

NASSAU STUDENTS GIVE UNIQUE GIFT

Princeton Would Retain Mrs. Cleveland by Adding New Husband to Faculty.

HIBBEN EVADES QUESTION

Announcement Expected Next April. Which Rumor Flies as Wedding Date—Bride-to-Be Is Held as College Godmother.

PRINCETON, N. J., Oct. 30.—(Special.)—While Mrs. Grover Cleveland today blushing refused to discuss her engagement to Professor Thomas J. Preston, except to say that she was the most contented woman in the world, the students at Old Nassau are gleefully planning a unique wedding present for the two.

The announcement may be expected before long—about next April, when rumor says the wedding is to take place—that Professor Thomas J. Preston, occupant of the chair of archaeology and the history of arts at Wells College, Aurora, N. Y., has received an invitation to accept a chair at Princeton University.

Students Make Plans.

From the students' viewpoint the situation is: "Professor Preston is a Princeton graduate, a prince among men personally, and we like him. But Mrs. Cleveland—why, Princeton wouldn't be Princeton without her. She is the fairy god-mother of the college. Now in most cases when two persons are married the woman goes to live in the man's home. But in this instance Mrs. Cleveland must remain in Princeton and Professor Preston must transfer his intellectual activities to Princeton."

With such an irresistible line of reasoning, Dr. John Grier Hibben, president of Princeton, was approached to-night and asked if he or the trustees of the university contemplated offering Professor Preston a post. Dr. Hibben laughingly turned aside the query.

Dr. Hibben Is Impressed.

It is known, however, that Dr. Hibben, besides being an intimate personal friend of Professor Preston, has an exceedingly high opinion of Professor Preston's scholastic ability, and so there seems ground for the student belief that Professor Preston will be enrolled among the faculty of his alma mater next year.

"Mrs. Cleveland has always been intensely interested in Princeton," said Dr. Hibben tonight. "Her home has always been open to the students and her social charm made it an exceedingly attractive gathering place. In addition Mrs. Cleveland has carried out many of the ideas of her late husband. Mr. Cleveland was really a fairly good father to many of the students. No one will ever know just how much money he spent in aiding poor boys to secure a coveted education."

RULINGS FIRM BUT TRUE

Senate's Chief Clerk Pays Tribute to Late Vice-President.

Henry H. Gilroy, chief clerk of the United States Senate, for the past 25 years and who has returned to Oregon to cast his vote at the coming National election, was much affected on learning of the death of Vice-President Sherman.

"My position in the Senate," he said, "is largely in the capacity as advisory on parliamentary questions, which the Vice-President has to decide, and this relation naturally brings us into close and intimate association."

"Of Mr. Sherman I personally had the highest regard and strong affection, as he had an attractive personality that made him universally popular with the members of the Senate, and at the same time it was accepted that his rulings were always fair."

"Mr. Sherman was a parliamentarian without an equal in the Senate, and the Republican leaders of the House often consulted him on matters of procedure when important questions were involved. He was universally respected and honored. He was overshadowed by some others because he was not aggressive in his own behalf, but now that he has passed away, his life work as a legislator and presiding officer of the United States Senate will be appreciated."

"He was always the same, and all knew that when he made a decision, in his quiet, gentle way, it was final. He was exceptionally deliberate in his rulings, and at times he was considered as hesitating, but there is no record of an appeal from his rulings being carried."

"As the presiding officer of the Senate, he never showed partiality and took no means to advance unfairly any Republican measure, although he was a most ardent believer in his party's principles as the best safeguards for the country."

"It was in my hearing, about the close of the recent session of Congress, that he said, in conversation with some of his associates, he had no desire for a re-election, and would prefer to retire to private life. But it had been impressed upon him that he might assist the candidacy of Mr. Taft, and he said he would make any sacrifice to that end, as no one knew better than that the President had been true to his promises to his party, and was gradually working out the plans he made in his inaugural speech and letter of acceptance, and with another term they would be fulfilled."

Mr. Gilroy is a resident of Salem, and votes there, but is in Portland at present as the guest of C. B. Moore, a life-long friend.

HAWLEY AT OREGON CITY

Representative Makes Non-Political Address at Commercial Club.

OREGON CITY, Oct. 30.—(Special.)—Before an enthusiastic meeting of Oregon City business men in the Commercial Club tonight, Representative Hawley made a rousing address on business conditions, told of the great benefit Oregon would receive by the opening of the Panama Canal, told of his work in behalf of the Willamette River channel improvement and promised further aid toward securing for this city a Federal building.

His talk was of a non-political nature throughout.

CASE IS POSTPONED

Grand Jury Puts Over Negro Inquiry Until November 7.

AGENTS CONTINUE SEARCH

Mulatto Singer Testifies About Report of Shooting Johnson in Leg in Fit of Jealousy—Lucille Cameron Takes Stand.

