

LA FOLLETTE WILL LEAN TO WILSON

Support of Democratic Nominee Inferred by Process of Exclusion.

TAFT HELD TO BE HONEST

President, However, Is Pictured as Reactionary and T. R. as Improbable, and "Blind Allegiance" Is Depreciated.

MADISON, Wis., Oct. 1.—(Special.)—The reader of the five La Follette articles on Roosevelt which will run in a series at intervals of a week beginning Friday will come to this conclusion:

Senator La Follette and his following will vote for Governor Wilson for President.

Roosevelt will be put out of consideration by the attack on him as a "fake" progressive, who is parading around the country with a false platform and hollow promises, which his record shows he will not endeavor to keep.

Taft will be pictured as the highest type of reactionary, but thoroughly honest, a quality not conceded to Roosevelt.

"Blind Allegiance" Depreciated. There will be no discussion of Wilson, but in his advice to progressives La Follette will point the way out of the dilemma presented by the Taft and Roosevelt candidates. It will be this: "Real progressives should maintain their organization within the Republican party, so that in 1916 they will be ready to take upon their shoulders the task of leadership and the work of reform."

"To maintain this organization within the party, blind allegiance to every party nomination and to every party declaration is not essential. No aid or encouragement has been given to a third party, which is trying to divide the progressive Republican vote and destroy the progressive Republican movement."

If La Follette progressives are not to give blind allegiance to party nominees, who are Taft and Sherman, and are told to give no aid to a third party, which is Roosevelt's, to whom are they to turn? To Wilson and Marshall, of course.

Balance in Congress Desired. In his magazine and in talks with leaders who have visited him from all sections of the country, Senator La Follette has driven home the direction that Progressive Republicans should give their chief concern to real progress in the United States Senate and the House of Representatives. The election of a militant body of progressives in both branches of Congress may enable them to hold the balance of power in legislation. Such a balance, the Senator has said, will serve as a check upon a reactionary President and would bring from reactionary opposition in both houses legislation in the public interest. In the event that a progressive is elected.

In his articles La Follette will clothe both Taft and Roosevelt with reactionary mantles and he will leave his readers to judge which of the three candidates is wearing a progressive cloak.

(Continued From First Page.) Governor Wilson's Presidential campaign. The recall showed 37 votes for Mr. Parker, who will be recommended as permanent chairman, and five for Senator O'Gorman.

The Senator later said his name had been used without his knowledge and that he had participated in a recent conference that favored Mr. Parker's selection.

Fight to Be Carried to Floor. The anti-organization men continued their opposition to Mr. Parker, however, and tonight were considering making a fight against him on the convention floor.

The platform being prepared by the resolutions committee is to be progressive in spirit and is said to be satisfactory to friends of Governor Wilson here.

The 450 delegates heard Temporary Chairman Clynch make today the keynote speech, after which the convention adjourned until tomorrow afternoon.

WILSON IS CENTRAL FIGURE

Governor Wins Fight for Indorsement of Hughes in New Jersey.

TRENTON, N. J., Oct. 1.—Governor Wilson was the central figure in today's Democratic state convention, at which a state platform was adopted and candidates for Presidential electors nominated.

The Governor made a brief address, in which he said that the main issue in the campaign was the trust question and the necessity for the elimination of monopoly.

The Governor was chairman of the committee on resolutions, which prepared the platform. It declared in favor of the election of United States Senators by direct vote, against any curtailment of the present direct primary law, and for a state convention to consider amendments to the Constitution.

The convention adopted a resolution offered by Governor Wilson, indorsing for United States Senator ex-Representative William Hughes, who won in the recent Democratic primaries.

The features of the Republican state convention was the opposition of the Hudson County Assembly candidates to the plank in the platform regarding the administration of President Taft.

The Hudson men are Roosevelt Republicans. The Republican platform favors submission to the people of a Constitutional amendment entrenching women.

PROFESSOR LOWE DYING

War Aeronaut, for Whom Mountain Was Named, Reported Sinking.

PASADENA, Cal., Oct. 1.—(Special.)—Professor Theodore S. C. Lowe, designer and builder of the Mount Lowe Railway, inventor of water gas and pioneer aeronaut, is near death here at the home of his daughter, Mrs. E. L. Wright. Professor Lowe was famous as a balloonist during the Civil War, being the first aeronaut attached to the United States Army. Mount Lowe is named after him.

Reports from the bedside are to the effect that Professor Lowe, who is 50 years old, is in a precarious condition.

ance," said Flinn. "I did not authorize him to send the telegram. 'He had worked for the Standard Oil Company and said he believed he could help me and I told him to go ahead in his own way; that I would be very glad of any help he could give me.'"

