

ARMY MAY AID IN
NICARAGUAN CRISIS

Navy Resources Now Pressed
to Limit With Disab-
lement of Vicksburg.

CANAL TROOPS MAY GO

Tenth Infantry Better Equipped
Than Marines for Landing Par-
ties—Reserve Ships Are Not
Manned Sufficiently.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 27.—The Navy's resources on the Pacific Coast have been drawn on to such an extent that if trouble were encountered in Nicaragua beyond the power the forces now there or en route to cope with should some of the American lives or interests in other Central or South American countries be jeopardized, the Army will be called upon to assist the marines.

The Tenth Infantry, now in the canal zone, would be the first called upon to answer the call. This branch of the service is said to be much better equipped than the marines for landing parties.

No Men for Other Ships.
The accident to the Vicksburg reported today is serious because it takes practically the last available vessel on the Pacific Coast. The State Department says it must have a vessel for the Mexican coast. The Navy has none except the cruiser Cleveland, which has just been taken out of reserve and ordered to Nicaragua. These orders have been rescinded and the Cleveland ordered to overtake the Vicksburg at Magdalena Bay and escort her back to Mare Island for repairs. This will take three days. The Cleveland will then carry out the Vicksburg's orders.

The Vicksburg, when last heard from today, was about 150 miles from Magdalena Bay, slowly making her way under sail. She is believed to be in no immediate danger.

DEATH TAKES D. K. DILL

Grand Army Veteran and Past Post
Commander Is Dead.

OREGON CITY, Or., Aug. 27.—(Special.)—A sunstroke received during the Civil War when he was orderly for General Powell in the Southern invasions, indirectly caused the death at Gladstone today of D. K. Dill, Past Commander of Mead Post, Grand Army of the Republic, Oregon City.

Mr. Dill was about 65 years old and lived for some years at Gladstone. The funeral will be held Wednesday afternoon at 1:30 o'clock at the home of his children, Mrs. Dill, 1111 N. 1st St., where he was residing.

AGED MANIAC IS FOUND

JAMES QUIGLEY ESCAPES FROM
PORTLAND SANITARIUM.

Since Death of Girl in Rose City
Park, March, 1911, He Has
Suffered Hallucination.

Exclaiming that the police were after him again and that he would be hanged, James Quigley, 50 years of age, was found in a state of dementia Sunday morning at Eighty-third and Welder streets. He had mutilated himself, after escaping late Saturday night from the Portland Sanitarium.

Quigley has made three attempts to leave himself since the death of the little girl, Susanne Quigley, whose body was found in the bushes near Rose City Park March 23, 1911. Shortly after finding the dead girl Quigley made a confession that he had perpetrated the deed, but no evidence was found against him and he was judged insane and sent to the asylum.

After his dismissal as cured he returned to work for Twombly Brothers, a few months ago. He had a similar attack of insanity, exclaiming at the time that he was certain he was being hanged.

SESSION COST BILLION

APPROPRIATIONS REACH GRAND
TOTAL OF \$1,019,636,143.66.

Amount Less Than Budget—Cannon
Shows That Minus Canal Cost
All Records Are Broken.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 27.—Congress closed another busy session today, but the exact total of the Nation's "cost of living" varies as it is seen through Republican and Democratic eyes.

The total appropriations for the fiscal year 1913, which began July 1, 1912, amount to \$1,019,636,143.66, as given to the Senate and House today by the Senate and House today.

Representative Cannon declared that out of the total should be taken all expenditures made for the Panama Canal. With such deductions, he said, the total appropriation for 1912 would be \$890,655,143, as compared with a total of \$981,122,881 appropriated for general purposes last year.

Predictions of the Government would face a heavy deficit at the end of the year were made both by Senator Warren and Representative Cannon. Senator Warren said that the deficit would be \$100,000,000.

ROYALTY HONORS BOOTH

King and Queen Send Wreath to
Bier of Commander.

LONDON, Aug. 27.—Though it rained hard all day there was no abatement in the number of persons who went to Congress Hall yesterday to view the body of the late commander of the Salvation Army, General William Booth. Thousands of mourners were waiting when the hall was closed last night and it has been decided to continue the lying in state today.

King George and Queen Mary today sent a beautiful wreath inscribed with the words, "As a mark of regard and high esteem from the King and Queen to the late General William Booth."

SEAMAN OBJECTS; JAILED

Year in Prison Is Sentence for Re-
fusing Vaccination.

