

BECKER MAY NOT REPLY TO CHARGE

Contention That Evidence Is
Insufficient to Convict
May Be Made.

COUNSEL IS THREATENED

John McIntyre Says That Man Un-
known to Him Told Him That
He Would Be Killed if
Woman Was Called.

NEW YORK, Oct. 12.—The possibility that the case of ex-Police Lieutenant Charles Becker, on trial before Justice Goff for the alleged murder of Herman Rosenthal, will go to the jury without any defense having been presented by John P. McIntyre, Becker's counsel, was indicated in a statement made tonight by Mr. McIntyre.

"We may contend," he said, "that there is not enough evidence to warrant a conviction and go to the jury on the people's case. If at its conclusion the state's case is no stronger than it is at present I do not see that my client has much to answer for."

Motive May Be Shown.
Mrs. Herman Rosenthal, widow of the gambler who was slain July 16, is expected to be the principal witness tomorrow. Through Mrs. Rosenthal's sworn story the prosecutor hopes to convince the jury that Becker had a motive in ordering, as alleged, the killing of Rosenthal—this motive being that the gambler was about to furnish the county authorities with information that would link Becker with a system of levying graft.

Threats of intimidation against John P. McIntyre and against Giovanni Standish, who testified against the accused lieutenant, were told of tonight in statements.

Mr. McIntyre said a man unknown to him threatened to "blow his brains out" if he should call a witness for the defense a certain woman, wife of one of the witnesses for the prosecution.

Guard Is Provided.
For Standish, who on Friday identified "Whitely Lewis" as one of the gang that killed Rosenthal, a guard has been provided by Mr. Whitman, the prosecutor said tonight. Standish told the District Attorney he had been followed by a strange man ever since leaving court Friday.

CLARK MUCH ENCOURAGED

Senatorial Candidate Returns From
Southern Oregon.

Reporting splendid audiences and a cordial reception wherever he went, Alfred E. Clark, Roosevelt Progressive party nominee for United States Senator, returned yesterday from a week's tour of Southern Oregon. Mr. Clark says he is encouraged in his candidacy, having come in contact with a general feeling on the part of Bull Moosers to give their support to the entire ticket.

"Extensive areas of both Jackson and Josephine counties are included in the Oregon and California land grant," said Mr. Clark yesterday, "which is now the subject of litigation in the courts. When this land eventually is restored to the Government under its sale for forfeiture, I am advocating the sale by the Government of the timber and the expenditure of the funds derived therefrom in the development and settlement of those lands. The time has come when Oregon should at least protect against the enactment of legislation that makes possible the diversion of funds belonging to this state to other states to be expended in their development."

"I also advocated the co-operation by the Government in some plan by which the constantly increasing immigration to the Pacific Coast can be gradually distributed in the country instead of permitting it to flock to congested cities, where 83 per cent of the new settlers are now located."

"The people of Southern Oregon are thoroughly alive to the need for the development of that section through the establishment of smaller settlements on the Pacific Coast to the west of them."

Mr. Clark says he unexpectedly met in the hotel lobby at Roseburg a man named Morgan, who is now living near Myrtle Creek, and with whom Mr. Clark used to drive logs on the Crow Wing River in Northern Minnesota, 20 years ago.

The following is Mr. Clark's itinerary for this week: Monday night, Albany; Wednesday, Astoria; Thursday, Astoria; Friday, Astoria. Wednesday afternoon Mr. Clark will give a non-political address on "Religion of Agriculture" before the students of the Oregon Agricultural College. He probably will pass Tuesday at Eugene mingling with the celebrators of Oregon Electric Day. It is probable that he will speak at Salem Saturday night.

Weather conditions permitting, it is the intention of Mr. Clark to leave the first of next week for Cedar Bay points, where he will make a number of addresses.

MISSING BOY, 13, RETURNS

Lad Tells Mother He Was With His
Father, Who Was Ill.

KLAMATH FALLS, Or., Oct. 12.—(Special.)—Instead of speeding toward Missouri with his father as his mother imagined, Willie Jones, the 13-year-old boy who disappeared from his home at Worden Tuesday has been with a few miles of that town on his father's homestead, visiting his father, who was ill.

