**Religion Makes Him Serene.** Marshall was not surprised. He is a Presbyterian and clings in perfect good faith to the doctrine that matters have been decreed. He does not call himself a fatalist, but he believes firmly that the eternal decree cannot be altered by the puny acts of man. The course of life has given him a peculiar serene and untroubled sunny conditions. He does not play golf or chop wood, or even take long walks. When he travels between his office and his home he is untroubled by the odors of charity and sociability, and he studies constantly. His aversion to labor is not the aversion of a lazy man, but the aversion of a man who simply takes the view that there is manual labor to be done, and he can do it, probably better than anyone else.

He was asked once what he did for exercise. "I read," he replied.

Despite this aversion he keeps in the best of health. He is far from being puny. He has done a prodigious amount of work as Governor and has been successful in his campaign. He is 58 years old.
