

RICH STOCK BROKER IS HELD BY REBELS

John T. Cameron, of El Paso, Kidnaped After Holdup of Mexican Train.

MOTIVE MAY BE RANSOM

Federal Troops Remain in Larger Towns, Offering No Protection to Railways—Commander of District Is Recalled.

EL PASO, Tex., Oct. 13.—Rebels late today held up a passenger train 150 miles south of this point on the border, rifled the mail and express cars and kidnaped John T. Cameron, a wealthy stock broker of El Paso. The train was allowed to proceed south.

Cameron was on his way to buy cattle to be imported into the United States. It is believed he either is held for ransom or to prevent further stock shipments from districts held by rebels. A Mexican passenger also was held by the rebels, who molested no others, according to the report.

Opening of the Mexico Northwestern Railway after a lapse of traffic for a week, caused by destruction of the road by rebels, makes known large recent losses by the company. Aside from the destruction of many trestles on the line, a train of 24 cars of choice lumber destined for sale in the United States was burned. The loss of the lumber train is estimated at more than \$20,000.

Federal troops continue to offer no protection to the railway, remaining in the larger towns, say passengers arriving here. Since no significance is attached to the departure to the state capital of General Antonio Rabago, commander of the district. It is understood he has been recalled to Mexico City.

Fresh troops not of his command are on the way from the City of Chihuahua to replace Rabago's troops.

FLIBUSTER TELLS OF PLOT

Employee of Madero Says He Was Hired to Destroy Railroad.

EL PASO, Tex., Oct. 13.—E. L. Charpentier, a filibuster formerly engaged in the Madero revolution, testified today before the Senate committee that he and two other Americans had been employed by "Mexican government officials" here to destroy railway communication in Mexico south of this point. He testified that the agreement was made in the Mexican consulate at El Paso. Charpentier is confined in jail here on charges resulting from the expedition, which proved a failure. His associates corroborated his testimony.

The committee investigating Mexican affairs has taken a recess until after the National election, when the local investigations will be continued under Senator William Alden Smith, the chairman.

WILSON'S CAUSE PLEADED

Senator Chamberlain Speaks on Campaign at Medford.

MEDFORD, Or., Oct. 13.—(Special.)—Senator George Chamberlain spoke in favor of Woodrow Wilson at the Medford tonight, basing his argument mainly on the contention that Taft had not made good and Roosevelt was not to be trusted. He reviewed the Payne-Aldrich bill, the veto of the tariff bills and the contributions of big interests to the Republican party in 1904 and in 1908.

Senator Chamberlain explained Governor Wilson's failure to revoke the charter of the big corporations of New Jersey on the ground that he was handicapped by a Republican Legislature and asked what could be expected of Wilson in two years, when Roosevelt had done nothing at all to curb the trusts in his seven years at the White House.

A large crowd listened patiently and applauded the speaker loudly whenever Wilson's name was mentioned. After the speech an informal reception was held at the University Club.

SPOKANE HAS LEPER EXILE

Antonio Volcano Is Separated From Family and Civilization.

SPOKANE, Wash., Oct. 13.—(Special.)—In an isolated house, surrounded by a fence, every few feet on which appear notices warning the public away, Antonio Volcano, leper, has taken up his forced exile from friends, family and civilization on the bank of the Spokane River, near the isolation hospital grounds, west of the city.

Although his confinement has now been of but a few days' duration the victim already feels the loneliness of his position and longs for a few minutes' conversation with the attendants from the nearby city hospital, who call three times a day and shove his food through the fence. The leper must himself keep his quarters clean and in order, for none may enter the premises.

Occasional visits of his family for a long distance conversation across the fence will be permitted by Health Officer Anderson.

12 WILL TALK SUFFRAGE

Medford Women in Autos Will Tour Two Counties.

MEDFORD, Or., Oct. 13.—(Special.)—Twelve Medford women, led by Mrs. J. F. Reddy and Miss Gladys Heard, will leave Wednesday on an automobile tour of Jackson and Douglas counties in the interest of woman suffrage.

Meetings will be held in Gold Hill, Rogue River, Central Point and Roseburg. At Roseburg the local delegation will meet a committee from Portland. Banners are being made to decorate the streets of the towns, and literature favoring woman suffrage will be distributed en route.

New School Overcrowded.