D. W. Jones, and his wife were divorced several years ago, and the mother was awarded the custody of the boy. She has since married L. West and lives in Shippington. The boy has been living at Worden with a sister, and going to school there.

Tuesday the lad was missing and his mother immediately notified the authorities, saying she believed her former spouse had started for Missouri with the boy. Telegrams were sent to other cities to watch out for the pair, but the lad returned to his sister's home and explained that his father had been ill and that he remained with him.

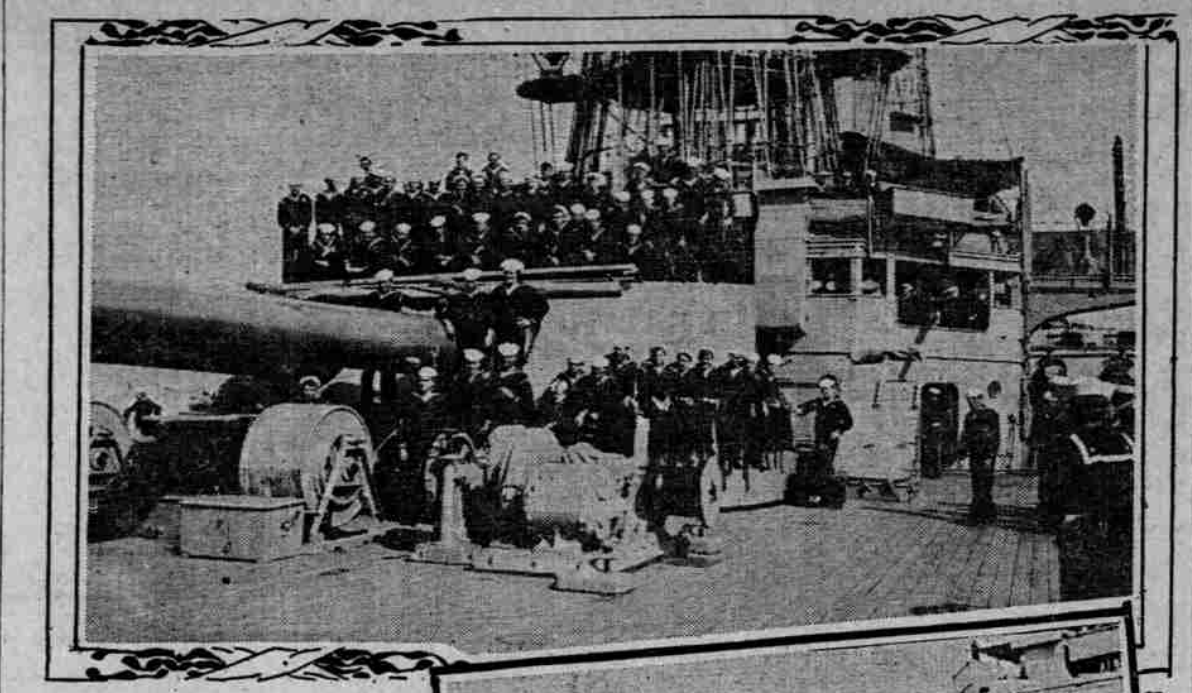
Springfield Man Is Helped.

ENSIGN IS DROWNED

Young Butler Steps From
Launch and Sinks.

SMALL CRAFT CUT IN TWO

Bluejackets Pull Seven Men and
Four Women From Water—All
Preparations Made for Arrival
of President Taft Today.

The bigger steam launch Vixen, and the occupants of the small craft, including seven men and four women, were thrown into the river. The little launch foundered almost immediately. Six sailors from the Maine were on the Vixen, and they were the first to plunge over the side to the rescue of the women. All hands were taken aboard safely, but not without difficulty, as the tide was running strong, and several members of the party had nearly succumbed before the sailors reached them. The rescued were taken aboard the Maine first, and after being treated by the ship's physician, returned to their homes.

Archbold Directs Rescue.
The yacht Vixen, which ran down the launch, is said to be owned by John D. Archbold, president of the Standard Oil Company of New Jersey. The launch which she struck was the 40-foot Madvie, owned by Bernard Bauer, of the Hudson River Yacht Club. Mr. Bauer was not sure whether Mr. Archbold was on board the Vixen at the time, but believes that a man who directed the rescue of some of the men was Mr. Archbold.

