SHOW'S PROSPECTUS OUT.—The Pacific Northwest Land Products Show, which is the successor of the Oregon Apple Show, will be held in Portland, November 18-22, under the auspices of the Oregon State Horticultural Society. Exhibitors will be permitted to place a card on their entries, giving name and address of grower, thus obtaining a vast amount of publicity not given at other shows. Cash and other prizes, aggregating over \$20,000 in value, will be offered in the competitive classes.

CLUB TO SECURE PERMANENT QUARTERS.—The board of governors of the North Portland Commercial Club will meet tonight with the president, J. H. Nolte, to consider the matter of permanent quarters for the organization. Also on the agenda is the incorporation which has been prepared by Secretary James A. Strickler. Quarters will be secured either on Killingsworth avenue or Kenton avenue, probably the former, as it is little more central to the territory than Kenton. As soon as the club has incorporated the matter of securing grounds for a building will be taken up, and the intention is to make the North Portland Commercial Club a permanent factor in that part of the city, and it is felt that this can be done only by securing a building for its headquarters.

MILWAUKEE STREET TO BE OPENED.—The west side of Milwaukee street is being paved between Holgate street and Bybee avenue in advance of the completion of the double tracks of the Portland Railway, Light & Power Company. It may be some time before the remainder of the street can be paved, but by completing the west side of the street it will open it up to traffic. As it is the only street extending to Westmoreland and Sellwood it will be a great convenience to get even half a street paved. The double tracks have been laid, one is finished and the east side track is now being completed by laying stone blocks between the rails. The street will be paved to Sellwood.

ANNUAL CAMPMEETING OPENS.—The annual campmeeting of the Free Methodist Church, of the Oregon conference, opened Wednesday night on the grounds at St. Johns Heights, on the St. Johns carline. ELECTION DATE FIXED MONDAY.—At a special meeting of the City Council called for Monday morning at 9:30 o'clock the date for a special election to place before the people the proposed charter amendment giving Portland a commission form of government, will be fixed. The charter as drafted by the committee appointed by Mayor Rushlight will be read to the Council and a vote taken upon a resolution to have it placed upon the ballot. A four-day vote will be required. If this vote is secured which seems probable, the date for the election will be set perhaps for some time this fall.

Dr. Davis, who was related to Mr. Baker, says he helped the men and declares that their operations were of a remarkable nature in that they captured the murderers under extremely difficult conditions.

ROBERTS TO APPEAL

Convicted Murderer Carries Case to Supreme Court.

MOVE STAYS EXECUTION

Jurisdiction of Multnomah County State Circuit Court in Handling Trial to Be Denied by Attorneys in Making Motion.

An appeal to the Supreme Court is to be taken from the conviction of H. E. (Jack) Roberts for the murder of Donald M. Stewart in an attempted automobile holdup on the White House Road on the night of March 29. Circuit Judge Morrow yesterday made an order for the payment by the county of the expense of transcribing certain portions of the testimony which Roberts' attorneys, E. S. J. McAllister, F. H. Whitfield and Roscoe P. Hurst, desire to send to the Supreme Court together with their bill of exceptions.

Judge Morrow has refused to grant a certificate of probable cause and the case will be appealed to the Supreme Court and it is expected to be furnished as a matter of course. The bill of exceptions will be settled between the Judge, Deputy District Attorney Fitzgerald and the defendant's attorneys on August 19 and the application to the Supreme Court for a certificate of probable cause will be made the day following, which day before Roberts is scheduled to be hanged.

Appeal Stays Execution.—The filing of the appeal will act as a stay to execution, making it unnecessary for Governor West to grant a reprieve in accordance with his promise that there will be no hangings until after the voters, at the November election, have passed on their desire to retain or abolish capital punishment.

The chief ground of appeal and the only one on which the defense is placing any real reliance is the question of the jurisdiction of the State Circuit Court for Multnomah County to try the case. The actual shooting occurred in Clackamas County and it was the contention of the attorneys for the defense that the trial should have been held in that county. At the conclusion of the state's case a formal motion for the discharge of the defendant was made on this ground, but was denied.

New Trial Not Liked.—There has not been nor could there be an application on the part of the defense for a new trial. To apply for a new trial in Multnomah County would be to retreat from the position that the Circuit Court for Multnomah County did not have jurisdiction. A four-day vote of the defense lies in appeal and the only real hope of reversal exists in the jurisdiction controversy. Should the Supreme Court reverse on this point the defendant probably would be tried in Clackamas County. Prior jeopardy would not, it is believed, intervene for the reason that there was no court which has not the right is equivalent to no trial.

BOND'S ESTIMATE IS HIGH

Portland Land Products Show May Bring 40,000 Visitors Here.

Twenty thousand fruit-growers and horticulturists of Oregon, Washington and Idaho, will come to Portland to attend the Pacific Northwest Land Products Show November 18-23, according to an estimate made yesterday by G. E. A. Bond, manager of the show. Mr. Bond says that inquiries regarding exhibits are being received from every producing district in the three Northwestern states.

Between 10,000 and 12,000 folders outlining the plan of the show will be forwarded to orchardists and farmers next week. The Executive Board of the show, which contains the plan of the show, contains the plan of the show, contains the plan of the show.

From reports of the Northwest, we have reason to expect at least 20,000 visitors to the show," said Mr. Bond. "We are planning to make the affair unusually attractive so that Portland residents also will be interested in the project. Prices aggregating \$20,000 will be awarded.

The farmers of Central Oregon are especially interested in the forthcoming show, and the dry farming products from that section will no doubt be an important feature. The site for the show will probably be secured next week. To house the exhibits it will be necessary to use about an acre of ground."
