

INVASION ARMY'S ADVANCE CHECKED

First Big Engagement of Maneuvers Takes Place in Narrow Mountain Pass.

JAPANESE TAKING NOTES

Well-Dressed Son of Nippon Offers to Buy Horse When He Fails to Hire One, and Case is Reported to Officers.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 18.—Its advances on San Francisco effectually checked by a determined stand of Colonel Bowen's advance force of the defending army, the invading "red" army in the war game was forced to camp last night on the north side of Paljaro River. Theoretically, the river is not fordable and the "red" will be delayed until a bridge, dynamited by the enemy, has been repaired.

The battle of Sargent, fought Saturday, was the first big engagement of the mimic war. Colonel Bowen's 400 men, who are harassing the advance of the invaders, engaged the first division of the "red" army, in command of Brigadier-General Wankewski, in a narrow pass near Paljaro and then, driven back by a force encounter, he accomplished his purpose in delaying the enemy's march.

Twenty-Mile Forced March Made. The main "blue" army, under command of Colonel Cornelius Gardner, which is moving south to meet the invaders, made a forced march from Redwood City to San Jose, a distance of nearly 20 miles.

Late tomorrow Colonel Gardner expects to join Colonel Bowen's force. He said today that he did not look for a decisive battle until Tuesday.

The maneuvers will end Tuesday night. When the "red" army camped last night at San Juan a well-dressed Japanese was busy about the town endeavoring to hire a horse. Failing to find a mount the Japanese informed the different liveries that he would purchase one. He was unsuccessful in this endeavor and the Japanese was pointed out to several regular army officers at that time.

Japanese Arrive With Bicycles. When the "red" and "blue" were fighting today in the hills near Sargent the Japanese arrived at Sargent and each brought a bicycle.

The attention of the commanding officers of the regulars had been called to the affair and it is believed an investigation will be ordered. Late today eight more Japanese arrived at Sargent and each brought a bicycle.

NEW YORK STILL IS SAFE. Army of Invasion Fails to Penetrate Line of Defense.

NEWTON, Conn., Aug. 18.—New York is still safe. The invaders who have threatened its capture, the great battle of Newton fought today between the blue defenders of the city and the attacking red army proved indecisive, according to official announcement.

With the failure of the "enemy" to break through the blue lines, the maneuvers, in which 20,000 regulars and volunteer soldiers were engaged, came to an end.

While New York has been saved from invasion in the present campaign, the question whether the city could be invaded from the land side by a large army is a problem in the view of military experts which must be worked out in future maneuvers.

EXPRESS MESSENGER HELD. Man Who Said He Was Robbed Is Himself Arrested on Theft Charge.

ASHEVILLE, N. C., Aug. 18.—Accused of having robbed the express car of Southern Railway train No. 13, which he declared had been rifled last Thursday night, a man was held today at the point of a revolver, E. Z. Carr, the express messenger, was arrested here tonight.

A package containing \$3,000 in bills was lost in the robbery of train No. 13 last Thursday night. Messenger Carr said a robber boarded his train as it was leaving Asheville, three miles from the city. According to Carr's story, the robber, after obtaining the package, bound Carr's hands and locked him in the express car where he was found when the train reached here.

AUTO WRECK INJURES ONE. Others of Party of Five Escape When Car Overturns.

Axl Peterson, a chauffeur with a stand at Sixth and Stark streets, was slightly hurt Saturday night when an automobile in which he was riding with four other chauffeurs overturned on the Canyon Road, two miles north of Beaverton. He was taken to St. Vincent's Hospital in the Red Cross ambulance, but after being attended was allowed to leave, his injuries proving superficial.

The party was returning from Silvertown when their car ran off the road, and crashed into a fence. No one but Peterson was hurt.

PEACE OVERTURES HALTED. Chicago Streetcar Men Now on Verge of Strike.

CHICAGO, Aug. 18.—The outlook for an amicable settlement of the streetcar controversy over wage scales and working conditions seems less favorable tonight than it has at any time since negotiations between the company officers and their employees began.

International President Mahone, of the Carmen's Union, has dissatisfied today with the refusal of the employers to come to an agreement with him on wage scales and he prepared a new ultimatum, which, if rejected, may mean a strike.

Arkansas Has No T. R. State Ticket. LITTLE ROCK, Ark., Aug. 18.—At a meeting here today of the state central committee of the Progressive party it was decided not to nominate candidates for state or county offices, but to confine all efforts to getting votes for the Presidential electors nominated by the party.
