

T. R. SAYS LITTLE MOOSE WILL GROW

Colonel, in Fine Humor, Pays
Especially Attention to Chil-
dren on Way Home.

BRIEF REST IS PLANNED

New Party Declared to Give Oppor-
tunities That Would Not Have
Been Possible as Repub-
lican Nominee.

TOLEDO, O., Aug. 8.—The showing made by the first National convention of the Progressive party, Colonel Roosevelt said tonight on his way to Oyster Bay, was one that would give the country a new impression of the strength of the movement and lend impetus to the outset to the campaign.

"It was a great week," said the Colonel. "It was a great convention."

When the movement to form a new party was started, he continued, many men who had led the fight against him in the Republican convention said no progressive convention would be held or that if one was held it would be a failure. By this time, he thought, they probably had changed their minds and realized that they had made a mistake in what they had done at the Republican convention. Even the leaders in the new party, he said, were surprised at the size and character of the convention.

New Party Gives Opportunities.

In the new party, Colonel Roosevelt said, he would have opportunities which he could not have had in the Republican organization. He referred to the Progressive platform as containing planks which he desired, but could not have had in the Republican platform had he been the nominee of that party.

Colonel Roosevelt said he had read parts of Woodrow Wilson's speech of yesterday, but he declined to comment upon it. Before leaving Chicago the Colonel discussed the Mississippi waterways project with a delegation from Missouri. He promised to deliver an address in St. Louis early in September. On his arrival in New York, Colonel Roosevelt will go at once to Oyster Bay. He said he hoped to have a rest of a few days before his campaign trips begin, and that he would see as few persons as possible at Sagamore Hill.

Crowd Drowns Colonel's Voice.

When Colonel Roosevelt's train reached Elkhart, Ind., several hundred persons were at the station. They gave the Colonel such a noisy welcome that although he tried several times to begin a speech he could not make himself heard.

So he passed the time in shaking hands with those who crowded about his car, singling out the children for special attention.

"Those little moose will grow up some day," he said.

Women Chosen for Committee.

Woman suffrage was insured voting strength on the Progressive party National committee. Four women were officially elected members of the committee. They were: Miss Jane Addams, settlement worker, Chicago; Miss Frances Kellor, chief of the immigration inspection bureau, New York; Mrs. Charles D. Blaney, San Francisco, woman suffragist and delegate to both the Republican National convention and the Progressive National convention, and Miss Jean Gordon, New Orleans.

Woman delegates who participated in the convention held a caucus and selected the four women to serve on the National committee of the new party.

CAMPAIGN PLANS ARE MADE

Five Bureaus Under Vice-Chairmen Will Be Provided.

CHICAGO, Aug. 8.—Colonel Roosevelt and Governor Johnson, of California, nominees of the Progressive party for President and Vice-President, left for their homes today after seeing two Progressive National committees take first steps for opening the campaign. Colonel Roosevelt, accompanied by Mrs. Roosevelt, George Roosevelt, a cousin, and Lyman Abbott, Jr., left the city aboard the Twentieth Century Limited for New York. A cheering throng of admirers bade the Colonel farewell at the railroad station.

In the lobby at the hotel this forenoon, Colonel Roosevelt replied to an old friend in the crowd, and he added to his political manager by designating his friend an "old wolf."

"Come here, you old wolf," the Colonel said, as he grasped his friend, Albert Burton, of Wyoming, by the hand. Colonel Roosevelt and Governor Johnson were then escorted to a room where members of two notification committees, there being also one of the Vice-President, filed in and shook hands. The ceremony was over and then the nominees gathered with the members of the National committee, which had assembled to complete its organization and make campaign plans.

Governor Johnson, accompanied by several members of the California delegation left for San Francisco tonight. He was in conference with members of the National committee until half an hour before his train started.

United States Senator Dixon, of Montana, chairman of the National committee, then said the committee would remain in Chicago several days to perfect plans for the campaign. The plans thus far adopted embrace a scheme for five or more division bureaus in various parts of the country, each to be conducted by a vice-chairman. The proposition was placed before the committee by George W. Perkins, of New York. Originally Mr. Perkins' motion named New York, Chicago, Boston, Atlanta and San Francisco, as the locations for the division bureaus. This was eliminated, however, and the question was left to the executive committee, which Chairman Dixon was authorized to appoint.

