

ELI WHITE MINERS WILL CEASE WORK

Strike Is Complete, So Companies Prepare for All-Winter Shutdown.

MORE THAN 4000 ARE IDLE

Smeltermen to Be Paid Off and Camp to Be Deserted—Moyer Declares Tieup May Be Extended to South.

ELY, Nev., Oct. 3.—The strike of the miners here is complete and the indications tonight are that the operators will not attempt to open their mines again this winter. The windows of all of the company buildings are being boarded up and hundreds of men were preparing tonight to depart for the morning. The ore supply at the Steptoe mill will be exhausted tomorrow and the plant will close.

Not a saloon in Ely was open today and there is no disorder in the camp. The miners were paid off today, the smeltermen will receive their pay tomorrow, and it is expected that by night a majority of the miners will have deserted the camp. With the closing of the mills tomorrow more than 4000 men will be idle.

Charles H. Moyer, president of the Western Federation of Miners, in a statement tonight, said that the strike could have been averted had the mining operators consented to meet with the union leaders.

No attempts have been made to resume work or any negotiations have been started to bring about a settlement.

President Moyer said he had the situation well in hand and did not wish to extend the tieup into the Arizona and New Mexico properties, but that he would do so if necessary to secure the recognition of the union and the increase of 50 cents a day demanded by the Ely miners and those of Bingham.

JACKLING'S PLANS UNDECIDED

Manager Says Company Never Will Recognize Union.

SALT LAKE CITY, Oct. 2.—D. C. Jackling, general manager of the Utah Copper Company at Bingham, Utah, and also in control of the operation of the Nevada Consolidated Copper Company at Ely, Nev., where the miners' steam shovel men and mine mechanics struck today, said that his company had not decided on its future action at the latter place.

"We shall wait for developments," said Mr. Jackling, "and be guided by them. The strike at Ely was brought on in order to force us to accede to the demands of the miners at Bingham. Recognition of the Western Federation of Miners is what the strike leaders really want, but although we always are willing to deal with our men as employees, we shall never recognize their organization."

Rumors that stock manipulators were behind the strike movement have no foundation in fact, Mr. Jackling said.

tion to their contributions to the New York fund.

Senator Dixon said he would tell anything he could about the Roosevelt funds; but he insisted that the committee show as much activity toward other candidates as it had toward Colonel Roosevelt.

Attempts of Senator Pomerene to get the names of informants brought on a bitter exchange in which "Senator Pomerene" was abandoned. Twice Senator Pomerene appealed to Chairman Clapp to compel Senator Dixon to give names of men who had contributed to the fund. Senator Dixon said that he had stated was "common rumor," and that he had received much of his information from Roosevelt's close friends.

"I can't tell these things in detail, and you know that when you ask the questions," he added.

After Senator Dixon had admitted he did know what arrangements the committee had made in investigating the funds of other candidates, Senator Pomerene charged the Roosevelt manager with attempting to "slander the committee."

Senator Dixon's reference to campaign activities for Governor Harmon, whom Senator Pomerene had supported, intensified the feeling between the two men. When Senator Dixon demanded of Senator Pomerene whether Governor Harmon had made a public statement of his expenditures, the Ohio Senator half rose, grasped the arm of his chair, glared at the witness and said:

"If you'll step outside I'll answer that."

The committee probably will hear tomorrow, in addition to J. P. Morgan, Charles H. Moyer, who was assistant treasurer of the Republican committee in 1904.

Representative Weeks, of Massachusetts, was questioned as to campaign contributions by New England industries in 1905, previous to the tariff revision of 1906. He said he knew nothing of a reported conference in Boston in 1908 between Speaker Cannon, Representative McKinley, of Illinois, and representatives of textile industries of the state, at which the impending tariff revision was said to have been discussed.

Corporate Contributions Listed.

Sheldon, when he took the stand, was asked what knowledge he had acquired from Mr. Bliss concerning the campaign funds of 1904.

"When I took charge of the treasury in 1905 Mr. Bliss handed me a list of large contributors of 1904," said Sheldon.

"What percentage was contributed by corporations?"

"To be frank, 75 per cent."

"Was any contribution made by the Standard Oil Company?"

"I'll answer in my own way," retorted Dixon. "In the Massachusetts campaign, the Taft people had the backing of every railroad, every trolley line, every big bank, every newspaper."

"Are you going to answer my question?" interrupted Mr. Pomerene.

A vigorous exchange followed in the course of which Mr. Pomerene again and again endeavored to pin the witness.

HAMMERLING MAKES DENIAL

Head of Foreign Language Papers Says Trusts Did Not Buy Space.

NEW YORK, Oct. 2.—Louis N. Hammerling, president of the American Association of Foreign Language Newspapers, denied tonight Senator Dixon's statement that the Standard Oil Company and the American Tobacco Company had bought space to be used in support of the Republican ticket in any paper belonging to the Association of Foreign Language Newspapers.

