

## REBEL TURNS FROM MINES TO MORMONS

Determined Defense Made by  
Defenders of El Tigre  
Awes General.

### WOMEN FLEE TO SAFETY

Armed Guard Escorts Party of 450  
Refugees on Journey to Ameri-  
can Soil—Whole Fourth  
Cavalry in Service.

DOUGLAS, Ariz., Aug. 30.—Awed by the determined attitude of the American defenders of El Tigre, Rafael Campa, the rebel leader operating in Sonora, southeast of this city, has not as yet attempted to carry out his threat to attack the rich gold mining camp. Instead he moved his force farther north on the Bavispe River, after informing couriers that he had given up his intention of taking El Tigre. It was reported that he would go to the Mormon colonies of Morelos and Oaxaca, but the Americans at El Tigre believe that he intends to attack the latter place.

All the women and children of the Mormon colonies have left and are expected to arrive in Douglas tonight or tomorrow. There are about 450 refugees in the party escorted by an armed guard.

Five troops of the Fourth Cavalry at Fort Huachuca have been ordered to Nogales, and the 12 troops of the Fourth Cavalry will then be in active service along the border.

Rebels under Escobedo and Alatorre are reported to have surrounded Campa, south of Nacozari. These are the rebels that looted the property of the Transval Mining Company several days ago. The property is owned by Cincinnati capitalists.

### AMERICANS BARELY ESCAPE

Mining Men Reach Border After  
Harrowing Experiences.

TUCSON, Ariz., Aug. 30.—F. M. Curtis and Bert Cunningham, after a harrowing series of incidents in making their escape from the rebel-infested zone of Northern Sonora, following the killing of three insurgents at El Oro mine, arrived here today in rags and still carrying their guns.

According to Cunningham he killed the rebels after one had shot at him. As a larger body of rebels approached the mine the two Americans fled and reached the San Rafael ranch Friday night. There were 26 federal soldiers at the ranch and early the next morning they were attacked by a force of 30 rebels. The battle lasted from 5 A. M. to 3 P. M., the Americans fighting with the federals.

Thirty rebels were killed, while the federals suffered a loss of two killed and two wounded. Later the rebels were reinforced and the Americans again took to the brush, eventually landing at Nacozari, half-starved and sick from eating green peaches. From Nacozari they went to Douglas, Arizona, by train.

### TROOPS HUNTING OROZCO

Government Thinks Rebel General Is  
Near Ojinaga.

JUAREZ, Mexico, Aug. 30.—Several expeditions set on foot today indicate that the Mexican government credits the report that Pascual Orozco is in the vicinity of Ojinaga, along the eastern border to the east.

It was announced from federal headquarters here that General Huerta, commander-in-chief of the government forces in the north, left the City of Chihuahua for Juarez early today over the Mexican Northwestern Railway. He comes with much cavalry.

From Juarez a cavalry expedition will be sent overland toward Ojinaga in an effort to find the rebel commander.

### MOTHER AND SIX BURNED

Father and Eldest Son Are Unable  
to Effect Rescue.

RUTHERFORD, N. J., Aug. 30.—Mrs. Emilio De Baro and six of her children, ranging from five months to 12 years of age, met death early today in a fire which destroyed their home. De Baro, the husband and father, and the seventh child, a boy of 13, escaped by jumping from a second story window. De Baro and his family made their home on the second floor of a frame house. Mrs. De Baro and the six younger children slept in a rear room near the window. Firemen believe a spark from a passing locomotive may have started the fire.

Five bodies were found in a heap near the center of the building. The woman, with the baby in her arms, lay near the window. Firemen believe a spark from a passing locomotive may have started the fire.

### CODY TAKES AIR PRIZES

Ex-American Wins Contests at Re-  
cent Army Competition.

LONDON, Aug. 30.—F. Cody, once an American citizen, but now a naturalized British subject, was awarded today the two leading prizes of English army aviation. The first—£5000—was given for his winning in the recent meet on Salisbury plain, the competition open to aviators of all nations in any make of machine, and the second—£5000—for his victory in the contest open only to British aviators using airplanes English-made, except the motor. In each event Cody used a biplane of his own invention.

Armand Depourdus, a Frenchman, carried off second prize in the first event, amounting to £2000. He used a monoplane of his own make.

