

REWARD OF \$4000 OUT FOR SLAYER

Lane County and State Determined to Find Green Girl's Murderer.

TWO NEGROES ARRESTED

Neighbor of Eugene Minister, Awakened by Unknown Cause, Peers Out of Window—Death Told by Screams of Loving Parent.

GOVERNOR TO ASK STATE TO OFFER \$2500 REWARD FOR FRIEND'S APPREHENSION.

SALEM, Or., Aug. 21.—(Special.)—Governor West today announced that he will recommend to the Legislature that it pay \$2500 for the arrest and conviction of the slayer of little Mildred Green in Eugene.

EUGENE, Or., Aug. 21.—(Special.)—Woman's intuition rather than definite information may set the hour of the murder of little Mildred Green, or at least the time of the entrance of the murderer into the Green home.

Mrs. Hoff, who lives at the corner of Sixth and Van Buren, two doors east of the Green residence, said today that she was awakened out of a sound sleep at 1:30 on the night of the murder.

"I do not know what it was that awoke me," said Mrs. Hoff. "Whether it was a noise or not, I do not know, but I do know I was so thoroughly aroused that I went to every window and looked out. There is a street light on the corner, illuminating the neighborhood, but I saw nothing stirring, so went back to bed."

"If Mr. Green did not go to bed until nearly midnight, I should think he would have heard a noise, but I know men usually are sound sleepers."

Cries Sound Death.
"I did not hear anything more during the night, and the first I knew of the murder was when Mr. Green came out of his house, calling for help."

Prosecuting Attorney Bryson is of the opinion the original hid for some hours in the closet off the death chamber, judging by traces found there. If he entered the house at 12:30 o'clock the prosecutor would have to believe that the murderer hid for some time in the closet, and then came out to the street.

The day's investigations netted nothing to the officials. One or two clues were followed out, but found to lead to nothing tangible. At noon the County Court entered a formal order, offering a reward of \$1000 for the apprehension of the murderer and Governor West has announced that he will recommend to the Legislature that \$2500 reward be paid for the man's capture.

Eugene citizens in mass meeting tonight raised \$500 in ten minutes to add to the reward offered.

Word has just been received from Roseburg that a negro with blood stains on his clothing has been arrested there. Sheriff Quinn, at the time the message was sent, was trying to reach Lane County officers before trying to sweat the prisoner.

The negro gives no satisfactory explanation of the cause of the stains. Another negro has been arrested in Medford.

Father Grieves for Dead.
Rev. Mr. Green, the grief-stricken father, has kept close to home nearly all day, moaning and grieving for his lost daughter. He is comparatively quiet when anyone is with him, but alone he paces the floor and beats his head with his hands. The neighbors are fearful that he will do injury to himself or to some of them in his frenzy.

Ira Johnson, an ironmolder, who lives a block west of the Green home, says the family domestic last night came to his wife's room with the statement that someone was trying to enter her room. Mrs. Johnson reassured the girl, telling her she was nervous because of the murder. This morning examination showed a box under the girl's window and the screen ajar, but when officials investigated Johnson could not be sure that the box and screen had not been in that condition for some time.

Mrs. C. H. Hyer and Mrs. N. R. Hunt were the two women who went first to the death room after Mr. Green had given the alarm. A man named Elliott, a railroad man, was passing by the automobile at the time he stopped at Mr. Green's call and attempted to quiet the man and get a coherent statement from him.

Death Belief Difficult.
"A little girl came running up and said, 'Mildred is dead,'" said Mrs. Hyer. "I could not believe it. The girl, just the evening before, had been in perfect health, so I hurried across the street to Mr. Green's home and saw him standing there. 'Is it true that Mildred is dead?' I asked."

"Come and see," Mr. Green replied, and so I went with him and Mrs. Hunt and Mr. Elliott, not suspecting for a moment that the child had been murdered."

"And then that awful sight met my eyes. I hope I shall never see the like again. After one glance at the terrible sight on the bed we came away without going nearer than the door. Mr. Green was crying because the officers had not come, and he made us go outdoors for fear we would disturb something."

