

COLONEL SAYS THE
WOMEN TO BE WELCOMED

Problems of Involuntary Unemployment and Overwork to be Attacked.

WOMEN TO BE WELCOMED

Compliment Paid to Jane Addams Defended Against Critic Who Attacks It as "Spectacular and in Bad Taste."

ST. JOHNSBURG, Vt., Aug. 30.—Colonel Roosevelt spent a strenuous day in Vermont today. He was within a few miles of the international boundary line at one time, but turned south. He spoke to a crowd gathered for a county fair at Morrisville and a smaller gathering at Barton, besides making several other impromptu speeches before reaching here. At St. Albans he referred to Mr. Archbold's remark that there was nothing "in darkest Abyssinia which was worse than the treatment of Standard Oil at the hands of the Roosevelt Administration," Roosevelt said.

"He doesn't think of darkest Abyssinia when he thinks of the dissolution suit, but when he thinks of my Administration, and that may have another. If I have, there will be more of the Abyssinia treatment, and he knows it. He knows that I put the fear of the Lord in his heart."

In his address here, Colonel Roosevelt attacked the old parties and welcomed women into politics.

Law Enforcement Essential.
"The Progressive platform," said Colonel Roosevelt, "demands efficient and thorough National regulation of all those great industrial concerns doing an interstate business. More of the anti-trust laws must be kept on the statute books, and, instead of its enforcement against the big trusts being, as now, merely farcical, it is to be the duty of the committee to see and seeing that every trust guilty of bad conduct shall be really and not merely nominally dissolved, and the men guilty of the misconduct punished."

Regulation of Work Proposed.
"Of all the planks of the Progressive platform, the two which must go to my own heart are the one which deals with social and industrial justice, and the one on country life. We pledge ourselves to legislation looking to the prevention of industrial accidents and occupational diseases. We intend to deal with the problems of involuntary unemployment and of overwork. We pledge ourselves to secure one day's rest in seven days for the worker, and an eight-hour day in continuous 24-hour industries, the prohibition of night work and the establishment of an eight-hour day for women workers for equal suffrage for men and women."

"The New York Times of August 20, in an interview with the prominent citizen, who has repudiated it, criticized and denounced Jane Addams for nominating me, and also criticized the Progressive party for permitting women to be in the Progressive convention. It attacked Miss Addams' conduct as 'spectacular and in very bad taste.' And it also criticized me as being 'spectacular because I had the 'bad taste' to compliment her on her action and thank her."

"My only reference to Miss Addams was contained in the following sentence: 'I wish to tell those who proposed and seconded my nomination that I appreciate to the full the significance of having such men and such a woman put me in nomination.' It will be noticed that in this sentence I did not even mention Miss Addams' name, and that President Elliot really considers this allusion to Miss Addams as being 'spectacular and in bad taste.' I should feel a mild curiosity to know just what he would regard as non-spectacular and in good taste."