After the Vixen had taken the rescued party to shore, it disappeared and late tonight there had been no communication with those on board.

Men Prepare for Review.
Aside from the excitement caused by the day's accidents and the presence of many thousands of visitors, the bluejackets were occupied with preparations for the official visit tomorrow by the Secretary of the Navy and the President.

The only event on the day's programme was the arrival of Secretary Meyer and his aides, but as his arrival was scheduled as "unofficial," no salutes or other demonstrations were made when the Secretary boarded the dispatch boat Dolphin.

Never before has so large a fleet of warships assembled in American waters, therefore never such a roar of salutes as will mark the President's arrival tomorrow. The President will review the ships on Tuesday as they pass out to sea.

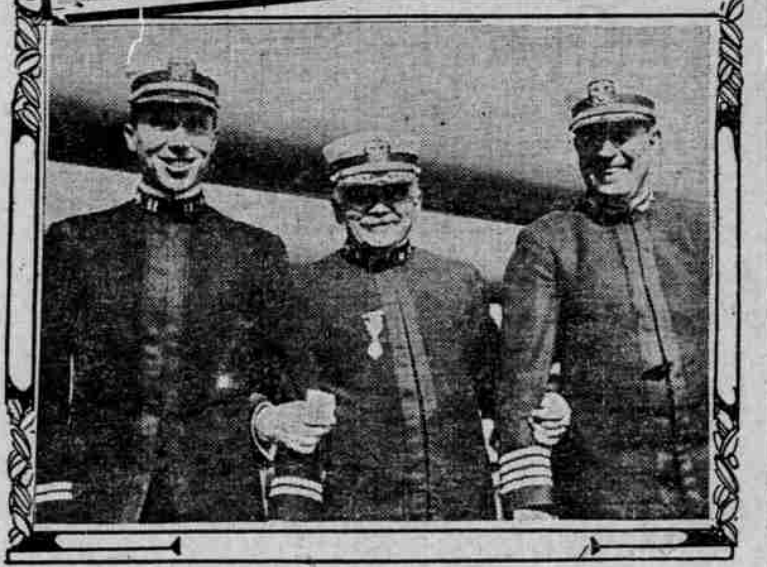
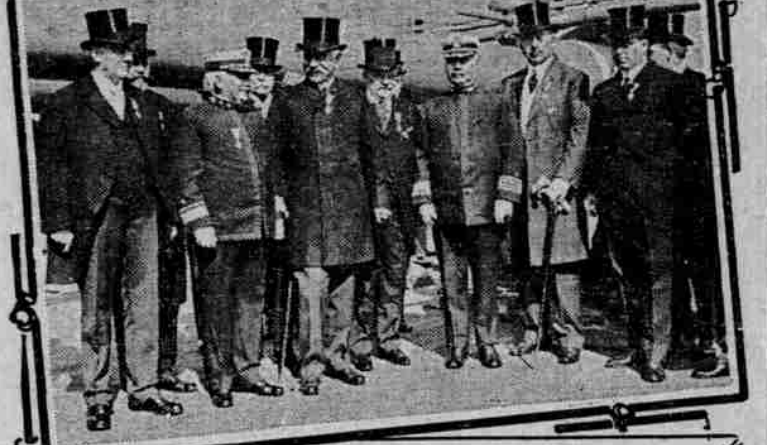
Speed Test to Be Held.
The Atlantic reserve fleet, with the great lakes Naval Militia on board, will be given a speed test at the conclusion of the grand review Tuesday. After the fleet passes the President on its way out to sea, it will break up and each ship will sail to the Delaware breakwater and up to Philadelphia independently. This movement might be termed a race, as each ship will be given an opportunity to show what it can do with a regular and mild crew. At a conference of the commanders of the reserve ships on board the Tennessee, today, this programme was determined upon and Admiral Austin M. Knight issued the necessary order for the speed test. The commanders of the ships upon returning to their vessels held a conference with their staffs, including the regular and militia officers at which steps were taken preparatory to the run to Philadelphia.

The naval militia officers and men are keen for the test and delighted with the prospects of real sea service. The Illinois militia, which sailed over from Philadelphia on the Montana, is particularly anxious to try its skill again at sea.

