

COLONEL PASSES HIGHLY ANTICIPATED

Physicians, After Dressing Wound, Repeat Injunction for Complete Rest.

INFECTION YET POSSIBLE

Friends and Political Workers Turned Back at Gate When They Call—Patient Himself Is in Hopeful Mood.

OYSTER BAY, N. Y., Oct. 22.—The quiet routine of life at Sagamore Hill was resumed today by Colonel Roosevelt and his family as though it had not been interrupted by the attempt to assassinate the former President.

For the first time since he was wounded eight days ago Colonel Roosevelt was unattended tonight by a physician. There was no one in the house except members of the household staff and the Colonel spoke hopefully of being able, after one day more of rest, gradually to resume his work.

Four physicians came today and after they had dressed his wound they told him that the one essential thing was complete rest. If their directions were observed, it is believed complete recovery is probable.

Wound Still Wide Open.

Dr. Alexander Lambert and Dr. Scully L. Terrell, who accompanied Colonel Roosevelt from Chicago, were joined in New York by Dr. Joseph A. Blake and Dr. George E. Brewer. After examination they said the wound was still wide open, and added they were unable to say whether it would be possible for him to resume campaign work.

Colonel Roosevelt said when his wound had been dressed that there was no longer the need of constant supervision of physicians, because he was "all right."

The physicians went to New York and said they would not return tomorrow afternoon. Their decision was regarded by Colonel Roosevelt's friends as an indication of his improved condition.

Friends Anticipated at Gates.

The parties and the political workers must have absolute rest and must see no one today or tomorrow. Friends, political workers, newspaper reporters and photographers flocked to the foot of Sagamore Hill during the day, but did not succeed in passing guards at the gates.

Although his physicians make no promises, Colonel Roosevelt was confident he soon would be back in the campaign, at least to the extent of exercising general direction. He expressed his intention of going to Madison Square Garden, New York, to speak on October 30, even if he had strength to say only a few sentences.

SOHRANK SORRY FOR HIS ACT

Fellow-Prisoners Tell of Expressions of Remorse.

MILWAUKEE, Oct. 22.—John Schrank has arrived at the stage of being sorry for his attempt upon the life of Colonel Roosevelt, according to the statements today of two prisoners at the County Jail, who are on trial in the Municipal Court.

John Frey, on trial for wife murder, and Frank Clinton, a negro prisoner, have been more or less associated with Schrank during the last week.

Frey has played checkers with Schrank and during the course of a conversation, Schrank, according to Frey, said he was sorry he shot Colonel Roosevelt.

"I considered it my duty at the time I fired the bullet to rid the country of a third-term," Schrank is alleged to have told Frey, and adding: "But I am sorry now."

Frey believes Schrank is perfectly sane.

TAFT'S WORK IS OUTLINED

GOLDENDALE, Wash., Oct. 22.—(Special.)—Before a large crowd here tonight, Senator Jones, of North Yakima, spoke on the political issues of the day, outlining the work of President Taft and his administration, showing what progressive legislation had been enacted during the past four years under the Taft leadership, declaring that the Third party ticket was not necessary to procure progressive legislation, and showing that the Republican party today is as progressive as any of the others claim and closed with a strong appeal to the voters to think twice before voting the Republican ticket. Progressives are urged to vote the Progressive ticket in preference to the old line Republican ticket, which means prosperity and stability in the Nation.

MRS. COX SHOT BY FRIEND

Kansas Woman, Recovering Consciousness, Admits Facts to Police.

SALINA, Kan., Oct. 22.—Mrs. W. R. Cox, who was found unconscious yesterday in her home after having been shot, admitted today to the police that she had been fired upon by her close friend, Mrs. Carl Ward, who a short time later committed suicide by shooting herself and jumping into a cistern.

According to Mrs. Cox, the shot that struck her may have been fired accidentally, as Mrs. Ward had shown her the revolver just prior to the shooting.

MABEL HITE, ACTRESS, DIES

Wife of "Mike" Donlin, Ballplayer, Succumbs to Long Illness.

NEW YORK, Oct. 22.—(Special.)—Mabel Hite, the actress, well known in musical comedy and vaudeville, who in private life was the wife of "Mike" Donlin, the baseball player, died at 4 o'clock this afternoon at the home of her mother, Mrs. Elsie Hite, following an operation for an intestinal disorder last June. She entered a private hos-

pital early in June. It was at first reported that she was recovering, but it was later learned that hope of recovery had been given up.