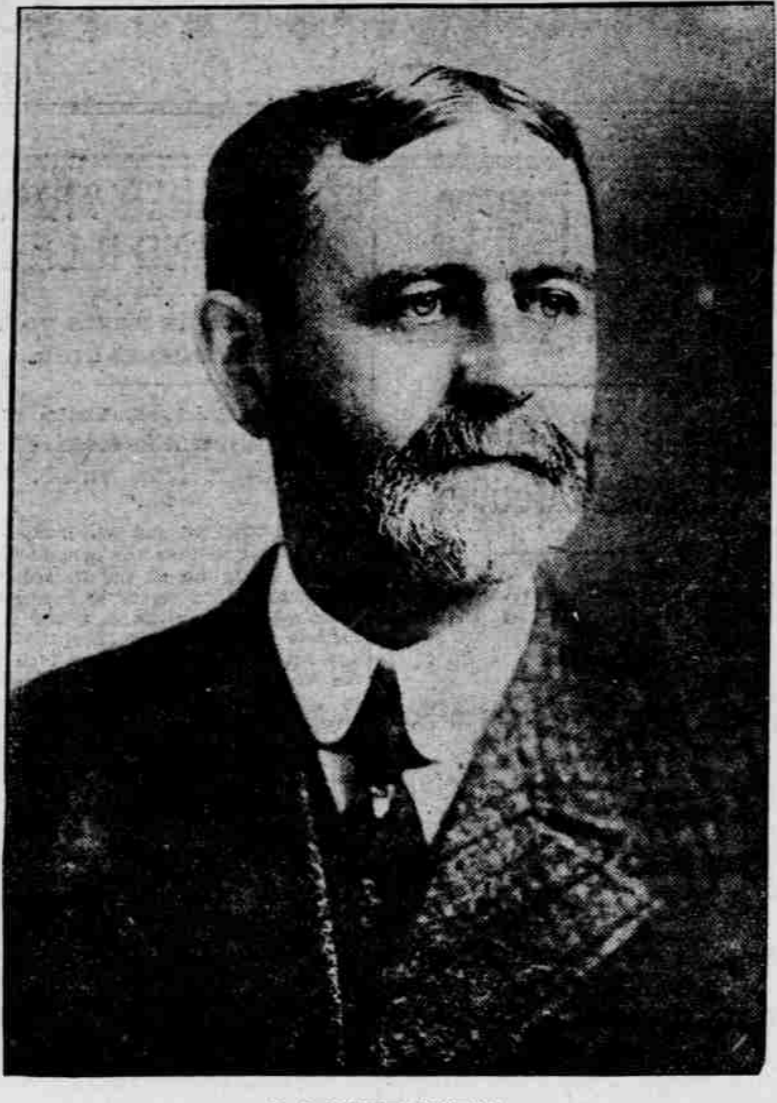
Women Welcome in Politics.
Among the other sentences in the article was the following: 'Women have no proper share in a political convention.' That man knows little of our political, social and industrial needs as a Nation who does not know that in political conventions the politics that ought to be regulated are the politics that affect women precisely as much as they affect men."

"I am glad to say that among the representatives in our convention were a number of women; and not only high in purpose, but in wisdom, in character, in cool-headedness and in far-sighted understanding of the needs of the Nation they stood on an exactly equal footing with the men. Our National committee will publish Jane Addams' speech. I ask you to read it for yourselves and then yourselves pass judgment on the good taste and wisdom of the New York Times in denouncing that speech."

HATE IS DEPLOYED

Alton President Says Socialists Foster Jealousy.

DOCTRINES ARE ATTACKED

Traveling Engineers Urged in Address to Promote Feeling of Generous Fortitude, Tolerance and Hospitality.

CHICAGO, Aug. 30.—(Special)—An attack on Socialist doctrines was delivered today by B. A. Worthington, recently elected president of the Chicago & Alton Railroad, in an address before the convention of the Traveling Engineers' Association.

Half of the troubles of working men, Mr. Worthington said, came through ignorance which is fostered by various societies and by labor leaders, who are supported and aided through the dissemination of Socialist literature. He urged members of the organization to strive to change the feeling of jealous hatred against the more fortunate ones into a feeling of generous fortitude and hospitality, endeavoring to keep the relations between man and man and between class and class in a healthy condition for the benefit of society as a whole.

Unrest is Manifested.
"There is prevailing among the laboring classes," he added, "a spirit of unrest manifesting itself through strikes of the various crafts and demands for higher compensation. The point has been reached where the employers find themselves unable to grant further concessions and maintain the solvency of their physical properties. At the same time labor in all lines of services never has been better paid and working conditions never have been less arduous in this country than they are at the present time."

Misleading Information Spread.
"In fact, there seems to be a yellow fever of literature prepared for the spread of incorrect information, which is misleading to the men who have by them the chance of opportunity to get at the facts to enable them to take a broader view of things, and soon those who fall under the baneful influence become unable to distinguish between right and wrong."

"It should be remembered that decay begins in discord, which is simply by the chance of an organism, because one part of the system gets more than its share of sustenance and the other part too little. If the process continues destruction is inevitable."

AURORA, Or., Aug. 30.—(Special)—The first yard to finish hoppers in this section will be the Otto Berning yard at Gervais, which will finish today. JOHANSON TALKS IN SEA OF BANDANNAS

Colonel's Running Mate in Wyoming Says Economic Justice is Goal.

TARIFF STAND DEFINED

Party Will Not Embark on Ruinous Course, Says Candidate—Roosevelt and Wilson Acceptance Speeches Contrasted.

