MOVING CROPS SERIOUS PROBLEM Fruit and Vegetables Will Require 425,000 per Kan More Cars Than Last Year.

Because of rather disqueiting reports as to car shortage, some wholesale fruit and produce dealers in the East are making calculations and estimates as to how many more cars will be required to move the leading products during the Fall and Winter of 1912-12 than were employed hat year. They find almost insurmountable difficulty in arriving at conclusions by which they are wiffling to stand, but the possibilities adviced are interesting, says the Journal of Commerce, For the chief crops there are official figures from which a reasonably close estimate can be made. For minor crops the probabilities of 1912 are compared with a ten-year average as to condition, and for some of these only estimates as to yields are given, with an assumption that they will exceed 1911.
