Brief History of Newly-Elected Occupants of Gubernatorial Chairs.

DUNNE WINS IN ILLINOIS

Minnesota Returns Governor Eberhart, One of Few Republicans to Win—Hodges, Democrat, Carries Kansas.

SUCCESSFUL CANDIDATES FOR GOVERNOR IN VARIOUS STATES.

Florida: Park Trammell, Democrat; Illinois: Edward F. Dunne, Democrat; Indiana: Samuel M. Ralston, Democrat; Massachusetts: Eugene N. Foss, Democrat; New York: William Sulzer, Democrat; North Carolina: Locke Craig, Democrat; South Carolina: Cole E. Blesse, Democrat; Tennessee: Ben W. Hooper, Democrat; Texas: Oscar B. Colquitt, Democrat.

CHICAGO, Nov. 5.—(Special.)—Who are the Governors elected today, what experience in public life have they had, what are the main facts in their careers and to what political parties do they belong? These questions will be answered in brief below.

Illinois is taken first and appears, therefore, out of alphabetical order in the list. Illinois—Edward F. Dunne, Democrat, Mayor of Chicago, 1906-7 and in law practice since that time. In 1881 he married Elizabeth J. Kelly, of Chicago. Ten of their 13 children are living. Mr. Dunne is a Catholic. Colorado—E. M. Ammons, Democrat, is a wealthy stockman and ranchman of Larimer County, about 54 years of age. He has been active in politics for 20 years and has represented his district in both branches of the Legislature for ten years, the last two terms as State Senator.

Connecticut—Simon Eben Baldwin, Democrat, was elected Governor of Connecticut in 1911, having served as Associate Justice and Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of Errors of his state. Governor Baldwin has achieved a national reputation as a lawyer and has written a number of authoritative works on the law. He was at one time a Republican.

Delaware—Thomas M. Monaghan, Democrat, has been prominent in state politics for 12 years. He has served two terms in the State Senate and was elected president pro tem by the Republicans after they had failed to elect one of their own party. He has also served in the lower house of the Assembly.

Idaho—James H. Hawley, Democrat, is serving his first term as Governor. Before he entered the Governor's office he had served in the Idaho House of Representatives and the Senate, had been District Attorney of the Second Idaho District and United States Attorney of the state. He was born in 1847 and was one of the pioneers of the territory.

Democrat Succeeds Marshall. Indiana—Samuel Moffett, Ralston, Democrat, was the nominee of his party for Secretary of State, of Indiana, in 1894 and 1898, but was defeated by the Republican landslides of those years. He was president of the school board of Lebanon from 1908 to 1911. With this exception he has never held office. Iowa—E. G. Dunn, Democrat, a grain dealer, and for the last two years has been secretary of the State Grain Dealers Association of Iowa. He was born on a farm and was educated at the University of Iowa. When he announced that he would be a candidate for the nomination for Governor, his fellow-townsmen at Mason City, regardless of party affiliations, joined in giving him a reception.

Kansas—George H. Hodges, Democrat, led the fight for Woodrow Wilson in his state, when every other Democratic politician of importance was against him. He has served two years in the state Senate and was found supporting every progressive measure introduced. He has conducted a campaign against machine methods in his party. Mr. Hodges is a wealthy lumber merchant.

Massachusetts—Eugene Noble Foss, Democrat, was first elected Governor of his state in 1910, and was re-elected in 1911. Previous to that time, he had been elected to fill a vacancy in Congress. He began a campaign for tariff revision in 1902. Mr. Foss was originally a Republican, but joined the Democratic party in order to work for political reforms in which he believed.

Ferris Wins in Michigan. Michigan—Woodbridge Ferris, Democrat, was a candidate for Congress in 1882, and for Governor in 1904. He is proprietor of the Ferris Institute at Big Rapids, a private school. He was born in New York, was graduated in medicine from the University of Michigan and was principal of a business college at Freeport, Illinois, for a time. He made his campaign for Governor as an energetic progressive.

Minnesota—Adolph O. Eberhart, Republican, became Governor of Minnesota in 1909 on the death of Governor Johnson. At the election in 1904 he received a majority of 42,000 votes, notwithstanding the fact that the late Governor, running on the opposite ticket, won by 72,000 votes. Governor Eberhart was born in Sweden. Missouri—Elliot W. Major, Democrat, is Attorney-General of Missouri, a position to which he was elected in 1908. He is a native of Missouri, having been born there in 1864. After being admitted to the bar he became a law partner of Charles H. Smith in 1890. He was elected without opposition State Senator from the Eleventh Missouri District. He edited and compiled the revised statutes of Missouri for 1899.