Miss Hite was the daughter of Elsie Sweet and Louis Hite and was 26 years old. She was twice married. Her first husband was Elsie E. Hamlin, of Chicago, and her second was "Mike" Donlin.

In the course of the appearance in New York of one of the plays in which she appeared she met "Mike" Donlin, then captain of the New York National League baseball team, but their marriage April 10, 1906, came as a surprise both to him and her acquaintances.

Their first joint appearance on the stage was at Hammerstein's Victoria Theater, in October, 1908. Since then they had starred in musical comedy and in vaudeville and were to have taken the leading parts in "A Certain Party," when the play was postponed.

Among her earlier successes in her profession were "The Telephone Girl," "The Chaperones" and "A Venetian Romance."

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MARSHALL WOULD BAR UNDESIRABLES

Candidate Cites Lawrence as Example of Condition That Should Be Ended.

JOHNSON IS CRITICISED

Roosevelt's Running Mate Declared to Have Been Aware of Effect California Election Law Was Going to Have.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 22.—Governor Marshall, of Indiana, Democratic Vice-Presidential candidate, wound up a flying two-day campaign in California by advocating tonight the exclusion from the United States of all aliens who are not of a character to amalgamate with the American people.

The argument was accepted with noisy approval by audiences which the Indiana Executive addressed in San Francisco just previous to his departure for Oregon, where he is scheduled to speak tomorrow.

"I am unalterably opposed," said Governor Marshall, "to the granting of citizenship to any race of aliens which by habit and by nature is absolutely unfitted to amalgamate with the American people."

"I believe in encouraging the immigration to this country of those people who will not alone understand and appreciate our institutions, but who, more than that, are eager to adopt these institutions as their own. For such people we have room and opportunities. But for the people who never can mingle in political affairs, business, or in a social life with Americans, I say: 'Don't grant them citizenship.'"

Lawrence, Mass., One Example.

"The time has arrived in some parts of our country when this issue is as great as any other one that I can name to you tonight. The Pacific Coast particularly is concerned with it, and in the East, at Lawrence, Mass. recently we have had an example of what a certain class of immigrants can come to under certain conditions. We must take steps to stop that sort of thing and stop it at once."

Governor Johnson of California again furnished a subject for sharp comment by Governor Marshall, who said that he thought Governor Johnson should be here in California remedying the election law instead of in the East at this time.

"We are spending \$60,000 in Indiana," said Governor Marshall, "as an extra expense to give a place on the ballot to a party that will not poll 1000 votes. Yet here in California, thousands of your Republicans are being prevented from casting their vote for Mr. Taft by a law which is neither decent nor American."

Effect Known to Johnson.

"Now, I do not say that Governor Johnson deliberately laid this mine, but certainly he was aware of what that law was going to do."

Governor Marshall, despite a rain to-day, dedicated Indiana's site for a state building at the grounds of the Panama-Pacific Exposition, and tonight attended two Democratic political meetings and the annual assemblage of the San Francisco Gaelic Club. He also attended a luncheon given by President C. Moore of the exposition corporation.

A committee of former Indiana residents, headed by Major Lee N. Olds, were active in entertaining Governor Marshall and Mrs. Marshall.

TAFT'S WORK REVIEWED

SECRETARY WILSON PRAISES STABLE ADMINISTRATION.

No Great Trust, Says Cabinet Officer, Has Been Organized Since March, 1909.

ALPENA, Mich., Oct. 22.—Secretary of Agriculture Wilson, speaking at the request of the re-election of President Taft, confined his address to a discussion of the issues between the Republican and Democratic parties, making no reference to the Roosevelt Progressive party.

Secretary Wilson elaborately reviewed the accomplishments of President Taft's Administration and emphasized the President for the great work which he had achieved in procuring "progressive legislation" and in "giving the country a safe and stable Administration, avoiding international troubles and conserving the interests of the people in every particular so that there has been no check to prosperity."

Secretary Wilson said that no great trust had been organized since March, 1909, and said that proceedings had been instituted by the Administration against combinations to control the price and restrict competition in groceries, butter and eggs, milk, meat, kindling wood, coffee, wall paper, agricultural implements, cash registers, and a score of other articles in daily use.

