"Of this amount about one-third is suitable for shipment. The prospects are that choice timothy will command a premium throughout the present season."

Aggressiveness of Shorts Sends Stock Prices Down.

LOSSES OF 2 TO 4 POINTS

Foreign Markets Are Unsettled and Nervous - Call Money Firmer With Reduced Supplies-Bonds Affected by Stock Declines.

NEW YORK, Oct. 21.—The feature of today's stock market was the heavy selling of the last hour, which caused a rapid diminishing of quoted values, net losses in representative issues ranging from two to four points. No news accompanied the decline, which was doubtless aided by the operations of the short interest.

The setback was due in part to foreign influences. London's market was weak, a natural condition in view of the liberal selling there for Berlin and Paris.

The local market opened with some moderate losses, these being partially regained in the early afternoon, when it became known that the United States Supreme Court would not hand down an immediate decision in the so-called anthracits cases. The professional element then undertook to advance several specialties and this movement proving more or less futile, the list was left to its own devices. Traders were not slow to realize its technical weakness, which included increasing firmness of call money on reduced supplies.

After the close it developed that Paris and other European exchanges were still at work clearing up last week's wreckage. It was intimated that numerous private settlements were being made in London, Paris and Scrilin to cover up some of the weak spots created by the recent liquidation and that further drastic measures might be necessary to prevent acute demoralization in more than one financial quarter.

Bonds were materially affected by the decline in stocks. Total sales, par value, asgregated \$1,50,000. United States bonds were unchanged on call.