SPRINGFIELD, Or., Oct. 13.—(Special.)—The growth of Springfield during the past year is attested by the fact that the new schoolhouse, built last year, and which it was supposed would hold the school children for a number of years to come, is already badly crowded, and it will be necessary immediately to erect an additional room to take care of the overflow.

Fall May Prove Fatal.

SALEM, Or., Oct. 13.—(Special.)—John Watson, a painter, was probably fatally injured today, when a scaffold gave way under him and he fell to the ground, about 20 feet below. But little hope is held out for his recovery.

Reforms Under Direction of Powers Demanded.

SCUTARI IS REINFORCED

Turks Increase Garrison From 12,000 to 20,000 Men, Making Capture by Montenegrins exceedingly Difficult.

provocation for war or to show the Balkan allies that Turkey cannot be intimidated, the government is acting with an aggressiveness calculated to bring on hostilities. The embargo on Greek ships, the detention of Serbian ammunition and the seizure of Bulgarian railway cars, all constitute belligerent acts.

The government is determined to expel all Bulgarians and Greek subjects as soon as war is declared, and these will be transported by steamers detained for that purpose. Trouble is probable over the seizure, as most of the vessels are foreign owned, though the vessels flew the Greek flag and the owners will claim damages.

The government is requisitioning the horses owned by foreign residents, except diplomatic representatives. The various embassies have protested and notified the ports that compensation will be claimed.

Several Turkish women are going to the front to attend the wounded. This will mark the beginning of a new era for the race.

A consular telegram reports the killing of 12 Bulgarians at Kuprili, in Macedonia, by Turkish soldiers. Massacres in Macedonia will be an inevitable feature of the war, but it is asserted here the Turks will not begin them.

Late advices say fighting continues around Berana. The Montenegrins advancing toward Gusinje, Plava and Arana, on the southeastern frontier, are encountering much resistance and losing heavily.

Severe fighting has occurred at Tuzhi, where the Turks are displaying great bravery. It is reported that the Turkish forces in the country between Lake Scutari and the sea have stopped the advance of the Montenegrins. It is announced that the ports intend to purchase the foreign cargoes aboard the detained Greek steamers.

A dispatch from Scutari, of current date, reports that the Montenegrins have burned the musliman village of Kranja, several children perishing in the flames. The fighting in that neighborhood is visible from Scutari.

The ports will reply to the collective note of the powers tomorrow.

ONE OF CHIEF TOWNS TAKEN

Montenegrins Get Firm Foothold by Capturing Bylopolje.

PODGORITZA, Montenegro, Oct. 13.—The Northern Montenegrin army under General Vukovitch, which recently crossed the border into the Sanjak of Novibazar, gained a firm foothold last night by capturing Bylopolje, one of the chief towns of the province. Bylopolje fell after prolonged fighting, but no information has been received regarding the losses. The Montenegrins have set up a provisional government. The Serb inhabitants of Bylopolje welcomed the Montenegrins as liberators from the Turkish yoke. A church service was held and prayers were offered for the Montenegrin king.

BULGARIA'S REPLY—MODERATE

Information Asked as to Exact Meaning of Clause.

SOFIA, Bulgaria, Oct. 13.—Bulgaria's reply to the Russo-Austrian note was presented tonight to the diplomatic representatives. This note and one addressed to Turkey are couched in moderate terms. The Bulgarian government says it is most desirous of doing nothing that will aggravate the precarious situation and is desirous of leaving open every avenue for the

maintenance of peace until the last possible moment.

The reply points out that the wording of one of the most important clauses of the powers' note is not clear and as Bulgaria desires to avoid all misunderstanding asks the powers to state precisely what the doubtful clause means.

In conclusion, the note declares the delay has been due to the fact that the note of the powers was addressed to all the Balkan states and that therefore time was necessary for a discussion of its contents by the states.

Most of the Bulgarian towns have a deserted appearance. Only old men, boys and women are to be seen. Virtually all business has been suspended.

TAFT FORCES ORGANIZE

TILLAMOOK REPUBLICANS IN ROUSING MEETING.

La Follette, Borah and Hadley Are Commended for Remaining With the Party.

TILLAMOOK, Or., Oct. 13.—(Special.)—There was a rousing meeting of friends of the Republican party and of President Taft in this city Saturday afternoon. The meeting was called to order by Fred C. Baker, congressional committeeman.

