

NEGRO THREATENS SUBPOENA SERVER

"Throw That Lawyer Out or I Will Kill Him," Shouts Jack Johnson.

CAFÉ LICENSE IN DANGER

Mayor Harrison Has Recommendation to Revoke Permit—Maid in Jack Curley's Home Tells of Miss Cameron's Actions.

CHICAGO, Oct. 21.—When Charles E. Erbe, attorney representing the mother of Lucile Cameron, visited Jack Johnson's saloon today in company with United States deputy marshals to serve subpoenas on witnesses who are to appear before the federal grand jury tomorrow, the negro pugilist became excited and threatened the lawyer with personal injury.

"Throw that lawyer out of the place or I will kill him," shouted Johnson to one of his bodyguards. Federal officers protected the attorney and served subpoenas on the pugilist's aged mother and nine employees of the saloon.

Important Witnesses Disappear.

Several important witnesses against Johnson have disappeared and could not be found today, but federal officers continued their search.

The federal grand jury investigation into Johnson's alleged violation of the Mann white slave act is scheduled to begin tomorrow, when Lucile Cameron, her mother and 25 other witnesses are expected to testify against the negro pugilist.

The police have reported to Mayor Harrison that Johnson has violated the 1 o'clock closing ordinance a dozen times in the last month, and recommend the revocation of his license. Mayor Harrison has taken the report under consideration.

Maid Gives Testimony.

Federal officers this afternoon entered the home of Jack Curley, a fight promoter, where Lucile Cameron lived after her mother began search for her, and took a maid, who gave her name as Miss Thomas, to the federal building, where she was questioned by Martin Line, acting superintendent of the Department of Justice.

She is said to have furnished the government with important information of events during the time Miss Cameron lived in the Curley home.

JOHNSON'S FIGHTS CANCELLED

Australians Refuse to Negotiate Further With Negro.

SYDNEY, Australia, Oct. 21.—Jack Johnson will not fight in Australia.

Hugh McIntosh, the Australian promoter who had offered Johnson \$50,000 for fights with Sam Langford and Sam McVey or Joe Jeannette, called today to W. W. Kelly, his representative in Chicago, to cancel all negotiations.

McIntosh explained that Johnson's part in the alleged abduction of Lucile Cameron, a white girl, had so angered the sporting men and public at large of Australia that the matches were no longer desirable.

NURSE'S MEMORY BLANK

Woman Who Accidentally Gave Acid to Patient Forgets Act.

YONKERS, N. Y., Oct. 21.—Florence Harris, a nurse, by mistake administered acid instead of salts, causing the death of Mrs. Abram Haight, a patient at the Homeopathic Hospital, who died after a few minutes' unconsciousness due to a collapse upon realizing her error.

Physicians say the nurse appears to have lost all recollection of what took place while caring for Mrs. Haight. She recognized several nurses, but greatly to the surprise of the physicians did not refer to her mistake. She was very weak and talked little.

The doctors decided not to question her regarding the mistake, fearing any mention of the affair would bring a second collapse.

The authorities have not yet learned how the acid came to be in the medicine cabinet next to the salts.

2 ARRESTED AS FORGERS

Alleged Leaders of Gang Circulating Bogus Postal Orders Held.

CHICAGO, Oct. 21.—Postal authorities arrested Mrs. Edna Phillips and Thomas J. Sharum, alias "Little Jeff Davis," today on a charge of forging postal money orders for more than \$50,000.

They are said to be leaders of a gang that has operated throughout the country. Their arrest resulted after a year's search.

Mrs. Phillips is declared to have confessed the forgery plot. She was taken to jail in default of \$3000 bail.

Six men and four women are said to compose the band of forgers. The men are said to have stolen pads of money orders, prepared them and turned them over to the women to be cashed. Forty orders were passed at Indianapolis, San Francisco and other large cities.

SIX YOUNG MEN IN JAIL

Five Identified as Party Who Attacked Young Bride.

IRONTON, Mo., Oct. 21.—Six of 14 young men alleged to have been implicated in an attack on Mrs. Lillian Mullane, the 13-year-old bride of Richmond, Va., near Des Arc, Saturday, are in jail here. Five of them have been identified.

Mrs. Mullane, who is being cared for by the women of Annapolis, near here, had so far recovered today as to expect to be able to testify against the youths.

Mullane and his bride were traveling as pedestrians for their health. Mrs. Mullane was attacked after her husband had been overpowered.

SUIT CASE AT MILWAUKEE

Schrank's Property Is Forwarded From Charleston, S. C.

MILWAUKEE, Wis., Oct. 21.—The suitcase belonging to John Schrank, who attempted to kill Colonel Roosevelt, reached Milwaukee today from Charleston, S. C., where it had been left at a hotel.