CHEYENNE, Wyo., Aug. 30.—Governor Johnson, running mate of the Presidential candidate of the Roosevelt Progressive party, arrived here tonight and addressed a capacity audience at a theater. His speech was often interrupted by applause and cheers. At times the orchestra and galleries were a sea of red bandannas. Governor Johnson said in part:

"At last the American people can turn from fighting a sham battle upon political issues to a real struggle with real consequences for the living, breathing vitality of real human interest!"

Contrast With Wilson Made.
Contrasting Theodore Roosevelt's Chicago address with Governor Wilson's speech of acceptance, Governor Johnson said:

"I listened with intense interest to the remarkable address of our leader which has been designated as his 'confession of faith,' and just afterward I read with the utmost care the speech which was made by Governor Wilson, candidate for President. I commend these two documents to every thoughtful American citizen, that he may read both, and that when he has concluded the reading of both he ask himself the question, Which of these two men, even assuming them to be equal in other respects, announces himself with greater clarity, with greater strength, with greater certainty, which document do I better understand and which man can I better picture from the print before me?"

Tariff Position Defined.
"Clear, unambiguous, forceful, direct and certain is the pronouncement of Roosevelt, and I challenge you to apply a single one of these adjectives to the pronouncement of the Democratic candidate."

MOSQUITO NEAR FATAL
ENGLISH ARMY OFFICER HELD 6 WEEKS IN HOSPITAL.
Bites Acquired When Lieutenant Dew Has Canoe Ride on River Prove Near Fatal.

Six weeks in the Good Samaritan hospital as the result of infected mosquito bites is the fate that befell a young English army officer, Lieutenant N. A. Dew, of the Royal Welsh Garrison Artillery. Dew came out here on leave less than six months ago with the intention of making his home here, provided he found a business opening. Through previous experience in Paris as an artist he had just obtained a post with Foster & Kleiser when he was taken ill. During the hot weather that immediately succeeded the Elbe week he rowed a couple of friends to the Oaks Amusement Park and back again. On the trip his legs were badly bitten by mosquitoes.

Two days later he was taken ill with tonsillitis, following a cold, secured probably through overexertion with the oars. The throat trouble lowered his constitution and the poison of the infected mosquitoes gained rapid hold and became apparent on Thursday. Two days later he was removed to the hospital in a very serious condition, 21 incisions being made in his leg to avert amputation of the limb.

THIBET POLICY ATTACKED
English Liberal Faction Opposes Grey's Attitude in Matter.

LONDON, Aug. 30.—Thibet's future promises to become a bone of contention as that of Persia. The same section of the Liberal party which accuses Foreign Minister Edward Grey of sacrificing Persia, and, incidentally, W. Morgan Shuster, to Russian interests, declares that Great Britain's Thibetan policy is on parallel lines.

The Conservatives, who support Sir Edward more strongly than the Liberals, members of his own party, approve of his ultimatum to China.

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UTAH DEMOCRATS MEET

PLATFORM ADOPTED AND CANDIDATES NOMINATED.

Initiative and Referendum, Recall, and Popular Election of Senators Are Advocated.

SALT LAKE CITY, Aug. 30.—With the largest representation that has been seen in a Democratic state convention for years, the followers of Governor Wilson assembled in Salt Lake City today, nominated a state and Congressional ticket and adopted a platform.

J. L. Tolton, of Beaver City, was nominated for Governor, and T. D. Johnson, of Ogden, and Mathonihah Thomas, of Salt Lake City, for Representatives in Congress.

The platform adopted supports the initiative, referendum, recall and the election of United States Senators by popular vote. Other planks in the platform are for a non-partisan judiciary and for direct primary elections. The State Land Board is criticized severely by the Democrats, and a plank was inserted in the platform favoring the passage of a law that will require the Land Board to make public its dealings.

The other candidates nominated by the convention are: Charles England, Logan, Secretary of State; LeGrand Young, Salt Lake, Justice of the Supreme Court; John S. Blain, San Pete County, Auditor; John F. Mendenhall, Utah County, Treasurer; Joseph W. Stringfellow, Attorney-General; Jess Knight, Provo; O. W. Powers, T. H. Fitzgerald, Sale Lake, and James Andrus, St. George, Presidential Electors.