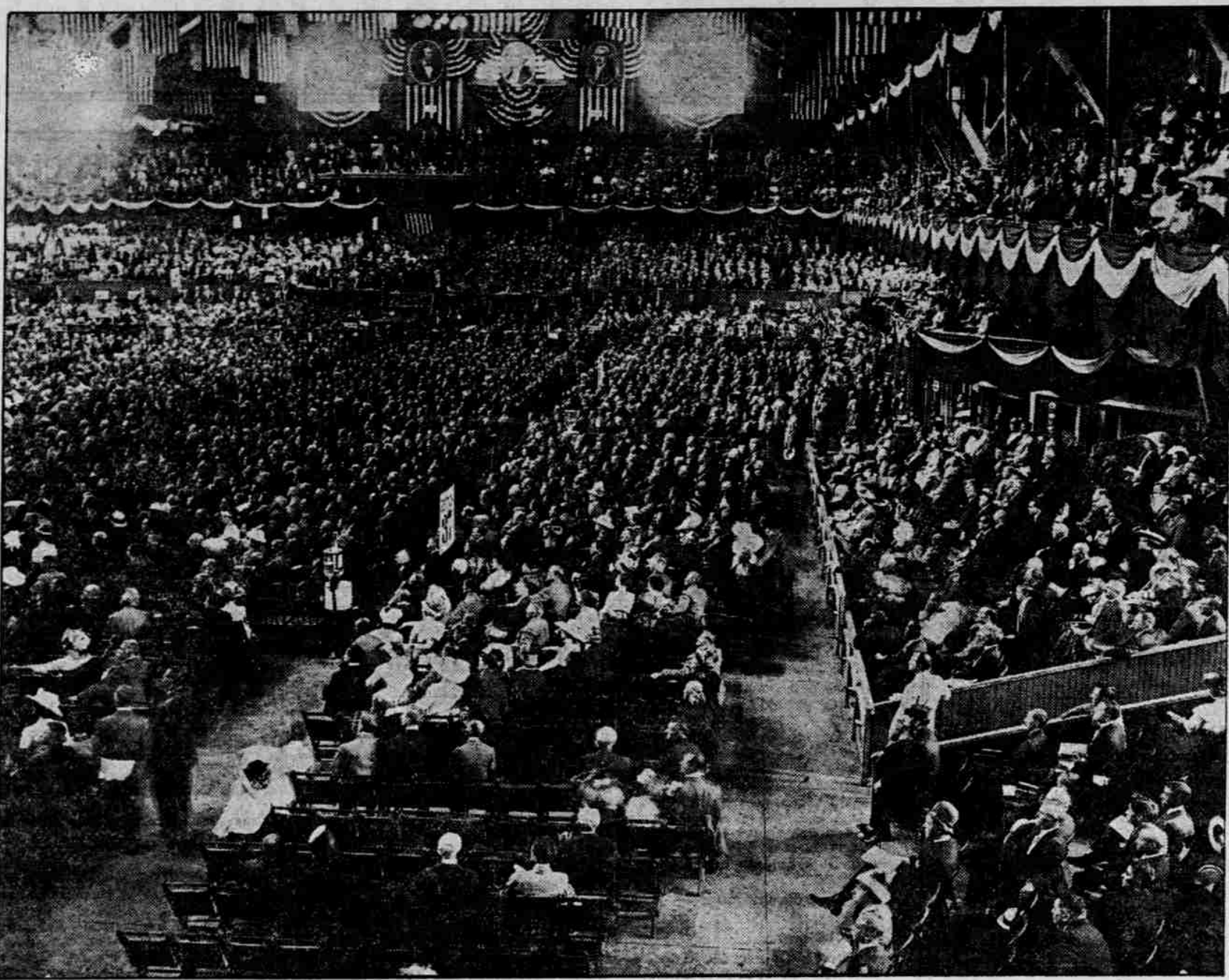
Senator Dixon named George W. Perkins as chairman of the executive committee. Mr. Perkins will appoint treasurer and other officers for the executive committee. This committee is provided for in the rules of the new party. It consists of nine members, who are not necessarily members of the National committee.