The grip was addressed to W. P. Janssen and was turned over to him. The chief says it will not be opened for the present.

DISLIKE IS CITED

Defense Attempts to Prove Becker Victim of Plot.

OFFICER MAY NOT TESTIFY

Attorneys for Policeman Expected to Rest Case Today Without Putting Becker on Stand—Conversation in Tombs Denied.

"as if you have something to tell me," he said, "I am going to get it out of you."

Becker may not be called.

Thirteen witnesses testified today. Indications at adjournment were that the defense would rest tomorrow without placing Becker on the stand.

Among today's witnesses were five policemen, three of whom testified that the raid on Rosenthal's gambling house by Becker's "strong arm squad" last April was not a "fake," as the state charges, but was made two days after they had procured evidence of gambling on the premises.

Two inmates of the Tombs prison, awaiting trial on charges of murder, denied the testimony of James D. Hallen, the convict lawyer, who said he heard Becker tell Policeman White that the public would "soon pay Becker a pension for killing that crook, Rosenthal."

White denies conversation.

White also swore that Becker had never said to him in the Tombs that he would be praised in the end for killing "that crook Rosenthal."

No conversation remotely resembling this occurred, the policeman said.

Testimony intended to show the existence of a long-standing hatred between "Bridge" Webber and Rosenthal, and that Webber had a motive of his own for desiring the murder of the gambler, was elicited by the defense.

William W. Dugan, a police lieutenant, said that "Bridge" Webber told him three years ago that Harry Valton's gambling place had been robbed by three men at Rosenthal's behest.

He said the place had been "stuck up" and robbed of \$375 by "Big John" Bootmaker and "Spanish Louie" the night before. He said Rosenthal was responsible for the trick. "Later I went to Webber's house and found that Webber's jaw was broken. Tough Tony" did it, and we arrested him. Webber told me that Rosenthal was back of the attack."

GOLDENDALE INQUEST HELD

Man, Who Died After Drinking Whisky, Born in Jacksonville, Or.

GOLDENDALE, Wash., Oct. 21.—(Special.)—An inquest was held over the body of Charles Tice, who died here suddenly October 8, after drinking the contents of a half-pint flask of whisky, the verdict being that the man died from strychnine poisoning after drinking from a bottle containing whisky and strychnine. The jury also were of the opinion that the poison was not taken by Tice with suicidal intent. On the other hand there was absolutely no clue as to how the poison got into the liquor which Tice drank.

The verdict completely clears up any

charges of foul play that have been made in the case so far and the presence of the poison in the bottle is still a mystery. According to the testimony of Everett Tice, an 11-year-old son of the dead man, who was with his father when he drank the fatal dose, Tice had the bottle hidden under the sidewalk and stopped to drink it while he and the boy were on their way home to supper after going up town after some provisions. The man died in convulsions 20 minutes after reaching his home.

The dead man had been at Golden- dale about two months and employed as a laborer on the street work. He was born near Jacksonville, Or., in 1885. He lived for a number of years in Klamath County and married Miss Belle Arnett, of Klamath Falls, in 1904. He is survived by his wife and two children. His mother, four sisters and three brothers live at Medford, Or. He was buried here today.

DRY FARM SHOW OPENS

LETHBRIDGE EXHIBIT GREAT INTERNATIONAL ARRAY.

All States and Three Canadian Provinces Represented—D. O. Lively, of Portland, Speaks.

LETHBRIDGE, Alta., Oct. 21.—Amid the most favorable auspices the International Dry Farming Congress opened here today.

All the exhibits were in place and made a brave showing, many agrarian authorities declaring they had never seen an exposition to equal it. The weather was ideal.

Chairman J. W. McNicol, of the exposition board, in opening the proceedings said this was by far the largest exhibition of dry farming he had ever seen. Exhibits from all the states and the three prairie provinces were in place.

In officially opening the Congress, Lieutenant-Governor Bulyea conveyed the regrets of the Duke of Connaught that it was not possible for him to be here. He declared it his conviction that 100 acres well farmed brought better results than 200 acres differently farmed.

Martin Burrell, Dominion Minister of Agriculture, referred to the magnificent display of farm products, while Professor Grisdale, of Ottawa, referred to the numerous speakers, being 150 ready to give information on the subject.

Lieutenant-Governor Brown, of Saskatchewan, pointed out the great results of scientific farming. He held that this was the greatest argument in favor of the work of the congress.

In the evening addresses were delivered by Senator Laurendeau, Secretary of Agriculture, Mexico; Leslie C. Newman, Director of Agriculture, Mysore, India; G. T. Bryan, of Oklahoma; D. O. Lively, of Portland, Or., and others.

