The Council committee after hearing communications involving two of the three in alleged unscrupulous dealings post-poned action until Tuesday afternoon, when a special meeting will be believed. when a special meeting will be held at which all sides interested will be given a chance to be heard.

"We are not here to persecute any-body," said E. F. Cannon, of the Realty Board committee, "but we are here to Board committee, "but we are here to protect the real estate business. We do this to help the business and to protect the public. When a man is known to have been engaged in crookedness he should not be allowed to transact business. We propose to help the city get rid of persons who should not be in the real estate business. We want everyone to be heard and therefore we are not urging the Council committee to take any hasty action."

The granting of the licenses to the three dealers named was held up by the committee until the hearing next Tuesday.