High Speed Developed.
For a short time on the way to New York, the Montana with the Illinois militia holding important stations, developed a speed of 18½ knots, and they expect to beat this record on their return. The Detroit militia, on the speedy armored cruiser Tennessee, is not making any boasts, but is quietly planning to show more speed than its rival organization from Chicago.

In the formation of the active fleet of battleships, under command of Rear-Admiral Osterhaus, will head the column today. Next will come the reserve fleet with the Tennessee at its head. In order to go out in this formation the active fleet of the latest battleships will pass through a double line into which the reserve fleet is formed in the North River. This will give the naval militia an opportunity to see all the dreadnoughts under way. Before the mobilization concludes, shore leave will be given members of the militia so as to inspect and visit the latest super-dreadnoughts. The reserve fleet will sail past the President in the following order, according to directions issued today by Admiral Knight:

Tennessee, with the Detroit militia; Montana, with the Illinois militia; the Washington, the North Carolina, the Maine and the Wisconsin with the Minnesota militia; the Alabama and the Kearsarge, with the second battalion of Michigan militia; the Massachusetts with the Toledo battalion of Ohio militia, and the Indiana with the Cleveland battalion of Ohio militia.

1 KILLED, 5 HURT

Auto Carrying Family Party
Turns Turtle at Winona.

MRS. J. P. VANSIKE VICTIM

Accident Due to Attempt by Driver
to Raise Wind Shield While
Running at High Speed and
Loss of Control of Car.

COLFAX, Wash., Oct. 12.—Mrs. J. P.

Vansike, 55 years old, wife of a wealthy farmer of Winona, Wash., was instantly killed, her daughter, Mrs. Joseph Wines, also of Winona, and another daughter, Mrs. James Banta, of Calgary, Canada, and her three young children were seriously injured when an automobile driven by Mr. Vansike turned turtle today on the road from Winona to Endicott.

Mrs. Vansike was thrown under the machine and her back broken. Her husband suffered only a few bruises, while Mrs. Wines' baby escaped unscathed. According to reports received here by Coroner L. L. Brunning the accident was caused by Mr. Vansike losing control of the automobile through trying to raise the windshield when running at high speed.

MAZAMA TRIP EXCITING

MEMBERS HAVE LIVELY TILT WITH SQUAWS.

Special Train Falls to Make Stop
and Hikers Are Left to Wait
and Shiver.

Lost in the woods Friday, assailed by squaws and a heavy rain, the members of the Mazama Sunday through a misunderstanding of train orders were stranded on the mountain trip of the Mazamas, which was to have ended early last night, but which did not end until after 3 o'clock this morning.

A party of the Mazamas set out Friday for a trip to the top of Wind Mountain. This party spent part of Friday and all day Saturday exploring the country about the mountain and joined another party which left Portland Saturday morning. Friday night the first party got lost in the woods and came near having to spend the night under the trees.

Saturday they all proceeded to the banks of the Columbia, where they got in an encounter with squaws. Randolph Carroll and George X. Riddell attempted to take the pictures of the Indians as they were drying fish on the river bank. The squaws became highly indignant and a lively scene ensued. After climbing Wind Mountain the

party proceeded back to a siding of the North Bank Railroad, where arrangements had been made for a through train to stop for them. Through a misunderstanding the train passed them up without even footing the whistle and left them standing on the bank of the river in cold wind. A delegation was dispatched to the nearest railroad station to telegraph to Portland for help. Arrangements were made for a special train, which left Portland about 8 o'clock last night and returned with the party soon after 3 o'clock this morning.

While waiting for the train the stranded Mazamas built a big fire and held a picnic on what lunch was left. This was the explanation of the party taken. Taft got 23 votes, Roosevelt 15 and Wilson 17.

ALUMNI OBJECT TO SALE

Settlement of Right of Way Across
Campus Arouses Protest.

UNIVERSITY OF WASHINGTON, Seattle, Oct. 12.—(Special.)—Declaring against the sale of a right of way through the campus to the Northern Pacific Railway for \$1, Alumni of the university are planning to block the transaction. The right of way is 80 feet wide and valued at \$100,000. The Northern Pacific has claimed the land by the right of eminent domain for several years and the board of regents arranged the sale to settle the title.
