

BRIDGES WRECKED IN 'MIMIC WARFARE'

Defenders of San Francisco
Obstruct Enemy Until Re-
inforcements Arrive.

50 CAPTURED IN SORTIE

Machine Guns Used to Cover Blues'
Retreat—Southward March to Be
Begun Today by Troops From
San Francisco.

SALINAS, Cal., Aug. 13.—For the second time since, on Sunday, the Red Army of attack landed at Presidio Monterey it has had its progress halted by the destruction of bridges by the small force of Blues retreating until it can effect consolidation with the main force of the defenders. The check administered today to the Reds took on all the aspects of a real battle and the Red outposts were driven back for several miles, while the Blues destroyed the temporary bridges erected across the Salinas River to replace the one destroyed yesterday.

The fighting was in progress for more than two hours and was witnessed by a large number of residents of this city and of nearby towns. Earlier in the day a detachment of the Blues made a sortie and captured 50 Red soldiers, the raiders escaping unscathed.

Southward March to Begin.
Colonel W. S. C. Bowen, in command of the Blues, is adopting every strategy to retard the invaders' progress until the main body of the defenders can reach San Jose. It is understood by Colonel Bowen that Colonel Cornelius Gardner will begin tomorrow morning the southward march from the Presidio, San Francisco, and will arrive in San Jose Thursday night.

Brigadier-General Robert Wankowicz, in command of the invaders, is using every effort tonight to repair the damage done today by the Blues, and purposes beginning his advance tomorrow at daylight. Coyote, 12 miles from San Jose, being his objective. He expects, however, to be stubbornly opposed by the Blues, under Colonel Bowen.

In the engagement today the Blues used machine guns to cover the retreat of the skirmishing forces. The Utah militia, with the Blues came in for high praise from Colonel Bowen as the result of their behavior in the fighting.

PERU BARS INVESTIGATION

Protestants Not Allowed to Probe
Rubber Trade Cruelties.

LONDON, Aug. 13.—The Peruvian government will not permit a Protestant mission to go to Putumayo to investigate the alleged atrocities reported by Sir Roger Casement, on behalf of the British government, to have been perpetrated on the Indians in that Peruvian rubber-gathering district.

At the request of an association, which is raising funds here for that purpose, the British Minister at Lima, Charles L. Des Graz, was instructed to ascertain what facilities would be granted to a Protestant mission by the Peruvian government.

In reply the British Minister cabled that the Peruvian Foreign Minister had informed him, after a consultation with the President of the republic, that any mission other than one composed of Roman Catholics would be barred by Article IV of the Peruvian constitution.

TITANIC REPETITION SAVED

Lookout on Allen Liner Sees Iceberg
in Time to Reverse Engines.

MONTREAL, Aug. 13.—A message from Captain Cook, of the steamship Corsican, relating the details of the accident yesterday, when the liner struck an iceberg in the Straits of Belle Isle.

Captain Cook said the lookout saw the ice and the engines were immediately reversed. When the impact came the steamship was traveling so slowly that the shock was slight.

The Corsican, her master said, was slightly damaged above the water line, but would be able to proceed to Liverpool without assistance, and information to that effect was sent to boats that started to her aid. Captain Cook said nobody was injured.

ELECTION IS TOO COSTLY

House Committee Advises Unseating
of Bowman of Pennsylvania.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 13.—The House elections committee investigating the contest between Representative Bowman, of the Eleventh Pennsylvania District, and Glenn H. McLean, has prepared a report recommending Mr. Bowman's unseating on the ground of large expenditures in his election.

SULTAN AND HAREM TOUR

Abdicated Moroccan Ruler Carries
Wives on Diplomatic Mission.

GIBRALTAR, Aug. 13.—Mulei Hand, who yesterday abdicated the Sultanate of Morocco in favor of his brother, Mulei Youssef, arrived here today.

With him he brought a large harem and suite. He is on his way to France.

PRINCE TO ROUT REBELS

Chief of Mongolian League to In-
vade Mongolia at Early Date.

PEKING, Aug. 17.—(Special.)—Prince Nayit, chief of the Mongolian League, will start next week for Mongolia, backed by three battalions of infantry, with machine gun detachments. The aim is to rout the Ugha Hutuktu and other rebels against republican rule, and thereafter to establish law and order out of chaos.

There are infinite possibilities in this expedition, but Prince Nayit is optimistic about the outcome, for he believes he can speedily alienate the followers of the unruly chiefs—a hint that he will not scorn to bribe if the battle is not surely on his side.

INFORMER WILL AID

Deposed Council Clerk Made
Assistant Prosecutor.

ALDERMEN ARE ARRAIGNED

Accused Detroit Officials Brand
Statement as False, Though De-
tails of What It Contains
Are Not Given Out.

DETROIT, Mich., Aug. 13.—Prosecuting Attorney Shepherd announced tonight that Edward S. Schreier, deposed Council clerk, who made a confession after his arrest with 18 aldermen in connection with bribery operations, will assist him in the prosecution.

"Schreier now is an attaché of the prosecutor's office; you might call him an assistant without pay," said the prosecutor.

The statement was made after the arraignment today of the 18 aldermen and Schreier, which resulted in setting the cases against the nine men arrested for the first time last Friday being for hearing on August 20, and the dismissal of the other nine aldermen with reference to their rearrests last Friday. The latter nine, however, are under bond to appear for hearing August 20 as the result of their first arrests on July 26.