### WAR EXISTS, SAYS AIKENS

Germany and England Declared to  
Be Already at Odds.

LONDON, Aug. 30.—"Germany and England are now in a state of war," said J. A. M. Aikens, Canadian member of Parliament from Brandon, Manitoba, who has just returned here from a Continental trip, in an interview here today.

"The overt blow has not yet been struck," he continued, "but when it is all may be over in three months or three days. When Canada understands, I believe the Dominion's hearty help will be forthcoming."

## MRS. ROGERS DIES

Standard Oil Man's Widow Is  
Stricken on Dining Car.

### DEATH IS NOT UNEXPECTED

Heart Attacks Suffered for Past Ten  
Years—End Comes as Train  
Enters Station on Home-  
ward Journey.

NEW YORK, Aug. 30.—(Special).—Mrs. H. H. Rogers, widow of the Standard Oil magnate, died suddenly on a New York Central train today. She was en route from Bretton Woods, N. H., to this city.

Mrs. Rogers was seized with a fainting spell in the dining car and fell from her seat to the floor. Trainmen gave her what aid they could, but she did not rally. She died as the train was entering the Grand Central station.

Mrs. Rogers had been spending the summer at the home of her daughter in Bretton Woods. She had planned to go to Europe next week and was to have been joined at her city residence, No. 2 East Seventy-ninth street, by her daughter within a few days.

Mrs. Rogers had been a sufferer from heart attacks for the last ten years and last spring her condition became acute and she went to Bretton Woods in the hope of gaining relief. About a week ago her condition became such that Mrs. Rogers became convinced that her death was a matter of a few days. She telegraphed to New York for her family physician, but he was out of the city.

It had been Mrs. Rogers' desire to return to her New York home before she died, and as she was steadily becoming weaker she insisted that the train be made last night as the train was entering the Grand Central station.

## HAWAIIAN JURIST DIES

JUDGE HARTWELL ONE OF PION-  
EERS OF ISLANDS.

Service on Bench Under Monarchy  
Followed by Similar Position  
Under American Flag.

HONOLULU, Aug. 30.—Alfred Steadman Hartwell, former associate justice of the Supreme Court of Hawaii, died here today. He was 76 years old. Judge Hartwell was one of the pioneer Americans in Hawaii.

Born in Dedham, Mass., he was graduated from Harvard College with the class of '68, but did not study law until after the Civil War, through which he served with distinction, being brevetted Brigadier-General for gallantry in the battle of Honey Hill, S. C., in 1864.

In 1868 he was mustered out, but he had been studying law while still in the Army and received his degree in law from Harvard in 1867. The same year he was elected to the Massachusetts Legislature and the following year was appointed Associate Justice of the Hawaii Islands under the monarchy. In that position he served until 1874, when he became Attorney-General. Active in the revolution which finally brought Hawaii under the flag, he became special agent of the Republic of Hawaii at Washington in 1893-1900.

When the Federal courts were established in the Islands Judge Hartwell again became Associate Justice of the Supreme Court, becoming Chief Justice in 1907. He resigned in 1911.

Judge Hartwell married Charlotte Elizabeth, daughter of Dr. James W. Smith, one of the first medical missionaries.

### Justice Blair, of Michigan, Dead.

LANSING, Mich., Aug. 30.—Charles A. Blair, Justice of the State Supreme Court, son of Austin Blair, Michigan's "war Governor," died here today.

### Bishop Grafton Succumbs.

FOND DU LAC, Wis., Aug. 30.—Bish-

op Charles C. Grafton, of the Fond du Lac Protestant Episcopal diocese, died today. He had been ill for some time.

### RICH ITALIAN HEIR FELLED

Michael Plastino, of Spokane, As-  
sailed by Supposed Jealous Rival.

SPOKANE, Wash., Aug. 30.—(Special).—Struck from behind with a sand-bag held in the hands of an unknown assailant, Michael Plastino, a 14-year-old son of Joe Plastino, leader of the Spokane Italian colony and the wealthiest of his countrymen here, was knocked unconscious on the doorstep of the Plastino residence, 2222 Second avenue, in the fashionable Browne Addition residence district, at 10 o'clock Thursday evening. The young man's assailant escaped.

Policeman James Kennevan, on the beat near Plastino's home, and Police Sergeant Alex McDonald investigated the case. The police are inclined to believe the assault was committed by a young man who was jealous of Plastino's attentions to a young woman who lives in the vicinity.