Among those who attended this meeting were W. D. Stillwell, John Johnson, Jacob Blum and J. H. Johnson, all of whom voted for Lincoln and have always lined up with the Republican party. A permanent organization having been effected, W. D. Stillwell was elected president; Morrison Mills, vice-president; and Fred C. Baker, secretary-treasurer, with one voter from each precinct to form an advisory committee.

The committee on resolutions made the following report, which was unanimously adopted:

"We affirm our allegiance to the sound principles of the Republican party, under whose administration unparalleled prosperity has abounded throughout the Nation, and whose policy of peace and growth, most marked in history.

"We endorse the National Republican platform and the principles therein set forth as being progressive and as the best declaration of policy any party such as ours has ever made.

"We commend the Administration of President Taft, whose unflinching adherence to duty has enabled him to accomplish more practical reforms and secure more permanent laws than ever before. No President has been more maligned or more misrepresented than he, but his impartial history will accord to the Administration of William Howard Taft the credit of having been one of the very best since the founding of the Republic. Safe, reliable and trustworthy in the discharge of his duties, his re-election will insure continued prosperity and advancement along safe and sound lines.

"We approve the course pursued by Honorable Robert M. La Follette, Senator Borah, Governor Hadley and other distinguished Republicans, who have remained with the party, believing with them that needed reforms can best be accomplished through and within the party whose history convincingly shows that it has always been the champion of the people's interest of the people. As the foremost and most consistent defender of the rights of the people, we believe that the course of Honorable Robert M. La Follette, following defeat for nomination, should commend itself to all honest men."

COOS SEEKS GOOD ROADS

Men Want to Bond County for Huge Sum to Build Concrete Highway.

MARSHFIELD, Or., Oct. 13.—(Special.)—At a meeting of representatives of all of the commercial bodies of the county it was decided that if laws passed at the next election would permit, Coos County would bond herself for \$2,000,000 for the purpose of making good roads and building a permanent highway with concrete foundation from the ocean to the Douglas County line. In such event Douglas County would be expected to do the same, so there would be a hard-surfaced road from Coos Bay to Roseburg. A permanent organization was formed and another meeting will be held next week at Coquille to further the movement and perfect details.

Blethen Chimes Being Installed.

UNIVERSITY OF WASHINGTON, Seattle, Oct. 13.—(Special.)—The new Blethen chimes have arrived on the campus and the work of installing them was begun yesterday. A tower has been built on the highest point on the campus to receive the gift. The chimes cost about \$10,000 and were a Christmas gift to the university last Christmas.

GREEKS QUIT WORKS

War in Balkans Threatens to Depopulate "Steel City."

HUNDREDS TO LEAVE GARY

Servians, Montenegrins, Bulgarians and Macedonians Decide to Return to Native Lands to Help Fight Against Turks.

CHICAGO, Oct. 13.—(Special.)—Grave fears are expressed by Gary, Ind., officials that the "Steel City" will be depopulated unless something happens soon that will stop the war in the Balkans. The great steel mills, piled to the limit with orders, are being badly crippled.

Within the last week many Servians, Montenegrins, Greeks and Bulgarians have departed to join the allied army, and today 400 Macedonians announced that they would cast their lot with Bulgaria in fighting the Turk.

Macedonians Are Exiles.

The Macedonians, for the greater part, are outlaws from their native land, and they are entering the conflict in hopes of whipping the Turkish oppressor and regaining the right to return to their homes.

Their message, volunteering service, was received at a mass meeting of 300 Bulgarians this afternoon. It was one of several from many cities of Northern Illinois and from neighboring states.

M. P. Kaloudoff, president of the Bulgarian Society, also received a telegram from Sofia, capital of Bulgaria, in which the Bulgarian government asked all countrymen in America to prepare for war and to respond immediately if possible.

Cheers were given when a dozen men stepped to the platform and signed enlistment papers. Then a collection was taken for the war fund. For nearly two hours speakers harangued the gathering, urging Bulgarians to respond and saying that the country needs men more than money.

Men To Be Sent to Front.

Young Greeks held their regular daily drill in their hall at Blue Island avenue and Polk street, and this week plan sending their second body of 300 soldiers to the front. The first group left last week.

More than 400 Greeks from Milwaukee, about one-third of them in uniform, arrived tonight at the Young Greeks' Hall. They will leave tomorrow for the East and board war transports in New York. They marched to the hall from Union station tonight, and many of them who could not be given quarters by the Chicago association spread their blankets and slept on the floor.

Astoria Greeks Volunteer.