ARMY AVIATORS GIVE UP

200-Mile Trip in Massachusetts Ma-
neuvres Abandoned at Start.

PLYMOUTH, Mass., Aug. 13.—With their hydro-aeroplane damaged as a result of an accident today, Lieutenants Kirland and Arnold of the United States Army abandoned the proposed 200-mile flight from Marblehead to the Army aviation fields on the banks of the Housatonic River, Connecticut.

RAVEN INVETERATE THIEF

Bird Will Carry Off Especially
Things That Glitter.

Of all animal thieves the raven is the most amusing, since he steals for the pleasure of stealing. The hiding of stolen articles seems to be the main thing with Monsieur Corvus Corax.

A man who owned a pet raven cut down a rotten plum tree. It was found to be hollow to the core, and this hollow had served as a sort of "robber's cave" for the raven. There was taken out a basketful of the raven's accumulation of months, which had been stolen and hidden away by this bird. The hoard was of a most miscellaneous character—spoons, knives, tinblades and pens; a pair of solitaires, a comb, a bundle of shoelaces, a merchandise pipe, two boxes of matches, etc.

Depositing the loot on the ground beside the fallen tree, the owner got hold of the raven and laid him down beside these proofs of his knavery. The raven was quite equal to the occasion, for he straightway assumed an aspect of perfect innocence and unconcern.

With one eye fixed on his master he seemed to inquire what this was all about, and to ask what in the world he had to do with it, while with the other eye the bird glanced about at the things spread on the ground with a merry blink that clearly indicated a lively reflection of the delightful stealing of them had afforded him.

The owner hid himself. When the raven thought himself alone he looked keenly around, croaked twice a deep guttural croak, and walked about the disintegrated articles as if admiring them. He then took a spoon in his beak, and carrying it with quick, decided step to the opposite side of the garden, hid it carefully among the broad leaves of a big rhubarb plant. He repeated this proceeding with every article of the hoard. When his job had been completed he uttered the favorite exclamation of the raven when he imagines he has just accomplished something cunningly clever, and is perfectly satisfied with himself— "Coo-croo-croo," a combination of laugh, chuckle and croak, specially reserved for such occasions.

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DARROW'S COUNSEL REBUKED BY COURT

Earl Rogers Bitter in Denun-
ciation of Assistant Pros-
ecutor Ford.

PROOF OF CRIME DENIED

Defense Contends Bribe-Money Has
Been Traced No Further Than
Olaf Tveitmo, San Fran-
cisco Labor Leader.

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 13.—Summing up today the evidence adduced by the state against Clarence S. Darrow, former attorney of the convicted dynamiters, John and James B. McNamara, who is on trial for alleged jury bribing, Earl Rogers, chief counsel for the defendant, told the jury that the prosecution had failed to connect Darrow with the corruption of Juror Lockwood, through the instrumentality of Bert H. Franklin, the former detective who confessed to having passed the bribe money.

The state had only proved, Rogers asserted, that Franklin had been introduced as a spy into the ranks of the McNamara defense and that any one of 50,000 other persons interested in the great war between capital and labor would have greater interest and a more impelling motive than Darrow in bribing a juror to acquit the McNamaras.

Rogers Attacks Detective.
He asserted the state had not traced the alleged bribe money further than Olaf A. Tveitmo, a labor leader of San Francisco, and that Darrow had been named directly in connection with the alleged bribing of Lockwood only by two detectives—Franklin and John Harrington, of Chicago, whom he described as the "most precious pair of soundrels that ever smothered their souls to betray a friend."

He also taunted the prosecution for failing to examine Tveitmo after he had been called as a witness, and then added that Harrington had been hired by Detective Foster of the National Erectors' Association to "get" Darrow.

Court Rebukes Lawyers.

Rogers assailed Assistant District Attorney Ford, who in the opening argument for the state asserted that the District Attorney would investigate the entire Darrow case, which Ford said "reeked with corruption."

Rogers became so bitter at times that First Assistant District Attorney Keetch and later Ford himself appealed to Judge Hutton to rebuke Rogers for straying outside the issues of the case. The rebuke was administered.

Rogers is scheduled to complete his argument tomorrow and Darrow will close his own defense.

STANDARD PRICES WANTED

Coast Retail Dry Goods Men Will
Make Demand on Jobbers East.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 13.—Retail dry goods merchants of the Pacific Coast have been invited by the San Francisco Retail Dry Goods Association to meet in this city September 5, 6 and 7, to form an organization for standard prices upon advertised specialties and to make a demand on jobbers prices "C. O. B. Pacific Coast."

It is the intention of the local merchants when the Coast merchants shall have organized, to align with them the National Association of Dry Goods Merchants in their campaign to have the manufacturers absorb freight charges on goods sold in this territory, in order that merchants here may sell advertised goods at Eastern prices. It is asserted that the territory west of the Rocky Mountains consumes 10 per cent of the dry goods output of the country's mills, and that an infinitesimal increase in jobbers' prices to the Eastern trade would enable Coast merchants to sell at the same prices as those received in the East.

TOKIO, Aug. 18.—Emperor Yoshihito issued an edict today addressed to Prince Sadanaru, Prince Takahito Arima, and Premier Marquis Kimmochi Saloni, expressing his gratitude for their services to the late Emperor Mutshihito, and requesting the continuance of their devotion to himself and the Japanese nation. Prince Taro Katsura, former Premier, was appointed Lord Keeper of the Privy Seal and Lord Chamberlain, in succession to Prince Sanenori Tokudomi, who resigned.
