

GRANDFATHER FIGHT FOR CHILD

Mother, Accused of Kidnaping Own Babe, Pursued and Ordered Into Court.

DIVORCE DECREE MODIFIED

Woman Contends She Is Within Legal Rights, and With Help of New Husband Will Make Stubborn Contest.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 9.—(Special.)—After a race down the coast, with her father-in-law, J. A. Gore, a prominent real estate dealer of Seattle, in pursuit, bringing with her Herbert Hadlock, her 2½-year-old son by a former marriage, whom she kidnaped from his grandmother in a public street of the northern city ten days ago, Mrs. Grace Wren, of San Francisco, was today taken before Judge Sargent, in the Superior Court on a writ of habeas corpus for the restoration of the child.

Gore arrived here several days ago and, failing to recover the child, filed a complaint charging Mrs. Wren with kidnaping. Upon his affidavit he obtained a citation for the mother to produce the babe in court.

Mother Is Married Again.
Mrs. Wren is the wife of Detective Wren, employed by the Thiel Detective Agency. On April 25, 1911, she obtained a decree of divorce from Bert Hadlock, now a mining man in Alaska, for non-support. The decree gave the custody of the son to Mrs. Martha Gore, his maternal grandmother.

Mrs. Hadlock then came to San Francisco and a few months ago was married to Wren. Three weeks ago she went north to Seattle and there had the decree of divorce from Hadlock modified so as to give her sole custody of the boy. Hadlock, being in Alaska, made no contest and the grandfather and grandmother of the child were not notified, Gore says.

One week ago last Sunday, Mrs. Wren, apparently by accident, met Mrs. Martha Gore and the boy on the street in Seattle. There was an affectionate greeting between mother and son. Mrs. Gore was asked by Mrs. Wren for permission to take the boy for a short walk alone.

Child Spirited Away.
Not suspecting anything wrong, Mrs. Gore consented and Mrs. Wren, it is alleged, hurried away to Ballard, a suburb of Seattle, from where she took the boy on a train to San Francisco, bringing with her the child.

When Herbert did not return home before dark, the Seattle police were notified and instituted a search, with the result that they discovered Mrs. Wren had gone to San Francisco with her son.

Gore took the next train here and searched out Mrs. Wren. He demanded the return of the child. It was refused and the next move was the writ of habeas corpus.

Gore says that even the modified decree of the Seattle court directs that the child be not removed from the State of Washington.

Through their attorneys, Frank Powers and Frank J. Hennessy, Mrs. Wren and her husband contend that the Seattle decree gives her the right to have the child, regardless of her residence, and they are prepared to carry the case to the court of last resort.

