LOS ANGELES, Cal., Oct. 17.—(Special.)—Showing a complete reversal of form and an unaccountable inability to play baseball, the Beavers were trimmed by a score of 6 to 0 by the incompetent Angels this afternoon at Washington Park.

This came when the fans were talking about McCredie's excellent material for next season and commenting on the "speed" of the visitors. There was neither speed or anything else that goes to make up baseball material shown today.

The chief spectacular feature of today was when McCredie's pitcher, Baker, in the third inning, and was carried senseless from the field. He recovered during the inning, after being called out for interference and continued the game. In that inning Howard had doubled to the left field fence and stolen second and Berger had walked and taken second when Dally was out. Rodgers to Morton. Metzger hit to Baker who fielded the play perfectly, but was knocked away by Berger who was making a play for third as if shot from a catapult. Time was called while Berger was carried to the sidelines, where he lay during the remainder of the inning.

In the second the Angels made two runs on Page's single, Suter's base on balls to Driscoll, Core's long fly to Doane in center and a double by Boles. Howard's run in the third piled up the tally, the run being secured when Dally went out at first. In the sixth Suter went badly to pieces when Metzger doubled and went to third on Page's out, Bancroft to Norton.

Driscoll singled, scoring Metzger. Suter advanced Driscoll to second by giving Core a base. Driscoll and Core each stole a base and scored on Levens' single. Core's tally was a narrow squeeze, for Cunningham fielded Levens' single perfectly and made an absolutely perfect peg to the plate, but Fisher dropped the ball, which was his sole error of the game. DANCE REFORM DEMANDED

Hall Managers and Civic Workers Draft Modern Ordinance.

Proprietors of various dance halls of the city met yesterday with representatives of civic organizations and considered in detail the proposed ordinance restricting public dances. After two hours of consideration, a measure which is satisfactory to most of the dance hall people, was adopted and will be sent to the City Council next week. The proposed ordinance requires all dance halls to be registered with the City Auditor and to be subject to a license of \$25 a year. Provision is made for the prevention of Sunday dancing, and for the closing of all halls at 12 o'clock, unless a special permit is secured from the license committee. Persons under 18 years of age will be barred from all halls. The Mayor is given the power to appoint a dance hall inspector, who will see that the provisions of the ordinance are lived up to. An important provision of the measure, which was adopted after considerable discussion, was that against return checks. Arrangements were made to require all gatekeepers to refuse return checks. The measure provides against liquor being sold in a hall or in any place adjacent.

'GIANT' FLYNN OUT

Multnomah Eleven Weakened for Saturday's Game.

AGGIE'S SQUAD IS STRONG

Club Players Have Fear of Houser and Blackwell—World Series Now Over General Interest Turns to Gridiron Sport.

 Multnomah Club football prospects tell a few points on the tinker last night when it was announced that "Giant" Flynn, the 215-pound lineman, would not be here for Saturday's game with the Oregon Agricultural College. Flynn, who is an ex-Minnesota star, has been called to Arizona on a business mission and may not return this fall.

"Flynn's loss will be a hard blow," said Captain Hurlburt. "He had been counted upon to make up the discrepancy in weight at the center of the line left by Cherry's absence. We should beat the Oregon Aggies by a touchdown, at least, but I'm getting dubious now. Hardy, the Washington State collegian, has not been out for two or three practices, and we are shaky material."

The winged-M football squad held another night practice last night at the field, going through 30 minutes of lively signal work. Keck, Wolf and Hurlburt comprise the regular backfield, with Berry and Ludlum working as secondary offensive men. Ex-Captain Rinehart is at quarter. "Rinehart participated in the alumni game against the Oregon Aggies ten days ago, and says Coach Dolan has one of the best backs in the Northwest. "The Indian, Hauser, will prove one of the greatest backfield stars in the conference," says the star quarterback. "He runs hard and low, as does Blackwell. These two will have to be watched closely and it wouldn't surprise me to see them score despite the general inept defense of the Multnomah eleven."

With the world's series over, Manager Pratt expects interest to switch around Saturday's game, for it will be one of the big events of the season. Only two other college games of consequence are scheduled locally. Washington meets the Oregon Aggies tomorrow 2 on Multnomah field, and Multnomah the University of Oregon on Thanksgiving day. Saturday's game will start at 2 o'clock.

Passing up football and the world's series for a moment, it might not be amiss to mention that the Coast League is still playing ball, and that we are being treated to one of the grandest comeback rushes in the history of the game. Happy Hogan's Vernon team, distanced at the start down the home stretch, has swept ahead at a terrific clip and is nosing at the finish tape only one game and a half behind Oakland.

Hogan has an excellent chance, too, of winning the pennant for his pitheaters are again fine, while Sharpe's are in slumps. Moreover, Oakland should find Los Angeles a tougher proposition for the finish series next week than Portland for Vernon. Dillon's sick men will be back in harness then. But Sharpe is out with an ugly intestinal that Los Angeles threw several games to Vernon when the Tigers grabbed seven games out of eight a week ago. The charge is silly, considering the disabled condition of the Angels at the time and the bitter rivalry that exists between the two Los Angeles clubs.

The Pacific Coast League season closes with a double-header Sunday, October 27.

INTEREST IS MANIFESTED

Equal Taxation League Speaker Has Successful Eugene Meeting.

Despite a number of counter attractions at Eugene Wednesday night, Charles H. Shields, secretary of the Oregon Equal Taxation League, reported a most successful meeting when he returned to Portland yesterday. He left again the same afternoon for Independence, where he spoke last night.

Mr. Shields' dates for the rest of the campaign are: Woodburn, October 18; Forest Grove, October 19. Immediately following the latter date he will enter upon his series of joint debates with W. S. U'Ren.

"From all I can find out," said Mr. Shields, "the arrangements made between Mr. U'Ren and my office are entirely satisfactory. Mr. U'Ren was good enough to meet me on several minor points, while I have conceded somewhat to him. As the debate now stands, Mr. U'Ren is able to support any feature he desires of the Oregon, single-tax amendment, while I have the privilege of pointing out that these measures are purely single tax and will not be for the benefit of Oregon."

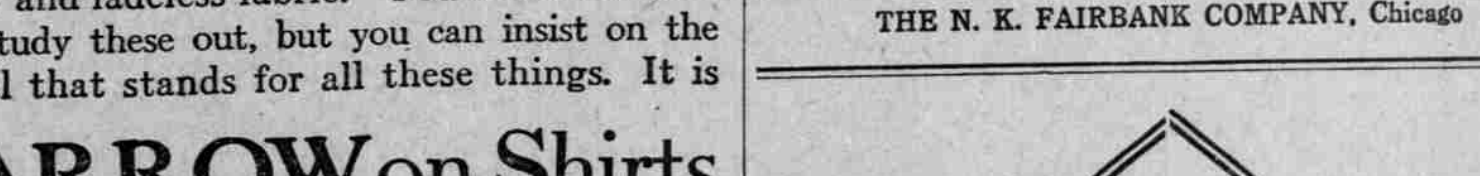