VALLEJO, Cal., Aug. 27.—J. M. Holman, ordinary seaman of the training ship Intrepid at the San Francisco naval training station, has been sentenced to serve one year at the disciplinary barracks at the Bremerton Navy-Yard for having refused to be vaccinated with typhoid virus, according to a dispatch from Washington, received at Mare Island Navy-Yard today.

He has been confined aboard the prison ship Manila awaiting sentence since his recent court-martial at Mare Island.

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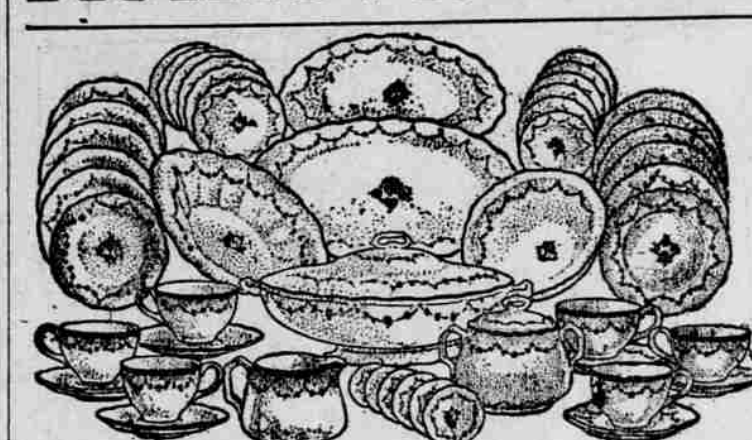

HOP HARVEST IS ON

Smaller Yards Start First, Big
Growers Wait a Few Days.

PICKERS NOT PLENTIFUL

Labor Recruited From Country Dis-
tricts But Spectacular Feature
Is Missing—Crop and Mar-
ket Are Satisfactory.

Hop-picking started in earnest in Oregon yesterday, but the harvesting will not be general until the latter part of the week. On several thousand acres the pickers were sent to work, principally in the smaller yards. The larger growers will begin picking in the last half of this week or the first of next.

The hop harvest this year has come about a week earlier than usual. The climatic conditions were such as not only to make a great crop but to pick it forward. For this reason a good many of the growers found themselves unprepared in the matter of obtaining sufficient labor, but are making a start with what help is available. As usual, the bulk of the pickers are being recruited from the country districts, the large commercial growers alone depending on city pickers to gather the crop. The annual hiring of the army of pickers has lost its chief spectacular feature this year by the withdrawal of the "Krebs" firm from the hop-growing business.

Season Is Early.
The customary date for beginning hop picking is September 1, but recent inspections of the large yards have shown the hope to be fully matured now, and the growers are afraid, if the harvest is further delayed, that injury may result. The possibility of a September crop is also causing them to hasten the work.

The price of picking this year will be one cent a pound. This price has prevailed for several years, regardless of the market price of hops, and seems satisfactory to the pickers.

The growers complain of having difficulty this week in getting a sufficient number of pickers, but hope that more will be on hand next week. Those who have made careful inquiries, however, declare that the labor supply this season will be scarce.

Season Cannot Join.
In the country rural farm work is not far enough advanced to permit the farmers and their families to go to the hop yards, while in Portland and the valley towns there are not as many idle young men and women as many were last summer.

The Oregon hop crop this year will be the largest since 1907. It is estimated at about 110,000 bales, which is 40 per cent larger than last year's crop. Picking will be much easier than usual, and the pickers will be able to make more money than they did last year.

AURORA HOPS BEING PICKED
Growers Have Good Yield, Plenty of
Help and Bank Accommodating.

AURORA, Or., Aug. 27.—(Special.)—In spite of the warnings of the hop-buyers and the newspapers, a number of growers will begin to pick tomorrow. A large number of pickers arrived this morning and others are expected this afternoon. Most of the old and experienced growers, however, will not commence operations until next week, but there are some yards where the crop is sufficiently mature to begin picking.

Many growers here are optimistic as to yield and prices. They declare that the average yard yield will be from 1200 to 1500 pounds, while some yards will produce 2000 pounds or more. The H. J. Keel yard near here is estimated as a 3000-pound yard and the George Yergen yard is reputed to be equal to any of the large-size yards of the state.

While no estimates of opening prices can be obtained from dealers, the growers in general are expecting that the prices will open about the same as last year. While this seems almost too optimistic, the fact that growers feel this way in the matter is bound to
