

LUCILLE CAMERON REPUTATES NEGRO

White Girl, of Whose Love Johnson Boasts, Ready in Court to Testify.

SCOPE OF CASE WIDENS

Pastor Says if Pugilist Were Hanged to Pole and Shot, Penalty Would Be Light — Mysterious Woman Appears.

CHICAGO, Oct. 28.—(Special.)—In the army of witnesses that crowded the corridors of the Federal building today to testify in the Jack Johnson investigation, was the white girl whose love Johnson boasts belongs to him alone—Lucille Cameron.

Moreover, the girl announced that she was ready to do everything in her power to assist the Government in its prosecution of the negro pugilist. The days she has spent in a cell at the Rockford jail have given her an opportunity to think, she says, with the result that she has renounced the negro to return to her mother.

Witnesses Come From Far.
The Federal grand jury resumed its investigation of Johnson's affairs in the afternoon, with a long list of witnesses to be heard. The witnesses have been compelled to come to Chicago from half a dozen states, most of them unwillingly. The entire office of the department of justice in Chicago, along with numerous helpers assigned here from Washington, has been used to bring the witnesses together and today's procedure proved that the prosecution is on in earnest. Among the witnesses called were:

Adah Banks, negro, whose husband is suing Johnson for \$25,000 for alleged alienation of his wife's affections.
Perry S. Bauer, secretary of the manufacturing firm of Bauer & Black.
Charles E. Erbstein, attorney for Mrs. F. Cameron-Falconet, mother of Miss Cameron.
"Totie" Marshall, manager of Johnson's "Cafe de Champion."
Charles Johnson, brother of the pugilist, whose affairs are under investigation.

Proceedings Kept Secret.
The utmost secrecy was observed in the hearing of testimony during the day and witnesses were warned not to talk to anybody concerning their appearance before the grand jury.
It was learned that the investigation has been broadened to include testimony concerning other girls of Johnson's acquaintance than Miss Cameron. One in particular, whose name has been mentioned, has resulted in patching of Federal Service operatives to Wisconsin. It is not believed that they will find the girl, however, as it was known on Saturday that they would search for her and this start is considered sufficient to result in her being spirited away.

Miss Cameron and her mother spent the greater part of the day in United States Marshal Hoy's office. The girl showed her good spirits by cheering a passing band wagon in the street and smiling whenever opportunity arose.

Girl Not to See Negro Again.
"Yes, I have returned to mother and I'm glad I have seen the right at last," said she. "I'm going to go back home when this is over and will not see Johnson again."

"Are you going to testify against him?" was asked.

"I am going to help mother all I can and if they call me to the jury I will tell the entire truth."

"Were Jack Johnson swung from a lamp post and his body riddled with bullets, it would be light punishment for his sins," was the way Rev. Judson B. Thomas, of the First Baptist Church, of Austin, spoke to his congregation of the case of the negro pugilist.

Shortly before noon a tall and handsome mysterious woman was ushered into the grand jury room.

The woman, whose identity was carefully guarded by Federal authorities, created a stir. When she was brought into the office of Marshal Hoy all other business was suspended. Cameron-Falconet and her daughter, retired. After a short conference the woman was hastily pushed into the grand jury room.

NEZ PERCE MAN CLEARED

County Attorney Vindicated of Charge of Malfeasance.

LEWISTON, Idaho, Oct. 28.—(Special.)—County Attorney Dwight H. Hodge, of Nez Perce County, was today vindicated in the District Court on the charge of malfeasance in office in failing to prosecute certain cases, among which was the case against Lewiston lodge of the Elks, when 15 months ago the club rooms were raided and a quantity of liquor was found, and the failure to provide lists of stockholders of two banking institutions in this city.

In this case L. L. Haynes was plaintiff. He was a party who stated that he was a member of the Elks lodge when he provided a means to gain entrance to the lodge rooms to gain possession of the liquor. He was a member of the lodge, and was later expelled from the order. Upon motion of Attorney Charles L. McDonald, Mr. Hodge's attorney, to dismiss Judge Flynn ousted the action. This case is an outgrowth of a keenly-fought struggle regarding the local option fight in Nez Perce County.

Then came Mary Sullivan, the presiding angel of the cake counter, to the stand. She corroborated what she could of Mrs. Belmont's testimony, and so did Mrs. Mary Morgan, the manageress, and Grace Smith, the cashier. Magistrate O'Connor became bored by the mass of repetition and threw the case out of court. As Mrs. Belmont got into her limousine she said:

"Things like this will be impossible when women have the right to vote."

POISON FOUND IN BODIES

EXPERT SAYS EMBALMING FLUID CONTAINED NO DRUGS.

Professional Fortune-Tellers Say They See Spirits in Court at Trial of Mrs. Lindloff.

CHICAGO, Oct. 28.—The state introduced its principal evidence today in the trial here of Mrs. Louise Lindloff, spiritualist, clairvoyant and crystal gazer, charged with poisoning her son, Arthur, and whom the prosecution asserts had foreknowledge of the deaths of many other members of her own family.

