WORK AMONG LUMBERMEN SUBJECT OF ADDRESS.

—Frederick F. Davis and Roy A. Pruden, evangelists among the lumbermen, spoke yesterday in Hawthorne Park Presbyterian Church of their work among the men who fell the trees and spend their lives in forests. They were dressed in the garb they use when in their mission fields, and described in strong and plain language the life they have been leading. Mr. Pruden is the singing evangelist and his work supplements that of Mr. Davis. Mr. Davis has been a lumbermen's evangelist for a number of years in Minnesota, Wisconsin, Idaho, British Columbia, Washington and Oregon. Mr. Pruden came to Hawthorne Park Training School of New York to take up his life work as a singer among the woodmen of the Northwest. They will be at Calvary Presbyterian Church next Sunday.

JUVENILE INDUSTRIAL FAIR PLANNED.

An industrial juvenile fair will be held at Crystal Lake Park, Milwaukie, August 29, in which 12 school districts of Northern Clackamas County will take part. Arrangements are now being completed. The programme as adopted is as follows: 10 A. M., baseball; 1:30 P. M., address by L. R. Alderman, State Superintendent of Public Instruction; music by the Oak Grove Girls' Band; awarding of prizes; 8 P. M., address by A. E. Wood, of Reed College. The exhibits will be placed in the large pavilion. A variety of exhibits is expected. This fair is for educational purposes, and will be along the line of similar fairs being conducted in other sections of the state.

CHURCHES EXAMINATIONS.

The first of a series of park meetings, by the Christian Endeavor Society of the third district, was held yesterday afternoon in the Westminster Presbyterian Church, in charge of the meeting, assisted by Mr. Van Patton, of the United Brethren Church, and Mr. Strangers. The address was delivered by Rev. John Talmadge, of Portland, who is relieving Rev. Henry Marcott, of Westminster Church. It is planned to hold a meeting of this character in the various parks of the city every week, as long as the weather will permit, under the direction of the neighborhood churches.