CHICAGO, Oct. 30.—

Federal grand jury investigations into the relations of the negro pugilist, Jack Johnson, with white women and members of his own race, precipitated by the recovery from association with him of Lucille Cameron, a Minneapolis girl, by her mother, was put over today until November 7, or after the election.

No work will be done by the grand jury in the interval, but agents of the Department of Justice, it was announced, would continue their search for evidence relating to Johnson's acts.

Mrs. Adah Banks Davis, the mulatto singer in Johnson's cafe, testified regarding the shooting of Johnson in the leg in a fit of jealousy. Her husband has in court a suit for \$25,000 against the pugilist, charging alienation of affections.

Charles Johnson, the negro's brother, and George Smiley, a doorman at the Johnson cafe, also testified.

Six indictments charging violation of the Federal "white slave" statute, which were returned by the grand jury, were returned by the Federal grand jury today. Immediately afterward the grand jury called to the witness stand Lucille Cameron to tell many more details concerning the negro.

matter of a violent anti-suffrage character, at first unsigned and then signed only by the name of the printer, have been printed and secretly at Eugene by some person or persons unknown to the public. The matter is already in the mail. The absence of the name of the author and of the publisher is a criminal offense and immediate steps are being taken to find the author and to institute civil and criminal proceedings. John F. Logan and Dan J. Malarkey are the attorneys for the Portland Equal Suffrage Association, which is backing the move.

Two telegrams were sent to J. R. Bryson, the District Attorney at Eugene, by Mr. Logan, the first of which read: "Your attention is called to the fact that the Portland Equal Suffrage Association has been circulating a circular in violation of code section 3519, first issued without name of author or printer, and later issued under the name of the association, but without author's name. You are requested to institute injunction and prohibitory proceedings under section named. Myself and Dan J. Malarkey represent Portland Equal Suffrage League and stand sponsor for this wire."

The second was merely to advise Mr. Bryson that the pamphlets were against suffrage and continued: "Many prominent people throughout the state are aroused over this illegal act of suppression of the truth. Three of the officers of the anti-suffrage association to whom the pamphlets were shown, denied all knowledge of them, and said that they neither individually nor for the association had issued or authorized the issue of any such pamphlets. They were printed at first, according to our information," said Mr. Logan, "without the name of the publisher or the author. Then, when the people responsible learned that this was illegal, they had the papers rushed back and run through again, this time with the name of the printing office on them, but still without the name of the author. Presumably they thought that this was sufficient to satisfy the demands of the law."

"Those circulars are now in the mails."

and the best evidence of all that there is the printing of them first with no name at all and then with the printer's name, but not the author's, showing that they did not want it known at whose instigation these pamphlets were being prepared.

"This shows the extent of the lengths to which they will go to avoid defeat if they can."

"It is their last stand. They know that if equal suffrage carries and has once been adopted in the state of Oregon it will never be repealed."

"The penalty is a fine of not less than \$10 and not more than \$1000."

The president of the Portland Equal Suffrage League, Mrs. Solomon Hirsch, said that she did not think that the pamphlets were used by the anti-suffragist society.

"But we cannot fight against this sort of thing," she said. "We will fight and fight all the time anybody and everybody who is making a straight fight against us, but understand, methods by enemies who dare not, or will not, sign their names, such means of winning we will not tolerate."

The heading of one of the statements reads: "Majority of women opposed to suffrage," and then goes on to say that the suffragists themselves admit this. Another pamphlet comes out with the statement that suffrage is to be costly. At the end, the article is credited, "Francisco Chronicle, March 2, 1912." Another in large type comes out with the statement that "Woman's vote had not helped child labor."

Still an additional pamphlet talks about the paid agitators of suffrage as being the only people to demolish the vote.

One pamphlet quotes an advertisement in the Woman's Journal, with regard to the sale of some Scotch terriers. "The advertiser should be able to sell plenty of his Scotch terriers through the columns of the suffrage paper, particularly since they are not given to fighting and roaming. Men have been known to fight and also to roam and what suffrage household would gladly trade mere man for a good dog, even though the 'God bless our home' motto had been turned to the wall pending a decision on the comparative merits of Wilson, Taft and Teddy."

BIG POWER PLANT PLANNED

\$10,000,000 Canal Projected at Priest Rapids on Columbia.

ELLENBURG, Wash., Oct. 30.—

(Special.)—That a canal to cost about \$10,000,000 will be built at Priest Rapids, on the Columbia river, which will generate 75,000 to 100,000 horsepower, is the announcement made by a prominent Columbia River Valley rancher, who was in Ellenburg today.

H. Stanley Coffin, who returned from that country several days ago, said that work on the canal had already commenced, and that the ditch is over 200 feet deep at the bottom.