### GOOD TEMPLARS ENJOINED

Official Charges Conspiracy to Con-  
nect Him With Liquor Traffic.

BUTTE, Mont., Aug. 30.—J. B. Knight, of Butte, former secretary of the Montana grand lodge of the Independent Order of Good Templars, has obtained a temporary injunction from Judge Lynch restraining the new officers of the order, elected yesterday, from assuming office.

Knight alleged in his petition that a conspiracy existed to prevent his reelection as secretary and to injure his reputation by accusing him of connection with the liquor interests. Judge Lynch set the hearing of the complaint for September 9.

Power Line.

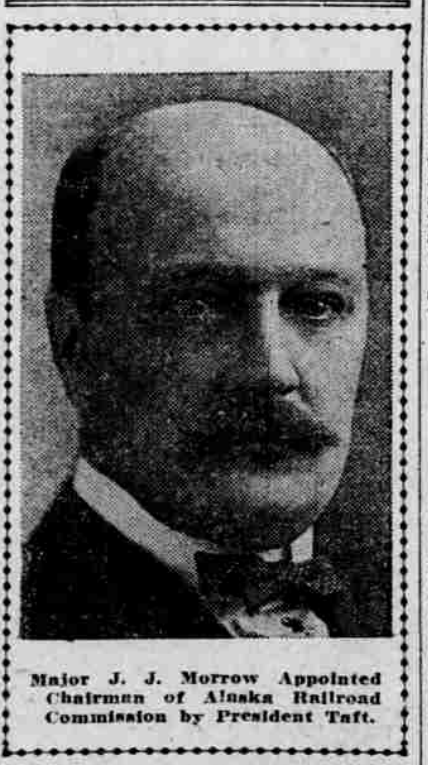

## \$700,000 ESTATE IS STAKE IN SUIT

Georgia Frances Stevens Re-  
news Fight to Share in Prop-  
erty of George T. Myers.

### FATHER'S RIGHT DOUBTED

Parents Made Similar Wills Naming  
Survivor Legatee Who Would  
Divide Residue Between  
Claimant and Brother.

Undaunted though twice defeated in the Supreme Court of Oregon, once on a rehearing involving the right to have had the case heard originally in the Multnomah County Circuit Court by a jury, Mrs. Georgia Frances Stevens has renewed her efforts to have the courts set aside the will of George T. Myers, her father, who died in 1907, leaving her only \$20,000 and the balance of an estate now worth \$700,000 or more to George Tobias Myers, Jr., a son and his only remaining child.

In a suit filed yesterday in Circuit Court against her brother, Mrs. Stevens attacks the will from a new angle. She sets up as a cause of action that the property was accumulated as a result of the joint efforts of both her parents and was, therefore, community property, and that there existed between the parents an agreement, as expressed by wills of even date, February 11, 1896, that the property should go to the survivor and eventually be divided in equal proportions between the two children.

### Executor Asked to Account.

The court is asked to consider this a binding contract between Mr. and Mrs. Myers and to hold that Mr. Myers abrogated it when, within a few months of his wife's death, he made a new will practically dispossessing his daughter. It is asked that the defendant in the present action, who was executor of his father's will as well as residuary legatee, be decreed to hold an undivided one-half of all the Myers estate in trust for Mrs. Stevens and be compelled to give an accounting. All the property is still in his possession. Mrs. Stevens having refused to accept the \$20,000 bequeathed to her.

In her former action Mrs. Stevens attacked the validity of the will on the ground that her father, without just cause, was prejudiced against her when he executed it. Her contention was that he was suffering from an insane delusion that she had "stood in with" a physician whom her father always persisted in believing had caused the death of Mrs. Myers, which occurred in 1902, by malpractice.

### Case Reaches Supreme Court.

The case first came up before Lionel R. Webster, ex-County and Probate Judge, in 1908. He decided that the will should be set aside, after keeping the case under advisement for four months. An appeal was taken to the Circuit Court, where Judge Bronough, after withholding his decision for 18 months, sustained the finding of the lower court. The controversy then went to the Supreme Court where judgment reversing the Probate and Circuit Courts was entered a few months ago.