Neighbors Live Close.
Mrs. Erickson, who lives next door west of the Green home, says she heard nothing until Mr. Green was screaming in front of the house. The Erickson kitchen is on the east side of the house, while that of the Green house is on the east, and it was not until she went to feed the chickens that Mrs. Erickson heard the commotion. The house east of Green's was vacant that night.

Other physicians were called by the prosecutor today to examine the body of Mildred Green and all agreed with the testimony given at the coroner's inquest.

ROSEBURG ARRESTS NEGRO

ROSEBURG, Or., Aug. 21.—(Special.)—With his trousers spotted with a substance resembling human blood and carrying a case knife and razor, a colored man giving his name as H. E. When questioned by Sheriff Quinn tonight Harris said that he was employed by Baker & Johnson, near Eugene, until about 10 days ago, when he resigned his position and went to Portland. He says he returned to Eugene Monday, where he remained until late last night, when he boarded the

WARRANT IS ISSUED FOR DAVID NAPPIN

Though Wealthy Farmer Is Willing to Drop Case, Judge Will Not Give Consent.

COURT SEES COLLUSION

Attorneys Scored From Bench and Police Are Told to Find Woer and Return Him at Once to San Francisco.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 21.—(Special.)—True to prophecy, David Nappin failed to answer when the call of Alice J. Brown was called this morning in Judge Shortall's court.

Mrs. Brown was there, but neither her attorney, W. T. Vaughn, of Portland, Nappin, the wealthy farmer, of Farmington, who accused her of poisoning him, nor his attorney, A. G. Kelly, of Los Angeles, answered when the court called upon them.

Mr. Fenton, representing Mrs. Brown, told to the court that he had received two communications from Los Angeles, with the request that they be handed to Judge Shortall.

Mind Changed in Conference.
The two letters, however, were addressed to "Judge Shortall." They were both written on Kelly's stationery and were signed by Kelly and Nappin. The wording was almost identical. They said, in effect, that Nappin, when he started the prosecution of the state against Mrs. Brown, believed he had a case against her, but that after she had been brought back from Portland he had gone into conference with his attorney, Kelly, and Leland Becey, of the District Attorney's office, and had been asked by them, whether at the time he gave the money to Mrs. Brown it was understood that the title to a property was to rest with him, and had been compelled to answer that there was no such understanding.

Title to House Not Discussed.
At the time that the money was provided by Nappin for the purchase of the rooming-house by Mrs. Brown, there had been no discussion, according to Nappin's letter, of the subject of title to the house.

Upon this information, the letters said, Nappin was informed by Kelly and Becey that there was no hope of securing a conviction of the young woman; and, as Nappin had himself paid all the expense of the prosecution so far and the state had not been out a cent, he believed that there was no use prosecuting Mrs. Brown, and asked that the case be dismissed.

Judge Suspects Collusion.
"From the beginning of this case," said Judge Shortall, "I have been convinced that the prosecution was not in good faith and am satisfied that there is collusion between Kelly and Vaughn. I do not know, said the judge, 'what the Bar Association of Los Angeles thinks of Mr. Kelly's method of procedure, but I know his line of practice would not be tolerated for a minute in this city.'"

Nappin said he intended to leave at once for his home in Farmington. Judge Shortall said he did not believe that Nappin intended to go so far away from the young woman. He issued a bench warrant for Nappin, instructing the San Francisco police to get in touch with the Los Angeles police as soon as possible. He said he believed Nappin to be an "honest, but misguided man" and that it might be possible to get him to tell the truth and fix the responsibility so that the conspirators could be prosecuted.

COLORED BOY AND WOMAN IN HIDING

Stanford Fraternity Leader
Elopes With Charmer and
Swindles Friends.

FATHER ADVISES ARREST

Family of Wilfred J. Sobey Wearies of Experience—Expulsion From University Due to Shady Money Transactions.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 21.—(Special.)—At the end of a trail of worthless checks, Wilfred J. Sobey, Stanford fraternity leader, son of a wealthy pioneer family of San Francisco and prominent in the younger set, is in hiding, having learned that a warrant for his arrest was issued today. With him in his hiding place is a society woman charmer of the vampiric type, the cause of it if the young man's ruin, yet more faithful to the wreck she has made of him than to the husband she has deserted.

