He contends that woman suffrage is a fad with which the big majority of women in the country are not in sympathy.

"There was no need of a new state ticket in Illinois. Governor Deneen has made an excellent executive, and it was a shame to put up another candidate against him. Yet if you dare say Governor Deneen is a good man someone is ready to class you with the 'crooks.' I think I am as honest as the next man, and I have no patience with the sort of campaigning Merriam and the others who have taken over the organization are prosecuting."



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