Mrs. Stevens' attorneys in the present suit are Emmons & Webster, the latter the County Judge who first decided the case in her favor. Judge Webster became thoroughly familiar with the facts through hearing the testimony. Henry E. McGinn, now Circuit Judge, was the principal attorney for Mrs. Stevens in the former action.

The two wills executed in 1896, on the same day and in the presence of the same witnesses, T. Welch and Sallie F. Nice, were identical in every particular with the exception that Mr. Myers named his wife as sole legatee and vice versa. The following is quoted from that of Mr. Myers:

### Wills Are Duplicates.

"I intentionally omit giving anything to my children, Georgia Frances Stevens and George Tobias Myers, Jr., knowing that my wife will care and provide for them.

"In case of the death of my said wife, Sallie F. Myers, before my death, then, I that I then give, devise and bequeath all my property and estate, real or personal of every name, nature or description and wherever situate and being, to my said children, Georgia Frances Stevens and George Tobias Myers, Jr."

Mrs. Myers' will contained exactly the same phraseology except that her husband was named as sole legatee and vice versa. The children were to execute the will of the survivor jointly.

### GOVERNMENT DROPS CASE

Indictments in Florida Everglades  
Inquiry Are Quashed.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 30.—Indictments against four men growing out of the Florida Everglades land inquiry were quashed by the court today at the Government's request.

The indictments were against Charles G. Elliott, chief drainage engineer of the Agricultural Department; A. D. Moorehouse, his assistant; F. S. Singleton, assistant of Elliott; and R. F. Teale, formerly an accountant, charging them with having approved and presented false vouchers against the Government and for which they were dismissed from the service.

The Government said investigation showed there was no intent to defraud the Government.

### BRIDE ACCUSED AS THIEF

Extradition of Woman Ordered for  
Stealing \$1100 From Husband.

SACRAMENTO, Cal., Aug. 30.—Myrtle Randrecker, a bride of six hours, must return from Illinois to San Francisco to stand trial on a charge of grand larceny. She is alleged to have stolen \$1100 from her husband, John Randrecker, six hours after the marriage ceremony was performed. This all happened on May 16, 1912, when the bride fled with the bridegroom's money to Chicago, it is charged.

A requisition extraditing the woman was granted today by Acting Governor Wallace.

### "DRUNK" GETS LIFE "RIDE"

Judge Sentences Man to Seat on  
Water Wagon.

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 30.—E. C. McCabe, charged with having driven an automobile while drunk, has been sentenced by Police Judge Frederickson to "ride on the water wagon for life."

He must pay a fine of \$50 besides.

## SLAYER GETS REPRIEVE

ACTING-GOVERNOR SAYS LAW  
WORKS UNEVENLY.

California Declares Poor Man Is  
Made to Suffer While Rich Man  
Usually Escapes.

SACRAMENTO, Cal., Aug. 30.—Acting Governor Wallace, who is representing Governor Johnson, while the latter is in the East, today issued a 14 days' reprieve to George Figueroa, who was to have been executed at San Quentin prison Friday, September 6 for the murder of his wife in Los Angeles. The reprieve was extended on the request of Figueroa's counsel.

Asked concerning what action he intends to take in the six other cases of men condemned to be executed next month, the acting Governor said:

"I have not made up my mind that the abolition of capital punishment would be an unmitigated good. One of the strong points in the removal of the death penalty is the fact that the existing conditions the law works unevenly. A poor man suffers the extreme penalty of the law and the rich man, by long-drawn-out legal processes, usually escapes the extreme penalty."

## TURKS AND GREEKS FIGHT

Greek Blockhouse on Frontier Said  
to Have Been Attacked.

ATHENS, Aug. 30.—Serious skirmishes between Turkish and Greek regular soldiers on the frontier resulted yesterday in the killing and wounding of many men.

A semi-official dispatch says that Turkish troops attacked the Greek blockhouses at Argypolis, Hagios, Elias, Tavval and Vryssi. In the fighting the Greeks lost one sergeant and five men killed. In another encounter later in the day 20 Turks were killed.

The Greek Minister has issued instructions for the dispatch of reinforcements to the front. He also ordered a searching inquiry into the cause of the fighting.

MOOSE JAW, Saskatchewan, Aug. 30.—Reports received here today from the north and east of the city show that Wednesday night's hail storm did damage to the extent of 33 per cent.