BANK ROBBERS ARE FOILED

Explosion at Dixie Arouses Townspeople—Bloodhounds Lose Trail.

WALLA WALLA, Wash., Oct. 22.—(Special.)—Two men wanted on the charge of attempting to crack a safe in a store at Dixie, a small town near here, are hiding in the mountains, where bloodhounds failed to trace them. Sheriff Toner said tonight he has not given up the hunt.

The explosives were used and the noise aroused the people of the town. The safe was badly damaged, but unopened. Hurriedly taking the few dollars in the cash register, the robbers ran to the railroad track, stole a handcar and, after several miles, abandoned it and took to the hills.

Sheriff Toner and Guard Maxfield, from the prison, took the bloodhounds, but so many people had been over the ground the hounds could not follow and came back this morning. The safe-blowing was attempted Saturday night.

POLITICS LIVE IN SPOKANE

Three Parties Muster Strength for Final Rally in County.

SPOKANE, Wash., Oct. 22.—(Special.)—With the general election only two weeks away, all parties are prepared to make this week the last of their active work in obtaining new converts, being content, generally, to devote the last week or ten days to holding the

wavering line and getting out indolent voters.

Democrats will have Governor Thomas R. Marshall, of Indiana, their vice-presidential nominee, here Saturday. Speakers are being sent out to all East Side counties to talk for the National and state tickets and an average of four meetings a night, two in the city and two in the country, will be held to urge the Spokane County and local legislative tickets.

Roosevelt Progressives will have their candidates for Governor, Lieutenant-Governor and Congress in the Third District in a big meeting at the Lewis & Clark High School auditorium Friday night and meetings at other points in the county, city and country for every other night.

Republicans will bring Senator Wesley L. Jones here next Saturday as a counter attraction, in an effort to prevent Democrats and Bull Moose from getting all the crowds, while city and county meetings will be held in the meantime.

BEVERIDGE IS CALLED

INFORMATION WANTED AS TO FUNDS IN INDIANA.

Committee Would Like to Know Concerning Contribution Credited to Perkins.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 22.—With the examination of witnesses summoned for a single session tomorrow the Senate campaign contributions committee expects to finish the investigation, so far as planned and to adjourn until after election.

The slowness of "war furnished to Albert J. Perkins for his 1904 campaign in Indiana will be the basis for tomorrow's inquiry, and Senator Beveridge himself, as well as the men associated with him in the campaign, have been summoned to appear tomorrow.

Senator Pomerene in his examination of George W. Perkins became involved in a heated controversy with the witness who denied having furnished between \$50,000 and \$60,000 for the campaign for the Indiana Legislature in 1904. Mr. Perkins said he remembered sending only \$10,000 to Mr. Beveridge, which Mr. Beveridge returned. Mr. Perkins said that the money was that \$50,000 or \$60,000 had been sent into Indiana by Mr. Perkins after the National committee had failed to furnish \$100,000 that had been promised to that state. He asked Mr. Perkins if he knew Henry C. Starr and H. C. Pettit, both of whom were summoned for tomorrow. The witness said he knew neither.

Senator Beveridge himself is busy with the Roosevelt Progressive campaign in Indiana, where he is running for Governor, and may not be able to come to Washington until after election. Other witnesses who were associated with him in the campaign, Miss Savice, have promised to be present for tomorrow's session.

PATRIOTS LED BY GIRL

Servants Quit Work, Demand Wages and Prepare to Go Home.

CHICAGO, Oct. 22.—Led by Christina Savice, a 21-year-old Servian girl, 40 men and women, determined to return to their mother country to help fight her battles against the Turks, stormed the Desplaines-street police station today and demanded assistance in collecting their wages for working to date. The men have been working for a construction company in Wisconsin and are said to have quit their employment without notice.

The question of wages was adjusted and the men will at once depart for home. Miss Savice declared she would carry a rifle on the firing line.

WIFE FORFEITS ALIMONY

Judge Rules Against Woman Who Riffled Husband's Pockets.

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 22.—Because she testified she had taken \$100 from her husband's pockets one night last July, Mrs. Sydney Smith, wife of F. H. Smith, a realty dealer of Pasadena, Cal., whom she was suing for divorce, lost her application for alimony.

Judge Monroe, of the Superior Court, who heard the action, declared, in a ruling filed today, that he denied alimony because Mrs. Smith was "apparently able to take care of herself."
