

PLAGUE WARRIOR IS DUTIFUL TO CHARGE

Lad Stopped From Spreading Handbills Takes Down Officer's Number.

STUDENTS VISIT EXHIBIT

Sixth, Seventh and Eighth Grades See Implements of War—DANGER OF DELAY IS DISCUSSED.

Reverend the usual order of things, Harry Hefferman, aged 14, yesterday gave a member of the Portland police department the experience of having his number taken, so that he might be reported to his superiors. The lad had been sent out by W. L. Cospier, superintendent of the National Tuberculosis Exhibit, to distribute circulars on the streets. He was warned by a man in citizen's clothes that he was violating an ordinance. He reported at headquarters, and was given a note signed by Mrs. T. D. Honeyman, secretary of the tuberculosis committee of the Visiting Nurse Association, saying that permission was given for the lad to distribute circulars on the streets. Thus armed, he again sallied forth with his red-crossed literature. Presently he returned, reporting that he had been "stopped by a cop" this time. "I showed him the note," said the boy, "and he called up some place on the phone, and then told me to beat it. I took his number. It's 176," he added, referring to his notebook.

Mayor Grants Permission.
No official order had been issued permitting the distribution of the circulars, but Mayor Rushlight had given the visiting nurses informal permission, telling them that in case any objection should arise to let him know. So when Harry Hefferman goes out this morning with his bundle of circulars, he will go armed with an official permit, which he will show to every policeman in Portland, if necessary to get his message to the people.

A number of new placards, bringing the meaning of the exhibit home to Portland people, were displayed yesterday in the assembly-room adjoining the exhibit. "Dirty houses breed dirty people. Dirty people breed disease," reads one. "Clean out the dirty shacks and lodging-houses in Portland."

In his black lettering it is announced that "Portland needs immediately a city-supported dispensary, an emergency hospital, a hospital for contagious diseases, and an open-air school for tubercular children."

Government Is Rebuked.
Uncle Sam receives this bold rebuke: "If the Government would provide as much for the health of children as it does for that of sheep and cattle, the children would die from contagious and infectious diseases."

"Is Portland doing all it can to prevent tuberculosis?" asks another poster, at the same time giving the emphatic answer: "Certainly not, as long as every tenth death is caused by the disease."

The attendance yesterday was nearly 2500, of whom 800 were sixth, seventh and eighth-grade school-children, who came in three parties, and saw everything to be seen in the exhibit-room, afterward being shown the moving pictures of the treatment of the disease.

Last night's programme was greeted with a good attendance, the greatest interest being displayed in the several lectures. F. C. Knapp, president of the Chamber of Commerce, presided, and the first address was by Rev. John Boyd, pastor of the First Presbyterian Church, who spoke on "The Church and the Tuberculosis Campaign," declaring that the church not only had its place in the present campaign, but that it would assume that place as a sacred duty.

DANGER OF DELAY DISCUSSED.

"Compulsory Notification and Registration of Tuberculosis" was the subject of the address delivered by Dr. Alan Welch Smith, president of the City Board of Health. Dr. Smith was pronounced in favor of a rigid civil system of notification and regulation of all cases of tuberculosis, outlining the many benefits to be derived from such a system.

"The Importance of Early Diagnosis" was emphasized by Dr. George S. Whitelaw, who deplored the present tendency of procrastination, which often brings a case to the attention of a physician after it has become hopeless.

A series of stereopticon pictures were shown following the addresses. Mr. Cospier and the committees in charge are much encouraged over the interest shown thus far, and are hoping that before the close of the exhibit next Saturday they can get the truth concerning tuberculosis into every Portland home.

BRIDEGROOM IS MISSING

George Huard Disappears Less Than Week After Wedding.

Less than a week after his marriage, George Huard, an employee at Blumauer & Frank's wholesale drug store, is missing, under circumstances that point to violent death or other mishap. He left his work early Saturday afternoon, complaining of feeling ill and said he was going home, but failed to arrive there.

Last Tuesday Huard was married to Miss Jessie Durbin, of Oak Grove, and established a home at Evergreen station. He had been employed by the drug firm for two years. He is more than six feet tall and noticeably slender, is smooth-shaven and has red hair. When last seen he was wearing a gray suit and blue flannel shirt.

CITY BUILDING AWARDED

Friberg Construction Company Successful Bidder at \$122,320.

City Jail and fire station at Second and Oak streets was let to the Friberg Construction Company, the lowest bidder. The contract amounted to \$122,320 of which amount \$112,320 was for the police station and City Jail and \$20,000 for the fire station.

Upon the request of the Manufacturers' Association, which was represented at the meeting by Sidney Vinco, Oregon brick will be given consideration in the erection of the building. Under the terms of the specifications for the structure the brick to be used was of Seattle make. This was objectionable to the association because of the fact that Oregon brick is considered just as good and as cheap. The committee after hearing arguments pro and con on the subject arranged to test the Oregon and the Washington brick to determine which is better for the building purposes. The test will be made between now and the time the contractor is ready for the brick which probably will be two months.

Mr. Friberg the successful contractor announced at the meeting that his company was ready to go to work at once on the new building and he said he expected to push construction through without delay. The action of the committee in letting the contract to the Friberg Company was approved by the Board at the regular monthly meeting next Thursday.