Montana Elects Handsome Man. Montana—Samuel W. Stewart, Democrat, was born in Ohio 46 years ago, was educated in the University of Kansas, and went to Montana 14 years ago. He is a lawyer by profession and always has been active in Democratic politics. He is 6 feet 2, blonde, and exceedingly handsome. He assumed the leadership of the Montana Democracy two years ago when, as state chairman, he brought about the defeat of Senator Thomas H. Carter. Nebraska—John H. Morehead, Democrat, is at present State Senator from the First Senatorial District. He served as president of the last Senate and became Acting Lieutenant-Governor after the death of the former incumbent. He is reputed to be the wealthiest man in Southeast Nebraska. He is a banker and a stock raiser, living at Falls City.

SIGNALS TELL NEWS

The Oregonian Flashes Returns to Many Cities.

SERVICE MOST ELABORATE

In Accordance With Prearranged Plan Result of Election When Received Here Is Sent to Neighboring Towns.

Undoubtedly the most successful election signal service attempted by a newspaper in the United States was the electric flash service carried out last night by The Oregonian by arrangement with the Portland Railway, Light & Power Company. In accordance with a plan of signals outlined in yesterday's paper, the residence districts of Portland, Oregon City, Vancouver, Wash., and the main towns of Multnomah County were notified of the election of Woodrow Wilson a few minutes after 7 o'clock. In addition to the residence flash service, two large electric signals were maintained on the top of the Oregonian building, which were lighted shortly after 7 P. M. in accordance with a code of signals. The lights for the election of Wilson were red and white. They could be seen for miles and told to thousands of people the story of the National election as gathered by The Oregonian from the entire United States by two special leased wires, operated by the Associated Press through San Francisco.

The plan for flashing the residence lights was worked out by J. R. Robley, of the Portland Railway, Light & Power Company. By a series of house-to-house switches in the various substations in the city, it was possible to flash every residence light within a period of 10 minutes. There were 12 of these mammoth switches which controlled the electric current in the entire residence section.

As these switches were opened and closed the Wilson signal was flashed throughout Portland, Salem, Vancouver and on all the lines between Portland and the power stations. The switches which were placed in the following sub-power stations: Jefferson, Knott, Station L at the foot of East Lincoln street, Station E on Twenty-third street, St. Johns, Columbia, Tabor, Sellwood, Lents, Boring, Oregon City and Vancouver. The Salem switch was operated in Salem.

Experiment Is Successful.

Every light in the residence sections of the cities named flashed twice if they were turned on when the signal was given. Otherwise the signal had no effect. The flash service was an experiment which proved highly successful. Within the 10 minutes that it required for the flash, more than 300,000 persons were

told in unmistakable terms the result of the election.

ALL GERMANY AROUSED

Epidemic of Boy and Girl Suicides Will Be Investigated.

BERLIN, Nov. 5.—(Special.)—The recent suicide of a schoolboy of 15 years at Frankfurt-on-the-Main, coming after a series of such tragedies, has once more raised the question of school examinations and the too strenuous upbringing of youthful Germany. In the case under notice the boy, son of a well-to-do and very honorable family of Magdeburg, stole \$175, and then disappeared. The police were asked to arrest him, as already he had shown himself an exceedingly headstrong character. But for a week no trace of him could be found. Finally, he was discovered dead in a hotel in Frankfurt, having shot himself in the head. More recently still, in Berlin, the son of an hotelier, only 13, hanged himself in the cellar, having been rather shamed by a newspaper in the United States that was the explanation given to the authorities, and which was accepted for want of a better. Last week, again, a boy of 15 years shot himself in bed, after showing extraordinary deliberation and invention in fixing up the apparatus by means of which he discharged the pistol.

These were three of the more remarkable cases. One may also remember a case of double suicide in which two school children, a boy and a girl, ended their lives, and many almost explicable cases of the suicide of young servant girls. Indeed, a casual glance at the suicide lists might lead one to believe that in Germany suicide is a common under 20 than in adult ages. The general reasons are not very clear. School examinations and the strenuous programme of the German schools have undoubtedly been a factor in some cases. It is even said that the education system, which has certainly done so much towards the greater refinement of Germany, is one that ultimately "sends the weak ones to the wall." Perhaps a greater factor is the psychological upheaval coming in the wake of a commercial rise of great rapidity. Parents who were brought up with Spartan simplicity now find themselves able to bring up their children in the lap of luxury. Indeed, there is a tendency towards too much luxury.

Still another cause may be seen in the precocious reading of philosophy, which seems to have as strong a hold on young Germans in some quarters as the "penny dreadfuls" in other countries.

MONTENEGRINS DRIVEN BACK

Excursion Across Boyana River Is Checked by Superior Force.

