SULLIVAN'S GULCH BRIDGE TO BE OPENED SOON.—The International Contracting Company is finishing the erection of the re-inforced concrete bridge across Sullivan's Gulch on East Twenty-first street, and it will probably be opened about November 1. All concrete work on the main structure has been finished, but the wooden supports under the central portion, recently completed, are retained in place until the cement hardens sufficiently to make them safe. At present the surface of the new bridge out to Multnomah street is being paved. At the south side the two entrances from East Twenty-first and East Twentieth streets are being filled in and prepared for paving. A considerable fill is being made on East Twentieth street and it cannot be paved for the present, but the other entrance is on solid ground and can be paved at once. East Twentieth and East Twenty-first streets are to be paved to Sandy boulevard.

BRIDGE APPROACHES BEING PAVED.—Preparatory to laying pavements on the streets leading to and connecting with the East Side approaches to the O-W-R & N bridge, sewers are being laid and cement walks put down. Adams street, on which the Portland Railway, Light & Power Company has its connecting line with the bridge, is now ready for the hard-surface pavement. Oregon street, connecting directly with the approach, has been made a 70-foot street and preparations for moving houses back to the new street line are being made. Cement sidewalks also are being laid on Oregon street. Practically all the structural work on Union avenue and the bridge will be paved as a district.

SHELWOOD Y. M. C. A. TO REOPEN.—The Shelwood Y. M. C. A. will be reopened during the present month at a date yet to be fixed, if the present plans of the board of governors are carried out. A. N. Willis, one of the directors, said that arrangements are being made to hold a banquet in about two weeks at which time provisions will be made to reopen the building, which was closed last Spring. Speakers are to be selected who will appeal to the people of Shelwood to come forward to the support of this branch. The building, which stands on Spokane avenue and East Fifteenth street, is complete for the purpose intended and represents an expenditure of nearly \$17,000.

OSWEGO GRANGE TO HOLD ANNUAL FAIR.—The annual district fair of Oswego Grange will be held in the hall at Oswego next Saturday. There will be displays of horticultural products, vegetables and a specialty will be made of cooking, including bread making. At 2 P. M. a literary programme will be rendered. C. Borland, J. W. Stone and Mrs. Florence Dickinson are the committee of arrangements, and they are assisted by several subcommittees. Mr. Borland and Mr. Stone have charge of the fruit and vegetable displays and Mrs. Dickinson is looking after the programme and cooking department. Oswego Grange invites its friends to attend.

IMPROVEMENT BONDS SOLD.—A total of \$125,096.17 in 6 per cent ten year improvement bonds were sold yesterday to the city by the Finance and Bond Committee of the City Council. Mayor Ruessliht bid at par for \$119,000 of the bonds for the sinking fund and \$6,096.17 for the city's general relief fund. Bids from local banks and brokers running as high as 2.50 above par were rejected much to the dissatisfaction of the Finance Committee.

PARKER SHOWN LENIENCY.—Abusive language, directed at one of the officers who were being sentenced to early release, cost John Parker, once an important factor in North End affairs, a fine of \$25 in Municipal Court yesterday, but because he afterward apologized and laid his conduct to desperation caused by the jail sentence, the mollified officer recommended that the payment of the fine be suspended. Parker has been twice convicted of vagrancy, by successive trials in Municipal and Circuit Court and now is taking an appeal to the State Supreme Court. He blamed Captain Riley for his predicament and asserted his anger in terms so strong that the officer in charge of the jail, who has reached the ears of the police that Sadie Parker, a notorious woman who consorts with the defendant, has threatened reprisals upon Parker's prosecutors if he is forced to serve time.

RILEY LECTURES TO BE GIVEN.—M. L. CABINETMAKER HURT.—WANDERS AWAY.—From the effects of a blow on the head, sustained in an elevator accident a little over a week ago, Roscoe Danvers, cabinetmaker employed by the Brunswick Balke Coldwater Company, wandered aimlessly from Wednesday until Sunday, and was restored to his senses yesterday, still unable to account for his movements. He told a number of conflicting stories as to where he had been in the interim. Danvers, after being confined to his house several days as the result of the accident, reported for work Wednesday and was sent out on a job, but failed to return. Danvers had to be appealed to for help in locating him.

WORK IS PROGRESSING.—Work is being pushed on the extension of Terwilliger boulevard from the terminal near the head of Hamilton avenue to its final northern terminal at the south end of Sixth street. The contracting company reported to the Park Department yesterday that the timber has been cleared from the entire course and the work of excavating for the highway is progressing rapidly. The company expects to have the work finished before the rainy season sets in so that the roadway can settle during the winter months ready for road surfacing next season. The contract for the work amounts to \$100,000.

