

COLONEL'S WOUND HEALING NORMALLY

X-Ray Picture Shows Bullet
Did Not Mushroom on
Hitting Bone.

NO INFECTION APPEARS

Path of Missile Is Clean Cut and
Physicians Say No Suppuration
Exists, Either on Surface or
in Interior of Wound.

CHICAGO, Oct. 17.—The bullet wound inflicted in Colonel Theodore Roosevelt's chest at Milwaukee Monday night, it was announced shortly after midnight for the first time, is healing normally without infection. The statement that no complications have shown themselves was made after a day during which the first successful X-ray picture which was made of the wound, was examined by the surgeons.

A description of the wound was given tonight by Dr. W. B. McCauley, the first to be made public by the surgeons. He said the bullet path through the muscles of the chest is lacerated to some extent but there was little contusion and no extensive area of bruised and extravasated surrounding tissue.

"The bullet did not mushroom as might have been expected," said Dr. McCauley. "For that reason it cut a comparatively small hole in the skin and did not reduce a large portion of the nearby tissues to pulp, as in the case of a soft bullet that mushrooms in animal tissue after it hits a bone. I think the bundle of papers checked it and the spectacle case for some reason failed to spread the bullet much."

"The wound is about big enough to put your finger in at the surface and it does not appear to get very much bigger. I would call it a clean wound. The skin is torn at the surface in a ragged way but not badly and there is little bruising."

"There is not a sign of suppuration in the wound. The flesh is in good condition and seems to be healing without evidence of complication. If there were pus forming deep in the wound, we would know it at once by an unusual rise of temperature."

Dr. McCauley added that it is now certain from the X-ray pictures that the bullet has not entered or injured the pleural cavity.

Dr. McCauley confirmed previous announcements that no attempt would be made at present to remove the bullet which is not expected to hinder the healing of the fractured rib.

Colonel Roosevelt awoke at 3 o'clock and told the nurse that he "had had a bully sleep." His temperature was 98.4; his pulse 74 and his respiration 18. This is a decrease of two beats in temperature, 10 beats in his pulse and two counts in respiration since the official statement issued at 10 o'clock last night. The Colonel said he would go to sleep again. He had been asleep since 11 o'clock.

WIRELESS CONDOLENCE SENT
Portland Ad Club Forwards Message to Colonel in Chicago.

A wireless message of condolence that Colonel Roosevelt will receive while convalescing in Mercy Hospital, Chicago, was forwarded yesterday afternoon by the Portland Ad Club. The Colonel was a guest of the Portland organization at its regular Wednesday luncheon three weeks ago.

On motion of Lewis M. Head, the following message was authorized: "Accept the sincere sympathy of the Portland Ad Club and our heartfelt wishes for your speedy recovery. We deplore the unwarranted and untrue attacks by publications and individuals upon our public men, leading weaklings and criminals to dastardly deeds, such as your attempted assassination."

The message was signed by the committee appointed to forward the message, Lewis M. Head, chairman; W. E. Coman and Fred Lockley. No sooner had the motion passed than C. D. Ross, Portland manager of the Federal Telephone Company, a wireless concern, tendered the complimentary use of his service to convey the dispatch. Leaving the clubrooms, he immediately asked all relay offices to clear the way for a letter to the Colonel from Roosevelt from the Portland Ad Club.

EX-OUTLAW OFFERS HIS HELP
Frank James Wants to Be One of 100 to Guard Roosevelt.

CHICAGO, Oct. 16.—Frank James, ex-outlaw and brother of Jesse James, offered his services as a member of a bodyguard for Colonel Roosevelt today. In a message to the Colonel, James said:

"Offer my services as one of 100 men as a bodyguard for the remainder of the campaign. Choose for yourself 99 and allow me to name myself, making 100. Would choose no one who is not willing to go into eternal darkness for you if necessary."

STATE POLICE CALLED ON
Strike Trouble Is Feared by Miners at McGill, Nev.

ELY, Nev., Oct. 16.—Governor Odell telegraphed Captain Donnelly, of the Nevada State Police, to gather an emergency force of men tonight and to proceed at once to McGill, where several thousand men and smelter employees are on strike. Governor Odell decided to call on the state police after he made an inspection of the camp today.