Dr. Walter S. Haines, testifying as an expert toxicologist, said he found between three and four grains of a mineral poison, enough to cause death, in the body of Arthur Lindloff and that he also found the same drug in deadly quantities in the bodies of William Lindloff, one of Mrs. Lindloff's husbands, and Alma Lindloff, her daughter.

"In my opinion all three members of the family died from poison," said Dr. Haines. "The embalming fluid used in the bodies," he said, contained no poisonous substances.

Testimony favorable to the accused woman was given by Dr. John M. Berger, who said Mrs. Lindloff was willing the body of the boy should be examined. A number of fortune-tellers and alleged scientific crystal-gazers and spiritualistic mediums are attending the trial, and with the defendant, profess to see spirits hovering about the courtroom and to receive spirit messages concerning the case.

MARINES FIND HEROINE

Modern Mollie Pitcher Victim in Nicaraguan Battle.

NEW YORK, Oct. 28.—When American marines, on October 4 charged up and captured Coyotepe Hill, near Masaya, Nicaragua, after having raked the insurgent position with their batteries of rapid-fire guns, they found among the dead rebels a Nicaraguan woman—a modern Mollie Pitcher. Clutched tightly in her hands was a one pounder shell, which she was trying to load into a rebel field piece.

When a bullet from the American force struck her.

This story and other details of the battle were related today by Lieutenant George W. Martin, of the First Provisional regiment, United States Marine Corps, who came from Colon on the steamer Cristobal to have wounds he received in the battle treated at the Navy Yard Hospital.

The rebel losses in the fight, Lieutenant Martin said, were more than 200. Two marines—private Durham, of Company C, and Private Bobbitt, of Company B, were killed and several others wounded. The heavy casualties of the rebels were inflicted by Nicaraguan cavalry which pursued them after the Americans had captured the hill.

The Americans, 1000 strong, and under command of William M. McKelvey, attacked the rebel position after dashing across open country for 800 yards. Two barbed wire fences had been erected by the rebels near the top of the hill. Private Durham was sent in advance with cutters to destroy the trenches.

The Americans then brought their rapid-fire guns into play and attacked the rebel position from two sides. The fighting lasted a few minutes and when the marines reached the summit of the hill they found it deserted except for about 40 rebel dead, among them the woman.

JOHN GOLDEN ON STAND

WITNESS TELLS OF WRITING TO RYAN OF EXPLOSIONS.

Ironworkers' President and Orlie McManigal Said to Have Had Long Secret Talk.

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Oct. 28.—John Golden, president of the United Textile Workers of America, testified at the "dynamite conspiracy trial" today that he had corresponded with the ironworkers' union headquarters in Indianapolis about an explosion.

He said that in April, 1908, he wrote to Frank M. Ryan, president of the International Association of Bridge and Structural Ironworkers, enclosing a clipping headed "dynamite explodes," and saying "enclosed please find newspaper clipping which will be self-explanatory."

The clipping referred to an explosion on April 25, 1908, at Fall River, Mass., when two spans of the Edgemoor Ferry bridge across the Taunton River were blown up. It was one of the jobs that Orlie McManigal confessed to having traveled from Indianapolis to blow up on instructions from J. J. McNamara.

Mr. Golden identified a copy of a reply sent to him by Ryan. In the reply Ryan referred to an editorial in the union magazine commenting on the finding of dynamite on a job in Cleveland, which a nonunion workman said he placed in order that he might "discover" the explosive and be promoted. Mr. Ryan's reply to Golden was that the Fall River explosion might be classed with the finding of dynamite in Cleveland.

Testimony that President Ryan and McManigal had talked for two hours in a room to which the door was closed was given by H. J. Cook, a former stenographer for McNamara. Cook said he never had seen revolvers or explosives about the union headquarters, but once was required to take stenographic notes of magazine guns which he turned over to McNamara.

Two days before McManigal confessed he caused an explosion at Kansas City. Three automatic machine guns, one shotgun and cartridges were presented before the jury as having been the property of J. J. McNamara, James B. McNamara and McManigal. They were identified by Frank P. Baker, prosecuting attorney of Marion County, as part of the property taken from the ironworkers' headquarters after the McNamara arrest.

KNUTE NELSON FOR TAFT

Minnesota Senator Makes First Positive Indorsement.

ALEXANDRIA, Minn., Oct. 28.—Stating positively that he was in favor of the re-election of the Republican candidate, Senator Knute Nelson today gave his first positive indorsement of President Taft.

"Some questioned my attitude on National issues when I reluctantly consented to become a candidate for United States Senator," he said. "I did so as a Republican intending to support the Republican ticket. It is my intention now to support the Republican ticket from top to bottom. I have never called under false colors and never will."

"NEW EVIDENCE" TO BE BECKER'S PLEA

Counsel for Convicted Slayer Has Witnesses to Swear Vallon Shot Gambler.

SCHEPPS' STORY ASSAILED

McIntyre to Contend in Appeal for New Trial That Rose and Vallon Were Overheard Plotting Rosenthal Murder.

