Put the Total Yield of Spring and Fall Grain at 800,000,000 Bushels-Minneapolis Receipts Expected to Reach 1000 Cars.

CHICAGO. Aug. 6.—Suggestions that the wheat crop this Fall might amount to \$50,000,000 bushels folited down prices today to the lowest level this season.

Estimates put the Spring wheat yield at \$35,000,000 bushels to 400,000,000 bushels, and the Winter total at 400,000,000 bushels. In this connection it was asserted that within a month recepts at Minneapolis would be 1000 cars a day and would continue until next August. The movement in the Southwest was said to be up to the limit of railway equipment.