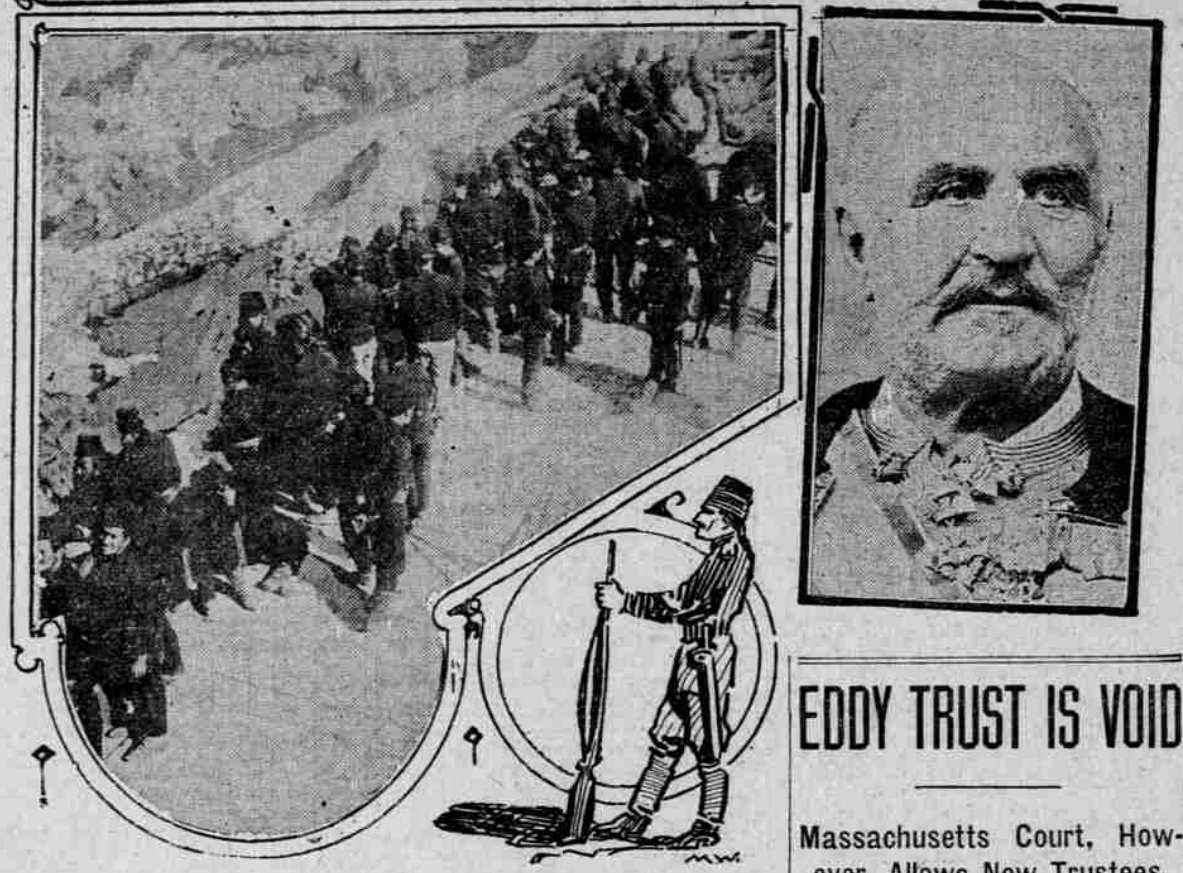

BATTLE IN PROGRESS

Montenegrins Attack Turkish Position; Enemy Retires.

TURKS LAND FROM LAKE

Preliminary to Opening of Hostilities King Surveys Position Amid Cheers of People; Band Plays as Cannon Booms.

The only suggestion thus far as to its possible tenor is found in the remark of the Bulgarian foreign minister, who said that the powers were delivered, "perhaps it would have had a better chance of success if presented a fortnight earlier."

Bulgaria's hesitation is variously interpreted. Most of the diplomats think it is a device to gain time to complete war preparations, but a shrewd minority has not given up hope that the accord of the powers is such that even if war breaks out it is sure to be localized.

Airmen belonging to opposing armies are likely soon to come into conflict for the first time in actual war for all Balkan states as well as Turkey have several expert airmen. They also possess considerable aerial equipment. Turkey recently acquired eight monoplanes in France, two in England and two in Germany, while others have been ordered by the Ottoman government in England and Germany. Bulgaria owns one monoplane and three biplanes and the War Department in Sofia has just ordered additional machines from Germany.

The Greek war department possesses six French biplanes and one hydro-aeroplane. The Serbian army does not own any machines, but several of its officers are flying men.

GENERAL WAR BELIEVED ON

Diplomats and Press of Germany See No Other Hope.

BERLIN, Oct. 9.—A general war in the Balkans practically has been inaugurated in the opinion of both diplomatic circles and the press of Germany. At the foreign office it is thought the attitude of the Balkan peoples leaves only the barest hope that the measures taken by the powers will prove successful, as concessions made by the Balkan governments would threaten the security of the thrones of Bulgaria, Serbia, Montenegro and Greece. For this reason their governments dare not yield.

One of the leading Berlin banks received a telegram today from Belgrade saying that the declaration of war by Serbia would probably be delivered immediately. Serbian troops, it was said, were being rushed by forced marches to the frontier.

The Serbians and Turks already have come into contact, according to the report of a special correspondent. Another telegram from Belgrade says the reply of the Serbian premier, M. Pashitch, to the Austro-Russian representations was tantamount to rejection. He declared that the Montenegro declaration of war had created a new situation, which was decisive for Serbia's further action. The solidarity of the Balkan allies, he said, would be maintained at all costs and the popular feeling in Serbia was so strong it would not permit the government to depart from the course on which it had embarked.