The session of the National committee was marked by a flood of oratory, each member of the committee reviewing the situation in his own state and the prospects for victory.

Kentuckians Excommunicate T. R.

LOUISVILLE, Ky., Aug. 8.—Kentucky's Republican State Central Committee has adopted a resolution reading all former Republicans, now turned Progressives, out of the party. A picture of Colonel Roosevelt was ordered removed from state headquarters.

SOLEMNITY IS FELT

Delegate Deeply Impressed by
Chicago Convention.

NEW PARTY IS BAPTIZED

D. L. Povey Declares Three Elements, God, Country and Home, and Duty to Fellow Man Were Dominating Features.

CHICAGO, Aug. 8.—(Special).—A great National Progressive convention in which more than 12,000 people were crowded into the Coliseum yesterday, all anxious for the country's best welfare, was a sight long to be remembered. Every person present felt the solemnity of the occasion and the responsibility devolving upon those who had the work in hand. To see bronzed men, many of whom were not church people, rise and in unison at the opening and repeat the Lord's prayer and in closing sing the Doxology, with all the earnestness of converts to a new faith, was an incident which could not be misinterpreted. These delegates and these people were baptizing the new party with the religion of righteousness, at such variance with the cynicism of ordinary politics that the great event became more a religious than a political gathering. Catholic and Protestant, Jew and non-believer, awake to the fact that there was somewhere behind the clouds of former political corruption a God of virtue, justice and good faith who was willing to smile on this national uplift movement for all mankind.

Moral Movement Is Seen.

That this is a great moral movement was the keynote of whatever was done. The brotherhood of man was shown everywhere. The fact that we are our brother's keeper and are responsible for the well-being of every other man, that the poor have claim upon their more fortunate brother, and that all must rise if the Nation is to continue, was the solemn sermon of Theodore Roosevelt, to which every heart present assented.

Sectionalism was for the first time in the history of the Nation in a great National convention obliterated. A Union General, a life-long Republican, a Southern General, a life-long Democrat, whose empty sleeve bore testimony to the cause for which he had fought. This Southerner now joined the general movement for Roosevelt and after his speech proclaiming that there would be no sectional line between North and South, threw his hat far into the audience proclaiming that the former Confederate vote was in the ring.

Just then the veteran life and drum corps struck up Dixie and the great crowd took up the song and all joined therein, waving Old Glory to the Southern cry of battle.

Epoch Is Made for Women.

The tribute to American womanhood by the nominating speech in which Miss Addams, one of the best-loved women in America, seconded the nomination, was an epoch-making event in the movement for women, who are taken into the new party with rights equal to man.

After the speech of Miss Addams, a silk banner inscribed "Votes for Women" was presented to her and enthusiastically carried about this vast building. In the march Oregon took the lead, with her standard aloft, proclaiming to the cheering multitude that the women of Oregon were with the Progressive party. Oregon's women will soon secure the same recognition as has been given her by the sister states of California and Washington.

These three elements, our God, our country and our home, were cardinal features taught by the convention, but interwoven through all was the emphasis laid on the duty to our fellow-man. This was solemnly given in that declaration of faith of the new party as laid down in the speech of Theodore

Roosevelt, in which he pledged no child-labor, no sweatshop, no night work and a minimum wage for women, shorter hours, the care of old age without charity, and other uplift measures.

Oregon Stamp on Platform.

Yet this platform is not new to Oregon, although it may be and is elsewhere. It bears the stamp of the Oregon system and this is an insurance policy of its success.

For us, with the leaders we have, and the cry of the people for relief from the exactions and failures of the old parties, we cannot fail.

STUBBS PROBABLY WINS

CURTIS GETS VOTES, BUT GOVERNOR HAS DISTRICTS.

Result Close in Many Counties, and Margin May Be Overturned on Official Count.

TOPEKA, Kan., Aug. 8.—Although United States Senator Curtis has upon the face of returns late tonight a popular majority of between 4000 and 5000 votes, he probably has lost in his fight for renomination for his seat in the Senate.