NEW YORK, Oct. 28.—It was learned tonight from sources close to the defense that the plea which counsel for Charles Becker will make for a new trial for the former police lieutenant will set forth under what will be described as "new evidence" that Harry Vallon, the informer, fired the shots that ended Herman Rosenthal's life and that "Bald Jack" Rose's story was a "frame-up" against Becker; that Sam Schepps, state witness who corroborated Rose's story, perjured himself when he swore he knew nothing of the murder plot, and that Harry Vallon committed perjury when he said he did not ride from the Hotel Metropole in the "murder car" after the slaying of Rosenthal.

A gambler whose name John F. McIntyre, Becker's chief counsel, is not ready to reveal, will swear, according to the appeal the lawyers are preparing, that it was Vallon who killed Rosenthal, while another witness is ready to testify that he heard Rose and Vallon plan the murder while at the home of Dora Gilbert, who was Rosenthal's first wife.

Another prospective witness, described as a "man of unimpeachable integrity," is ready to swear, according to Mr. McIntyre, that Rose told him three days before his confession to District Attorney Whitman that Vallon was Rosenthal's murderer.

"Red Phil" Davidson, slayer of "Big Jack" Zelig, will be placed on trial Wednesday morning. This trial, District Attorney Whitman expects, will take up the remainder of the week.

1500 HEAR TAX DEBATE

U'ren and Shields Discuss Pending Measure Before Salem Audience.

SALEM, Or., Oct. 28.—(Special.)—Before 1500 people at the armory Charles H. Shields and W. S. U'ren debated the tax question.

Mr. U'ren attacked the present system of taxing banks declaring that the assessors, in some counties at least, were allowing banks practically to dictate their own assessments. He also objected to any form of taxation which would place a tax on labor.

Mr. Shields assailed the graduated system in his contention of the murder of George Dedaskalos, September 22, confessed Sunday night to having delivered the first blow, but declared that Spanos cut the dead man's throat with a third man, Bert Cummings, was implicated and engineered the crime, instigating on a third of the loot.

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TWO POSSES SEEK HUNTER

Chehalis Hunter, Lost Since Wednesday, Found Near Raymond.

They led a posse of some 25 or 30 men from Centralia and other places.

Sturdevant wandered about until he emerged from the woods near Raymond. His mind was affected by his being without food for several days. It is said that he was seen through the forest on the South Bend train while he was being hunted in the woods by two posses.

SPOERI BECOMES MANAGER

Spokane Man Succeeds Yarnall With Pacific Telephone Company.

Fred Spoeri, for the last year and a half commercial manager of the Spokane office of the Pacific Telephone & Telegraph Company, has been transferred to Portland to become commercial manager of the local office to succeed John Yarnall. Mr. Yarnall has been transferred to San Francisco.

In Spokane Mr. Spoeri was prominent in the publicity work of the Rotary and Ad clubs and with the Elks Club. He was prominently connected with the Enakopa carnival of Spokane. Prior to going to Spokane Mr. Spoeri was at Los Angeles with the same company.

OIL SQUABBLE MAY END

Archbold and Rockefeller Offer to Sell to Pierce.

NEW YORK, Oct. 28.—The taking of testimony of John D. Archbold in the Standard Oil-Waters-Pierce litigation was postponed today until Thursday, pending the determination of negotiations to settle the suit out of court.

Although the counsel for neither side would discuss the case today, it became known Saturday that Mr. Archbold, John D. Rockefeller and other Standard Oil interests had offered to sell their holdings in the Waters-Pierce Company to H. Clay Pierce, thus settling the fight for control. The deal would involve \$2,000,000, it was said.

CALLS FLASH AFAR

New Navy Wireless Station Most Powerful in World.

GREAT RADIUS IS COVERED

Capital Now in Instant Communication With Key West, Guantanamo, Colon and All Stations on Atlantic Coast.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 28.—Crackling and sputtering, the Navy's new wireless station at Arlington, Va., the most powerful plant in the world, flung tonight from its lofty aerials the first messages which signaled the completion of an important step in the building of a globe-girdling wireless system that will keep every ship of the United States Navy and every insular possession within instant communication of the Capital.

Down in the sound-proof operating room, windowless and protected by double doors, some of the Navy's most experienced operators, directed by Lieutenant Woodworth, sent out the first flashet.

"N-A-X, N-A-X" the call for Colon, 1785 miles away, was sent through the ether. At intervals, the instrument sparked off "N-A-X," the call for Key West, 975 miles distant. No official messages were sent, but the results of the test were noted at all stations the Atlantic Coast as well as Key West

and Colon, and reports on the trials will be made tomorrow.

The radius of the new plant will be about 3000 miles when it is in working order. This range, probably the acme of wireless operations, will be attained gradually and it may be weeks before the big plant is "tuned up" to its highest efficiency.

Communication with the Pacific Coast will be attempted only at night for the present, but throughout the day the Secretary of the Navy at his desk in Washington will be within instantaneous communication with Key West, Guantanamo, Colon, the Navy coaling station and all Atlantic stations. When the plant is working perfectly and the chain of stations is completed, Washington will be in touch with Hawaii, Samoa, Guam, the Philippines and Pearl Harbor. The completed system will cost about \$1,000,000. Ships, because of weaker equipment, will be obliged to relay messages to the various stations for transmission to Washington.