Machinery to construct the canal and build the dam across the Columbia will, it is said, be shipped from Keokuk, Ia., where the Mississippi is being dammed. Work on the Milwaukee extension down the river is being pushed and it is generally believed that the road will be in by the C. & N. at Benton City, although the latest assertion is that the connection will be made at Kennewick.

COLONEL LAWSON IS NAMED

Governor West Appoints Eugene Man to Conduct Klamath Falls Inquiry.

SALEM, Or., Oct. 30.—

(Special.)—Lieutenant-Colonel B. K. Lawson, of Cottage Grove, has been designated by Governor West to go to Klamath Falls and make an investigation of conditions which are said to exist there.

This investigation grows out of charges that a police officer assaulted a newspaperman in the presence of city officials. The governor first designated Colonel Hammond, of Eugene, but he was unable to accept.

BECKER SEVERELY EXECUTION STAYED

Appeal Will Save Convicted Man From Death on December 9.

PRISONER STILL HOPEFUL

Wife of Doomed Convict Goes to Sing Sing With Him, Where He Is Placed in "Death Cell." He Holds Nerve.

OSISING, N. Y., Oct. 30.—Former Police Lieutenant Charles Becker is in the "death house" at Sing Sing tonight under sentence to die in the electric chair during the week of December 3, the convicted murderer of the gambler, Herman Rosenthal. He was brought here from New York today immediately after sentence was pronounced upon him by Justice Goff in the court room where he was found guilty six days ago.

Becker's execution will be stayed, however, by the filing in the interim of a notice of appeal from the verdict. In this lies Becker's only hope of escape from death. His last words before the gates of the prison were shut behind him this afternoon were:

"I come here an innocent man. I never had a chance. I was railroaded. But the fight has only begun. I expect a reversal of the verdict and a new trial."

Becker maintains composure. Becker arrived at the prison at 1:40 o'clock after a 50-minute walk through the streets of the village, surrounded by several hundred persons, curious to see him. With stolid countenance and head erect, Becker withstood the ordeal without losing his composure, cool as he had accompanied him from New York and had driven ahead of him from the railroad station. Becker waved his hands and the woman threw a kiss.

An hour later, after the formality of taking the pedigree was over, Becker was in the "death cell," in solitary confinement, clad in prison garb and entered as prisoner No. 82,499. Three other condemned murderers occupy cells in the "death house" with him.

Mrs. Becker was allowed to see her husband through the steel screen of his cell door before she departed, but entrance was forbidden her. She purpose to make her residence in Ossining during her husband's confinement and will be allowed to visit him daily, but not to enter his cell.

J. P. McIntyre, Becker's chief counsel, who suffered a nervous collapse after the close of the trial, was unable to be in court today. His condition is serious, but not critical.

When Becker was brought into court he walked slowly to the bar and, catching the eye of acquaintances among the newspaper men, nodded to them with a faint smile.

"Charles Becker, have you any legal cause to show why judgment of death should not be pronounced against you?" asked the judge.

Attorney Interrupts Client. Becker opened his mouth as if to speak, but before he could reply, John W. Hart, his attorney of record, rose to make the usual motions to set aside the verdict and to arrest judgment.

Justice Goff denied the motions and then pronounced the sentence.

Becker himself, condemned without any show of emotion other than the closing of his eyes and the compression of his lips.

"Red Phil" Davidson, slayer of "Big Jack" Zelig, the gang leader, will escape the electric chair. At the opening of his trial today he withdrew his former plea of not guilty, and entered a plea of guilty to second degree murder. The penalty may be life imprisonment.

A jury was obtained in record time. Justice Goff then called to the stand physicians who had examined the defendant, and on their testimony that he was weak mentally, the plea of second degree murder was accepted. Sentence was deferred.

HARVESTER PROFITS BIG

MCCORMICK CAPITAL MULTIPLIED IN DIVIDENDS.

Witness in Government Inquiry Says

Trust Sold 85 to 90 Per Cent of Country's Output.

CHICAGO, Oct. 30.—Rodney B. Swift, former head of the law and experiment department of the McCormick Harvester Company, gave a detailed account of the organization of the Harvester combination in 1902 at the hearing of the Government's dissolution suit against the International Harvester Company here today.

Mr. Swift said early in 1902 he went to New York with Cyrus H. McCormick and met J. P. Morgan, George W. Perkins, F. B. Stearns, Attorney Cromwell and Mr. Stewart, head of one of the large trust companies. The witness said Stearns assured them the combination could be formed without violating the law. Mr. Morgan said he would finance the proposition. Attorney Cromwell said the combination could be legally formed.

In July, 1902, the witness made another visit to New York with Cyrus H. McCormick and Stanley McCormick and, after two weeks of conference, final plans for the organization of the International Harvester Company were decided upon. George W. Perkins represented J. P. Morgan & Co. at these conferences, said Mr. Swift.

It was agreed that Cyrus H. McCormick should be president and that the McCormick Harvester Company should be the operating company.