HUNTERS ENJOY TREAT

SUNDAY RECKONED AS BIGGEST DUCK DAY OF SEASON.

A. L. Mills Bags 35 Game Fowls Before 9 o'Clock—Other Nimrods Have Fruitful Outing.

The Portland Gun Club was extremely lucky to welcome a squad of 29 shotgun artists to the Kenton traps on Sunday for it was the biggest day of the 1912 duck season, with practically every hunter returning from the lakes and sloughs of the Columbia with the limit bag of 35 fowl.

The heavy rains of last week added several inches of water to lakes and sloughs rapidly drying up, and the air over the hunting premises was thick with winging mallard, teal, sprig, widgones, spoonbill and an occasional brant goose.

At Deer Island the members of the Deer Island Hunting Club bagged the limit within three hours after sunrise, while the Saville Island clubmen enjoyed a successful day at the traps.

A. L. Mills, president of the First National Bank, killed 35 ducks and brant geese on the Deer Island preserve by 9 o'clock Sunday morning, his best record for the present season. Other club members of Mr. Mills were just as fortunate.

Joe Stett and C. B. Williams shot at the Athenian Gun Club lakes, near Little Sturgeon, and had a successful day. Dr. C. H. Wheeler, Dr. J. M. Montgomery and Edgar King had no trouble in securing large strings on the King Place, Saville Island.

Word has been received by President Cullison, of the Portland Gun Club, that the Interstate Association has received the bid of Portland for the 1913 Pacific Coast handicap, and that the application will be acted upon at a meeting scheduled for Pittsburgh December 5 and 6.

The future of the monthly Winter shoots of the Gun Club will be decided at a meeting this week. The attendance Sunday was flattering, considering the duck weather, but a number of Portland blue rock enthusiasts failed to respond to the call.

800 BOWLERS WILL COMPETE.

KANSAS CITY, Oct. 28.—Eight hundred bowlers have filed their entries for the Middle West bowling tournament which will be held on the Grand Allevs here November 27 to December 3. Entries close November 17. Chicago, St. Louis, St. Paul, Minneapolis, Omaha, Des Moines, Denver, and numerous other cities have teams entered. The prize money will total \$7500. The tournament is second in importance as a National event only to the American Bowling Congress games.

STRAW VOTE DENIED

Chairman Moores Declares Result Not Dependable.

SILENT POLL COUNTED ON

Republican Leader Says Taft Will Win if Supporters Only Get Out and Cast Ballot—Roosevelt Least Feared Now.

State Chairman Moores, of the Republican committee, refused to accept as dependable in the slightest degree the estimate of the New York Herald, which is supporting Wilson, showing the Democratic nominee the very probable winner in the Presidential contest. Mr. Moores not only points out the inconsistency of the Herald's figures, but he quotes from a letter from the Republican National headquarters to the effect that if the supporters of the President go to the polls and vote Tuesday, Taft will be re-elected.

"The Democratic estimate of the Democratic New York Herald as to the probable result of the Presidential election is less than Moore yesterday, 'is just what would naturally be expected from that source. It reminds one of the careful poll of all the states by Senator James K. Jones, of Arkansas, when he was chairman of the National Democratic Committee. The states were carefully listed and were practically all carried by enormous majorities for Bryan. If the Oregonian would give in parallel columns the estimates of the states and the actual returns it would read like one of Mark Twain's richest travesties."

"Silent" Vote to Figure.
"The estimate of Chairman Barnes, who has the same interest in booming Taft that the Herald has in booming Wilson, showing New York for Taft, is at least just as authentic. The fact is that the great silent vote, which in the State of Pennsylvania alone is placed at 400,000 is the vote that will do the business. The Taft constituency, like Taft himself, is not of the inflammatory, hysterical and emotional class. It is not always on parade. The silent vote is the thoughtful vote, and it has evidence in every community that the thoughtful vote is the Taft vote."

"There came to Republican headquarters this morning a letter from David W. Mulvane, director in charge of the headquarters of the Republican National Committee at Chicago. This letter was not for publication and was in its nature confidential, but I shall quote its opening sentence which was as follows: 'We will not try to elect Taft by our vote on election day. That is not campaign "bunk." It is my deliberate judgment, based upon reports from every Republican in this city on October 17, that if everybody who really wants Taft elected goes to the polls and votes for him, he will be elected.'

Abundant Is Pointed Out.
"The game of the Herald and of every other Democratic organ is to create the impression that Wilson is to sweep the country and thus drive Republicans to vote for Wilson."

Wilson is so sure of election why appeal so earnestly to Republicans to support him? If these absurd prognostications are true they furnish the last reason in the world for Republicans to stand by Taft. Think of the absurdity of the Republican position. The ground that Wilson is to win. How does that sort of proposition appeal to any Republican with the slightest modicum of common sense in the 70th year of his life? On the other hand it emphasizes the absurdity of voting for Wilson to beat Roosevelt."

"One absurdity of the Herald's estimate is shown in the case of Idaho. Speaking of that state, the estimate

FOGEL DENIES ALLEGATION
Philadelphia Expresses Defiance to National League.

NEW YORK, Oct. 28.—General denial of the charges brought by the National League against Horace Fogel, president of the league's Philadelphia club, in this city on October 17, contained in a letter received today from Fogel by President Lynch.