ASTORIA, Or., Oct. 13.—(Special.)—A mass meeting of the Greeks residing in Astoria was held here this afternoon and 110 of them agreed to leave for home as soon as they are notified they are wanted for the war. A purse of \$3000 was raised to pay transportation of the party as far as New York. The Greek Consul at New York was informed of their decision.

DENECEY SAYS T.R. PERVERTS FACTS

Roosevelt Declared to Have Forgotten Lorimer Once Was His Illinois Adviser.

QUOTATIONS ARE GARBLED

Illinois Governor, Who Voted to Sustain Colonel in California Cases, Says He Does Not Charge Fraud.

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., Oct. 13.—(Special.)—Governor Denecey, replying to the statement by Colonel Roosevelt, appearing in Sunday's paper, gave out a statement tonight in which he said: "The statement of Colonel Roosevelt is characteristic. He denies the facts which embarrass him and misstates and colors other facts in an attempt to justify his own conduct toward the Republicans of Illinois and myself."

"First—Regarding the 34 delegates, these are the facts: Governor Hadley introduced a resolution to take from the temporary roll the Taft delegates and substitute Roosevelt delegates in certain contested states. These numbered about 78 delegates, all told. Colonel Roosevelt sent for me and asked me to introduce a resolution limiting the number to the 34 from Washington, California, Arizona and Texas."

"I refused to do this without Governor Hadley's consent, because he had presented the motion and he and others had discussed it before the convention and my motion could not be submitted until after the debate had ended."

"I saw Governor Hadley and Governor Hadley himself wrote the resolution which I introduced in the presence of Senator Dixon, of Montana; Senator Borah, of Idaho, and myself. It will be noted that the motion of Governor Hadley was to strike from the temporary roll the Taft delegates and substitute Roosevelt delegates in their stead. My amendment provided that it should be right to a seat in the convention was questioned by Governor Hadley's motion should have a right to vote on the selection of a member of the committee on credentials or on its report."

"It will be noted that Colonel Roosevelt makes me responsible for Governor Hadley's motion and states that my motion charged that the Taft delegates were stolen. The resolution does not so state and there is no possibility of placing upon it such a construction."

Honest Difference Possible.

"Colonel Roosevelt in his statement says that the roll was called upon the California delegates 'simply because in this case the facts were uncontroverted and there was the slightest hope of persuading the convention to act decently in any case it would be in this case.'"

"I voted with the Roosevelt delegates upon the resolution to unseat the two California delegates. I do not think they were seated fairly. There was ground for an honest difference of opinion upon the merits of this case."

"In speaking of California, I may add that under its primary and election laws the Bull Moose party has been enabled to have its electors placed upon the Republican ticket and the Republican party has been prevented from placing its electors in the field, which disfranchises the Republicans of California. Colonel Roosevelt appears to be willing to accept the advantages of the Bull Moose party under such conditions made his campaign in California."

"On the general question of contested delegations, it may be remembered that Colonel Roosevelt 'cried wolf' and quoted the Scriptural injunction, 'Thou shalt not steal,' very vehemently regarding the selection of Southern delegations, long before the states with primary law had an opportunity to vote. He did this with apparent sincerity, but he receded in mathematical precision as he gained delegates in the primary states."

Garbled Quotations Used.

"Colonel Roosevelt went out of his way to injure me by garbled quotations in an effort to make it appear that I was an ally of Senator Lorimer. His statement is without truth or justification."

"Colonel Roosevelt has received fair treatment from the Republicans of Illinois, from its delegates to the National Convention and from myself. I voted with his friends on every motion that affected his candidacy up to the time he withdrew from the convention and did everything within my power to further his nomination, but because he failed and because I refused to desert the Republican party, I am subjected to unmerited abuse."

TOWNSHIP FORM WANTED

King County to Vote on Proposition to Change Present Plan.

SEATTLE, Wash., Oct. 13.—(Special.)—A proposition for a township form of district government was submitted to vote in King County at the November election as a result of the petition of 110 electors filed today. Should it carry it would then become the county commissioners' duty to survey the county, form such districts as would include in their boundaries not less than 25 electors, and turn over the taxing, road making and bonding functions for local purposes to township officers.

Under the township system a town meeting is held March of each year, at which time three supervisors, a treasurer, assessor, clerk, road supervisor, justice of the peace and constable are elected. The township may be bonded by a two-thirds vote for not to exceed five percent of its assessed valuation.