Flinn said he received no telegram from John D. Archbold in reply. "The Standard Oil Company is very strong in our state," he added. "No Senator has been elected from Pennsylvania in years in which the voice of the Standard Oil Company was not potent."

"When I received specific information from Mr. Flinn that they had sent me Mr. Knox, I was through," said Flinn.

Senator Oliver said Flinn's declaration did not include all his contributions for local offices and members of the Legislature, and the Senator wanted to know the total.

"Does the committee want to know," demanded Flinn, "how much money I spent for all political purposes this year?"

"Yes," said Senator Clapp. "All right," exclaimed the witness, and turning to his lawyer and associates he said:

"Where are the papers?" At this point a recess was taken. Treasurer Hooker, of the Roosevelt Progressive party, said that he had acted informally as National treasurer of the Roosevelt organization in the pre-convention campaign. He placed in evidence a statement of all receipts and expenditures in the Roosevelt primary campaign in New York City.

"The Secretary of State of New York," said Hooker, "said this was the most complete statement ever filed by a political committee."

The statement was made public at the time it was filed. It showed \$59,125.35 had been contributed and \$32,904.25 spent in the primary campaign in New York. The balance, \$26,221.10, was turned over to the National primary campaign.

Hooker also filed a statement of receipts and expenditures of the National primary campaign conducted by Senator Dixon. Senator Paynter took the statement and announced that George W. Perkins was shown to have contributed \$15,000 to the New York campaign and \$25,000 to the National campaign, and Frank A. Munsey "about the same."

"How many votes did you get in the New York primaries?" asked Senator Pomerene.

"About 20,000—as many as Taft got," said Hooker, "but they were not counted."

Senator Pomerene observed that the primary expenditure was at the rate of "about \$2 a vote."

Hooker vigorously resented any insinuation that any money was expended in an improper way.

"I believe that this National primary campaign was the most economical ever conducted," he said. "More economical than any except the Taft primary campaign in New York this fall."

C. R. Crane Double Contributor. The amounts sent to the various state campaign committees were as follows: Massachusetts, \$52,000; Maryland, \$5000; Maine, \$3500; Vermont, \$2500; Illinois, \$13,500; Oklahoma, \$2500; recount in Massachusetts, \$475; in Vermont, \$94.

Senator Clapp asked whether Hooker had any further information to give the committee.

"Yes, I know of one \$70,000 contribution to Senator La Follette's campaign fund," he said.

"Who gave it?" asked Senator Clapp. "Charles R. Crane. I also know that he gave the same amount to Governor Wilson's fund. Mr. Crane himself told me," said the witness, "that he was making these contributions at the same time."

Hooker said Crane "was a very public-spirited citizen, and was helping both men on in the work he was in sympathy with. He was helping both men because he believed they were great men. He said he had talked with Crane at the Chicago Club in March or April."

"Tell me what he said," demanded Senator Pomerene.

"He said that he had already given \$70,000, and was contributing \$4000 a week to keep the campaign going," replied the witness. "He said it was very expensive."

PORTRAIT IS UNVEILED

WILLAMETTE UNIVERSITY HAS IMPORTANT CEREMONY.

Splendid Work of Institution Is Subject of Comment by Speakers Present.

WILLAMETTE UNIVERSITY, Salem, Or., Oct. 1.—(Special.)—This morning at 10 o'clock in Eaton Hall occurred the unveiling of the portrait of A. E. Eaton, of Union, Or.

All college work was suspended and in the presence of the university trustees and faculty, together with an immense gathering of students and townspeople, the gift was officially received by President Homan.

Those assisting in the exercises were: Dr. Benson, of the First Methodist Church, of Salem; Joseph Albert, president of the Salem Board of Trade; Judge Moreland, Vice-President Todd and President Homan.

Mr. Albert, in the course of a brief talk, reviewed the earlier history of Willamette, following it down to the present time, speaking of the splendid co-operation now existing, also that Salem people were beginning to realize that President Homan was becoming Salem's first citizen through his rapid advancement of Willamette.

Judge Moreland, representing Governor West, spoke of the great amount of good an institution with old Willamette's aims was doing for the State of Oregon and the whole Northwest.

President Homan stated that it was his plan to make a collection for Willamette of the portraits of the old Oregon pioneers, the first of which was that of Mr. Eaton. In the new Memorial Hall building, which will be located upon the campus, the coming Summer, an art gallery for this purpose will be erected. As the result of a motion on which every student voted in the affirmative a telegram was sent to Mr. Eaton, expressing the thanks and appreciation of the entire undergraduate body for his splendid gift.