RENO, Nev., Oct. 16.—A message from Governor Odell at Ely was received by Captain W. C. Donnelly, superintendent of State Police at Carson, ordering him to proceed immediately with his available men to Ely. Captain Donnelly will leave Reno tomorrow night.

MGILL, Nev., Oct. 16.—Two wagons loaded with provisions for the loyal men within the Steptoe Smelter enclosure were attacked by strikers this morning. The teams were stampeded and drivers and guards were pelted with sticks and stones. Although clubs were used freely and several shots fired, no one was injured seriously.

STORM WARNINGS POSTED
With Falling Barometer North Head Has 42-Mile Gale.

ASTORIA, Oct. 16.—(Special.)—Warnings of a southeast gale were hoisted here this evening, and as the barometer is falling fast, a heavy storm is looked for. This evening the wind at North Head is blowing at a 42-mile rate and is increasing.

COLONEL IS BETTER

Doctors Cautious, Though Patient Suffers No Pain.

VISITORS ARE CUT SHORT

Prospect Is That Campaign Activities Will Not Be Renewed, Although Colonel Wants to Make Another Speech.

week longer, and that after his arrival at home, he will not be permitted to plunge into the campaign again. Associates of Colonel Roosevelt said he was showing no concern as to the possible effect of his removal from the field of battle.

Another Speech Is Hope.
It is Colonel Roosevelt's desire to make at least one more speech before election, and that in his own state of New York. If he can do nothing else, he hopes to speak in Madison Square Garden.

There was little in the appearance of Colonel Roosevelt to indicate that he was not in his usual health. His face has not lost its color, and as he sat propped up with pillows, he moved about easily, and apparently was free from pain. As he talked he used his characteristic gestures, although with perhaps less vigor than usual and at times his laugh would be heard in the corridors outside. Relieved from politics for the first time in months, he seemed to enjoy his care-free state and to be determined to make his stay in the hospital an enjoyable vacation.

Children's Visits Cut Short.
His three children, who are in Chicago, dropped in to see him three times during the day. Mrs. Roosevelt would not permit them to remain long, lest her husband tire himself. Once more this afternoon Mrs. Roosevelt found O. K. Davis, secretary of the Roosevelt Progressive National Committee, in Colonel Roosevelt's room. He remained there only a few seconds after the appearance of Mrs. Roosevelt, who with-out debate exited him to the corridor.

Nervous tension of yesterday was somewhat relaxed today. The few persons who were admitted to the corridor near Colonel Roosevelt's room on the third floor, spoke in a natural tone instead of in low whispers.

When the score of the baseball game in Boston began to come in by innings, Colonel Roosevelt was almost forgotten for a time.

On the street outside the hospital there was less of a crowd and at times only newspaper correspondents were to be seen. There was one exception, in the person of a young girl, who took up a position at the main door of the hospital early in the morning and remained there until after dark. As soon as she arrived she sent word that she must see Colonel Roosevelt. She was told that her request could not be granted and replied that she was going to stay there until she did see him. She remained at her post until hunger and weariness drove her away.

Messages of condolence continued to pour in today from all parts of the world. One from Samuel Gompers said:

"Upon learning of the outrageous attack upon you, I was too much shocked to find expression. I join with

the men of organized labor, in common with all our people, who are profoundly hoping for you and expecting your speedy recovery."

Athletes Express Concern.
Colonel Roosevelt laughed heartily at a message from three of his athletic friends, which read:

"The Bull Moose League of Athletes expresses to you our deepest sympathy and trusts that our athletic bull moose will soon be restored to us—Committee, Johnny Hayes, Melvin Sheppard and Michael J. Ryan."

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FELIX DIAZ LEADS NEW REVOLUTION

Ex-President's Nephew Takes Possession of Vera Cruz Without Opposition.

TWO GUNBOATS CAPTURED

Part of Garrison Accepts New Order, and Part Is Loyal to Government—Street Fighting Is Expected Momentarily.

MEXICO CITY, Oct. 16.—General Felix Diaz, nephew of General Porfirio Diaz, the deposed president of Mexico, raised the banner of rebellion at Vera Cruz today. He entered the city with 500 men and seized the arsenal and garrison, which comprised 500 men of the Twenty-fifth Infantry and one six-gun battery.