While the friends of the woman have been spared the scandal of an expose of the reasons for her disappearance, the home of the young man's father, Dr. Arthur Lyne Sobey, has been besieged for three days by friends of the family, bank officials and strangers, alleged to have been victimized by the son, whose checks, issued within a week, will amount to at least \$1000.

Numerous Small Checks Passed.
The amounts of these checks vary from one of \$10, passed upon a woman who managed to cash them, to one for \$50, indorsed by one of the young man's friends.

Among the fugitive's victims are the two sisters of the woman who he is in hiding. One of these advanced him \$140 to enable him to recover a diamond ring he had borrowed from the other sister and pawned. The latter is without her ring, as Sobey did not redeem it, but kept the money borrowed for that purpose, it is alleged.

The warrant for the arrest of the former Stanford student was issued today by F. J. Silvey, real estate operator, who indorsed a \$50 check, which Sobey cashed at the Humboldt Bank. Silvey swore to the warrant only after he had been advised to do so by the fugitive's father, brothers and the family attorney.

Family Wary of Sobey.
In explanation of their unusual attitude, the members of the Sobey family revealed past experiences with the son and brother, which began before he was a student at Stanford, and for financial entanglements, which then grew out of the infatuation for the much older society woman.

After a series of misdeeds at the university, which had been condoned by the faculty at the earnest pleas of the student's family, Sobey borrowed a large sum of money from a young woman who was a chum of his sister, also a Stanford student. When asked to return this money the young man refused to do so, and his father refused to go to his aid again and he was taken from the school.

When his father, Dr. Sobey, has written friends in the city, from whom he obtained money on worthless checks, promising to "make good" as soon as he could, his letters were mailed in this city.

POISONED RUM IS FATAL

NINE DEAD, MANY CRAZED BY
LIQUOR AT CELEBRATION.

Victims of Carousal Go Stone Blind Before Death and Are Not Able to Identify Prisoners.

MONTREAL, Que., Aug. 21.—Nine men have died and others are hovering between life and death in the general hospital, while many others are walking the fields around St. Lambert in a state of temporary insanity, as a result of a little celebration which took place among foreigners across the river Sunday night.

Most of the men who were believed to be the cause.

When the beer ran low in the party, some one suggested sending for more. The bottles were brought across the river. Two men have been arrested on the charge of being responsible for the nine deaths. The men arrested are George Zimmermann and Karl Bellefleur, both of Montreal, and prominent leaders of the Russian colony here.

SINGLE BOARD APPROVED

BENEFITS OF GOVERNOR'S PLAN ARE SEEN.

Vesting Management of All Public Institutions in One Head Pronounced Economical.

SALEM, Or., Aug. 21.—(Special.)—Members of the State Board who have fallen in line with Governor West's suggestion that all of the institutions should be placed under the management of that board are already pointing out where the plan will prove beneficial and are laying schemes for the highest development of all of the state lands.

As some of these lands now lie they are inequitable divided among the institutions. As an instance, the Oregon State Training School has about 600 acres of land to care for 100 boys, while the asylum has only 400 acres more to care for over 1500 people.

In addition there is a considerable tract of land lying between the State Training School and the Tubercular Sanatorium which is covered with timber and brush and is good only for pasture purposes. Under the new plan machinery for the clearing of this land could be secured, convict labor utilized and the tract cleared for grain and other produce, which could be used for any institutions as found necessary.

This problem of equal division of the state lands among the various institutions is one which may become something of an economical factor in the future conduct of the institutions and one which it is said can be done much easier and more economically through the consolidation of all the institutions under one board of management.

In Republican Primaries in Washington Withdrawals Have Effect.

OLYMPIA, Wash., Aug. 21.—(Special.)—In withdrawing his name as a candidate for the Republican nomination for Congressman-at-Large tonight, J. A. Falconer, of Everett, left but seven men in the field and as a result the voters on primary day will not have to express a second choice for that office.

The primary law requires a second choice when four or more candidates aspire to an office, but Attorney General Tanner holds that where two are elected, there must be four for each office, so that event is now a first instead of a second choice affair.

Secretary Howell has wired the big publishing houses and has sent notices to all county auditors of Falconer's withdrawal, but it is feared that it will be too late in some counties, as several are reported to have had their ballots printed already.
