rallway-station construction was inaugurated by the completion of the Southern A new standard in railway-station construction was inaugurated by the completion of the Southern Pacific depot at Sixteenth street, Oakland, Cal., last Saturday. This new standard, it is believed, will be adopted in future construction work on the lines of the Southern Pacific, and may have an influence on the style of building to be erected soon in Portland. The principal innovation is the double deck, allowing steam trains to enter on the lower level and interurban electric trains on the upper level. The station cost approximately \$350,000, and is built entirely of California products.