There was almost a repetition of the

scenes which took place on Black Tuesday (October 1) on the Bourse today, under the conviction that a general war in the Balkans was inevitable. There was an all-round fall from two to eight points and the slump was checked only slightly just before the close.

EARLY RUMORS UNCONFIRMED

Balkan States Believed Acting Under Cover of Deference.

LONDON, Oct. 9.—Another day has elapsed without, so far as known, any extension of the Balkan war. The earlier rumors that Bulgaria and Serbia have declared war are not confirmed. None of the embassies or legations in London tonight had heard of any development since Montenegro made her hostile declaration against Turkey. It may be assumed that while making some show of deference towards the powers, the Balkan states are busily engaged in completing the concentration of their forces.

It is suggested that the Montenegrin advance on Borana, near the frontier, may indicate the intention of the country to effect junction with the Serbian army coming from the north. The Russian government has issued a denial of the reported mobilization of its army. Russia declares that all the reservists called upon for a test have been disbanded. It is understood that Germany will protect Turkish subjects in the Balkan states should war ensue.

NICHOLAS DENIES ARROGANCE

King of Montenegro Says War Is One to Prevent Extinction.

CETTINJE, Montenegro, Oct. 9.—King Nicholas has issued a proclamation summoning the Montenegrins to go immediately to the assistance of their brethren in Old Serbia, where, he declares, women and children are being massacred.

"Montenegro has hoped to secure the liberation of the Serbians in Turkey without the shedding of blood, but peaceful endeavors proved unavailing," continues the proclamation, "and no other recourse was left but to take up the sword."

"We are assured in this holy undertaking of the sympathy of the whole civilized world, and we will have the loyal assistance of the Kings of Serbia, Bulgaria and Greece, and their peoples, who have ranged themselves with the Montenegrins like brothers."

The proclamation concludes: "Montenegro is attacking Turkey not from motives of arrogance, but inspired by a noble resolve to prevent the final extermination of her brethren."

GREEKS IN OREGON RESTLESS

Call to March Eagerly Awaited by More Than 1000 Men.

More than 1000 Greeks in Oregon are restlessly awaiting the call to march to the front for Greece. Word has been received from the Balkan disturbances is expected momentarily. The volunteers, many of them ex-soldiers of Greece, are aroused by reports from the East and want to sail for Europe at once.

At a meeting in Portland Sunday night, the men agreed to defray their own expenses. John Glanopoulos and Louis Canellis, prominent members of the Portland Greek colony, estimate there are considerably more than 1000 drilled men available in Oregon.

EDDY TRUST IS VOID

Massachusetts Court, However, Allows New Trustees.

HEIRS' RIGHTS NOT LOST

Contention That Christian Science Teachings Are Contrary to Public Policy Is Dismissed. Limit Is Defined.

BOSTON, Oct. 9.—A trust estimated at \$2,000,000, created by the will of Mrs. Mary Baker Eddy, founder of the Christian Science Church, for the benefit of the denomination, was declared void by the Massachusetts Supreme Court today.

The court holds, however, that a charitable trust has been created and that new trustees may be appointed to administer it.

The trust was to have been administered by the directors of the mother church in Boston, but the court decided that the trust provisions were nullified under the statute limiting the amount of the income from bequests to religious organizations to \$2000 annually.

The court dismissed the bill brought by the contestants of the will, who alleged that the teachings of Christian Science were against public policy. The contestants have 30 days in which to bring additional evidence to support their claims.

The court holds that the action of the directors of the church in becoming a party to the suit gives George W. Glover, the son of Mrs. Eddy, and Ebenezer J. Foster-Eddy, her stepson, a standing, because it is possible the heirs may take the property. Their kinship is not regarded as extinguished by their so-called family settlement agreement.

GENERAL OROZCO FOUND

MEXICAN REBEL LEADER HAS 3000 MEN WITH HIM.

Insurgents Forbidden by Commander to Forge on Ranch of Federal General.

