NEW GARBAGE CREMATORY WANTED.

A proposed amendment to the city char-
 ter making an appropriation of \$100,000
 for the erection of a new city
 garbage crematory has been introduced
 by the City Auditor by Councilman Ma-
 guire and will be considered along with
 other proposed amendments at the
 regular Council meeting tomorrow. It
 is Councilman Maguire's opinion that
 the city should adopt the municipal col-
 lection system, in which event a new
 crematory will be necessary to handle
 the city's garbage. At the present time
 the incinerator which was formally
 accepted by the city last Spring is
 taxed to its capacity. The proposed
 municipal collection system, it is said,
 would increase the supply of garbage
 to about twice as much as is handled
 by the incinerator at present.

CITY BUSINESS TO BE SCHEDULED.—
 The City Council at its meeting tomorrow
 will be asked to pass resolutions
 establishing a uniform line of pro-
 cedure for all of the municipal com-
 mittee and commission meetings. At
 present it is not known until the
 meeting is called what is to be con-
 sidered. Under the new system, if
 adopted, the City Auditor will submit
 a list of the business before the com-
 mittee and will supply each member
 with a copy a day or two before the
 meeting is called. Beginning Septem-
 ber 30 the Health Board and the Park
 Board will hold their meetings the
 last day of each month instead of the
 first of the month as heretofore. The
 change in date is to facilitate the work
 of the City Auditor's office.

JAIL SENTENCE SUSPENDED.—Early last
 Spring Wallace Simon was arrested at
 Florence by United States Marshal
 Scott on a warrant charging him with
 selling liquor without having procured
 a Government license. He was indicted,
 tried, found guilty and sentenced to
 pay a fine of \$100 and serve 30 days
 in jail, but the sentence was tempo-
 rarily suspended. It was found on
 investigation that Simon had been
 acting as the selling agent of
 beer and that he had been in-
 formed by it that it was unnecessary
 for him to have a license as it had one
 to cover his case. In view of these
 facts he was sentenced yesterday to
 pay the fine of \$100 and the 30 days
 in jail was suspended pending good
 behavior.

NORTH PORTLAND CLUB MEETS.—The
 North Portland Club has accepted an
 invitation to meet tonight with the
 Overlook Improvement Club
 near the corner of Mississippi avenue
 and Shaver street. Among the reports
 that will be received are the follow-
 ing: Enlarging the scope of the club
 to include St. Johns and Woodlawn;
 elimination of the electric pub-
 licity within the city; establishment
 of common-user provisions on all rail-
 roads; construction of another rein-
 forcing water main for the city.
 The special committee appointed to ar-
 range for the get-together banquet
 September 17 in Kenton is expected to
 make report.

WORK STARTS ON POWELL-STREET IM-
 PROVEMENT.—Work started yesterday
 on the improvement of Powell
 street, between East Twenty-first and
 East Twenty-sixth streets. A steam
 shovel began cutting down the grade
 preparatory to laying the hard-surface
 pavement. Powell street improvement
 is part of an extensive pavement pro-
 gramme for that district. East Twenty-
 sixth street will also be paved between
 Division and Holgate streets. Powell
 and East Twenty-sixth streets are
 key to Waverly-Richmond and Kenil-
 worth districts.

PENINSULA PARK ENTRANCE TO BE
 LIGHTED.—Through the efforts of the

 TO BE SENG.

Musical Composer Who Swayed Eng-
 lish Public Was of Irish and
 Italian Parentage.

The engagement of the Gilbert
 and Sullivan Festival Company, from the
 Casino Theatre, New York, with De-
 Wolf Hopper, Blanche Duffield, Eugene
 Cowles, Kate Condon, George MacFar-
 lane, Viola Gillette, Arthur Adridge,
 Louise Varnell in the famous series
 of Gilbert and Sullivan comic operas,
 which includes "The Mikado," "Pina-
 fore," "Patience" and "The Pirates of
 Penzance," announced for one week at

Investigation of Agent Selling on In-
 stallment Plan Satisfactory.

Subsequent investigation by the police
 at the suggestion of Mrs. S. L.
 Bryant, of 541 Bidwell avenue, as to
 the reliability of the Great Northern
 Tailors' Combine, an account of which
 appeared in The Oregonian last Sunday,
 under the caption, "suit-club game re-
 vealed," has revealed the fact that the
 tailor company is in no way com-
 mitted to any lottery scheme, but is
 selling suits contracted for on the
 installment plan.

An agent for the Great Northern
 Company, of which W. O. Samuels is
 the local representative, with offices
 in the Swetland building, had called in
 the neighborhood of Mrs. Bidwell's
 home soliciting contracts for suits on
 the installment plan. Not certain that
 any such firm as "The Great Northern
 Tailors' Combine" existed, Mrs. Bid-
 well quietly requested the policeman
 at that beat to investigate the mat-
 ter to ascertain whether or not the
 firm was doing a legitimate business.

An investigation made by the police
 established the fact that the com-
 pany was operating in a lawful way.