OIL BUSINESS NOT CHANGED BY ORDER

Standard Methods Shown to Be Same in Indiana as Before Dissolution.

ARCHBOLD TO BE CALLED

Officers of Corporation Deny That Directors of Old Company Have Connection With New or That Agreements Exist.

CHICAGO, Oct. 1.—The Standard Oil Company of Indiana still buys its crude oil from the Prairie Oil & Gas Company and the Ohio Oil Company, and ships its refined product in cars of the Union Tank Line, both former subsidiary corporations of the Standard Oil Company of New Jersey, the same as before the separation of the corporations by order of the United States Supreme Court. Such was evidence brought out today at the hearing here in the light waged by H. Clay Pierce against stockholders of the Standard Oil Company for control of the Waters-Pierce Oil Company. The hearing will be resumed at New York Thursday. John D. Archbold, vice-president of the corporation, will be called as a witness before the conclusion of the hearing in New York.

No New Stations Established. It was brought out by witnesses that the company since its separation from the parent corporation has not established any new stations in territory outside the states previously covered by the Indiana concern.

President Cowan, of the Standard Oil Company of Indiana, denied, however, that John D. Archbold or other directors of the old corporation have had any connection with the management of the Indiana corporation since the order of dissolution.

President Cowan explained that the \$25,000,000 stock dividend distributed after the reorganization of the company represented property owned by the corporation, and was made after the capital stock had been increased from \$1,000,000 to \$25,000,000.

Crude Oil Price Increases. L. J. Drake, vice-president of the Standard Oil Company of Indiana, said he was in charge of the marketing of the company's product, and that there was no agreement or understanding in regard to the prices or territory with any of the former subsidiary corporations of the Standard Oil Company of New Jersey.

W. M. Burton, in charge of the manufacturing branch of the business of the Indiana company, said the price of crude oil had increased 35 cents a barrel since the distribution of the company's stock last December.

SENATOR ASSAILS T. R.

STONE, OF MISSOURI, TALKS FOR WILSON IN IDAHO.

Bull Moose Leader Branded as "Facilitated by Stars" and of "Revolutionary Policies."

BOISE, Idaho, Oct. 1.—(Special.)—Directing his attack against Colonel Theodore Roosevelt through the company he keeps with representatives of the Harvester and Steel trusts, Senator William Joel Stone, of Missouri, branded the leader of the Bull Moose party and his followers as facilitated by the stars, and advocating revolutionary policies. He said he had talked with Theodore Roosevelt here tonight before a large audience. Senator Stone fired the opening gun of the Democratic National campaign in Idaho.

Missouri's brilliant Senator was not abusive in his attack on either Taft or Roosevelt, but he scored both and made a strong plea for support in behalf of Woodrow Wilson. He praised La Follette for his denunciation of Roosevelt.

"I was in the United States Senate when Senator La Follette reviewed Roosevelt's trust record while he was President, showing that there were mighty few trust prosecutions. Yet, Roosevelt, who is now railing at the trusts, is being supported by such gigantic corporations as the Harvester and Steel combinations, representing millions of dollars and has men behind him like Rockefeller, the head of the biggest trust of them all."

"The policy was a rational one to stand pat and let good enough alone, the Roosevelt policy is to revolutionize everything and anything and the Wilson policy is plain conservative progressiveness. He said he would go back to the Woodrow Wilson campaign managers confident that the word from Idaho will be the election of the Wilson Presidential Electors, a United States Senator to succeed Senator Borah, two Congressmen and a Democratic Governor."

WIFE NO. 2 STARTS SUIT

Lawrence B. Rich Misrepresented Himself, Declares Spouse.

GRANTS PASS, Or., Oct. 1.—(Special.)—Jessie Layton, wife No. 2 of Lawrence B. Rich, who is confined in jail at this place, has started proceedings for a divorce. She alleges in her complaint that Rich fraudulently and wrongfully represented to her that he was an unmarried man, when in fact he had a wife. Papers were served upon Rich in the county jail.

GRAND JURY IGNORES VICE

West Hammond Young Woman's Efforts Are of No Avail.

CHICAGO, Oct. 1.—Despite testimony by Miss Virginia Brooks, the West Hammond "Joan of Arc," the Cook County grand jury adjourned today without voting indictments as the result of its vice investigations.

It also refused to take cognizance of the report that a member of the staff of the state's attorney had attempted to prevent the vice investigation.