"The space used by the Republican party for campaign purposes has in every case been paid for by the Republican National Committee," Mr. Hammerling said. "Neither the Standard Oil Company nor the American Tobacco Company ever used a line of our papers for political purposes. In politics our agency is Republican and handles only Republican advertisements, but we have never tried to prevent any paper belonging to the association from accepting any political advertisement it sees fit."

WILSON DOUBTS DONATION

Governor Says He Never Heard of Crane Contribution to Fund.

PRINCETON, N. J., Oct. 2.—Governor Wilson denied today knowledge of a \$75,000 contribution to his campaign fund by Charles R. Crane, of Chicago, when the report of the evidence before the Clapp committee yesterday was shown to him.

"It can't be true," said the Governor. "or I would have heard of it. I know what the total contributions are. I have seen the list and I know that Mr. Crane did not contribute at all to the pre-convention campaign fund."

JURY NOT YET OBTAINED

TRIAL OF "DYNAMITE PLOTS" PROCEEDS SLOWLY.

Prosecution's Opening Statement

Will Declare Conspiracy Was Continued for Years.

INDIANAPOLIS, Oct. 2.—Thirty-four veniremen had been examined and 12 remained in the box still under consideration at the conclusion of today's examination for the selection of a jury to try the 15 men accused in the "dynamite plots." It was thought the jury might be completed tomorrow or Friday.

District Attorney Miller will open the case for the Government. His opening statement, already prepared, contains 800 typewritten pages and will cover the ground upon which the prosecution intends by testimony to sustain its charges that the dynamite conspiracy continued for five or six years; that Orlin E. McMann's confession of working in a "dynamiting crew" is corroborated by persons from many sections of the country; that the McMann case was not alone in financing and arranging for a widespread system of blowing up the works of employers of nonunion labor.

The reading of the Government's opening statement will occupy several days. The defense has not yet indicated whether it will present an opening statement.

Most of the veniremen were excused today because they said they had convictions that the defendants were guilty, which it would take evidence to remove.

T. R. WINS STRAW BALLOT

Spokane's Fair Visitors Let Wilson Run Second.

SPOKANE, Wash., Oct. 2.—(Special.)—Roosevelt led in the straw ballot here tonight. At 3 P. M. the figures were: Taft, 2539; Roosevelt, 2582; Wilson, 2445. CHINA TO BE ASKED TO PAY OLD DEBTS

WASHINGTON, Oct. 2.—Governor Wilson was told tonight that Alton B. Parker had been selected as permanent chairman of the New York State convention at Syracuse. He made no comment, but when that portion of Mr. Parker's speech in which the New York man said he was a "progressive" was read to him, the Governor smiled.

The Governor knew of developments at Syracuse only through the newspapers, though Dudley Field Malone, a son-in-law of Senator O'Grady and a member of the Governor's party, received some telegrams indicating the trend of the convention. The Governor was tired when he started this afternoon for a two weeks' invasion of the West.

The Western invasion by Governor Wilson was a surprise. He will speak in Indiana, Illinois, Nebraska, Colorado, Kansas, Missouri and Ohio. Tomorrow the Governor will speak at the Conservation Congress in Indianapolis.

RANCH MANAGER KILLED

ANOTHER LIFE CHARGED TO MEXICAN REBELS.

Ambassador Reports Murder and Is Given Usual Assurances of Prompt Action.

MEXICO CITY, Oct. 2.—Hubert L. Russell, manager of the San Justo ranch in Durango, which is the property of Allen C. McCaughan, the American Vice-Consul at that place, was murdered last night by the rebels. Consul Theodore C. Hamm reported the tragedy to the American Embassy here in a cipher telegram, which an error in transmission was first given out by the embassy officials as involving the killing of McCaughan and Cliff, another American of Durango.

Ambassador Wilson immediately made representations to the Government and today received assurances of prompt action.

Mr. McCaughan was a native of Des Moines, Ia., where he had practiced law. For the last 15 years he had been in the ranching and mining business near Durango. He was appointed September 11. He leaves a widow and three children.

Officials of the Mexican Embassy expressed much concern and have asked their foreign offices for advice.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 2.—Allan C. McCaughan was appointed Vice-Consul at Durango less than a month ago, in fact his name had not yet been entered upon the State Department records. He was appointed from Iowa and had been in his office but a few days.

PEACE NEGOTIATIONS ARE ON

Mexican Government Openly Seeking Terms With Zapata.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 2.—The Mexican government is apparently making no secret of the fact that it is negotiating with Zapata for peace, according to reports to the State Department. The strong representations made to the Mexican government by Ambassador Palmer at the residence of President Taft, is said to be having a powerful effect on the Madero government.

It is believed that if pending peace negotiations are not speedily successful the government will renew the war upon the rebels on a scale far more formidable and extensive.

INSANITY LAW REFORM WANTED.

ABERDEEN, Wash., Oct. 2.—(Special.)—Seeking reform in improvement in the law governing feeble-minded persons in this state, the Chehalis County Federation of Women's Clubs will shortly begin a state-wide campaign to have an amendment passed at this winter's session of the Legislature. The present law allows feeble-minded persons to leave the state schools when they reach majority.
