HAWTHORNE DRAW OVERHAULS EAST.—The operation of the Hawthorne-avenue bridge has now been worked down to such careful timing that it is not over one to one and one-half minutes that regular traffic is stopped, while the river drawmen are passing through the draw. James S. Hicks, one of the operators, says that it is only when a steamer or a tugboat is in tow or a heavily loaded steam or sailing vessel in tow passes that the lift is not lowered within this time, and even under these circumstances the time of traffic interference does not average more than two minutes.

EAST SIDE BUSINESS MEN TO MEET.

Ground has been broken for the structure on a site donated by the citizens of Gresham. The building will be 36x60 feet, and arranged largely on the suggestion of Miss M. A. Francis, home city librarian. The first floor will contain the general book depository, reading-room, office of librarian and other rooms. It will be an attractive building architecturally.

LAND RELEASE SOUGHT

AGRICULTURAL AREA REPORTED IN SIUSLAW FOREST.

Settlers Say Development of Ten-Mile District Is Retarded by Inclusion of Rich Acreage.

Settlers in the Siuslaw National forest in Oregon are preparing to make a vigorous protest against retaining as part of the forest about 1000 acres of what is declared to be excellent agricultural land near the headwaters of small streams in Lane and Lincoln Counties. The protest is to be taken up with the Forest Service officials in Washington, D. C., and efforts will be made to have experts examine the land to determine its adaptability to agriculture.

The land in question lies in townships 15 N. and 16 N. and ranges 11 W. of the Willamette meridian. It is situated in the vicinity of Saddle Mountain, Klickitat Mountain and Cummings Peak. Settlers who secured holdings in the county before the land was placed in the National forest assert that this action has resulted in the inability of the settlers to get roads, schools or other improvements which would come if the territory was open to settlement.

It is for the most part valley land, being made up of the country now known as the Ten Mile branch of Ten Mile Canyon about seven miles inland from the Pacific Ocean. There is no timber on the land and it is well watered by Ten Mile Creek. It is said that it is as good agricultural land as can be found anywhere in the state, including the Willamette Valley.

The settlers say they have taken the matter up with the Forest Service which has charge of the Siuslaw forest, but have been unable to get any relief owing to the fact that the forest rangers have been sent out to investigate and have reported that the land was better suited for other purposes than for agriculture. This, the settlers maintain, is unfair, inasmuch as the settlers who are in the district at present are raising all kinds of crops and are rapidly making good farms.

The hope of the settlers is to have the land opened to entry under the land laws so that the country will become a farming district. It is hoped a wagon road will be extended down Ten Mile Canyon to the coast, opening up an important agricultural and stock raising district. The land at present is covered with maple and alder brush, but has no timber.

IRISH TAKE ACTION

Home Rule Indorsed in Resolutions by Mass Meeting.

ULSTER'S STAND ASSAILED

J. Hennessy Murphy, Father Gallagher and Wallace McCamant Discuss Various Phases of Proposed Measure for Ireland.

Home rule for Ireland and its own Parliament for self-government is the answer that will be sent to Ulster from the Portland Irishmen, they expressed addresses delivered and resolutions adopted yesterday afternoon at the mass meeting held in Columbus Hall, Upper Albina. The meeting was in protest to the action taken in Belfast against the proposed home rule measure, and where armed resistance is threatened in case the home rule bill should become a law.

The speakers of the afternoon were J. Hennessy Murphy, who presided, Rev. Father Hugh Gallagher, of Columbia University, and Wallace McCamant. Father Gallagher reviewed the situation in Ireland and pointed out that there was absolutely no grounds for the contention that home rule meant extinction of religious liberty and the dominance of the Roman Catholic Church, and pointed out that Catholics and Protestants had worked side by side in the cause of human liberty.

Ulsterites Branded Agitators. "These agitators in Ulster," said Father Gallagher, "must give way. There have been no great supporters of freedom and religious independence than Irishmen themselves. Home rule will come in spite of the Ulster movement."

Mr. McCamant declared in his address that the Ulster movement is wrong and cannot prevail in preventing home rule and self-government for the Irish people. He condemned in strong terms the threat of armed resistance made by the Ulster people, and declared that the home rule bill itself is a guarantee of religious freedom. The Irishmen, he said, always believed in the blessings of religious liberty and accorded everyone the right to worship God according to the dictates of conscience.

Religious Liberty Not Threatened. "There is nothing in the home rule bill that threatens full religious liberty," said Mr. McCamant, "and the autonomy of the Irish people, of which the Irish people have labored for seven centuries will certainly come."

Mr. Murphy reviewed historically the struggle of Ireland for home rule, and declared that there is a strong bond of sympathy between American and the Irish people. At the close of his address the following resolution was adopted:

ALBINA TRACK OPPOSED

RIGHT ON STREET SET APART FOR HIGHWAY DESIRED.

Committee Will Report at Special Meeting Tonight When Solution May Be Suggested.

"We will never permit the construction of another wide-spread track on Goldsmith street in Lower Albina, as proposed by the Hancock-Street Land Company, for the reason that it will be on the street set apart for the Pacific Highway through the Peninsula across the interstate bridge," said J. H. Nolte, president of the North Portland Commercial Club, yesterday. This company has submitted a proposition to the people of Lower Albina to lay this spur from near the foot of Russell street, where it will connect with the O. W. R. & N. line, along Goldsmith and Larrabee streets to the Montgomery tract, for factory and warehouse purposes; and a committee which has been organizing the opposition will submit a report tonight at a general meeting to be held in Dania Hall, corner of Russell and Kerby streets.

Delegations will attend from the North Portland Commercial Club, North Albina Improvement Association, Overlook Improvement Club, besides the regular membership of the Lower Albina Push Club, under whose auspices the meeting will be held. Those outside the club will attend for the purpose of fighting the railroad spur. Blueprints and maps of the spur will be shown at this meeting.

Optimists in Lower Albina are divided on the proposition. Some heavy property owners oppose the spur, while others favor it, if the company can guarantee that the Montgomery tract will be covered with factories. This land is vacant and is not available for factory purposes or warehouses without a spur connecting with the main transportation lines. What the investigating committee will report is not known, except that it will be a strong one.

SANDY PAVING IS ORDERED

Property-Owners Will Fight Any Move to Delay Completion.

That the property-owners at the intersection of the Sandy boulevard and the O. W. R. & N. line will oppose the erection of a viaduct at this crossing and fight any new proceedings that may be proposed which may delay paving this crossing with the remainder of the boulevard, was the announcement made yesterday by G. E. Hamaker, chairman of the committee from the Rosebush-Hancock Street Improvement Club.

"I have in my possession," said Mr. Hamaker, "a letter from the City Engineer, received this week, in which he says that he has instructed the contracting firm to proceed with the paving of that part of the Sandy boulevard between East Thirty-seventh and East Thirty-eighth streets, the same as on the balance of the street. We will fight new proceedings, and if necessary, we are prepared to resist to the court, to prevent this great outrage being perpetrated."