Governor Stubbs, his opponent, according to tonight's returns, has 30 legislative districts out of 145 in the state, and as Senators are nominated under the Kansas law by plurality of legislative districts, Stubbs seems to have won the Republican Senatorial nomination.

Returns have been received from 151 legislative districts and of this number Curtis has 73. In many districts, however, the margin is so small it may be overturned by an official count. Several counties went for Stubbs by a few votes. In Gray County the Stubbs majority was four.

The Curtis forces do not concede defeat, but have issued a statement warning workers to keep the state to watch the official count closely.

The Democratic nomination for Governor was still in doubt tonight, both J. B. Billard and George H. Hodges, the leading candidates, claiming it.

PAUL CLAGSTONE LEADS

RACE FOR GOVERNORSHIP IN IDAHO CLOSE.

Official Returns Put Haines in Second Place, but He Is Expected to Win by Small Margin.

BOISE, Idaho, Aug. 8.—(Special).—Paul A. Clagstone jumped into the lead in the Governorship race today, and from the returns now in, official and unofficial, leads John M. Haines by 155 votes.

Thus far the official count has only been made in 10 counties, most of which were conceded to Clagstone, and when the count is completed Haines may lead with a sufficient number to give him the nomination. The gains made by Clagstone on the official returns are as follows: Ada County, 251; Canyon, 153; Bonner, 375; Latah, 446; Lewis, 105, or a total gain of 1194 over the unofficial returns, which gave Haines 143 majority.

Haines made a slight gain over the unofficial count from 10 counties. Shoshone, Clearwater and Twin Falls, conceded to Clagstone, are yet to be heard from, while Oneida and Bannock, carried by Haines, have not the official count and are backed on by the Haines followers to give him the nomination.

The outcome is still uncertain, with the probabilities that the successful nominee will not have a plurality of over 200 or 300 when the count is completed.

VIEWS TO BE GIVEN

Wilson Will Tell What He
Thinks About Navy.

NOMINEE'S PICTURE DRAWN

Acceptance Address Brings Telegrams of Congratulation—Norman Mack Calls on New Chairman McCombs.

NEW YORK, Aug. 8.—Governor Woodrow Wilson sat for three hours today in a studio while an artist drew a charcoal portrait of him, which will be used for campaign purposes.

Tonight he went to a theater, accompanied by his youngest brother, Joseph R. Wilson, a newspaperman, of Nashville, Tenn. This was the Governor's way of resting from the busy day of handshaking and speechmaking yesterday, when he was notified of his nomination.

The Governor met the newspaper correspondents tonight at a hotel and was asked concerning those planks in the Baltimore platform which he did not mention in his speech of acceptance.

"Omissions did not mean opposition," explained the Governor. "The things omitted did not happen to come in my theme."

With respect to the Navy the Governor indicated that discussion of the subject at the present time might be construed as an assumption on his part "of the privilege of directing the House of Representatives." He intimated that he would take up in his future speeches the Navy question as well as other issues not touched upon yesterday.

Telegrams lauding Governor Wilson's speech of acceptance were given out at National headquarters today from many prominent Democrats, including William J. Bryan, Speaker of the House, Marshall, Senator Kern, of Indiana; Louis E. Brandeis, of Boston; Senator Hoke Smith, of Georgia; Mayor Fitzgerald, of Boston; Norman E. Mack, Governor Dix, of New York; Mayor Harrison, of Chicago; Governor O'Neal, of Alabama, and E. W. Hurst, of Illinois.

Norman E. Mack, ex-National chairman, called on the new National chairman, William F. McCombs, today and promised to visit National headquarters as often as possible within the next three weeks and give as much assistance as he could in connection with the campaign.

Mr. McCombs today met a number of National committeemen from states regarded as doubtful. He will continue to have conferences in the next few days with committeemen who are expected to bring detailed information on conditions in their respective states. Among the callers at National headquarters today were National Committeemen Taggart, of Indiana; Wade, of Iowa; Boeschstein, of Illinois; Senator Watson, of West Virginia; State Chairman Finley, of Ohio, and E. C. Shields, of Michigan, also called.