VIENNA, Nov. 5.—The correspondent at Scutari of the Reichstag telegraphs that the Montenegrins again crossed the Boyana River today, but that they met a superior force of Turks and were compelled to retire. Some of the Montenegrin shells hit houses in the Christian quarter of Scutari and several persons were wounded. The Turkish military hospital also was hit by shells fired at a magazine close by.

HARVARD GROWTH AIM

Plan Is to Have Representative in Each Class From Every State, Thus Widening Influence.

BOSTON, Nov. 5.—(Special.)—With the possible exception of the new plan of entrance requirements, no single act of recent years promises to do so much toward Nationalizing Harvard University as the decision of the Associated Harvard Clubs to offer 11 new scholarships each valued at \$300 and each to be awarded to some man in those states which now have a representation of less than four in the university. The ultimate plan is to insure for registration in every incoming class of a representative from each and every state in the Union.

In four years there should be four men in the university from each state as a permanent pledge of the continued democracy of the university, which thereafter there would be graduates returning to every state carrying back the "spirit of Harvard" as fertile seed for new growth of influence and power.

Bulletins Are Flashed.

In addition to the signal service, The Oregonian maintained a street stereophonic bulletin service which attracted thousands of persons. As the news of the election was flashed to The Oregonian from all over the United States, the figures were flashed on a screen opposite the Oregonian building on Sixth street. The bulletins began as soon as the first returns were received from the far East and were continued until after midnight, while the results in Oregon were being reported by a small army of messengers who were gathering returns throughout the state for The Oregonian. Special incomplete returns were gathered throughout Multnomah County by The Oregonian at 8, 9, 10, 11 and 12 o'clock.

T. R. Leads in Tacoma.

TACOMA, Wash., Nov. 5.—(Special.)—Twenty-five precincts in Tacoma, Pierce County, give Taft 1879, Wilson 1739, Roosevelt 2234.

WILSON LEADS IDAHO

Roosevelt Expected to Run Second With 30,000 Votes.

BORAH'S RE-ELECTION SURE

Martin, Bull Moose Gubernatorial Candidate, Appears to Lead Over Hawley and Haines—Republicans Claim State Offices.

BOISE, Idaho, Nov. 5.—(Special.)—Woodrow Wilson will carry the State of Idaho for President. Partial and incomplete returns, a reflection of the trend of the vote, places Wilson in the lead, Roosevelt second and Taft third. This is considered a remarkable showing, if the final vote verifies it, in face of the Supreme Court decision forcing the writing of the names of the Roosevelt electors off the ballot.

The total vote in the state on President will be approximately 90,000, divided as follows: Wilson 40,000, Roosevelt 30,000, Taft 20,000, with a small vote for Debs. The Prohibitionists will also have a scattering vote.

Borah's Re-election Certain.

The Legislature will, it is conceded on the showing made by the partial returns, be strongly Republican, assuring the re-election of Senator Borah and a second Republican Senator to fill the vacancy made by the death of the late W. B. Heyburn.

Southeastern Idaho has gone for President Taft and John M. Haines, Republican candidate for Governor. This is the Mormon stronghold in the state, the vote indicating that the members of the church of the Latter Day Saints voted almost solidly a straight Republican ticket.

The gubernatorial race is doubtful, the returns indicating the election of G. H. Martin, Roosevelt Progressive. He has carried Ada County and is running strong in all southern and southwestern counties. Haines leads both Martin and Governor Hawley in the southwest, Hawley being second.

Hawley Appears to Lead.

North Idaho cast a heavy vote. The returns from there are very incomplete, Nez Perce County being the only one heard from. It looks now like Governor Hawley would be third in the race. Both of the Republican candidates for Congress have survived the contest, apparently assuring seats in the next lower house to Burton I. French and Addison T. Smith. The reelection of Chief Justice George H. Stewart is in doubt. He was cut badly by Republicans and Roosevelt Progressives. Arthur M. Bowen, Democrat, is pressing him closely.

The remainder of the Republican state ticket looks safe, the candidates probably elected being W. I. Gifford, Secretary of State; Fred I. Huston, State Auditor; O. V. Allen, State Treasurer; J. H. Peterson, Attorney-General; Grace M. Shepherd, Superintendent of Public Instruction and R. M. Bell, Mine Inspector.

TAFT AND SELLING LEADING

Roseburg Goes Dry by 150 Votes and Sutherlin Wet by 100.

ROSEBURG, Or., Nov. 4.—With only a few votes counted in the four Roseburg precincts, Taft leads for President with Wilson running a close second. Selling leads for United States Senator.

Incomplete returns from four precincts in Douglas County give Taft 18 Wilson 19, Roosevelt 18. Lane 19.
