JOHNSON IN RAGE

Government May Prosecute Under White Slave Act.

GRAND JURY CALLS JURY

Negro Prizefighter's Fury Grows When Police Refuse to Let Him See Lucile Cameron or Procure Her Release.

CHICAGO, Oct. 18.—Jack Johnson's troubles, growing out of his alleged relations with Lucile Cameron, a 19-year-old white girl, rapidly multiplied today. A few hours after his arrest on a warrant sworn to by Mrs. F. Cameron-Falconet, of Minneapolis, the mother of the girl, charging abduction, assistant United States Attorney Wilkerson ordered a thorough investigation with the view of the Government's prosecution under the Mann act, prohibiting the illegal transportation of women from one state to another, and commonly known as the "white slave" law.

Late in the afternoon Miss Cameron was served with a subpoena, calling her before the Federal grand jury to testify against Johnson. In order to keep her in the custody of the police, her mother names her in a warrant charging disorderly conduct.

Government Is Determined. The Government is determined to go the limit in investigating Johnson's alleged relations with the Cameron girl and others. Information has come to the Department of Justice that the negro prizefighter has associated frequently with white girls.

Bert J. Meyer, special agent of the Department of Justice, interviewed the girl today. She refused to talk much about her case, attempting to shield Johnson. It is said, in every answer to questions put to her.

Johnson was indicted by a Federal grand jury a few months ago on charges of smuggling a diamond necklace valued at \$50,000 into America from London, where he had been with his white wife, who recently killed herself. The trial on the criminal charge of smuggling is expected to take place this winter.

Prisoner in Rage at Arrest. Johnson raged when arrested today. His fury increased when the police refused to permit him to see the girl or to procure her release on bond.

Meantime Mrs. Cameron-Falconet visited her daughter in her cell and weepingly tried to induce her to return to Milwaukee. Lucile is said to have repulsed her mother at first, but finally burst out with a declaration that she would rejoin Johnson if she could.

The pugilist is scheduled to appear for a preliminary hearing tomorrow morning. He gave his own cash bond, which was fixed at \$500.

Mother Says Girl Is Insane. Later Mrs. Cameron-Falconet appeared before Judge Owens in the County Court and swore to a formal complaint that her daughter was insane. After the papers had been signed Judge Owens issued a commitment order providing for the detention of the girl, pending an investigation as to her mental condition.

Mrs. Cameron-Falconet informed

Judge Owens that she believed her daughter's mind was unbalanced as the result of her association with Johnson. Miss Cameron was held by the Federal authorities on bonds of \$25,000 as a witness against Johnson.

The warrant committing the girl to the detention hospital for examination as to her sanity will not be served unless Johnson succeeds in having her released on a writ of habeas corpus.

Armed tonight with warrants charging conspiracy to violate the Mann white slave law, Federal officers searched the South Side for several women said to have been involved in bringing to Chicago girls who later were introduced to Johnson.

IRRIGATION DISTRICT WINS

Owners Near Echo Vote to Advance Reclamation of Land.

ECHO, Or., Oct. 18.—(Special).—Another important step was taken yesterday in the development of Umatilla County, when the owners of the land lying east of and adjacent to Echo held an election for the purpose of forming an irrigation district. Seventy-four votes were cast, 61 for and 13 against forming the district, which will be known as the Paradise Irrigation District.

This project will affect 50,000 acres of land the greater part being already under cultivation, now being used for dry-land wheat growing.

The directors elected were: A. B. Thomson, Frank Sloan, Joe Conley, W. M. Slusher and James Hoskins.

ALLISON M'FARLAND FREE

Second Trial Results in Acquittal of Wife-Murder Charge.

NEWARK, N. J., Oct. 18.—Allison M. McFarland, an aviator, was acquitted today at his second trial of the charge that he murdered his wife. The verdict was returned by a jury in the Supreme Court.

The death of Mrs. McFarland occurred one year ago today. Her husband was charged with having caused her death by placing poison where she would be likely to take it in mistake for a simple remedy. On the first trial he was found guilty and condemned to be electrocuted. The higher court ordered a retrial.

AVIATOR ESCAPES IN FALL

John M. Bryant Caught in High Wind at Colfax, Wash., Hits Hill.

COLFAX, Wash., Oct. 18.—John M. Bryant, an aviator of Oakland, Cal., had a narrow escape from disaster today when he lost control of his biplane in a heavy wind and crashed into a low hill two miles from Colfax.