Diaz then placed men in charge of the two gunboats Tampico and Bravo, lying in the harbor.

People Elated by News.
The news of the rising created excitement here, although there was no street demonstration. Mexicans generally appeared elated at the new developments. According to reports, General Diaz found many adherents when he entered Vera Cruz, including some of the troops, but the government is informed that the Nineteenth Infantry and the Artillery remain loyal. Colonel Gutierrez, commanding the loyal troops, notified the government that he would resist.

Street Battle Imminent.
The two forces are now in the city of Vera Cruz and street fighting is imminent. President Madero has ordered the mobilization of 3000 regulars to proceed against General Diaz. The arrest of alleged partisans of Diaz in Mexico City is expected momentarily.

The government has instructed the railroads into Vera Cruz to withdraw equipment—the Mexican to Orizaba, the Inter-oceanic to Jalapa and the Vera Cruz-Pacific to Tierra Blanca.

Madero Rushes Troops.
Believing that a great portion of the army remains loyal, President Madero has ordered every available soldier in the service, both regular and irregular, into the lines which are being drawn about Vera Cruz in an effort to crush with the least possible delay the new rebellion begun by General Felix Diaz.

From Santa Lucia, on the Tehuantepec isthmus, General Zozaya has been ordered to move north, even from the northern part of the republic, where remnants of large bands, General Blanquet has been summoned to the capital with the greater part of his forces to join the campaign against Diaz, whom the government regards as a greater menace than any other revolutionist.

New Party Outlines Plans
Selection of President to Be Left to Choice of People.

EL PASO, Tex., Oct. 16.—It was made known today that overtures have been made from men prominent in Madero's government at Mexico City to representatives here of Pascual Orozco, Jr., leader of the rebel movement in the north. Also, it is learned from secret service sources that an emissary is on his way to Paris to see Porfirio Diaz, President of Mexico before the Madero revolution.

Departure of the messenger to Paris was almost synchronous with the arrival from Mexico City of another emissary bearing word to the rebels that hereafter what is said to be a revolutionary element at the National capital. It was said today on highest authority that Felix Diaz, who has been in arms against the Madero government, is one of five named as Presidential candidates to succeed Madero.

The new revolutionary party, said rebel leaders here, who for obvious reasons withhold their names, will be unique in Mexico, in that it will champion no one man, leaving the selection to popular vote or to some committee to be chosen from the many warring elements in Mexico. A running mate for each of the five secretly named candidates has been selected. The names of the others will be withheld until their announcement may not affect their personal safety.

BRYAN KEEPS UP FIGHT
CAMPAIGN NOT TO BE SETTLED BY MANIAC, HE SAYS.

Nebraskan Says It Is Embarrassing to Discuss T. R. or Policies Under Conditions.

FRANKLIN, Ind., Oct. 16.—"It is embarrassing to discuss Mr. Roosevelt's policies while he is suffering from the murderous assault made upon him," was the way William J. Bryan opened his first address on his Indiana tour here today.

"I would rather occupy the time," continued Bryan, "in denunciation of the deed and in expression of sympathy for him and hopes for his speedy recovery, but the issues of the campaign should not be determined by the act of a madman. They must be settled by the sane rather than the insane."

"Neither Colonel Roosevelt nor his friends could ask that the discussion be turned away from the principles that are involved. If he is elected President it should be because of what he has done in the past and what he proposes to do."

"A nation sits expectant by the ex-President's bedside hoping that the wound is not serious," continued Mr. Bryan. "But Mr. Roosevelt's supporters must not use this attack to protect themselves and their position from just criticism. The brave soldiers on a battlefield do not use the wounded for breastworks. They stand out and give blow for blow."

"And so in this campaign, Mr. Roosevelt's supporters cannot use him as a shield to protect themselves against the attacks that may be made against the policies for which they stand."

Woodland Pioneer Dies.
WOODLAND, Wash., Oct. 16.—(Special.)—Mrs. Jane Miller, aged about 70 years, a pioneer of the Lewis River Valley, passed away at a Portland hospital last Friday.