EL PASO, Tex., Oct. 9.—General Pascual Orozco, with 3000 men, was located today on the Blocker ranch, an American property, 90 miles southwest of the border below Del Rio, Tex.

Official advice says that he would not permit his men to forge on the ranch of General Trevino, the Federal commander, in the State of Nuevo Leon.

REBEL CHIEF SEEKS AMNESTY

Miguel Encisco With Remnants of His Former Band Offers to Quit.

CANANEA, Sonora, Oct. 9.—Miguel Encisco, a rebel chief leading 30 men, remnants of his former command, has sent word here that he wishes to surrender and accept the amnesty.

DOUGLAS, Ariz., Oct. 9.—Antonio Rojas, the rebel leader, has demanded the surrender of Moctezuma, south of this point. Two hundred and fifty Yaqui Indians were dispatched today by General Sanjines from Agua Prieta to engage him.

ORIGINAL DYNAMITE TELEGRAMS SOUGHT

Government Says It Holds Messages as Received, Ordering Explosions.

SINGLE TRACE IS FOUND

Munsey, of San Francisco, Declared to Have Notified J. J. McNamara "Patient Is Out of Danger and Will Get Well."

INDIANAPOLIS, Oct. 9.—Telegrams signed "Ping," alleged to have been the alias of Herbert S. Hockin, and sent to Orlie E. McNamagal, directing where to "drop" dynamite bombs on his trips about the country, were sought by the Government through the examination of the first witness called in the trial of the accused "dynamite plotters" today.

Managers of the telegraph offices in Buffalo, Detroit, Toledo, Chicago, Cincinnati, Indianapolis, Evansville, Ind., and Salt Lake City testified. With one exception they said the originals of telegrams asked for by the Government covering a period as far back as 1908 had been destroyed in the ordinary course of business.

Trace of "Flying Squadron" Sought.
The Government asserted it had possession of the telegrams as received and it called the witness to show why the original messages sent cannot be produced. It was during this period that McNamagal and the McNamaras formed the "flying squadron of dynamiters," the Government charges, often sending McNamagal out alone and equipped him with a suitcase filled with explosives to await by telegraph as to when he should blow up.

When James W. Noel, one of the counsel for the Government asked why the telegrams were not produced, Senator Kern, counsel for the defendants, asked the witness: "You don't know that any such telegrams ever existed, do you?" The witnesses replied they could not remember individual messages.

Salt Lake Telegram Produced.
The telegrams, Mr. Noel said, often were sent by Hockin, now acting secretary-treasurer of the International Association of Bridge and Structural Iron Workers, and at present on trial, to McNamagal's home in Chicago. They shifted him at times, the attorney said, from Chicago to St. Louis, from Cincinnati to Indianapolis and from Chicago to Holyoke, Mass.

H. A. Knight, manager of a telegraph office at Salt Lake City, was the first witness to produce a telegram. The telegram was dated October 10, 1910, and was purported to have been signed by J. E. Munsey, known as "Jack Bright," one of the defendants. According to the Government's charges, J. E. McNamagal, after blowing up the Los Angeles Times building on October 1, 1910, hid for two weeks in places secured by Munsey, J. J. McNamara, the secretary of the Ironworkers' headquarters in Indianapolis, was anxious about his brother after the Los Angeles explosion.

The telegram as identified by Knight and by Mrs. Charles McCarthy, who was the counter clerk at Salt Lake City, follows: "J. J. McNamara, Indianapolis—Everything is O. K. Glad to hear you. Patient is out of danger and will get well. He is improving right along. You can depend on me to handle matters carefully. Will wire you if there is any change. "325 Southwest Temple street."

San Francisco Man Accused.
It would be shown, the Government said, that the "C" referred to was E. A. Clancy, of San Francisco, on trial here, who had been in Boston when the Times disaster occurred and who was about to start on a sailing trip with Michael J. Young, of Boston, also a defendant, but news of the loss of life at Los Angeles induced Clancy to change his mind and after sending a telegram to San Francisco to "clean out the office" he decided to hurry West.

The examination of telegraph managers has not been concluded when court adjourned until tomorrow.

M. C. Tiff, of Minneapolis, counsel for Fred Mooney, of Duluth, Minn., and Charles N.