Bryant had reached a height of 500 feet when he was struck by a heavy gust and driven far from his course. The biplane started to fall rapidly, but he regained partial control before he struck the ground. He was badly bruised and the biplane demolished.

Rate Complaint Filed.

SALEM, Or., Oct. 18.—(Special).—That the Portland, Eugene & Eastern charges and collects rates on merchandise in packages between Eugene and Springfield which are excessive and that the regulation and practice of the company in those respects are inadequate, unreasonable and unjustly discriminatory are allegations in a complaint filed by the Eugene Creamery with the State Railroad Commission today.

NEW TONGUE LOST

Caruso, Who Once Spoke English, Has Interpreter.

POLICE RECOUNT TALKS

Defendant in Murder Case Growing Out of Textile Strike, Declared to Be Shamming Now He Is Before Court.

SALEM, Mass., Oct. 18.—Joseph Caruso, one of the defendants charged with the murder of Anna Lopizzo at Lawrence in the textile strike, who is on trial here with Joseph J. Eitor and Arturo Giovannitti, sat in the prisoner's cage, with an interpreter by his side, while Lawrence police officials testified today that they frequently had conversed with him in English and that the defendant had understood them without difficulty.

"When Caruso was detained in the Lawrence jail last March, before his indictment for the Lopizzo murder," testified Police Inspector Vose, "I talked to him in his cell. I can't speak a word of Italian. I asked him what he was there for and he said: 'They say I snub a man.' Then he told me about his movements."

"When I asked Caruso where he was on January 23, the day of the riot in which Mrs. Lopizzo was killed," continued Vose, "he said he was in a pool-room with others and then ran away because he did not want to get into trouble. He said he saw one man rush into the crowd with a club and another with a cleaver."

Bernard Ford, a Boston newspaper

man, who met Eitor in the course of the Lawrence strike, described events and riots on January 23 in the mill city and said Eitor told him on that day that the authorities could "send the whole Federal Army" to Lawrence and the strike would yet be won.

"We will win if they erect a gallows on every street corner," were words attributed to Eitor by Ford.

POLICEMAN KILLS ROBBER

Seattle Officer Apprehends Burglars In Saloon and Shoots in Fight.

ROY TRAVERS TO RETURN

Requisition for Man Accused of Robbery in Portland Honored.

SACRAMENTO, Cal., Oct. 18.—Roy Travers, wanted in Portland, Or., on a charge of having robbed a man of \$800 after getting him under the influence of liquor, will be taken back for trial. He was arrested in San Francisco recently and Acting Governor Wallace today honored the requisition of the Governor of Oregon for his return.

Travers is accused by E. C. McDougall of robbing him in a North End saloon. He was located in San Francisco by Detectives Snow and Coleman, of the Portland department, through writing letters to his sweetheart in San Francisco.

SHELLS GO ABROAD

Navy Lets Part of Contract to British Foundry.

DOMESTIC BIDDERS HIGH

Expectation Is That Home Institutions Will Reduce Price in Face of New Policy—Eight-Hour Law Will Apply.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 18.—Determined to learn whether foreign manufacturers can sell the United States Navy shells of equal quality for one-third less than the lowest price Americans will offer, the Navy Department awarded today a contract to the Hadfield Steel Foundry, of Sheffield, for 500 out of a total for 550 armor-piercing projectiles contracted for.

The department officials believe that if the English product measures up to the test, the avowed intention of the Government to buy abroad when necessary to meet exorbitant domestic bids will result in a substantial lowering of American prices.

Foreign Concern Gets \$25,000.

The Hadfield Company received the contract for 500 12-inch projectiles at

\$187 each. To the Bethlehem Steel Company went 1000 12-inch shells at \$278.40 each and 500 14-inch at \$500 each; to the Washington Steel & Ordnance Company, 500 12-inch at \$277 each and 1000 14-inch at \$400 each, and to the Crucible Steel Company of America, 1000 12-inch at \$274.75 each and 500 14-inch at \$500 each.

The Hadfield share amounts to \$23,500 out of a total of \$1,915,950. This company received none of the 14-inch projectiles, although on them it bid almost \$100 less apiece than its lowest American competitor and was the only concern that offered to undertake the entire contract.

Eight-Hour Law Will Apply. Attorney-General Wickersham has prepared an opinion advising the Navy Department that the eight-hour law will be made to apply in the shell contract.

Contracts were let today for large quantities of shells other than the 12 and 14-inch armor-piercers, on which only American companies bid.