ZION'S HEAD EXPECTED HERE.—Wilbur Glenn Voliva, general overseer of the Christian Catholic Apostolic Church in Zion, with headquarters in Zion City, Ill., is due to arrive in Portland at 7 A. M. tomorrow. Services will be conducted in the Gipsy Smith auditorium, tomorrow at 2 P. M. when the Zion leader will deliver an address urging the salvation of sinners and touching upon many of the vital public problems of the day—religion, politics, disease and the other traffic. Voliva is making a tour of the large cities of the West preaching the gospel as taught in Zion.

The aggregate loss is about \$5000, covered by insurance.

COIN BACK IS DEMAND.—Assertion is made by Gustave Schmidt in a complaint filed yesterday in Circuit Court that George W. Wheeler and M. H. King, by inducing him, by false representations as to earning ability and prospects of the concern, to invest \$1500 in the stock of the Auto Painting and Exchange Company, have obtained from him a sum of \$1500 which he now found out that he was grossly misled and wants the return of \$700 cash and the cancellation of a note for \$800 which he stated he executed in favor of Wheeler and King.

DAMAGES AWARDED FOR INJURY.—Verdict in an indictment of having the Bell's court against the Pantages Theater Company by Ernest R. Ringo was out to \$100 by Circuit Judge Gatens on appeal yesterday. Attorney Ringo about a year ago sustained injuries by falling into an open sidewalk excavation in front of the old Pantages Theater, now the Lyric, at Fourth and Stark streets. He sought to recover \$150.

NEW BILLS OPEN AT THE VAUDEVILLE HOUSES

ALMOST any one of a half dozen acts on the Empress bill this week might be classed as a headliner. Sifting the merits down it is probably that the play, "The Pool Room," is the real headliner of the bunch. This is a powerful moral skit, well staged and well played. It gives interesting glimpses of the underworld and the horrors of criminal life.

OF GREAT INTEREST in the story told by Edward Dorking, of London, England, of his experiences on the Steamship Titanic during the recent disaster. NATION'S AIDES HONORED

Trio En Route to Crater Lake on Inspection Meet Portland Men.

A luncheon was given yesterday at the Imperial Hotel by a number of Portland people in honor of Clement S. Ucker, chief clerk United States Department of the Interior; Frank Bond, chief clerk United States Land Office, Washington, D. C., and Captain Roberts, Engineer Corps, United States Army. These men are en route to Crater Lake for the purpose of inspecting and completing plans for the vast road system and improvements about to be commenced by the Government.

Captain Bond explained the system of control of the various parks, reservations and monuments owned and improved by the National Government. Captain Roberts outlined the road system to be constructed by the Government and the advice of an unknown general executive work of the park, all of which came under his personal direction.

HIGHWAY INTEREST KEEN

Major Bowby Says Proposed Route to the Sea Is Much Wanted.

Major H. L. Bowby, of the Pacific Highway Association, has returned from a trip over the proposed Pacific highway between Portland and Seattle, which trip was commissioned by the officers of the Columbia Highway Association to make.

Major Bowby is highly enthused over the possibilities of building a high-class commercial, scenic and tourist highway on the route selected, and he says in the project justifies activity in the several counties affected.

"I found the people in the communities along the route very much in earnest over the plan," he said in discussing the trip with Julius L. Meier, president of the association, yesterday. In St. Helens, Rainier, Goble and other points along the line, public meetings will be held to arouse further interest in the project. Invitations have been sent to Samuel Hill to attend these meetings and to give his popular and instructive illustrated lectures of road building.

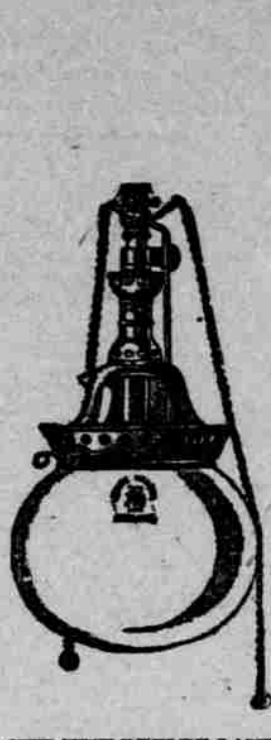
Elfers Sued for Personal Injuries.