The announcement was made that H. Holmes, of Raymond, Alta., had been awarded the championship prize of a \$2500 farm engine for the best wheat grown under dry farming conditions.

The champion dry farmer, who is a Mormon, hailed originally from Utah, where, in the early days "he had to dry farm or quit farming."

WAGE DISPUTE UNSETTLED

Striking Longshoremen at San Diego Refuse Company's Offer.

SAN DIEGO, Cal., Oct. 21.—All attempts to effect a compromise between the striking longshoremen in San Diego and the Pacific Coast Steamship Company have failed.

According to announcement made today by Patrick Welch, president of the union, the company offered a flat rate of 50 cents an hour, and it was rejected. The union demands 47½ cents an hour for day work and 65 cents an hour for night work. The company's steamers dock after 5 o'clock in the afternoon.

WITNESS TELLS OF DUAL BOOKKEEPING

Iron Workers Said to Have Kept Secret Record of McNamara Fund.

ONE ACCOUNT FOR PUBLIC

Former Bookkeeper of Convicted Dynamiter Tells of Juggling Books to Hide Money Used in "Emergency Fund."

INDIANAPOLIS, Oct. 21.—Reading from the financial account books of the International Association of Bridge and Structural Iron Workers for the period when John J. McNamara, the secretary, was in charge, was conducted today a "campaign of exposures" about the country, Miss Mary C. Dye, former bookkeeper for McNamara, testified at the "dynamite conspiracy" trial today, that one record of money expended was kept for the union's officials and executive board members, while a different record was kept for the public and for members of the union generally.

A regular system of "juggling" the accounts, the Government charges, was maintained to conceal the payments for the expenses of dynamiting.

Dual System Is Told of.

Miss Dye's testimony was that a dual system of recording expenditures was in force prior to 1909, or until the executive board decided to allow McNamara \$1000 a month without requiring any accounting, which continued until after the Los Angeles Times building was blown up. It was out of this \$1000 a month the Government charges, that McNamara paid Orrie E. McManigal and James B. McNamara for the Pacific Coast explosions and for 53 other explosions.

The defendants named by witnesses as having been members of the executive board who were cognizant of the use to which the money was put were Frank M. Ryan, president of the union; John T. Butler, Buffalo, first vice-president; Eugene A. Clancy, San Francisco; Henry W. Tegleiner, Denver; Frank C. Webb, New York; Michael J. Young, Boston, and Herbert S. Hockin, present secretary. They are among the 45 men now on trial charged with illegally transporting explosives by aiding and abetting.

Publications Are Juggled.

Miss Dye testified that in the books available to the officials, the full amounts paid to McNamara, Hockin, Webb and others were given, but in the records published in the union magazine less than half the amounts were charged to the individuals, while the difference was charged to "emergency fund" or to the executive board.

The witness said that for the fiscal year ending in 1909, \$3698 was paid to Webb, while \$1572 was recorded on McNamara's report to the union; \$4970 was paid to Hockin, while \$2043 was reported to the union, and \$2537 was paid to J. J. McNamara, while \$1987 was reported to the union as having been paid to him.

Altogether, the Government alleges that \$20,000 was represented in aggregate differences and was used for dynamiting purposes.

Legion Conference Held.

A Young People's Branch Institute and the conference of the Loyol Temperance Legion were held at the Sunday-school rooms of Grace Church, while Mrs. Allen and other heads of special departments were making their reports in the auditorium. The institute was conducted by the Rev. E. E. Mosher, general secretary, and Mrs. Bessie L. Scovell, college secretary of the Young People's Branch. Miss Edna Rowan, general secretary, had charge of the Loyol Temperance Legion conference.

The department conference included reports of work among the Indians, Mrs. Margaret Dye Ellis and Mrs. I. B. Ingalls presiding for an hour each. Much progress was reported by Mrs. Dorcas J. Spencer, California, superintendent of this department. She told of a California woman who had taken into her own home five Indian children, sending them to the public schools and herself teaching the girls domestic science and music. The fact was brought out that scientific temperance instruction is now required in all Government Indian schools.

Mrs. Evalyn M. Graham, National superintendent of the department of work among railway employees, submitted a resolution, adopted, pledging the National body to give her department all possible support in their prayers, work and influence, to the end that men engaged in railway work may be free from temptation.

The resolution pays a tribute to the captains of industry of the country, calling them great temperance leaders because of their insistence that their employees be non-drinking men. The liquor traffic is branded as "the foe of property, the enemy of efficient labor, the cause of crime, the cause of poverty and the cause of domestic violence and music.
